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EDITORIAL

"Public School Week"

Citizens in our area are encouraged to remember and to participate in the Texas Annual Public Schools Week, March 1 through 5. The objective is to acquaint all our people with programs and accomplishments of our public school system.

The slogan for the week is befitting the occasion, "Texas Public Schools—Democracy in Action." Citizens in our area are urged to take every opportunity to visit our school systems during public school week.

The need for the public school never changes, but times and conditions may change or require to be changed methods and practices of public education. This is inherent with anything that grows, for growth is the result of change.

It is a healthy thing in our democratic way of life to have intelligent understanding of the important functions of our basic institutions. This is especially true of the schools. The initiative and resourcefulness and the wisdom and leadership that our schools are manifesting in the youth of today are the answer of the problems in the years ahead.

The challenge of tomorrow is, "Bring me men to match my mountains." That is the need of our times and these men must come from the public schools—schools that are strong in virtues required for building strong men and women.

Did you know that the responsibility for determining what it takes to make a good instructional program is that of the local community? The State has the responsibility for establishing minimum standards only and to give leadership to local schools in improving the program.

In carrying out its legal responsibility, the State Board of Education in 1961 approved revisions in the principles and standards for accrediting elementary and secondary schools. These changes resulted from a two-year curriculum improvement study conducted by a state-wide committee and by local schools. They became effective in September 1962.

In visiting and observing schools during Texas Public Schools Week, parents and other citizens may be interested in discussing with school personnel the effect of the revised standards on course offerings, graduation requirements, teaching methods, and many, many others.

Many are unaware that based on present status and expected growth of Texas Public Schools, that there will be an increase of from 3,000 to 3,500 students each year. Considering that there will be 5,000 teachers entering and leaving classrooms for complete employment, it will take 3,000 new teachers each year to meet the growth in Texas schools.

This year, the Texas Legislature passed Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 15 which officially designated March 1 through 5 as the dates for the official Public Schools Week in Texas for 1965. In passing the resolution, the lawmakers stated: "By the Senate of Texas, the House of Representatives concurring, that the Legislature join with the State Board of Education in urging the citizens of Texas to participate in the annual visitation programs of our public schools, and that visitation in the schools be reminded of each citizen's obligations and responsibilities as a contributing member of a free, self-governing society."

The Texas declaration of independence, written in 1836 stated that: "It is an axiom of political science, that unless a people are educated and enlightened, it is idle to expect a continuation of civil liberty, or the capacity for self government." The education system of our nation is the backbone of the self-governed.

Practical Educational Plan

An experiment in commercial feeding of beef cattle currently being conducted by students through the vocational agriculture program in local schools makes more real sense, it seems to us, than anything that's happened in this area of education in a long time.

It seems simple, logical, and obvious, in this area where beef production is a major industry, to teach students who are preparing to be tomorrow's farmers and ranchers how to feed cattle for the commercial market and show a profit.

However obvious and logical it may be, it's far from simple, as Vokig instructor Pat Roberts and his group have discovered . . . and the commercial feeding program now being carried out by ten Memphis county youngsters may turn out to be a pilot program which will show the way to a lot of other similar groups throughout the area. Because nobody's doing

it in these parts up to now . . . not in the schools, at any rate.

This is a far cry from the fattening of selected steers for the livestock shows . . . where the winners bring trophies, ribbons, and even fat cash premiums from buyers who see promotional values in their purchases.

Feeding show cattle may be great sport, and even good training, but it isn't good business . . . and any commercial operator who attempted these methods with commercial herds would speedily find himself with a deficit rather than his cattle.

But feeding cattle to produce marketable beef . . . at a profit . . . is the problem that every beef producer faces year after year in the normal course of his business . . . and the producer who finds a successful formula, a recipe that will put a marketable finish in his cattle at a cost that leaves a margin of profit and possibly a breed of cattle that will improve his percentages) is the

producer who stays in the business.

