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## EDITORIAL

#### **Farmers' Cooperation Requested**

The 1964 Census of Agriculture which is now being conducted by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, in Hall County and which will bring up to date the farm and ranch statistics is being considered the most significant ever taken.

Hall County farmers and ranchers are urged to cooperate in compiling an accurate record by filling out the census form he receives in the mail and holding the completed questionnaire until a census taker calls for it.

Why is the 1964 national census of agriculture so important? The United States Department of Commerce explained that because of the rapid changes American agriculture has been undergoing in recent years, Census Bureau officials regard the current census as one of the most significant ever taken.

The last agriculture census was taken in 1959. The statistics showed that Hall County had 601 farms and ranches in 1959, compared with 747 in 1954. The average size of the farm and ranch was 1,062.1 acres in 1959, compared with 655.6 acres in 1954.

The value of products sold by Hall County's farmers and ranchers in 1959 was \$8,874,510. The value of all crops sold was \$6,922,456, and the value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$1,952,054.

Cooperation is most important and Census Bureau officials ask every farmer and rancher to cooperate in compiling an accurate record of these changes.

#### **Physical Fitness**
