Negro man, is charged with two counts of murder with malice in the double slaying of two Negro women late Wednesday afternoon at the farm home of Earl Williams, located one mile east and one-half mile south of Lakeview.

Beaver turned himself over to Hall County Sheriff Elmer Neel at 5:20 p. m. yesterday at the County Jail and confessed to the double slaying, which he said had occurred only minutes before. The two women, Mrs. Everline

Williams, 31, wife of Earl Williams, and Corrine Walker, 32, Mrs. Williams' sister, were found by Sheriff Neel at the Williams home shortly before dark.

Mrs. Williams was found dead on the floor of the living room and Corrine Walker was found in the yard outside the farm home. Both had been shot at close range with a shotgun.

Beaver was arraigned before Justice of Peace J. S. Grimes this morning and he is being held without bond.

Beaver offered to make a statement to District Attorney John Forbis, but due to inconsistencies the District Attorney stated that no statement would be taken until these inconsistencies are worked out.

Beaver agreed to take a lie detector test as soon as it can be ar-



Good Conservation Includes Wildlife

Charles A. Rodgers has expressed some ideas regard ing wildlife in an article sent to the Herald recently that is good meat for an editorial.

Rogers is with the Soil Conservation Service and expresses the idea that a conservation practice can add to the production of wildlife.

His article reads,

"What has happened to wildlife? Comment such as this is heard when there is difficulty finding game. This problem could be overcome if with a little effort wildlife was farmed

"No matter what the major purpose of any conservation practice is, each can contribute to the production of wildlife if any effort is made in this direction.

"Many conservation practices produce additional food and water and other practices provide a place for wildlife to raise their young, travel unseen, or hide from their natural

'More and more farmers and ranchers are seeing wildlife is being made a part of their conservation plan, where weeds are no problem, small areas are being allowed to grow the ultra conservatives have little wild with native shrubs and plants.
