





Mr. and Mrs. Cosby and their two sons reside at 917 Harrison Street.



EDITORIAL

State Highway Needs

With National Highway Week only a few days away, May 21-27, the state's highway officials feel an apprehension rather than elation over the week. For at this time of the year, highway traffic will "snow under" most of the State's highways.

Texas has been undergoing a fantastic growth in motor vehicles and if the statistics continue the trend established in the past, the State may suddenly be faced with the most terrific traffic jam in history. Texas reached the one million mark in motor vehicles in 1926. It took 21 years to reach the second million, in 1947. During the next decade the number jumped to four million and from 1957 to date Texas added almost another million.

The statistical growth rate reveals the chilling fact that instead of needing 21 years to gain a million vehicles, fastexpanding Texas can now do it in three years.

Under present financing, the Texas highway network cannot begin to keep pace with the "motor vehicle explosion." More than one-third of the total State-maintained highway mileage in Texas is already obsolete - or about to become soby modern traffic standards. This dilemma faced by highway officials caused State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer to term Highway Week "not an occasion to brag on what we have done, but to focus attention on the tremendous task we must face in the future.

Foremost among Texas Highway problems, Greer said, is the fact that more than one-third of the total state-maintained highway mileage in Texas is obsolete, or about to become so. This is Texas' 25,000-mile network of U.S. and State-numbered highways. The system has been "almost totally antiquated," Greer said, by an enormous increase in traffic.

This system of "trunk" highways is litterally the lifeline of the development of Texas. These highways serve more than a thousand Texas cities and towns. Many were built in the early days and are now out of date and completely inadequate for the 18 billion vehicle miles traveled on them in a year.

The problem is compounded by lack of money. The trunk they bit off a mouthfull. Hall Farmers Are Using More Com. Fertilizer

Farmers in Hall County are using large amounts of commercial fertilizer this year as a result of last year's fertilizer test plots and of having their soil tested, County Agent W. B. Hooser announced this week.

Where the soil tests show very low in organic matter, the fertilizer will not pay the expenses incurred, he said.

Hooser reports that some farmers who had been using 100 pounds are now using 400 pounds of commercial fertilizer per acre, where the organic matter shows to be high in the test.

For good grain sorghum and sweet sorghum under normal rainfall conditions, approximately 150 pounds of nitrogen, 60 pounds of phosphoric acid, 150 pounds of potash and 800 pounds of calcium oxide are needed per acre, according to the county agent.

"After we test a sample of soil, we can predict with a reasonable degree of certainty what the limiting nutrient will be in crop prosaid.

The agricultural agent pointed | out that fertilizer recommendations are affected by other conditions in addition to the amount of plant nutrients present. Some of these conditions are soil type end soil characteristics, amount of leaching, soil structure, the preceeding crop on the land, and crop to be grown, previous soil treat-

ment and seed-bed treatment. Hooser offered this idea as a means of making money for any farmer. He said that using the

There are other factors, of course, such as good seed, good seedbed and the weather conditions. But the key to the situation is balanced fertilizer

The way to siart on a program of balanced fertility, he said, is with a soil test.

"It's pretty hard to tell what your soil needs for maximum production until you know what is in it. That is where the soil test comes in. The money you spend for a soil test will be the best fertilizer money you spend," he explained.

Hooser added that perhaps a farmer is already using fertilizer and it is not living up to expectations. In this case, he may be using the wrong kind of fertilizer, or he may not be putting it where the crop can use it to best advantage. Another common fault is simply not applying enough fer-

tilizer, he said. Most farmers know the three erimary plant foods-nitrogen. phosphorus and potassium-but how many know what each of these does for his crop, was a question put forth by Hooser.




