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

Hall County wheat farmers voted 79 for and 0 against in the 1961 wheat referendum, held at polling places in the county last Thursday. This information was announced early this week by Lynn McKown, manager of the ASC office here.

Over the nation, the referendum carried by one of the highest percentages in its eight-year history, 87.4 per cent. The only year it was higher was in 1957 when the referendum carried by 87.6

Since the quotas were approved by the necessary two-thirds vote, producers who stay within the acreage allotted for their farms will be eligible for the full announced level of price support on their entire production which will be not less than 75 per cent of parity, McKown said,

The support rate in Hall County for 1960 wheat was \$1.80.

How Important The Orations?


