School Board Names Billy J. Hall Monday

The Memphis School Board Monday night appointed Billy J. Hall to fill out the unexpired term of W. A. Smith, who recently resigned.

Hall was telephoned after his appointment, and he immediately took his place on the board.

In other important business, the board discussed the annual senior trip. The group decided to take the matter up again at a future meeting and in the meantime to discuss the problem with interested citizens. Anyone desiring to discuss the matter should contact a member of the school board, it was announced.

The board received a proposed budget from the athletic department and the band department. Members plan to study the budget requests and act on the matter at their next regular meeting.

Another important matter discussed was the teaching of the Lakeview and Clarendon colored youths. The board discussed a contract sent them by the Lakeview school board, and decided to consider the matter further before making a decision.

The board voted to have the teachers in the system draw up a list of supplies which they feel they will need for next year, and

submit it to the board for consideration.

They also awarded a contract to Blair-Hamilton Office Supply to clean and service the typewriter.

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Commissioners Have Light Meeting Monday

The Hall County Commissioners Court met Monday with only a light schedule of business coming before the group, according to records in the office of Ruby Goodnight, county clerk.

The Court designated June 1 as the day for persons to appear who have already registered their complaint in tax evaluation. Taxpayers will be notified by card of the meeting which will be from 10 to 12 a. m.

The Court also approved the regular reports and payment of bills.

They approved a motion for Precinct No. 2 to make a deposit of \$50 to secure a water meter under a new system being established in that community.

County Demos. Name Delegates To State Meeting

Hall County Democrats pledged their support to the Texas governor candidate the party will nominate in the June 2 run-off election, and named six delegates to the state convention.

Party delegates held their county convention in the court house in Memphis in a session which lasted an hour and a half.

Joe Allen Ballard of Estelline was named chairman of the Hall County delegation to the state convention. Other delegates who were elected include O. E. Bevers of Lakeview, Herschel Combs and J. W. Coppedge of Memphis, Eugene Ferguson of Turkey, and Clyde Fowler of Brice. The slate of alternates to the state convention are: Mrs. J. A. Ballard of Estelline, Mrs. Bray Cook and Bill Cosby of Memphis, V. C. Durrett of Lakeview, Elmer Lacy of Turkey and J. Claude Wells of Memphis.

In pledging their support to the Democratic nominee for governor at both the state convention and in the general election campaign, the delegates approved a resolution rededicating their "energies to insure a stronger, more united and victorious Democratic party in Texas."

In addition to studying the educational system, the group also gave considerable time to the study of economical and political conditions in the Soviet Union and religion there.

Dr. Golden has held various educational positions over the past

years, serving as president of Eastern New Mexico University at Portales for the 19 years prior to the time when he joined the Amarillo firm in 1960.

He is a past district governor of Rotary International, a 32nd degree Mason, a deacon in the First Baptist Church and has also held various other positions over the years.

Following the address, James A. Adcock will explain the class gift, and Prin. C. E. Voyles will recognize the honor students.

New Water System To Be Built At Lakeview

Work has been progressing this week on the establishment of a Water Supply Cooperation at Lakeview, according to B. E. Dav- enport, chairman of the board of directors.

The organization has contracted with an engineering firm to begin work on the advance stages of the project which is expected to entail about \$65,000 to \$80,000.

The project is to provide the community of Lakeview with a

water system and money for the project is available by financing it through the Farmers Home Administration.

Engineers have stated that they feel that there is an ample water supply for a modern water system.

Other directors of the organization include Woodrow Mullin, J. B. Skinner, R. C. Clements and Joe Durham. These will serve until January when an election will be held.

Rain Gives Area Good Moisture

Rain threatened all this week, and finally broke loose Wednesday night with a little less than an inch over most of the county.

Here in Memphis, John J. McMickin, official weather observer, measured .65 of an inch. Half an inch was reported at Lakeview, and Brice, and one inch at Parnell. Estelline reported about half an inch, but Tell reported no rain, and some is needed in that area before planting can begin. About

two inches was reported at Tur-

key. As a whole, the rain was described as beneficial by most of the farmers, and damage to early cotton was probably slight.

