Public Meeting About School Bond To Be Held Next Mon.

Board of trustees of the Public Schools announced this week that a district-wide meeting will be held in the Community Center at 7:30 p. m. Monday, May 17, for the purpose of discussing all aspects of the bond election, scheduled for Saturday, May 22.

Letters are being mailed today to all property owners in the district encouraging them to attend this important meeting and explaining many aspects of the proposed \$950,000 bond issue.

The board explained that early next week, booklets outlining the entire project will be mailed out so that taxpayers will have the complete story before going to the polls next Saturday and voting on the issue.

At Monday night's meeting, the school board, school administration, architects and bond advisors will be on hand to answer any questions and to explain the entire issue.

The board made the announcement at their regular monthly meeting Monday night, at which time they handled several items of public interest.

The board approved the election of Mrs. Pat Chambless as a teacher for next year, subject to assignment. Re-elected were Monty G. Alewine as school tax assessor-collector, and Miss Ruby Hoffman as school secretary.

The firm of Kinard, Watson & Kinard of Abilene were named auditors for the tax office and school funds.

The board also approved the summer driver's education course for the district, and named Charles Chambless as instructor. They set a fee of \$25 per student, for those residing in the district, and \$30 for out-of-district students. The course is scheduled to begin June 1.

Robert Haynes Killed Monday In Car-Train Crash

Funeral services for Robert Clifton Haynes were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday in the First Baptist Church with the Rev. Gene Jorgenson, pastor, officiating assisted by Tom Posey, minister of the First Christian Church.

Interment was in Fairview Cemetery with services under the direction of Spicer Funeral Home.

Mr. Haynes, who was 42 years of age, was killed Monday afternoon when the car he was driving struck a 67-car freight train on the east edge of Roaring Springs. Mr. Haynes died in Stanley Hospital in Matador, shortly after 5 p. m., about one hour after the accident.

E. J. Jones, engineer of the Quannah, Acme and Pacific train, told officers who investigated the accident that he blew the train whistle continuously for about a half-mile before the crash. Haynes hit the train between the first and second cars of the five diesel units.

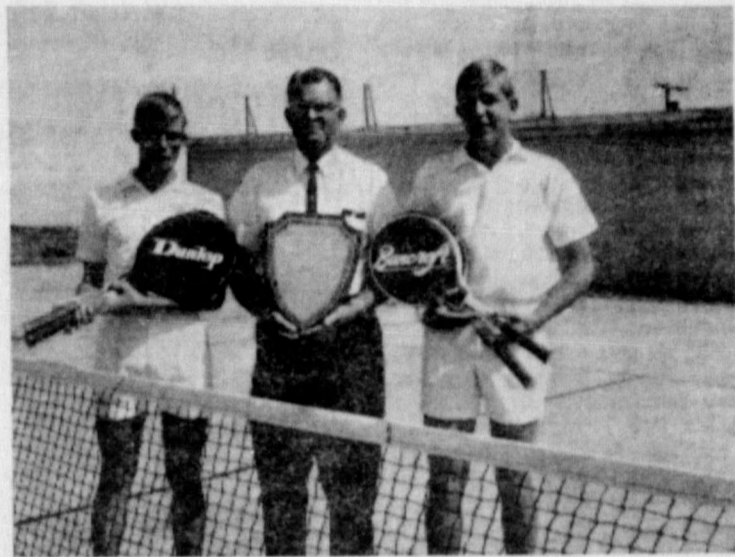
The impact of the crash threw Haynes and the motor of the car, about 12 feet. Motley County Sheriff, J. D. Spray and Deputy Bobby Williams investigated the accident.

Haynes, who lived in Memphis for the past four years, operated a pool hall here. He moved to Memphis from Weatherford.

He was born Nov. 30, 1922, in Kingston, Okla. Mr. Haynes was a member of the York Street Baptist Church in Weatherford, Okla.

He was a veteran of World War II, and served in the U. S. Air Force.

J. Stargel, Setliff-Case Win State In A Track, B Tennis

Jack Stargel, Memphis High School senior, and two sophomore boys from Turkey, Alton Setliff and Harvey Case, proved at Austin last weekend they were the best in the State in their individual events.

Those who took all eight of the Hall County students to Austin from the Class A and B events reported that all entrants were top contenders.

