





Many years ago it was the custom to exchange gifts in January to ensure a lucky New Year. In some manner this custom was trans-ferred to Christmas and the seasonable gift became expected on the day after the feast, or Boxing Day. Influencing this custom was the earthen savings-box which had to be broken to remove its treasures. It is still used in Holland, usually in the shape of a pig and it is called the "Feast Pig." Another explanation is the alms-box of the early church. Its con-tents were kept until the day after Christmas and for that reason it was called Boxing Day.

the cotton bunting under the tree. Don't use it unless it has been treated with a nonflammable solution by the manufacture or unless you yourself have treated it under the directions supplied by the fire department.

If you think Christmas will not be complete without candles glowing in the windows, use them with extreme care. But never use them on the tree itself. Take special pains to keep them away from curtains, and put them in a sturdy candle holder to guard against their tipping over.

Make certain you use only decoration lighting which carries the tag of Underwriters Laboratory approval.

Even after buying only UL products, pull the power cord from the wall outlet when the lights are turned off. This is important because insulation failures and overheated circuits could develop while you are absent from home.

Saw your Christmas tree off at an angle at least one inch above the original cut and keep it standing in a pan of water throughout the holiday period. The tree will thus absorb a great deal of water, especially during the first few returns in that they will add to days, and thereby be less vulnerable to fire. Be sure to add to the water from time to time so the entire stem cut will always be sub-

merged.

As an added precaution, take the tree down as soon as practical after the holidays. If you have had a real tree, dispose of it in the manner and place prescribed by your community. In most Texas towns, the junior chamber of commerce or a similar organization routinely supervises the burning of discarded trees. Check to see it

Many Home Fires Are Caused By **Christmas Trees**

Carmichael, who also is Direct-or of the Dallas Health and Science Museum, advised cutting off the trunk of the tree at an angle at least one inch above the original cut.

Support the tree well. There are many stands on the market which not only are sturdy, have a broad base and clamps for anchoring tree, but also have a receptacle for water.

"If freshly cut tree trunk is placed in water and level of water is above the cut at all times, the 'tree will stay fresh," he said.

He suggested that the tree be kept away from sources of heat and placed in such a position that standing or fallen, it could not block the way out of the room in case of fire.

Do not use wax candles on the tree or nearby where there is any chance for an open flame to contact the tree or combustibles piled beneath the tree.

Check lighting sets each year for frayed wires, loose connections, and broken sockets before using. Use only electric lighting bearing the Underwriters' sets Lab. label. Be sure the fuse of the electric circuit serving the tree is not over 15 amperes. Cord sets with a fuse in the plug bear-

ing a UL label are available. Make certain all tree lighting is turned off before you retire or leave the house. Use non-combustible material to decorate. Metal and glass decorations are nonflammable. Do not let metal foil icicles or tinsel touch a light socket or cord.



Top with corned beef slice. Broil on ungreased baking sheet at 450 degrees for three to five minutes, or until hot. Use cooky cutters to cut holiday designs in meat and bread, if you wish. Chop any remaining meat and blend with corn mixture. Makes 8 sandwiches.

Keep Safety In Mind When You **Select Toys**

The Texas Safety Association today advised Christmas shoppers to keep safety in mind when selecting toys for children. Mrs. L. E. Dudley, President of

Women's Activities for TSA, said toys should be selected that are sturdy and well-made and that are "suitable for the child's age."

"Cheaply constructed toys which may come apart or be broken under strenuous child play, have no place under the Christmas tree," she said.

Mrs. Dudley suggests testing toys for strength. See how much bending it will take and whether it will last past Christmas Day. In pointing out that toys should be selected to match the child's

ability, she said: "A toy that may easily handled by an eight-year-old cannot always

be handled by a four-year-old. A toy which is too heavy for . a child can cause an accident." She explained that toys for ba-

bies and very young children should be washable, large, light in weight and of non-brittle material. All toys of lead or colored with lead based paints should be avoid-


BETHLEHEM...the first Christmas

Bethlehem, at the time of the Birth of Jesus, was a sleepy little town set down among the Judean hills where shepherds tended their sheep, as had before them.
