

The Board of Trustees of phis Public Schools in its regular meeting Monday night, adopted the Superintendent of Schools recommendations for complying with the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and with the recommendations of the Accreditation Division of the Texas Education Agency.

NUMBER 43

The decision made by the trustees was "at the beginning of school next fall, all students above the fifth grade level grades (six through 12) will attend Memphis Junior High and Memphis Senior High Schools and these seven grades will be discontinued at Morningside School."

The Board decided that for at least one year grades one through five will be maintained at Morningside School and students may continue to attend there regardless of their places of residence within the school district if they desire to so.

Elementary students who live within the present boundaries of Austin Elementary School and Travis Elementary School may attend those schools without regard to race, color or national origin so long as adequate space is available, Supt. Shannon Doss explained.

"At the secondary level (junior and senior high) the Morningside students can be absorbed into the system without creating a housing problem. However, there is not adequate space to absorb the Morningside students into Austin and Travis Elementary Schools at the present time," Supt. Doss said.

"We are trying to solve our school problems as quickly as possible and the outlined program for integration of the two school systems in Memphis is a majo step in that direction," stated Mr.

EDITORIAL

Chamber Work Outline!

Those who attended the Memphis Chamber of Commerce Banquet recently heard the speaker, President Charles Gibson, present many items where communities fall down in trying to promote progress. He advised several times in his address that leaders need to keep their citizens informed about what projects they are working upon and what is being done toward bettering the area.

At noon Monday, the directors of the Chamber of Commerce met and approved an outline entitled "program of work" for the organizations standing committees. Listed as program of work are 58 items which are divided between the organiations 16 committees.

Before any worthwhile project is ever put into operation it takes a lot of advanced planning, work and study, publicity, more work and revisions, compromises, and sometimes a popular mandate by the people (if bond issues are needed).

Probably the biggest handicap most projects must overcome, if they are to be successful, is the lack of cooperation. It has been observed in past years that projects sponsored by Chamber of commerce organizations in all communities have a much better chance of succeeding than those not sponsored. A good chamber of commerce group does much for its community because of the cooperation citizens give the organization.

Many of the items listed on the chamber's program of work outline are the same ones the organization sponsors each year; however, others are dreams which have been with us for years and someday, through the groundwork and planning being made now, may be reality in the future.

We encourage our readers to read the program of work outline, study the projects listed, make notes for any suggestions which could help, and cooperate with the committees. The committees will be meeting to draw detailed plans for carrying out the projects listed on the work outline. Any help they can get from interested citizens would be appreciated.

Handle Medicine Carefully

There is a right and a wrong way to do everything, includ-ing the taking of medicines. Most persons are familiar with the sage advice which has been passed on from generation to Building, which is too tall to be generation, but a reconsideration might be in order as new and located so close. better drugs are handled in the homes.

This was brought to mind recently when the American Medical Association issued a pamphlet on the matter. The first item says, "When medicine is taken correctly, the exact dose is taken at the proper time under conditions that insure against This point is well taken, and should be adherred to faithfully.

Among other suggestions by AMA for taking medicines are the following directions.

Store medicines in a cabinet, preferably locked, away from the reach of children.

Already a few structures obstruct somewhat a view of the Capitol.. The state itself built one, the Sam Houston Office







Destroy old prescriptions, because many drugs lose potency or may be chemically changed by time.

Read the label in a good light before opening the bottle or box. Read it again before taking the medicine.

If you have more than one box of pills or capsules to take, be sure one is closed before opening the other. This avoids garage or office structure. switching covers, and also labels.

When pouring from a bottle, keep the label up so that any dripping will not soil it and make it hard to read.

When taking medicine at night, be certain that the light is on and that you are wearing glasses if you need them. It is easier to misread and misunderstand labels at night when you are Houston Chronicle. sleepy than when fully awake during the day.

Keep medicines in the original labeled container. If you carry pills in a pocket pill box, identify them with a label. Never put medicines in containers identified with foods.

Avoid using medicine for children which is disguised as candy. Poisoning-or at least overdoses-can occur when children find and take medicine which looks and tastes like candy.
