### 4,000 Receive Vaccine, Make-Up To Be Saturday

A make-up for all Hall County and Hedley area residents who were not able to receive the Type I Oral Polio Vaccine last Sunday will be held from 3 to 4 p. m. Saturday at the courthouse in Memphis, Dr. Jack Rose, president of the Memphis Lions Club, announced this week.

Approximately 4,000 persons received the vaccine during "Polio Sunday."

"The same set-up will be used Saturday that was used last Sunday," President Rose said.

Persons desiring the vaccine are asked to enter the west door of the courthouse and exit through the east door.

The distribution of the vaccine is free to everyone. The sponsoring organizations are asking that those who feel they can donate 25 cents as they come through the line.

**Band To Play**  
In conjunction with the make-up on the Polio Vaccine and also in conjunction with the Hall County Picnic, the Memphis High School Band will play a concert on the courthouse square beginning at 3:30 p. m. Saturday.

Band Director Bill Bradley said the band would arrive at the courthouse in time for those students who have not taken the vaccine to do so before the concert.

All area residents who were unable to receive the vaccine last Sunday are urged to take it from 3 to 4 p. m. Saturday. The sponsoring organizations desire an overall turnout of 6,000 persons. So far, 2,000 persons have not shown up to receive their vaccine, it was pointed out.

The Memphis Jaycees, who furnished transportation and personnel for the program last Sunday, will again furnish these same services.

Organizations helping with the distribution of the vaccine include the Memphis Lions Club, Hall County Medical Society, Memphis Jaycees, and the Simmons-Noel Post of the American Legion.

In four weeks, the Type III vaccine will be distributed, and in eight weeks the Type II vaccine

The Memphis Cyclone, at full strength, will be host Friday night to the Crowell Wildcats in a non-district contest between two Class A teams. Game time is 8 p. m.

Both teams lost their season openers last Friday night to Class AA powers. Iowa Park defeated the Crowell team 18-0 while the local boys were downed by Tulia 76-0.

The local team will go into the game with four sophomores in their lineup while the probable starters of the Crowell eleven contains eight sophomores.

Two of the Cyclone's best boys will be back in the lineup against Crowell. Senior Tackle Dale Sexton will be in the lineup in the right tackle slot. The team's doctor informed Sexton that he could begin working out in pads last weekend.

Also, Junior Halfback Bill Pounds, as was predicted, will be back in the lineup. Coach Don Lambert stated that Pounds and Sexton are handling themselves very well.

Several position changes will take place due to Pounds and Sexton being in the lineup. Coach Lambert said. Sexton will play right tackle and James Carroll will move to left tackle, his old position. Dwight Gailey, who played left tackle Friday night, will move back to his quarterback slot. Bill Pounds will be in the right halfback position and Mike Crow will go back to the fullback slot. Guard Jerry Lowe will move from fullback to left guard.

Another change Friday night will be End James Waites moving to a halfback position. Coach Lambert said he needed speed, pass-catching ability, weight and blocking ability, in the halfback position, and he has been looking at Waites this week in workouts as a possibility.

Possible starters will include: Richard Ellis, lb; James Carroll, lb; Jerry Lowe, lg; Donnie Bridges, c; Rex Grisham, rg; Dale Sexton, rt; Jacky Bridges, re. The line will average 187 pounds per man.

Mrs. Cap Oreutt, guest speaker, spoke to Freshmen girl students of the Estelline Homemaking Department Tuesday morning.

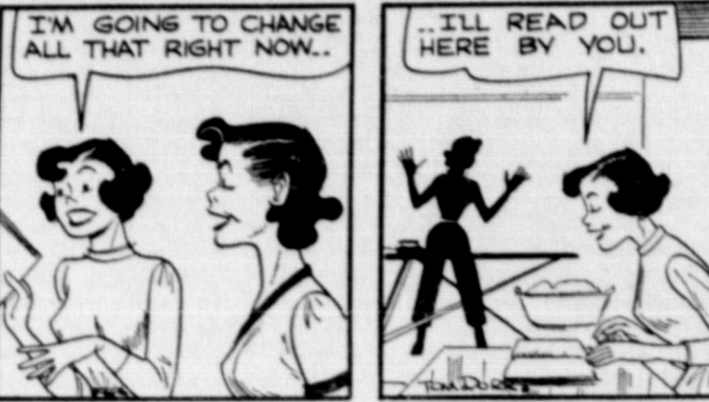
She spoke on personal grooming, the correct care of the hair, nails, etc. This is one of the selected topics required by the state, according to reports.