Temperatures for the past week have mostly been pleasant with a low this morning of 63 degrees, according to McMickin.

Other temperatures included Wednesday 68-67, Tuesday 81-68, Monday 83-67, Sunday 90-64, Saturday 99-62.

A Big Vote—A Good Sign

One of the most rewarding things that persons in Carson County have felt in a long time came to mind after the hustle and bustle of compiling the election returns was over and one had time to relax and reflect on the day's events.

When the total vote was in, there were 1,723 Democrats who voted and 272 Republicans for a county total of 1,956 votes cast in the primary elections.

The total vote is a sizeable figure for a small county, but not nearly so astonishing as when it is compared to the 2,096 paid poll taxes and 55 exemptions.

Based on the total eligible voters via the poll taxes and exemptions, the vote was an overwhelming 61.4 per cent of the Carson County eligible voters went to the polls to vote in the primaries Saturday.

The figure is a bit deceiving as in small counties, under 10,000 there is no requirement for persons over the exemption age to secure an exemption certificate to be eligible to vote. With the group voting, and not being counted as part of the number of eligible voters, the actual percentage is high for the turnout.

However, by adding in some 200 to 300 persons voting who do not need an exemption certificate, the percentage is still in the high 80's, a figure of which the voters of the county can well be proud.

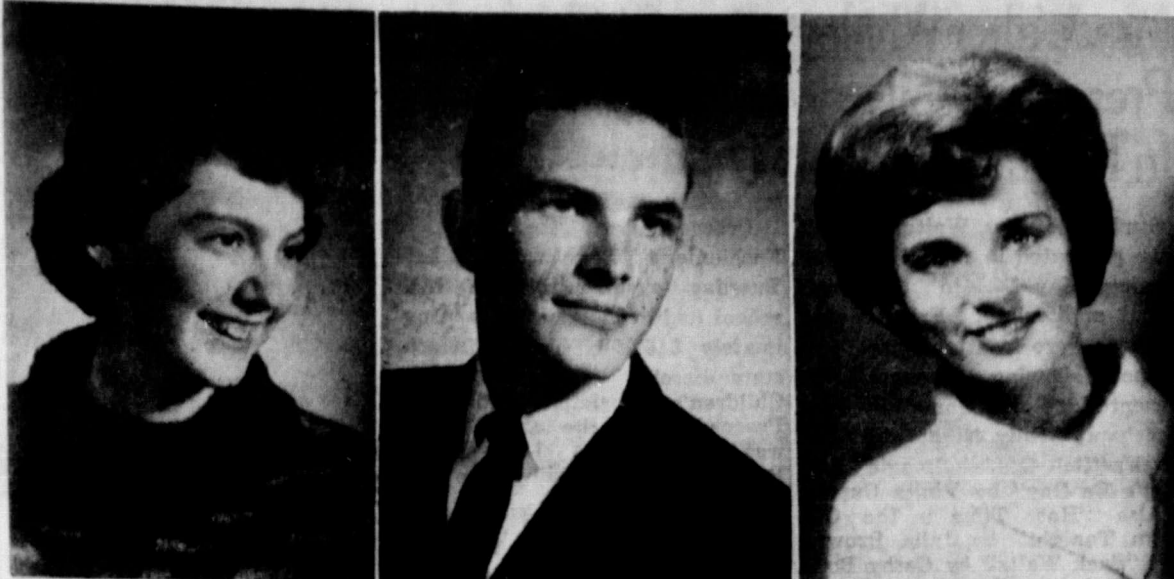

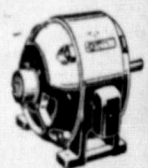

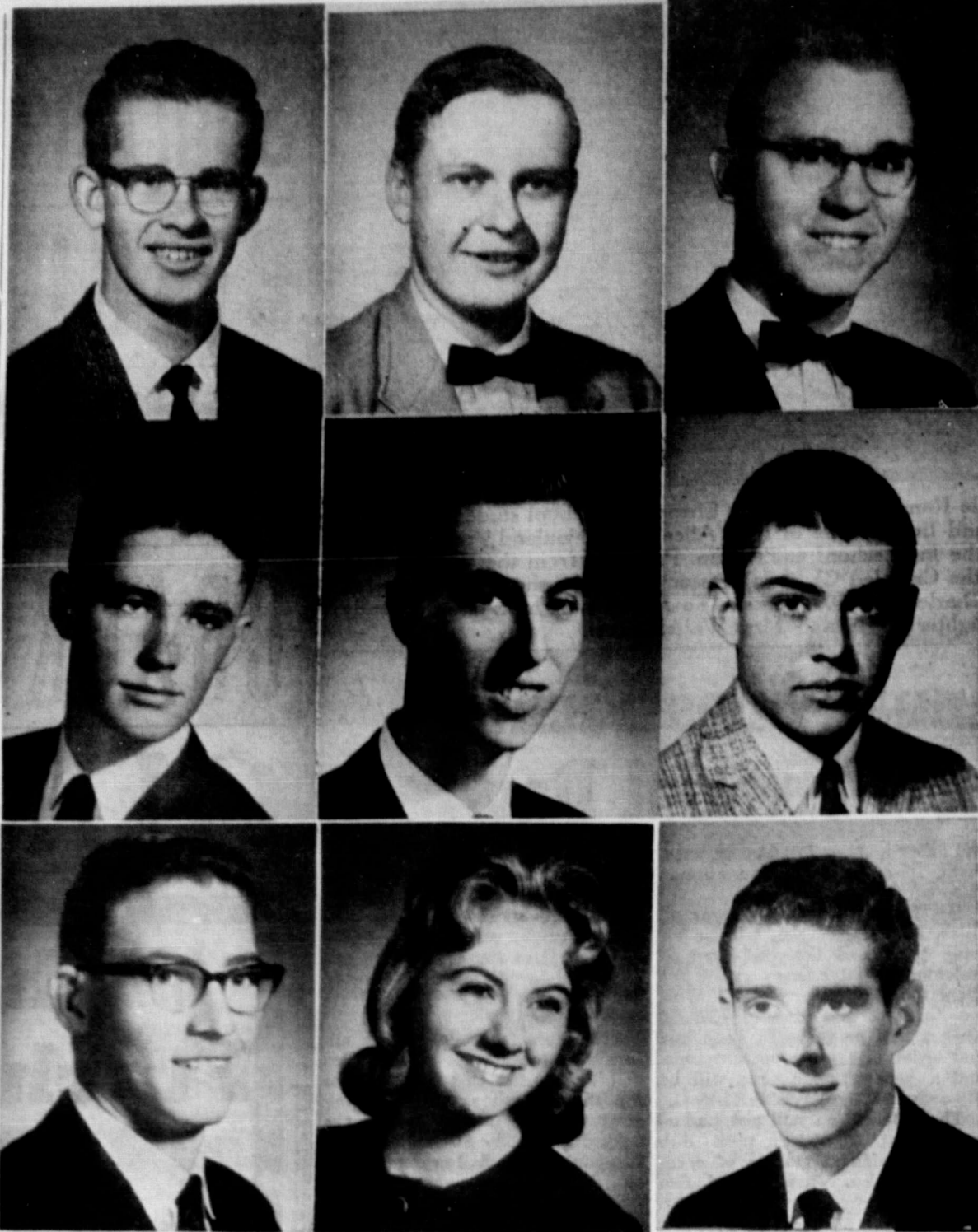

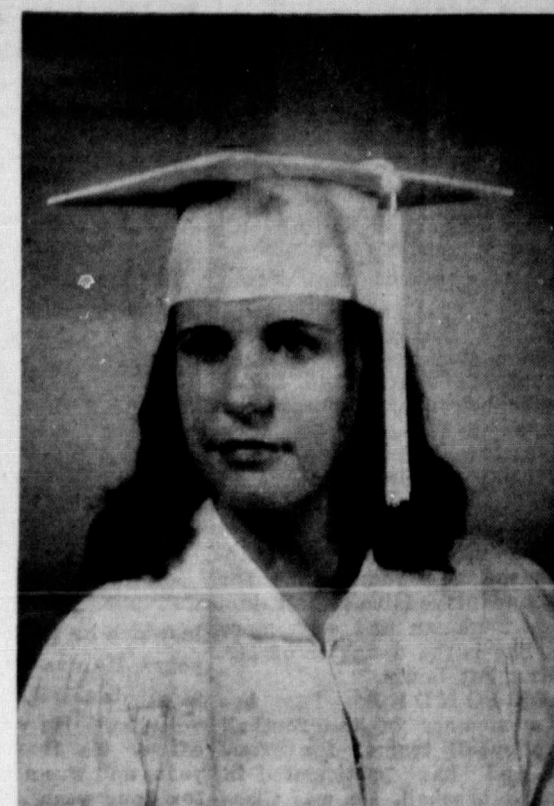
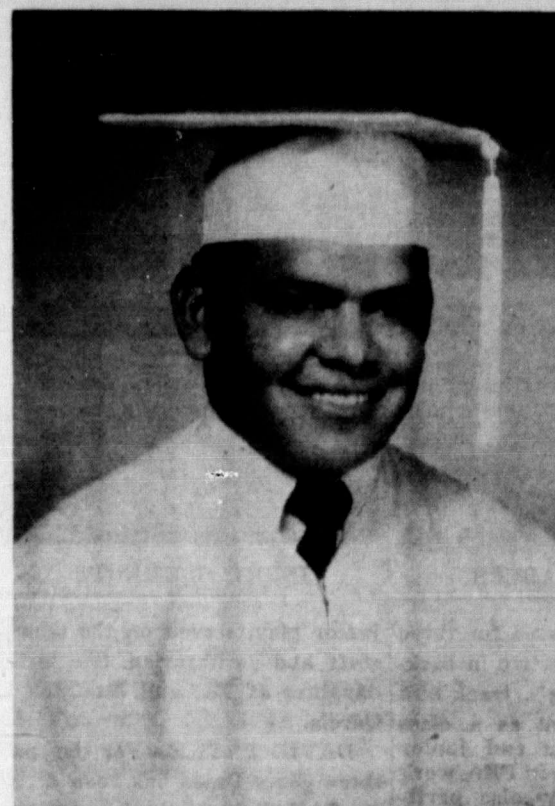

