## City Sells \$70,000 Bonds To 1st National, Memphis

The Memphis City Council Tuesday night passed an order to accept the bid from the First National Bank of Memphis, the lower interest rate bidder on the \$70,000 worth of Municipal Bonds.

The FNB of Memphis submitted a bid with the effective interest rate of 3.446081.

The City Council received four bids, including the First National's. These were from First State Bank of Memphis, First Southwestern Company of Lubbock, and Columbian Security Corp. of San Antonio.

The bid submitted by the First National Bank had the lowest effective interest rate of any of the bids submitted.

In selling the bonds, another step was completed toward the building of a new sewage disposal plant south of Memphis, and sewer system improvements. The council also stated the next step is the land survey to determine

Shannon Doss, Superintendent of the Memphis Schools, said the juniors and seniors will enroll on Thursday, August 26, and the remainder of the students will enroll on Friday, August 27. The first official day of school will be Monday, August 30, he said.

Supt. Loran Denton of Turkey Public Schools announced school enrollment will be on Friday, Aug. 27, at 9 a. m. with classes beginning on Monday, Aug. 30.

Supt. JoEd Cupell of Estelline reported that high school enrollment will be held Wednesday, Aug. 25, with classes beginning on Thursday, August 26th. Junior High and Grade School students will enroll on Thursday, August 26, he said, and buses will run that day.

Supt. Allen Jones of Lakeview Public Schools said that registration will be held from 9 to 11 a. m. on Friday, Aug. 27, for all twelve grades. Buses will run that morning, he said. Lakeview's first day of school will be Monday, Aug. 30.

The first film was entitled "A Modern Nursing Home", giving some of the highlights of what is expected in caring for the aged, letting them know that they are really cared for in love and in their individual needs as they often feel that no one really cares or wants them; safety precautions, exit lights, fire extinguishers, clean surroundings, and good food.

For diversions, many things were suggested, such as reading materials being provided, sewing rooms available, game rooms, television, radios, and encouraging the people of the community to come often to visit. All old people love to have company and that is one of the ways in which they feel neglected.

One of the suggested diversions was discussion groups to be led by someone in the community to let them know what is going on and to guide them in their discussions.

The second film, "A Matter of Time," was heart disease and the strides made in the past fifty years in research but it is still our greatest killer; the basic causes being still unknown. Heart research is supported by insurance and by individual giving.

Eighty-five percent of heart attacks are not fatal; enough is known of heart disease that persons may live normal lives if they learn to live within their physical strength and keeping one's weight down is highly important, along with diet.

Mental Health was the third film, naming four basic things to watch: don't bottle up your emotions, respect your own ability respect others, face problems at

M. G. Upton, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Sunray, will be the evangelist for the revival, while Loran Denton of Turkey will serve as song leader.

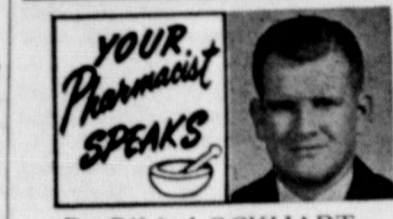

### Report From Washington

**Labels On Imported Meat**  
Last, the Department of Agriculture is moving another step toward a goal I have been advocating for many years—a goal of directing producers of this nation against excessive imports. The Department also is taking another step to provide further protection to Americans who have imported meat and meat products. While most products processed for sale within the United States must bear "establishment numbers" identifying the plants in which they were prepared, no such requirement has been in effect for imported products. Now, under its authority granted by the Congress in laws governing meat inspection, the Department will require this kind of identification on imported meats so that they may be readily identified as to source. In addition, the proposed new regula-

tions will require that the "principal display panel" of the product bear in English the true name of the product and the name of the country of origin. Designations in English are not now required. Last year and again this year, I introduced in the House a bill proposing a Federal law to require that imported meat and meat food products bear a label showing the country from which it originated. I am certainly pleased that the Department of Agriculture is strengthening its own position in this regard. However, the Department's regulations affect meat and meat products as they reach grocer's shelves—not as they reach grocer's shelves—for the majority of meat imports. It is estimated officials of the Department of Agriculture and men acquainted with the meat processing industry that which country-of-origin labeling regulations affect 75 to

90 percent of imported meat as it reaches this country, the labels identifying exporting countries remain on no more than 20 percent of these imported products on supermarket shelves. The reason is that substantial quantities of the imports consist of manufacturing types of meat—meat combined with U. S. meat in the manufacture of frankfurters, bologna, soup and the like.