Competition was stiff in all events and the excitement ran high, it was reported.

There was no more exciting climax in any race at the State Meet than that turned in by Jack Stargel, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Stargel, in the 100-yard dash and the 220-yard dash.

Jack, the stocky 5' 8" speedster, ran two close races. He won the 220-yard dash with a time of 22.5, running into a light wind, hitting the string only a fraction of a second ahead of Keller's Charles Thornton.

Jack reported that when he was coming out of the turn he was trailing Thornton slightly, and he knew he had to beat him to win the race. The race was so close that both boys were awarded 22.5 time by the official time keepers.

Turkey's Boys Setliff and Case took the State Class B boys doubles tennis title Saturday in the UIL tournament with a five-set win over Bertram's Larry Carroll and Craig Coates.

The lengthy, exciting match, the best three out of five, ended 6-1, 1-6, 6-0, 1-6, 6-3, in favor of the Hall County boys.

The District 9-B sophomores advanced to the finals with a semifinal victory Friday over Joe Bagby-Jerry McDonald of Eden, 8-6, 7-5. They defeated Jackie Johnson and Forest Metcalf of Winona 7-5, 6-2, in the first match.

This is quite a feat for two sophomores, who have two years to go, sports fans estimate.

MHS Track Team The Memphis two-man track team totaled 26 points to earn third place in the Conference A state track meet.

Stargel scored 18 points with a first place in the 220-yard dash and a second in the 100. Hubert (Hoot) Jones scored eight points with a second in the 440-yard dash.

Jones, in taking second place, ran his best 440-yard dash time of 49.4 in his career, only two-tenths of a second off the previous state record of 49.2, set by Bob Thompson of Boswell (Saginaw) last year. However, Poth's Gerald Keller, turned in a 48.5 (Continued on Page 8)

Tickets may be purchased from any member of the Memphis Lions Club or at the City Park on the evening of Friday, May 21.

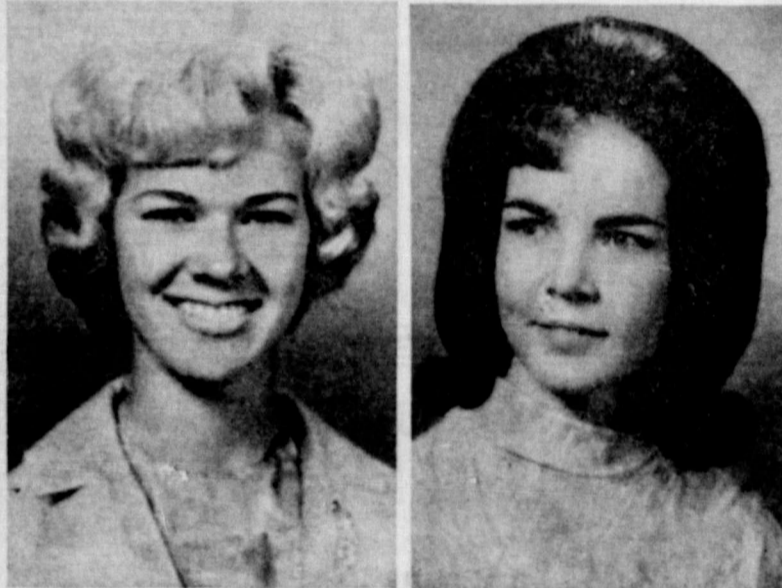

Banks' Total Assets Are Over 13.5 Million Dollars

The financial statements of condition of the four county banks at the close of business April 26, 1965, revealed that Hall County remains in good shape financially, but slightly below last spring.

The figures also indicate the county is slightly under what it was in January of this year.

The total assets of the four county banks is reported at \$13,567,461.50. Last January the figure was \$13.6 million.

Last year, the total assets of

the four banks was \$13.8 million, which shows a decline of approximately one-quarter of a million dollars.

An even larger decline was seen in comparing the total deposits figures. As of April 26, 1965, total deposits were \$12,042,233.19. This is a decline of \$398,499.64 over the figure a year ago.

Another decline was seen in the loans and discounts column of the combined statements of con-

dition. As of April 26, the banks showed \$6,103,111.97 in loans and discounts, which is \$264,242.90 below that of a year ago.

