EDITORIAL

Communist Home Trouble

The world troubles continued on their same course, but at a decreased rate during the past weeks, with diplomats sensing a certain unsettled attitude among the diplomats of the Soviet Union. The real meaning of this cannot be pinpointed yet, however, several theories have been advanced.

One theory is that the continued break with the Red Chinese has gone on to cause a break inside the Soviet leadership itself, due to the two ideas of dealing with the Chinese. One of these is the idea of putting pressure on the Chinese in order to bring them into submission, as has been done in the

The other group in the Kremlin believed that Khrushchev is being too easy on the West and should solve his Red Chinese problem by taking the initative in the drive to make all the

At present most observers believe that Khrushchev has the support of the majority of the high Communist party leaders. However, this isn't to be taken as an overall approval for the policy of being "soft" on the Berlin issue and other such questions. It seems that Khrushchev is in favor of easing tension with the West, of providing more consumer goods inside Russia, and in favor of keeping his military strong enough to scare us but not to actually conquer us. His real war with us will probably be on the economic front and in the infiltration of other countries, take-over from within.

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

qualify for social security payments has been substantially reduced under the 1961 changes in the law, according to Hal Geldon, Security office.

Some people who were not able to receive any retirement or family insurance benefits because there had not been enough work, are now eligible for payments. Applicants whose claims were denied before June 1961 should inquire again if the worker has at least a year and a half of social security work.

Anyone who reaches age 65 or died before 1958 now needs only a year and a half of social security work to be fully insured. A man who reaches age 65 or a woman who reaches 62 this year needs only about two and threefourths years of work covered by social security to be eligible to

receive retirement benefits. Anyone in this area who wants to know if he is now eligible for payments should get in touch with the Amarillo Social Security Office, located at 1006 Adams St.
