How the U.S. Department of Agriculture Serves You

Next Tuesday, May 15, marks the 100th Anniversary of the founding of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. On that date in 1862 President Lincoln approved an Act of Congress creating the department, "the general design and duties of which shall be to acquire and diffuse among the people of the United States useful information on subjects connected with agriculture in the most general and comprehensive sense of that word." And this effort toward the increasing of the capabilities of the American farmer have met with more successthan any other phase similar effort anywhere in the world.

After its founding in 1862, the Department was elevated to the eighth Executive Department in the Federal Government with Cabinet rank in 1889. The Department is headed by Washington, D. C. by the Secretary of Agriculture. He and his staff direct the programs and activities assigned to the Department by Congress in every part of the United States, and in many Foreign countries employees administer programs authorized by Congress.

The activities of the Department include many different phases. There are seven USDA agencies engaged in research and the department also works closely with States, schools and other public and private agencies. In addition to research on crops, farm and land management, livestock, human nutrition and home economics, the department also does general economic and statistical analysis, marketing economics, farm economics and foreign economic analysis.

Another important phase of the Agriculture Department is education. The cooperative Extension Service is the field education ar mof the Department and land-grant colleges. In every rural county, extension workers conduct an educational program designed to help farm families and others use research findings and other government aids. 





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Memphis Makes Contrubition To Aid Camp Kiowa

Memphis citizens have contributed \$2,930.00 in pledges and funds to expand facilities at Camp Kiowa, located near Canadian, and build a Council Service Center, Tony Craig, chairman of the drive, announced this week.

In February of this year, a 15county campaign was organized to raise a total of \$139,000.00, Craig said.

E. E. Shelhamer, general chairman, reports that contributions to date have reached \$116,000.00. It is estimated that by 1970 there will be nearly 7,000 Boy Scout members and 270 Scout units with over 2,500 volunteer adults. Camp Kiowa would have to expand to meet this growth.

This expansion program will include a new water well, table and benches, remodeling kitchen and dining hall, new camp service building, trading post and office central showers, camp ranger's home, craft and recreation pavilion, five new camp sites, additional camp land, special camp maintenance projects, new housing for the staff and many other things will be needed to take care of the additional 2,300 boys between now and 1970.

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

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