However, it should be pointed out, that in the spring of 1961, the total assets figure of the four banks was \$10,618,798.64. It can be seen that the 1961 figure was three million less than this spring. The total deposits figure in 1961 was also approximately three million less than this spring.

Senate Resolution Memorializes Allen

(Editor's Note: Last Thursday, May 6, 1965, the Senate of the State of Texas passed a resolution memorializing Suzy Allen which has been published in the Senate Journal. Senator Andy Rogers introduced the resolution. The resolution, which is reproduced below, was sent to the Democrat last weekend and accompanying it was a letter from Jack Boone, a member of the Senator's staff, which explained the resolutions introduction.

WHEREAS, On Monday, April 19, 1965, in the untimely passing of Honorable Matthew Cartwright Allen, Memphis and the State of Texas lost one of its most highly respected business and community leaders, and

WHEREAS, This distinguished citizen was born on July 9, 1905, in Terrell, Texas. He attended the Terrell Public Schools, Terrell Preparation School in Dallas, and graduated from Missouri Military Academy in Mexico, Missouri, and

WHEREAS, After his graduation from military school, he worked in the American National Bank in Terrell and then was employed with the railroad company in Grand Saline. From there, Mr. Allen went to Plainview, where he worked at a cotton oil mill. In the mid-1920's he began his first work in the cotton compress industry at Corpus Christi. In 1932, he became manager of the Memphis Compress Company, a position he held until his death, and

WHEREAS, Mr. Allen married Miss Flossie Davis on September 29, 1928, in Greenville, Texas. Three children were born to the Allens, one of which preceded Mr. Allen in death, and

WHEREAS, This beloved citizen, known far and wide to his many loyal friends as "Suzy", was

a prominent community worker who had devoted years to school, church, community and business life, Suzy was twice selected Outstanding Citizen of the Year of Memphis, Texas, in 1963 and 1965, and named a Community Builder in 1957, and

WHEREAS, This fine citizen and area leader served many terms on the Memphis School Board of Trustees and the City Council, as well as serving as President of the Memphis Volunteer Fire Department. He was a member of the Memphis Lions Club, a past director of the Southern Compress Association and served for many years as a director of the Memphis Chamber of Commerce, and

WHEREAS, Suzy was especially interested in furthering the educational opportunities of our young people, and had a heartfelt desire to help those in need, and

WHEREAS, It is the desire of the Senate of the 59th Legislature to recognize the leadership of Mr. Allen and to express its sincere and heartfelt sympathy to his devoted wife, Mrs. Flossie Allen; his son, Mackie Allen; his daughter, Mrs. Darrel Long of Amarillo; his brother, W. T. Allen, Jr. of Terrell; his two sisters, Mrs. Ophelia McCord of Terrell, and Mrs. Ewell R. Rutherford of Dallas; and his two grandchildren, Sandra Kay and Sue Lynn Allen, now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED by the Senate of Texas, that a page in the Journal be set aside in memory of Matthew Cartwright Allen, and that copies of this resolution be sent to the members of the family and when the Senate adjourns today, it do so in honor and respect to the memory of this outstanding and beloved citizen.

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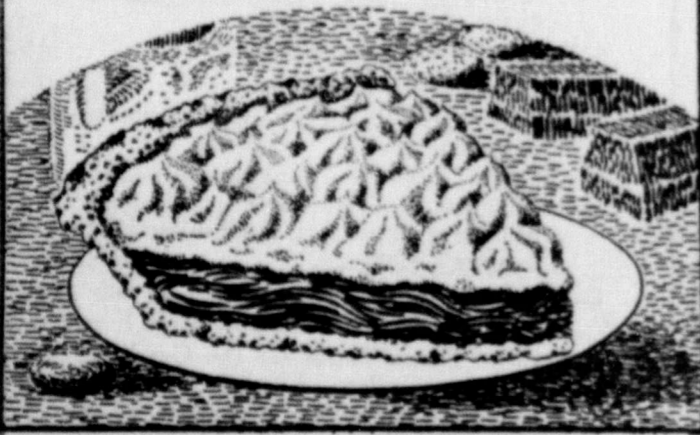
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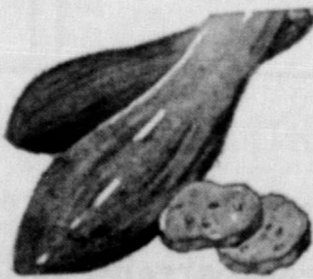

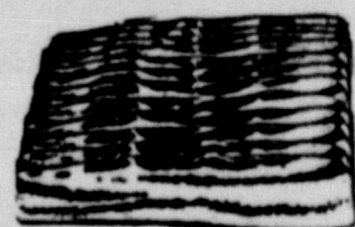

The selected service trade establishments in the county employed 69 persons (exclusive of proprietors) and had a payroll for the year of \$144,000.00. The state as a whole included 60,879 establishments with receipts of \$1,879,300,000.00.