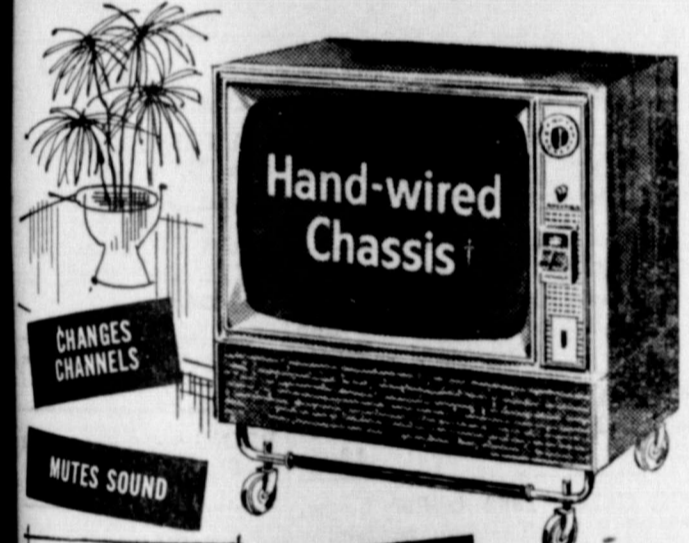

### Report From Washington

#### Historic Changes At Pennsylvania Avenue

...to the White House, our official home, is a treat at any time, but since the restoration has shown results, the thrill is gratifying. For the 12 years I have had the honor to represent you in the U. S. House of Representatives, Mrs. Rogers and I have had many occasions to tour the White House. Before we have been here, we have seen the changes that have reinforced the historic flavor of the White House with the restoration of so many old and beautiful features — coveted possessions — collectors and private citizens have either loaned or bought these priceless antiques. I have seen the White House associated with past Presidents which symbolize the dignity of the President's House. It is no exaggeration to say that over 1,260,000 people have visited the White House this year.

her financial backing through private donations and asked Congress only for a law making the White House a museum under the vigilance of the Smithsonian Institution. The First Lady has the reputation of being a knowledgeable bargain hunter in the art and antique field and it is said that she is a master of the "soft sell." I suspect that many women were born with this "virtue," but my good wife disagrees.

Nevertheless, the Fine Arts Commission has 240 acquisitions to its credit, one of which is the famous 4 horsemen Remington bronze statue entitled, "Coming Through the Rye," a contribution of the Amon Carter Foundation. The Commission was prudently reinforced with an 18 member Advisory Committee including such noted historians as Julian Boyd, editor of the Jefferson papers, and Lyman Butterfield, editor of the Adams papers, plus directors and curators of leading U. S. museums and galleries.

Despite this formidable array of talent with which Mrs. Kennedy surrounded herself, the authenticity of the Baltimore desk on view in the Green Room which she so proudly displayed as "our first piece of unsolicited fine furniture" in the televised tour of the White House last February is in dispute and will be replaced by

the famous Burgess desk, a well-known, well-documented piece of early 19th Century Maryland furniture.

The Green Room, the Red Room, the Blue Room, and so on—each is a splendor in itself and beckons the respecter of history, beauty and tradition. The East Room, now restored to its original gold and white decoration, serves as a great reception room on state occasions, but it is said that Mrs. Abigail Adams, the first First Lady to inhabit the newly constructed White House in 1800, used this room for drying clothes.