Meanwhile, I am going to continue my efforts to obtain enactment of a responsible and effective labeling law, one whose provisions would apply uniformly across the United States. I think it is proper that consumers be fully protected as to quality of food products, with standards of inspection and identification applied equally to imported and domestic products. In addition, I believe it to be proper for imported products to be readily identified as to countries of origin.

Years ago, U. S. labor organizations took the lead in urging the Government to establish standards by which foreign goods being imported to compete with U. S. manufactured products could be identified. It was the position of these organizations that American consumers would be deceived if, unknowingly, they purchased imported articles thinking they were made in this country. The law has supported this view that, all things being equal, American consumers prefer American-made products. The Federal Trade Commission enforces, on a case-by-case basis, the right of American manufacturers to challenge importers of competitive foreign goods not identified as to country of origin.

It is my conviction that the same theory should be applied to meat and meat products. The housewife in the supermarket is able now to tell from the label whether certain canned hams and meats come from the United States or abroad, but most meat products are not so identified. In the bill I have proposed, labels identifying the importing country would be required on all meat products consisting of more than half, by weight, of meat from abroad. This would remove the doubts shoppers now face as they inspect the selections at supermarket meat counters.

Beef cattle prices are much improved now over the situation a year ago. Our cattlemen were in trouble then because of an increased level of beef imports. I am glad to report that imports for the year ended June 30 were approximately one-third lower than during the previous year.

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.**  
**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 27** proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto to be designated Section 48b, so as to create an agency of the State of Texas, the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, vesting the general administration and responsibility of the proper operation of said system in a state board of trustees to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, authorizing said Board to invest assets of said system in various obligations and subjects of investment, subject to certain restrictions stated therein and such other provisions as may hereafter be provided by law; providing that such Amendment shall be self-enacting and shall not alter, amend or repeal Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas or any legislation passed pursuant thereto except insofar as such legislation may limit or restrict the provisions of this Amendment; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding Section 48b thereto which shall read as follows: "Section 48b. There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, the rights of membership in which, the retirement privileges and benefits thereunder, and the management and operations of which shall be governed by the provisions herein contained and by present or hereafter enacted Acts of the Legislature not inconsistent herewith. The general

administration and responsibility for the proper operation of said system are hereby vested in a State Board of Trustees, to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, which Board shall be constituted and shall serve as may now or hereafter be provided by the Legislature. Said Board shall exercise such powers as are herein provided together with such other powers and duties not inconsistent herewith as may be prescribed by the Legislature. All moneys from whatever source coming into the Fund to provide retirement disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the state and all other securities, moneys, and assets of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas shall be administered by said Board and said Board shall be the trustees thereof. The Treasurer of the State of Texas shall be custodian of said moneys and securities. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to acquire, hold, manage, purchase, sell, assign, trade, transfer, and dispose of any securities, evidences of debt, and other investments in which said securities, moneys, and assets have been or may hereafter be invested by said Board. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to invest and reinvest any of said moneys, securities, and assets, as well as the proceeds of any of such investments, in bonds, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued, or assumed or guaranteed in whole or in part, by the United States or any agency of the United States, or by the State of Texas, or by any county, city, school district, municipal corporation, or other political subdivision of the State of Texas, both general and special obligations; or in home office facilities to be used in administering the Teacher Retirement System including land,

