## New Well Will Be Added To Memphis Water System Soon

trol and Improvement District No. 1, supplier of water for Memphis, this week was testing a new well north of Memphis.

Frank B. Foxhall, manager of the water firm, stated that the new well was pumping about 300 gallons per minute Wednesday. The initial pumping continued Wednesday, and then a 24-hour test is being carried out today, Thursday, to determine if the well will hold this rate of flow. Also samples of the water will be sent to Austin for testing. Foxhall explained that the sys-

tem at present had plenty of capacity to take care of the needs of the town, but that Memphis was growing, and the district planned to stay ahead of the growth and keep adequate water for the years ahead.

Last year the peak day in con sumption of water was a little over 1,000,000 gallons. This vol
