The polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m., with a large turnout expected.

All voters must take their poll tax receipts with them to the voting places. There the receipt will be stamped either "Democrat" or "Republican," depending on the primary in which each person is voting. If the voter has lost his or her poll tax receipt, the presiding judge at the box will issue

In the case of persons not required to have a poll tax receipt, the presiding judge will issue a certificate of party affiliation.

Saturday night The Memphis Democrat will post a bulletin board showing the results of the voting in the county races.

A copy of the ballot to be used Saturday appears on an other page in this issue of The Democrat.

A Republican Primary will be conducted from a voting box in Estelline at the home of Oscar Wright, county Republican chairman, and in Memphis No. 1 Precinct at the home of Frank Van Pelt, 1809 Montgomery St.

License Suspension Part of Safety Program

The Texas Department of Public Safety operates several types of programs which help insure our safety on the highways. Most of us think of the department in terms of patroling the highways. However, another important phase of work is the driver license suspensions and denials.

In Hall County last year there were a total of 23 actions on drivers licenses. Of this number 12 licenses were suspended for driving while intoxicated and another 6 were denied for this reason.