equipment, and office building; or in such corporation bonds, notes, other evidences of indebtedness, and corporation stocks, including common and preferred stocks, of any corporation created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any of the states of the United States, as said Board may deem to be proper investments; provided that in making such and all of such investments said Board shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as probable safety of their capital; and further provided, that a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may now or hereafter be provided by law. Unless investments authorized herein are hereafter further restricted by an Act of the Legislature, no more than one per cent (1%) of the book value of the total assets of the Teacher Retirement System shall be invested in the stock of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid cash dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors; and provided further, that so long as less than \$500,000,000 of said Fund is invested in the government and municipal securities enumerated above, not more than thirty-three and one-third per cent (33 1/3%) of the Fund shall be invested at any given time in common stocks. This Amendment shall be self-enacting and shall become effective immediately upon its adoption without any

enabling legislation. This Section shall not alter, amend or repeal the first paragraph of Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas as amended November 6, 1956, or any legislation passed pursuant thereto. This Section shall not alter, amend or repeal the second paragraph of Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas as amended November 6, 1956, or any legislation passed pursuant thereto, except insofar as the provisions of the second paragraph of Section 48a and any legislation passed pursuant thereto, may limit or restrict the provisions hereof and only to the extent of such limitation or restriction."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 2, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 48b relating to the Teacher Retirement Fund and the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investment of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Teacher Retirement System."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 48b relating to the Teacher Retirement Fund and the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investment of moneys and other assets of the Fund and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Teacher Retirement System."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.**  
**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 47** proposing an Amendment to Section 4, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, to provide for four-year terms of office for State Representatives.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 4, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. The members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new House of Representatives shall be chosen after every apportionment, and the members elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the members of Class A shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of Class B at the expiration of four years, so that one-half of the members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified. Except in case of an election to fill a vacancy, and except in the first election following reapportionment, a person who has been elected to the House of Representatives shall not be eligible to be a candidate again for membership in the Legislature until the term for

which he was elected has less than one year remaining." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to provide for a four-year term of office for State Representatives."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to provide for a four-year term of office for State Representatives." Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the constitution and laws of this state. Sec. 4. In the event the Constitutional Amendment proposed in this Resolution is adopted by the people of Texas in the election in November, 1965, the Governor of Texas is directed not to issue a proclamation for the election and not to publish notice thereof for the Constitutional Amendment proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 1 of the 59th Texas Legislature, since the provisions of said House Joint Resolution No. 1 are included in this Resolution. But, should this proposed Amendment be rejected by the people of Texas in the election in November, 1965, then the terms and provisions of House Joint Resolution No. 1 shall be in full force and effect and shall be proclaimed and published and submitted to the electorate in November, 1966, as provided in said House Joint Resolution No. 1.

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.**  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 57** proposing an Amendment to Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding to said Section as presently written, the following provisions: requiring automatic retirement of certain District and Appellate Judges at age seventy-five (75) or such earlier age, not under seventy (70), as may be provided by law; creating a State Judicial Qualifications Commission and providing for its composition and the qualifications, methods of selection and terms of office of its members; defining the functions and procedures of said Commission, including the duty to investigate, and hold hearings in respect of, disability and misconduct of District and Appellate Judges and to make recommendations to the Supreme Court of Texas for involuntary retirement or removal of such Judges; empowering the Supreme Court of Texas, in its discretion, to retire such Judges for disability and to remove them for misconduct, upon recommendation of the aforesaid Commission and consideration of the record made before it; defining misconduct for which said Judges may be so removed; providing that the proceedings of said Commission shall be confidential until filed in the Supreme Court for retirement or removal; and providing that the removal provisions hereby established shall be alternative to and cumulative of those provided elsewhere in the Constitution.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that said Section shall hereafter read as follows: "Section 1-a. (1) Subject to the further provisions of this Section, the Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Justices and Judges of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age and disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed. The office of every such Justice and Judge shall become vacant when the incumbent reaches the age of seventy-five (75) years or such earlier age, not less than seventy (70) years, as the Legislature may prescribe; but, in the case of an incumbent whose term of office includes the effective date of this Amendment, this provision shall not prevent

him from serving the remainder of said term nor be applicable to him before his period or periods of judicial service shall have reached a total of ten (10) years.