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Dean Killion Speaks At Cyclone Band Banquet

Members of the Memphis Cyclone Band were feted at a banquet Saturday evening at the Travis Cafeteria by the band mothers, with Mrs. Gerald Knight serving as chairman.

The principal speaker of the evening was Dean Killion, director of bands at Texas Tech University at Lubbock. Mr. Killion had high praise for the group, and told them they were an outstanding group of workers and had a spirit and tradition which was unmatched in this area.

"You folks just don't want to be second best. You have a reputation of winning first—and this is the way it should be," Killion said.

The speaker said that, although he had not heard the band perform at Amarillo or at Six Flags Over Texas, he knew more of the members by name than any high school group in the state.

"You have more top musicians, and 100 per cent workers in this group than any high school band I know about," he said.

The speaker went on to explain that band work teaches students to be responsible.

"Many times when a student flunks out of college, it is because he won't accept the responsibility of going to classes, turning in his work on time, studying his assignments, or anything else. He just is not responsible," Killion said.

In band, he explained, members must show up at the right time, with the right mental attitude, with the proper uniform and equipment, and go on the field or stage and perform to his or her best capabilities.

"I know when I was in high school band and I would sit in that auditorium and await my turn to perform, it was the hardest thing I ever did—to walk out on that stage when my name was called," he said.

"I believe in athletics, and band is the only place where a student learns to put it on the line, go for broke and make the crowd stand up and take notice."

He concluded with the remark that he always wanted to be a member of the Michigan Band—the best in the world. "But I'm a little too old to enroll at Michigan; so over at Texas Tech we want to take that title away from Michigan. And, to do this, we need as many 100 percenters as we can get. Not 100 per cent of all of a student's time, but a 100 per cent effort out of 100 per cent of all members of a 250-piece band an hour a day at practice," he said.

This is what makes winning bands according to the speaker.

Even in these days of big boats and fast runabouts, there still is a place for the fishing boat. But, there are extremes even in fishing boats. For example, the kayak. Yep, we said the kayak. For years Lyndsay Phillips, manager of the Durant Chamber of Commerce, has been a kayak fisherman. He made his own kayak of marine plywood. It is so small and so light that he can hoist it to the top of his automobile alone.

His is a shallow-draft boat. It has only enough room for Phillips to sit in the bottom. With his legs outstretched and the sides of the boat fitting close to his hips, he maneuvers his rig around some of the hottest bass fishing spots of Lake Texoma.

Fishing is particularly good in the spring of the year. That's when the big black bass get back into shallow water, off sandy points. And those are the very best spots Phillips heads for.

With his rig he can move into spots where others can't even get within casting distance. Phillips' kayak is painted battleship gray. It is pointed on both ends like a cigar. A brace, or arm, extends out from the back side. To this is attached a small Mighty Mite motor. This little motor is very effective in moving Phillips' light rig anywhere he wants it to go.

Fishing with the Durant man is quite an experience. Actually, you don't fish with him, you fish alongside him or nearby.

One day a couple of our mutual friends were in a 16-ft. aluminum boat on Lake Texoma. As these fishermen started out, Phillips ran his little kayak alongside the larger craft. He lifted the little Mighty Mite's prop out of the water, caught hold of the larger boat, and went piggy-back across the big lake.

When Phillips got into shallow fishing water, he shoved off. Before his boat stopped sliding, his little gas motor caught and he was on his way into water that the larger boat couldn't even enter with the motor raised.

Phillips, who is adept with a paddle, keeps two short oars in the boat. He places one on each side of the kayak so that he can use either one if and when he wants it.

