#### Representative, 18th Congressional District Report From Washington

America reached The Perpetual Pinnacle of Prosperity during the early decades of this century, and for the first time in history the complex activities of financial trade and investment fell into the hands of millions of people all across the country. College boys were selling short between classes. often times on the advice of Aunt Matilda who had just made a fortune in steel. The stock market reports were read with greater ntensity than comic strips or the ticker tape pounded out the naton's pulse at an often feverish

It did not require the Great Avalanche of 1929 to reveal certain unpleasant aspects of the securities business. The State of New York enacted legislation as early as 1909 to protect its people from abuses and shady practices, and other States followed suit. Some of the early laws simply required a license to sell securities while others aimed at punishing any fraud after it appeared. A Congressional Committee proposed regulation as early as 1913, but no action was taken at that time. Interest was heightened during Members present were Mmes. 

Shown above is the Old Stone Church at Lewisburg, West Virginia. This building was erected in 1796 to replace a log structure built in 1783. Well preserved, this building was constructed of limestone blocks said to have been brought on horseback from the banks of the Greenbrier River, four miles away, by the women of the Presbyterian congregation. The interior has been rearranged, but the original pews, the balcony in which the slaves sat, and the pulpit with sounding board have been preserved.
