EDITORIAL

Kennedy Less Liberal Than Congress

The general assumption that Congress would prove o the more conservative than the new administration, and would exercise a restraining influence upon liberal programs put forward by Presidnt Kennedy, may be in need of drastic revision. For at the moment just the oppisite appears to be true. Through the proposals he has transmitted to Congress may be branded as liberal in his fiscal approach to them-in his dealings with money matters-President Kennedy has shown a high degree of caution and orthodoxy. It is Congress, or its committees, which has exhibited little regard for financial and economic effects.

Take, for example, the minimum wage bill which a House subcommittee has approved. As was to be expected, President Kennedy proposed that the present \$1 hourly minimum wage be raised to \$1.25. But he proposed to do it over a three-year period-\$1.15 this year, \$1.20 next year and \$1.25 in 1963. The subcommittee wants to hasten the process, and so the bill it approved calls for the minimum to rise to \$1.15 within 30 days after enactment of the legislation and jump to \$1.25 a year later.

The bill is certain to receive stiff opposition when it reaches the floor, and its scope may be somewhat narrowed. But the view in Washington is that the Senate will pass a broader bill. Chairman James Roosevelt of the House subcommittee showed scant regard for the impact of the bill upon business now under the minimum wage laws and new ones that would be affected, saying that making the change in two steps instead of three would save the Labor Department much paper work.


