During the past months there have been several instances uncovered where the U. S. government (and that's us taxpayrs) have been taken to the cleaners. The probe into possible mishandling by various businesses will probably go on into many fields before it is finished. It really began in earnest when Congress began to look into the Billie Sol Estes case, and now it will probably cover many other areas.

There have been shortages of grain in warehouses reported, as well as cases of mixing commercial feed grain with grain for human consumption before it is shipped overseas. This goes a long way toward losing friends for us overseas.

An the problems are not all in the Agriculture Department either. The other day we ran across a small story concerning blue-serge uniform coats for the Air Force. It seems that the Comptroller General added up and found out that the Air Force spent 9.6 million dollars on 492,00 unneeded blue-serge uniform coats. This resulted in enough coats to take care of the Air Force for the next eight and one-half years. The Pentagon said the purchase took advantage of low prices, but the Comptroller General pointed out that it would cost something to store and preserve them, plus the interest on the money invested in the coats.

Memories Furning Back Ti From The Democrat Files

August 3, 1922

On the 20th day of July 1867, just fifty-five years ago today John W. 



Within a short time, another patrolman flashed the message that a plane had crashed in a field five miles east of Buffalo. From the scene he radioed that he had found a section of the plane and was able to read the word "Braniff." Waco communications sent a message to Dallas where communications men contacted Braniff Airways to learn that their airliner was in the area and overdue. Braniff provided the DPS with a passenger list containing 34 names.

The highway patrol captain who assumed charge of security and rescue operations advised headquarters through the communications system that an identification team was needed. By this time it was determined that there were no survivors. At the scene, temporary communications were set up, making use of walkie-talkies for the grim identification task. Later, the DPS mobile communications center arrived from Austin, providing more complete communications for the local area and a straight circuit to Austin.

Here was a case where good communications, through work on the part of all DPS personnel involved, and close cooperation among all agencies involved minimized the difficulties normally accompanying this type of operation. The result was that within 48 hours, all 34 of the victims of the tragic crash were identified and their next of kin notified.



Act. This law applies mainly to gifts and stock shares.

The law creates the "custodian" with powers much like those of a trustee or guardian. He is often a parent-donor who manages the stock. He must reinvest or sell the stock for the child.

The custodian must act as 'prudent person." He cannot buy and sell the stock for his own benefit, nor can he be negligent. The gift can only be used for the minor's benefit, and for his support and education. The People often make gifts to custodian cannot mingle his own youngsters and sometimes save on property with the child's. After the child becomes 21 the whole gift or what is left of it must go

> In rare cases, the law may let a giver revoke his gift, as when he gave it in contemplation of the minor's marriage which did not take place. He may also reresult of undue influence or fraud.