All of the rooms are handsomely appointed and other beauties are to be added in the years to come. I was most impressed with the restoration of the Diplomatic Reception Room. In 1960, during the Eisenhower Administration, the National Society of Interior Designers furnished the room with excellent examples of American craftsmanship. A rug in the Aubusson manner was woven, incorporating the seals of the 50 States. The soft, chairs and tables of New York and New England origin are in the appropriate classical or Federal style. The light cream-colored carpet and furniture upholstered in shades of yellow create a color scheme of superb gold and white, also popular in the early years of the Republic.

But in 1961 Mrs. Kennedy discovered, papered the walls of a Thurmont, Maryland, home, a picturesque wallpaper called "Scenic America" printed in 1834. Can you imagine the tedious job of removing paper of this vintage and value, piece by piece, with only a canvas backing for protection? However, today it graces the walls of this oval shaped room which are ideally suited to the panoramic sweep of the scenic views based on engravings of the 1820's which contain five views of American wonders particularly admired by Europeans, i. e., Niagara Falls, the Natural Bridge of Virginia, Boston Harbor, West Point, and New York Bay.

The White House is open to the public every day Tuesday through Saturday from 10 until noon. It is a "must" on the agenda of everyone visiting Washington, and if you give me sufficient notice I can arrange for you to see some of the rooms not generally open to the public. If a personal tour of the White House is not possible, second best is a copy of the book just published by the White House Historical Association, which is the first of a series of historic guides done in color and well worth the \$1.00 charge.

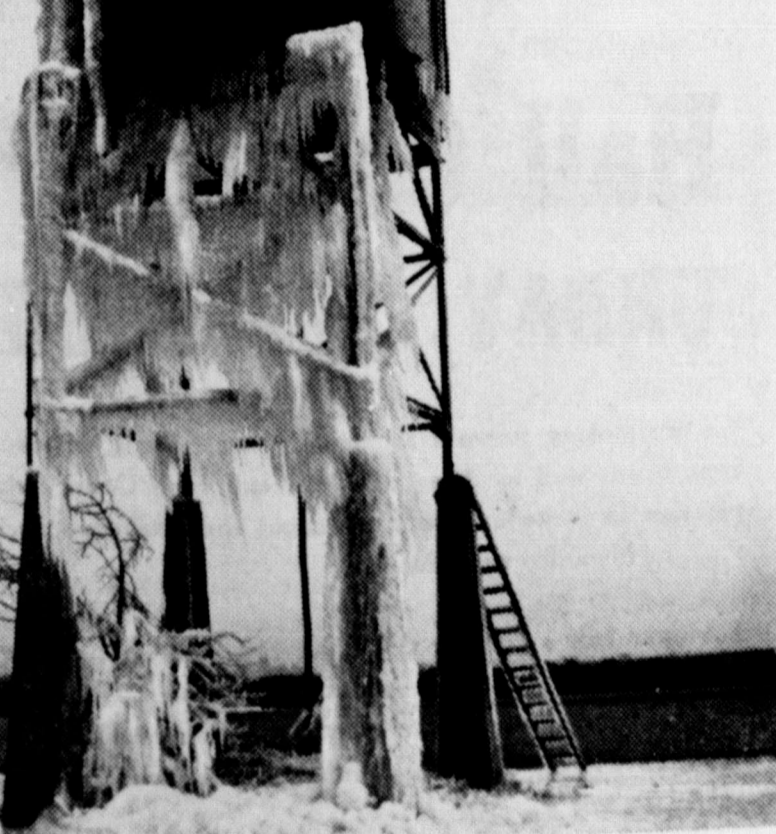

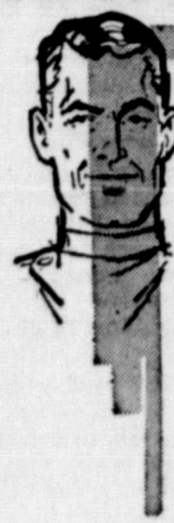

# Memphis Eleven Is Downed By Hornets

The Memphis Cyclone dropped their opening game of the season to a spirited Tulia squad, 76-0, last Friday night at the local stadium.

