





> The extension of the Act for ion tons of raw sugar, if not purchased from Cuba, must be purchased from foreign nations. In other words, the American farmer is denied the right to participate in any portion of the quota which is taken away from Cuba. It will go as a windfall to other foreign nations, many of them Latin American nations. We are all interested in helping Latin America, but the President has only recently indicated a request for \$600 million for that purpose. How can the taxpayers of this country assume a burden of that kind if they are to be denied the right to produce products necesery to provide for their own subsistence? Onefourth of the Cuban quota assigned to domestic producers who must carry the tax load would go a long way toward solving three problems. One, it would help the economic situation in areas that can grow sugar beets. Two, it would permit the planting of sugar beets, a non-surplus crop. and thereby reduce surplus crops. Three, it would help to stem the outflow of gold from this country. And, I might add, that would not hurt our foreign relations, because the foreign countries would not lose any tonnage. In fact, they would be gaining the remaining 75 per cent of the Cuban quota. But it appears that those interests who have gained control of the sugar business are so overcome by their own greed that they are willing to risk anything to prevent additional domestic production of sugar or permit the people to be heard on the subject.

If this present proposed extension is jammed through the Congress, I would say to those responsible that it would be well to remember the old Indian saying: "If you fool me once, it's your fault. But if you fool me twice, it's

President Kennedy's Farm Program

President J. F. Kennedy presented a 6,800-word mess age to Congress last Thursday in which he proposed a writeit-yourself program for American farmers.

Under the proposed plan, farmers themselves would be authorized to draft and adopt, subject to congressional veto, a sweeping new series of crop-by-crop farm marketing control programs to cut surpluses and boost farm income,

President Kennedy is hopeful that the plan will be able to lift farmers' income to equality with the income of city

The President, in the message stated that the farm problem could not be solved "in a day or in a year, or perhaps even in this administration." But he said his proposal would eventually cut the tax cost of the farm program by reducing farm surpluses, and would "gradually reverse" the decline in

The alternative to boosting farm income, he said, is a "substandard rural economy (and) a weakened nation." He promised consumers the proposed new plans would assure them "stable" price levels.

The message from the President explained that the vexing problem of overproduction needs a commodity-by-commodity approach which would be worked out by farmer groups in consultation with the Secretary of Agriculture, and then submitted to Congress for a final review. The legislators thus would retain a veto power over individual programs.

A Washington news release Friday, following the President's message stated that leaders of two of the nation's largest farm organizations and most Democratic congressmen praised President Kennedy's plan to let farmers write their own ticket. 