Phillips' gear consists of a 6-ft. glass rod and a Shakespeare President reel. His casting from that little boat was like poetry. With just a little flick of the wrist, his lure sails out to the foot of some brush or beside a protruding rock.

He works the lure easily, then reels it in for another cast. One thing for sure, he always works out his spot well before abandon-

ing it. On this particular day he and his party were fishing in the Peach Orchard area, just below the Roosevelt bridge. And from what we're told, Phillips knew the address of a lot of big 'ol bass around those stumps.

Actually, my fishing friends spent more time watching Phillips than they did fishing. He was like an artist at work.

Once he gets a strike and sets the hook, he moves the bass in quietly to the side of the boat. Thanks to the kayak, he doesn't even have to bend over to run his fingers through the fish's gills. He sits on a level with the water anyway.

Phillips makes a mental note of the size of each fish he lands. Invariably, when he lifts the fish from the water, he holds it alongside his rod handle for size comparison. If it doesn't please him, back the fish goes into the water.

One of Phillips' tricks is his use of an anchor. He has a small weight attached to a heavy piece of trotline cord wrapped around a length of broomstick. When he finds a spot where he wants to fish, he plays enough of the line over the side of his kayak to set the anchor. Then he drops the broomstick to the bottom of the boat and holds it down with his foot. When he gets ready to move on he carefully winds the line back on the broomstick handle and goes on his way.

That's how one man does it. Phillips formerly lived in Stephenville. He went to Durant nearly ten years ago to retire. Then he started fishing—and it has made a younger man of him.

A. No. The school designs winning awards in the National School Fallout Shelter Design Competition included both above ground and underground fallout shelter protection.

Q. Can we expect any help from Washington with the inclusion of fallout shelters in school buildings?

A. Most people expect Congress to pass House Bill No. 8200 sometime in the future, however, no one can be sure. This bill was approved in Committee during the last session of Congress. If passed, it provides for Federal financial assistance with the construction costs of public buildings including fallout shelter meeting protection specifications.

Q. What effect has fallout shelters in schools had on students?

A. School officials have found improved learning situations. They have had better attendance and have indicated a sense of security. Outside distractions have been eliminated with the pleasant controlled classroom conditions.

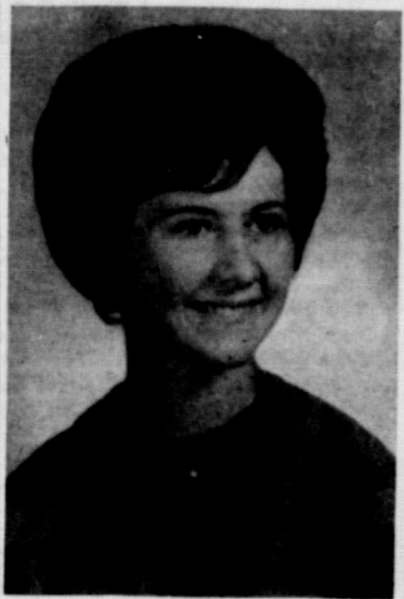
Delphian Club Entertains With Guest Tea For Newcomers To Memphis

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EDITORIAL

A Salute To Our Graduates

Within the next two weeks, the four school systems of Hall County will hold graduation exercises, and many young people will receive diplomas, earned by them after years of study and gradual development of their mental capacities.

This newspaper is publishing two special issues in salute to the graduates of Hall County. The Editors, Publishers and Staff would like to extend their congratulations to the seniors of all four Hall County schools for making the sacrifice of staying in school until all requirements have been met and the diplomas earned.

You, graduates, are well aware that some of your classmates, sometime during their school career, chose to drop out. They left the halls of learning to enter the labor market or to seek other careers. To these, we would encourage that they do all they can to further their education.

Why? It might seem unimportant at this stage in life to further one's education, but 10, 20, 30, 40 or even 50 years from now, with all the changes in our way of life to come, it will seem far different.

The average life span of the 1965 graduate is approximately 68 years. At this stage, at least 50 per cent have acquired all the formal education they will have. Naturally, many will have on-the-job training, special instruction courses, and many other opportunities to further their education.

However, by now, all graduates have formed their personalities, and many of the personal habits that will follow them throughout their lives. These graduates are now facing a crossroads. The decisions to be made during the next few months will probably plot the destiny. The time has come when these young men and women will be asking themselves: "What now?" "Where do I go from here?" or similar questions, in trying to arrive at decisions on their future.