The Cyclone could not mount an offensive attack and was unable to pick up one first down during the game, while the Tulia team netted a total of 471 yards and 24 first downs. The game was almost void of penalties with the Cyclone receiving only 16 yards and the Tulia squad a total of 25 yards in penalties.

The Cyclone lost the ball three times on fumbles and had two of their four pass attempts intercepted. The Hornets passed 10 times, completed 3 for 41 yards, threw six incomplete passes and had one interception.

### Action by Quarters

The game got underway with the Hornets kicking off and the Cyclone defending the south goal. Jimmy Sturdevant took the kickoff and carried it back 15 yards before being downed on the Cyclone 33.

A third down quick-kick by Bill Pounds hit one of the Cyclone boys and fell short on the Cyclone 47.

Tulia started their first touchdown drive which took five plays, climaxed by a 26-yard pass from Quarterback Frank Hooper to End Happy Rogers. Hooper carried for two more points, making the score 8-0.

The Cyclone received the kickoff, were in a hole due to a fumbled catch, and FB Jerry Lowe was downed on the home 14-yard line. On the fourth down, Pounds got away a 40-yard punt. The Tulia backs crossed, and Hooper ran the ball back for another Hornet score. The extra-point try was not good.

The Cyclone lost the ball after the kickoff when a pass was intercepted setting up Tulia's next score. Taking over the ball on the Memphis 24, it took the Hornets four plays to score on a pass from Hooper to HB Melvin Chisum. A wide pitchout to HB Jim Arnold was good for two more points, making the score 22-0.

The Cyclone was again in the hole after a delayed attempt to run back the kickoff by QB Sturdevant resulted with the ball on the 1-yard line. Pounds punted out of bounds on the Cyclone 24. Five plays later, Tulia FB Eddie DeVoll carried over for another score. The extra point try was not good. The first quarter ended with the score 28-0.

### Second Quarter Play

Tulia scored again in the early minutes of the second quarter on a 31-yard carry by FB DeVoll. A pass from Hooper to Chisum was good for two points.

HB Bill Thompson returned the ball to the Cyclone 19 on the kickoff.

From there a five-yard penalty nullified a carry by FB Lowe. On the second down, QB Sturdevant attempted a jump pass, but the ball was deflected by a Tulia lineman, and was intercepted.

It took Tulia five plays to take the ball across, climaxed by a 2-yard plunge by DeVoll.

Tulia scored again on a 57-yard drive the next time they got the ball. The score came on a 34-yd. carry by Tommy Durrrough, making the score 48-0. The half ended after Tulia expended four downs throwing long passes, trying to score again.

### Second Half Play

Tulia received the kickoff and marched 63 yards for another score. A 4-yard run by Durrrough

added the scoring punch. The try for extra point was not good.

After Sturdevant returned the kickoff to the Cyclone 28, the Memphis squad faced a third down and 9 situation, after one pass fell incomplete and FB Lowe could only pick up one yard on a dive. Bill Pounds quick-kicked the ball 63 yards down field, putting Tulia in their first hole. On the first play, the Hornets fumbled and FB Lowe recovered on the Tulia 7. A three-yard carry by FB Mike Crow and a one-yard gain by Lowe left a third and 3. Then, with the Cyclone's luck turning bad, a fumble lost the ball. The Hornets marched down the field for another score, climaxed by a 23-yard carry by DeVoll. John Howell carried for two more points, making the score 62-0.

The Cyclone fumbled the kickoff and Tulia recovered. Tulia lost the ball three plays later when End Jacky Bridges intercepted a pass on the Cyclone 8-yard line. Two plays later, a fumble in the Cyclone backfield gave Tulia the ball on the 1-yard line. Tulia's HB Howell scored on the next play.

HB Thompson returned the kickoff to the Cyclone 20. QB Sturdevant was injured on the kickoff, and Tackle Dwight Gailey went into the quarterback slot for the team.

Gailey passed complete to End Bridges, however the play was nullified by a penalty. The Cyclone was forced to punt.

Tulia took over the ball on their 44. They marched down the field for their last score. David Cole carried over for the visitors from the 5-yard line. Jame Miller carried for two points. The game ended two plays later.

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