That's what these young experimenters are trying to learn to do. Working with several breeds of cattle and with various feeding formulas, they've been keeping careful records of their whole operation. Their pay-off will come on April 17, when their cattle will have been slaughtered and dressed and the carcasses, carefully graded, will be sold on the current market . . . right here at home.

It is an experiment which, hopefully, will be continued . . . and one in which the livestock producers of this area should take more than passing interest.—The Canadian Record.

Decorate With Tape

Want to try something different in the decorating line? Use Pressure Sensitive Masking Tape. Just remember that the surface must be clean where you intend to use it. To start, why not try re-taping. All you have to do is use masking tape and paper to cover the lower half while painting the upper half. Remove when the paint is "wet," wait for the painted half to dry and harden thoroughly, then apply a strip of tape along the edge where colors meet. Next, paint the bottom half in a second color and remove the tape as soon as possible.

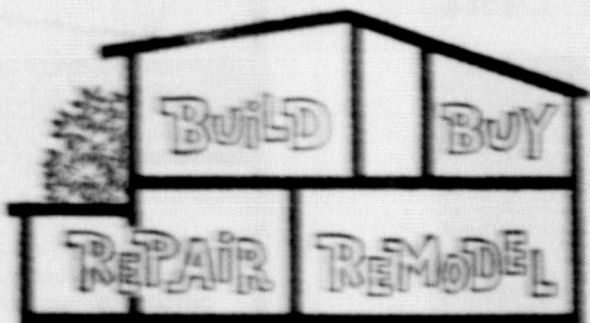

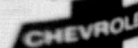

There are other meaningful symbols of communism. There is the wall erected across Berlin to trap a people in slavery, a monument to the bankruptcy of communism's appeal.

There is the 2,000-mile armed barrier stretched across the breadth of the European Continent—the Iron Curtain—to keep the population of the Satellite states in their Red chains.

There are the concentration camps in Siberia, the grim prisons in Cuba, the unspeakable dungeons of Red China, in which the enemies and critics of communism are entombed in a living death.

These are the bitter, bleak symbols of communism and its hopelessness.

Communists deny them, but they exist—and the world knows it.

It is little wonder that the Communists would wish to destroy OUR symbols—the Statue of Liberty, which welcomed to this bright new land so many millions fleeing oppression and seeking opportunity; the Liberty Bell, which rang out in celebration of our Declaration of Independence; the Washington Monument, which honors the Father of Our Country and denotes the love we all share for our United States.

We are, of course, glad that the plot to destroy the symbols of our freedom was detected in time. But we can be proud that the enemies of our country find these symbols so dangerous.