The decision must be made by each individual. Parents and friends can advise, but in the final analysis, it will be up to the graduate as to what course to take.

We would like to offer what help we can in helping our graduates to arrive at a sound decision. To begin with, to those graduates trying to choose a career, we would encourage them to choose one they will not have to force themselves to follow but will enjoy doing. Many have spent four years in college studying a profession, only to discover that they do not like the pressures which go with their chosen field, after they have gone to work.

Here are some qualities, or virtues, employers look for in employees: honesty, thrift, hard work, dependability, loyalty, initiative, and the ability to get along with others. What employer is going to put up any longer than he has to with an employee who cannot be trusted, or is lazy, or is unpleasant to his associates and customers, or who shows no interest in his work.

If young people want to get ahead, they should make it a practice to do the best work they can. In addition, they should, as far as possible, always save a portion of their incomes. This may be a sizable amount, or it may be only a few dollars a week or month.

And just because you, as graduates, have gotten diplomas, is no reason why you should think your learning days are over. Actually, you should have learned in school that man's knowledge is expanding daily. Text books studied this year will be outdated next year. As long as you live, you should never grow tired of adding to your knowledge. We must never cease being curious, because only in this way can our minds keep growing.

Your high school career will be memories within a few short days, which you will recall many times throughout your life. But now the time is here to shoulder the responsibilities of citizenship, to seek a profession, to work for a better future, and to begin living your own life.

What Other Editors Say

3 1/2 Months Less Life

Our science writer, John Troan, who keeps track of such facts, reports the average life expectancy in the United States has dropped three and a half months in the last two years.

The National Center for Health Statistics in Washington figures a baby born in 1963 had an average prospect of living to age 69.9 years. Two years earlier the prospect was 70.2 years, an all-time high.

The statisticians blame this on the flu epidemics of 1963 and 1962. In 1963, for instance, there were 55,000 deaths from influenza.

We don't want to quarrel with the experts, but—

If 55,000 deaths from influenza can make a dent in the life-expectancy figure, how about the 43,564 traffic deaths in 1963? This was an increase of 5500 over 1961. (Last year, the toll was even worse; 47,800 died in traffic "accidents.")

Flu is pretty hard to deal with when an epidemic strikes. But this is a now-and-then thing. The traffic toll is every day, and it keeps going up. But a genuine jail-type crackdown on speeders and other idiots of highways could have a real effect on regaining that Biblical average of three score and 10.—Ft. Worth Press.

Closing a loophole

Parents particularly should be interested in a bill passed by the House of Representatives a few days ago aimed at the smut peddlers who use the United States mails to reach a teen-age market all over the country.

As reported by Rep. Walter Rogers, the new bill passed by the

House is designed to protect American families from the forced intrusion into their homes of objectionable material through the mail. It at least offers parents an effective method of stopping such mailings to their individual post office addresses.

Under terms of the proposed new law, any person receiving objectionable material through the mail could, by simply returning such mail to the Postmaster General, require the PGM to issue an order to the sender not to send any more such mail. The Postmaster General may then order the sender to halt his mailings to you or your children of any mail matter which you consider to be obscene, indecent, or vile . . . and the sender who fails to comply with such an order can be hauled into Federal court and punished for contempt.

This apparently solves a major judicial problem of defining obscenity by making each person who

receives mail his own censor . . . or in effect, allowing parents to exercise an effective censorship over what type of matter may be mailed to their children. The recipient of the printed matter is the sole judge . . . no court decision need be involved.

Enactment of this bill could go a long way toward helping curb the traffic in pornography which disturbs many American parents. It would at any rate, close one big loophole through which such material can invade the home . . . the family mail box. —The Canadian Record

