
the State Health Department. During the lunch hour the Hospital Committee met and discussed the latest plans, and then after the court came back into session, they recommended that the Court

accept them. The Court committee to look further into an offer for the donation of a site and to report back with their recommendations when the commissioners meet next Monday. The Commissioners Court has already purchased the land for one site, but it was pointed out in the meeting that if the other site under consideration was donated, then the county could probably sell the first site for about as much as they had paid for it. The Court also named County Attorney John Deaver to serve as the person to sign all legal papers necessary in connection with the hospital program. The commissioners also discussed the necessity of having soil tests made at the hospital site sometime within the near future. The approved plan shows 14 single rooms and eight double rooms for patients, for a capacity of 30 beds. However, it was pointed out that extra beds could be added to the single rooms if needed in emergencies. The actual cost of constructing the building according to the latest plans has not been figured as yet, but it was estimated that, after the construction was completed, there will still be about \$50,000 left for the hospital to use as operating capital.

The plan will be submitted to the State Department of Health and the Public Health Service for their approval also as one of the steps necessary in the overall program.