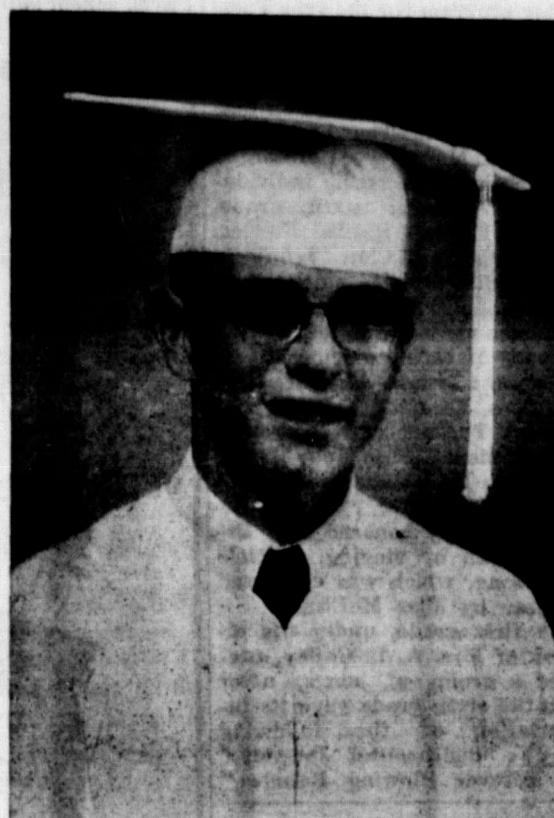

Report From Washington

Emergency? This letter is about the Sugar Act. I have written several in the past. There will probably be others before we are able to obtain the fair treatment to which the American farmer is entitled. But, in any event, the fight will continue until justice is done. I headed the newsletter "Emergency" because this subterfuge has been used time and again to gain extensions of an unfair Sugar Act. It is another case of crying "wolf" when there is no wolf. The time could well come when there will be a wolf, and the American people will have been so drugged by false emergency cries that they may be hurt by the real emergency. We have heard a lot about an expanded Reciprocal Trade Program. I think it would be well for the Congress to study the Sugar Act and the activities that have occurred thereunder before formulating any new policy. Much can be learned. Proper corrections could be made that would measurably benefit the economy of this country and especially the American farmer. Much land that is now being used to grow surplus crops could be diverted to sugar beets and the entire economy would profit. For a number of years this country has imported 45 per cent of its sugar requirements. It could produce domestically within the continental United States all of the sugar it needs and have some for export. It is not proposed that this latter be done, but it is proposed that a more realistic ratio as between imports and domestic production be effected. The Administration was supposed to have treated this problem and to have presented to the Congress new sugar legislation in the early days of this session. That proposal has not yet come to the Congress. The present Sugar Act expires on June 30th of this year. Last year, an at-

tempt was made by the "sugar trust" to extend the act for three years, but those of us who realize what is going on were able to block this and limit the extension to June 30th of this year. We had hoped that this would force new sugar legislation that would be fair to the American farmer. However, nothing has been done to date indicating that such attention will be had. The situation is exactly as it has been in former years. The termination date of the Sugar Act is fast approaching. The "sugar trust" will be crying "emergency". They will demand an extension through the Congress. Their argument will be that unless the act is extended there will be a sugar shortage, because the sugar importers will not be able to contract far enough in advance for deliveries to reach our shores in time. This is utter nonsense. Foreign countries are clamoring to sell sugar, and this is out of their great markets. If such an extension is gained without amendment to the present law, it will simply mean that a group of international bankers will again reap a rich harvest at the expense of the American farmer and the American taxpayer. In anticipation of this move being made by the "sugar trust," I have proposed an amendment to the present act that should be adopted if the act is extended. This proposed amendment would make it possible for the President of the United States to allocate to continental domestic beet growers 750,000 tons of sugar and to continental domestic cane growers 250,000 tons of sugar, in addition to that now being produced. This sugar allocation would come out of the sugar allocations formerly held by our Communist neighbor to the south, Cuba. You will recall that Cuba was selling to this country three million tons of sugar a year. The Congress brought about the cancellation of these imports as well as other imports from Cuba. However, the "sugar trust" was not asleep, and when they realized that we were going to cancel the Cuban allocations, they were able to have inserted in the Sugar Act a provision that the three million tons of sugar formerly purchased from Cuba must be purchased from other foreign countries. This meant that American farmers were absolutely and positively denied the right to produce one pound of sugar that we had formerly purchased from Cuba. It has been suspected that although Cuba cannot sell sugar to this country direct, it is entirely possible that the American people may be eating some Cuban sugar. We must not underestimate the power, the influence, and the trickery of the "sugar trust." If they could make more money by transshipping Cuban sugar so that it would finally end up in this country, please do not doubt that they would do it. And, I would point out in this regard that the "sugar trust" is not made up solely of Americans. It is made up of a great number of foreigners who owe no allegiance to this country whatever. Please understand that I am not saying that this group is importing Cuban sugar, but I am saying that the possibility exists. I am further saying that by proper action with regard to the Sugar Act, discrimination against the American farmer could be stopped. We would then know that whatever additional amount of sugar was being produced by American farmers certainly was not coming from Communist Cuba. This has been a long, hard fight, and it may continue for some time, but I have faith that in the final analysis we are going to win, whether it takes ten days or ten years.