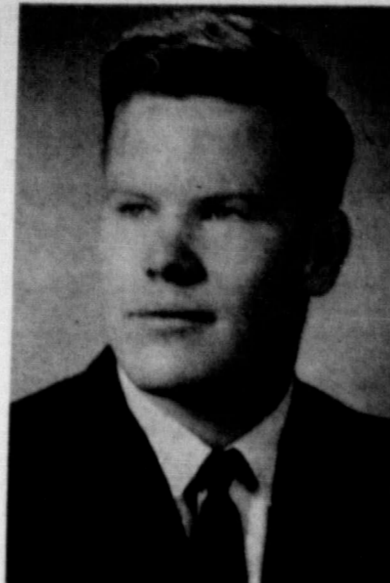

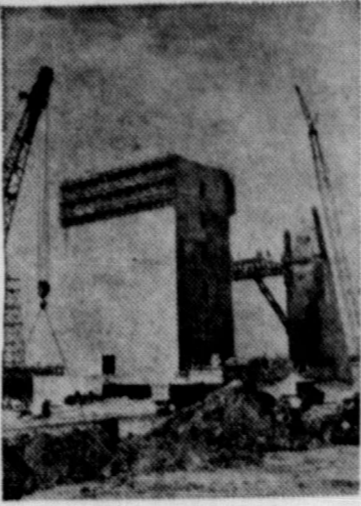

CIL OF THE CITY OF MEMPHIS, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 1st day of June, 1965, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors of said City, who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

"SHALL the City Council of the City of Memphis, Texas, be authorized to issue SEVENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$70,000) general obligation bonds of said City for the purpose of constructing improvements and extensions to the City's Sanitary Sewer System; said bonds to mature serially over a period not to exceed twenty (20) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed FOUR AND ONE HALF PER CENTUM (4 1/2%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually, and to provide for the payment of principal and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

Report From Washington

CRIME IN THE NATION'S CAPITAL
Washington is the Capital of the greatest nation in the world. It is a city of everyone, especially the young people, has a great desire to visit the Capital. At this time of year, high school seniors from all over the nation converge upon the Capital City in buses, trains, cars, and private cars. Many of these graduation trips for the young people are during their high school careers. They are happy, carefree and carefree at this time of life and look forward to a wonderful experience.

It is a fine feeling to see these young people visiting their Nation's Capital, inspired by its past glory, which is so forcibly called to mind by the Washington Monument, the Lincoln and Jefferson Memorials, the White House, Lee's and Mount Vernon, and a host of other points of historical value. Nevertheless, the facts are faced, whether it is Washington, New York City, Los Angeles, Dallas, Chicago, or Pumpkin Center. The root of the evil can be found, a solution provided and soon. The staggering cost of crime throughout this Nation is incredible. It is my feeling that the Washington is the Nation's Capital the fight against crime should begin here.

In the meantime, it would be for all those planning to visit Washington, whether adults or children, to realize the seriousness of the situation. There are very few nights in the District of Columbia that are not filled with crimes, burglaries, muggings, and more serious offenses. The assets of the Nation's Capital are safe, despite diligent work of the available police. Anyone who walks the streets after nine o'clock in the evening is asking for trouble unless they stay within well and brightly lighted areas and do not alone. Any journey down a dimly lighted street or a little thoroughfare, or through a

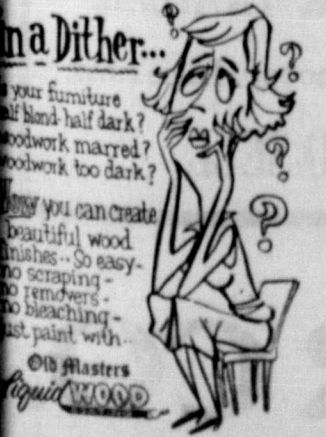

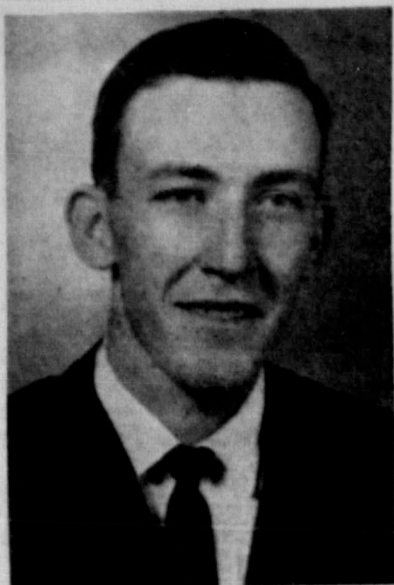

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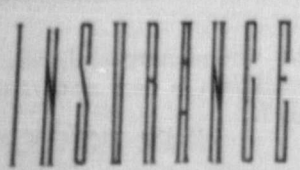
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