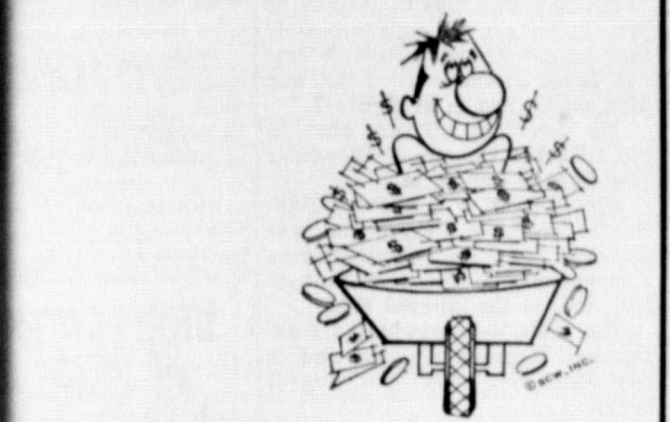

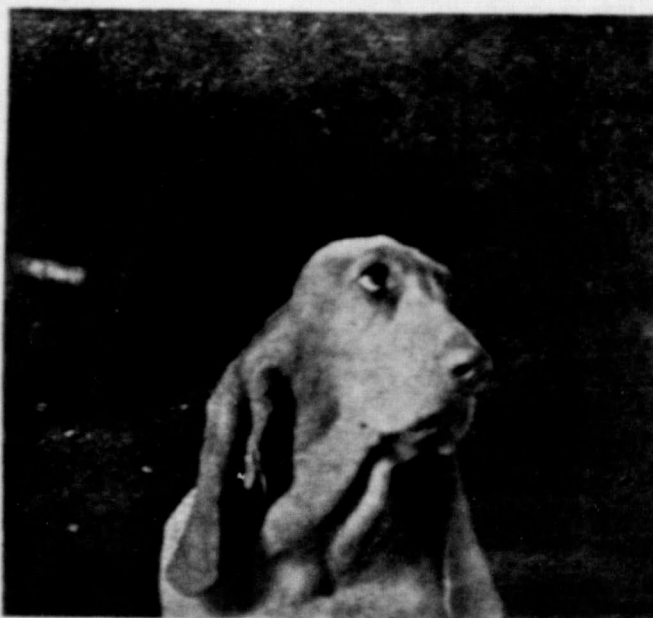

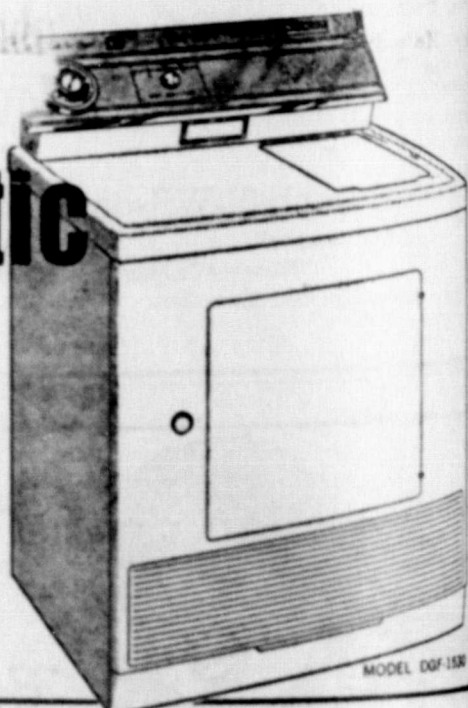

ON THIS, the 15th day of February, 1965, the City Commission of the City of Turkey, Texas, convened in special session at the regular meeting place thereof in the City Hall, there being present

Mayor Lacy introduced a resolution and order. Commissioner Lacy moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Young. The motion carrying with it the adoption of the resolution and order, prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: Mayor Lacy and Commissioners Lacy and Young.

NOES: None.

The RESOLUTION AND ORDER is as follows:

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Turkey, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF TURKEY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That an election be held on the 6th day of March, 1965, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors of said City, who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

"SHALL the City Commission of the City of Turkey, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the amount of FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$50,000), maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Commission, the maximum maturity being not more than TWENTY (20) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed FIVE PER CENTUM (5%) per annum, for the purpose of constructing improvements and extensions to the City's Waterworks System, to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in Articles 1111-1118, both inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, each bond to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligations out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation, and secured by a pledge of the net revenues from the operation of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System?"

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held at the CITY HALL,

in the City of Turkey, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

SECTION 3: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election, to-wit: G. O. Coker, Presiding Judge; Lee Gregory, Alternate Presiding Judge.

If the regularly appointed Presiding Judge is unable to serve at the election, the Alternate Presiding Judge therefor shall serve as Presiding Judge. The Presiding Judge shall appoint at least two (2) Clerks (one of whom shall be the Alternate Presiding Judge if the election is conducted by the regularly appointed Presiding Judge) and not more than two (2) additional Clerks, as he deems necessary for the proper conduct of the election.

ABSENTEE VOTING shall be conducted at the City Clerk's Office in the City Hall, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 424, Acts of the 58th Legislature, Regular Session, 1963.

Since the Public Schools Week

program was begun in 1950's, Masons have helped local school officials in promoting and advertising the program to the schools and in increasing attendance at open house days or special programs.
