### Highway Week, Oct. 4-10

Next week, October 4-10, will be observed as National Highway Week in Texas. The theme for this observance is Mobility: Your Fifth Freedom." And what could get nearer to the backbone of Texas business and industrial economy, and the lives of every Texan than our Highway System.

Think what would happen to the economy of this area if all the highways leading to it suddenly should become impassable! There would be no fuel for vehicles . . . food supplies soon would be exhausted . . . the sick might want for medicine and drugs . . . industry would want for raw material and would not be able to deliver their product to market . . . no one would have anything to sell, because needed merchandise would be stranded in far-away supply centers . . . and agriculture would not be able to move machinery or products. Virtually everything Texans make or use, buy or sell moves

over our vast 66,000-mile highway system at some time. Did you know that Texans drive on the world's finest highway system? More than 1,800 of the State's communities are totally dependent upon highways for transportation.

A good highway system accrues three obvious benefits: safety, economy, time. Also, wealth can be added as a by-

Thomas McDonald, now deceased, who served as chief of the Bureau of Public Roads, one said, "We were not a wealthy nation when we began improving our highways. But the roads themselves helped up create new wealth, in business and industry and land values. So it was not our wealth that made our highways possible. Rather, it was our highways that made our wealth possible.

The dedicated Texas highway system amounts to nearly near 66,000 miles approximately 3,000 miles of Interstate, 26,000 miles of Primary and 37,000 miles of Farm to Market. or secondary highways. More than 1,000 miles of highway are under construction in Texas on any given day.

The Interstate and Defense Highway System has been described as the greatest engineering project in the history of mankind. Begun in 1956, when completed in 1972 the 41,000mile Interstate system will link 90 per cent of the nation's metropolitan areas of 50,000 or more population, and all but one We hear a lot of conversation of the capitals of the 48 adjacent states.

trol both wind and water erosion. Surface residue protects the land without using any of the soil moisture. A good cover of residue lous thing in the world a woman actually helps to get more of the rain into the soil. This makes good residue management one of the most valuable conservation practices in this area. The proper way to manage crop

residue varies from one field to another. If the main problem is wind erosion then the crop residue should be left standing through the wind erosion season or until the first of April. Residue such as sorghum stalks will give the best protection from soil lowing when left standing. The height of the stalks help reduce

ground. Any early tillage on sorghum land should be done with equipment that will leave the stalks standing.

On fields where the main hazard is water erosion, residue management will be slightly different. The object is to cover as much of the soil surface as possible. This can best be done by either chopping the stalks or undercutting them so they will lay good planning. A farmer must de- over.
