Community Responsibility Comes First (AN EDITORIAL)

The troubled times of the past many months for Hall County came to a head last week with the issuing of a corpora tion charter to a new newspaper for Memphis and the surrounding area. All during this controversy over the county hospital question The Memphis Democrat has stood on the grounds of reporting the news as it happened, and let the people of the county make up their own minds as to the various aspects of the situation. We have diligently tried to report all facts that were brought to light in the issue.

It had been our hope throughout this time of trouble that there would eventually be some common ground whereby the two factions could reach a compromise which would be acceptable to both sides. As a result of our efforts toward this end, a group of hospital proponents at one time met in our office and implied they would cut off our livelihood by stopping their advertising and other expenditures. Our answer was that of any honorable newspaper, that our editorial policy could not be bought. As a result, a new newspaper is being started.

We here at The Democrat have, for many years, believed that the prosperity of Memphis is dependent upon agriculture. 
A charter was granted by the Office of the Secretary of State in Austin last week for the organization of a corporation, under the name of Hall County News.

The charter was granted Monday, July 31, according to information received from the Secretary of State's office.



Beneficiaries who earn over \$1200 will lose one dollar of benefits for each two dollars of earnings between \$1200 and \$1700. and a dollar of benefits for each dollar of earnings over \$1700. Except that they are eligible for social security benefits for any month in which they do not earn over \$100 in wages and have not worked in their own business. "After age 72, thre is no restriction on a person's earnings, although the limits apply to all months before the 72nd birthday,'

Fishing \$1200 during the year, it is important to notify the Social Security Office promptly of such earnings in order to avoid receiving an overpayment. All such overpayments must be repaid. 





EDITORIAL

The Problem of Criminals

In the August issue of the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin, the national problem of dealing with criminals was discussed forthrightly. In a letter, addressed to all law enforcement officials, J. Edgar Hoover, FBI director, made the following statement:

Nothing discourages and disheartens law enforcement officers more than the knowledge that their efforts in apprehending criminals are too often no more than useless expenditures of time and money-useless because unwarranted leniency in the form of suspended sentences, parole, or probation so frequently makes a mockery of good police work.

Assuredly, we must continually strive to rehabilitate those persons who have strayed from lawful ways. On the other hand, consideration must be given to protecting society by isolating depraved individuals who have no respect for law and order or the rights of others. The scales of justice must be balanced.

Certainly, the principles of parole, probation, and other rehabilitative measures are good, but maladministration can nullify their worthwhile aspects. Conscientious, hard-working parole and probation officers, frequently underpaid and seldom able to discharge the heavy burdens placed upon them by the archaic clemency systems still existing in some areas, are just not equipped to cope with ever-expanding caseloads. Adding to their dilemma are some misinformed and misguided jurists and an apathetic citizenry who cause and condone the release of hardened criminals who gloatingly accept society's softness and repay it in the coin of treachery.
