

"Mesquite Control" is a new extension publication which may be obtained from any county agent, and it goes into detail on the various means of chemical and mechanical control that can be

A farmer or ranches should consider the type of brush control that is best suited to his farm or ranch depending on the amount of brush and the kind and amount of grasses that he has. The men of the Soil Conservation Service assisting the Hall County Soil Conservation District will be glad to help anyone desiring information on brush control. Cost share for brush control may be obtained from the local ASC office through the Agricultural Conservation program. Cost sharing is based upon the type of brush and the method in which the brush is controlled.

Mechanical methods of brush control are: hand grubbing, root cutters, anchor chains, shredders, root plows and stingers. These methods should be practiced during the season when the grass can make the fastest recovery. Some rangeland may need reseeding at time of brush control to make a good recovery.

Chemicals that can be used include kerosene, diesel oil, and 2,4,D or 2,4,5-T, and should be applied after the trees have leafed out good in the spring.

# Social Security Pays When You **Become Disabled**

Some people in the Panhandle may be losing social security benefits to which they are eligible according to Hal Geldon, manager of the Amarillo Social Security

A person who has been totally and continuously disabled for period of at least six months and who has been employed or selfemployed in work covered by the Social Security Act for approximately five out of the ten-year period before disability began, may be entitled to a disability freeze. | Calif. April, 1950, is the first month farm operators can meet this requirement. Freezing means protecting the person's social security investment, and the period of disability will not count against time. This applies to persons un-

"If you are at least 50 years of age and meet the requirements for a disability freeze, you may be entitled to a monthly disability benefit," Geldon said.

Geldon emphasized that all dis-

abled workers including farmers who have questions regarding the disability protection under the Social Security Act should get in touch with their local social security office now. The district office located at 1006 Adams, Amarillo, serves 26 Texas Panhandle coun-





May I was "Law Day U S. A." a day set aside for dedication to government under law. The basic rights guaranteed all citizens under our constitution, recognized as a "rule of law are: life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

In commenting upon how the people enjoy these rights, the State Bar of Texas made the following comment recently:


First, men and women must want these rights. There are who are willing to go without some of their rights rather bear the responsibilities that go wth them. Futhermore, a lot of us are all for our own rights but don't care about those of the other fellow. But our own rights are safe only for as long as we are willing to go to the defense of the rights of others.

Second, we must have a government genuinely concerned bout the rights of the people and willing not only to state what these are but to enforce them. Millions of people are living under governments that have no such policy. We in America do have such policy.

Third, there must be the necessary facilities for doing the job under a rule of law.

These we have in our courts of law — the representatives of the vast judicial system of our state and nation. Our court houses are the cornerstones of the structure of government under law. Everyone in the courtrooms of the nation - the judge as presiding officer, the attorneys as officers of the blems of schooling due to the miscourt, and other citizens as litigants and jurors - share the responsibility of preserving, strengthening and passing on to and the generally more complex future generations this judicial system which unconditionally problems of society. Our schools guarantees equal justice under law.

For those living under the yoke of communism, the wight of a courthouse stirs fear and hopelessness. It evokes dread visions for people who are condemned to live out their fives by edicts or whims of dictators. But in America, the courthouse is the symbol of a free nation. Inside its doors the dignity of man as an individual will be respected and his equality of rights protected.







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