"(2) There is hereby created the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, to consist of nine (9) members, to wit: (i) two (2) Justices of Courts of Civil Appeals; (ii) two (2) District Judges; (iii) two (2) members of the State Bar, who have respectively practiced as such for over ten (10) consecutive years next preceding their selection; (iii) three (3) citizens, at least thirty (30) years of age, not licensed to practice law nor holding any salaried public office or employment; provided that no person shall be or remain a member of the Commission, who does not maintain physical residence within this State, or who resides in, or holds a judgeship within or for, the same Supreme Judicial District as another member of the Commission, or who shall have ceased to retain the qualifications above specified for his respective class of membership. Commissioners of classes (i), (ii) and (iii) shall be chosen by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate, those of class (iii) by the Board of Directors of the State Bar under regulations to be prescribed by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate.

"(3) The regular term of office of Commissioners shall be six (6) years; but the initial members of each of classes (i), (ii) and (iii) shall respectively be chosen for terms of four (4) and six (6) years, and the initial members of class (iii) for respective terms of two (2), four (4) and six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. Commissioners may succeed themselves in office only if having served less than three (3) consecutive years.

"(4) Commissioners shall receive no compensation for their services as such. The Legislature shall provide for the payment of the necessary expense for the operation of the Commission.

"(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceed-

ings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement or removal of Justices or Judges shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.

"(6) Any Justice or Judge within the scope of this Section 1-a may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any such Justice or Judge may be involuntarily retired for disability seriously interfering with the performance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature. (7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to misconduct or disability of particular Justices or Judges, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.

"(8) The Commission may, after such investigation as it deems necessary, order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal or retirement of a Justice or Judge, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause, it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal or retirement, as the case may be, of the Justice or Judge in question and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission.

"(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order removal or retirement, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary.

"(10) All papers filed with and proceedings before the Commission or a Master shall be confidential, and the filing of papers with, and the giv-

ing of testimony before, the Commission, Master or the Supreme Court shall be private and provided that upon being filed in the Supreme Court the record loses its confidential character.

"(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall afford to any judge against whom a proceeding is instituted to cause his retirement due process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest in active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not misfeasance is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed.

"(12) No Justice or Judge shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal.

"(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to, and cumulative of, the methods of removal of Justices and Judges provided elsewhere in this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the automatic retirement of District and Appellate Judges for old age, creating the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, defining its functions; and empowering the Supreme Court, upon recommendation of said Commission, to remove District and Appellate Judges for misconduct and to retire such Judges in cases of disability.

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the automatic retirement of District and Appellate Judges for old age, creating the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, defining its functions; and empowering the Supreme Court, upon recommendation of said Commission, to remove District and Appellate Judges for misconduct and to retire such Judges in cases of disability."

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.**  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8** proposing an Amendment to Section 24, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, to allow an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature for the Lieutenant Governor and for the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and increasing the per diem allowance of Members of the Legislature.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature. All Members of the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, also shall receive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day for the one hundred and forty (140) days of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. This Amend-

ment shall be self-enacting and appropriations hereof made in the General Appropriations Bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1967, for the salaries of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives shall not be invalid because of the anticipatory nature of the legislation.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of Government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller for each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

Sec. 2. That Section 17 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 17. If, during the vacancy in the office of Governor, the Lieutenant Governor should die, resign, refuse to serve, or be removed from office, or be unable to serve; or if he shall be impeached or absent from the State, the President of the Senate, for the time being, shall, in like manner, administer the Government until he shall be succeeded by a Governor. The Lieutenant Governor or shall, while he acts as President of the Senate, receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature and the same mileage which shall be allowed to the Members of the Senate, and no more; and dur-

ing the time he administers the Government, as Governor, he shall receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office, and no more. The President, for the time being, during the time he administers the Government, receive in like manner the same compensation, which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature for the Lieutenant Governor and for the Speaker of the House of Representatives and allowing a per diem for Members of the Legislature not to exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day for the 140 days of each Regular Session and 30 days of each Special Session.

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature for the Lieutenant Governor and for the Speaker of the House of Representatives and allowing a per diem for Members of the Legislature not to exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day for the 140 days of each Regular Session and 30 days of each Special Session."

Sec. 4. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

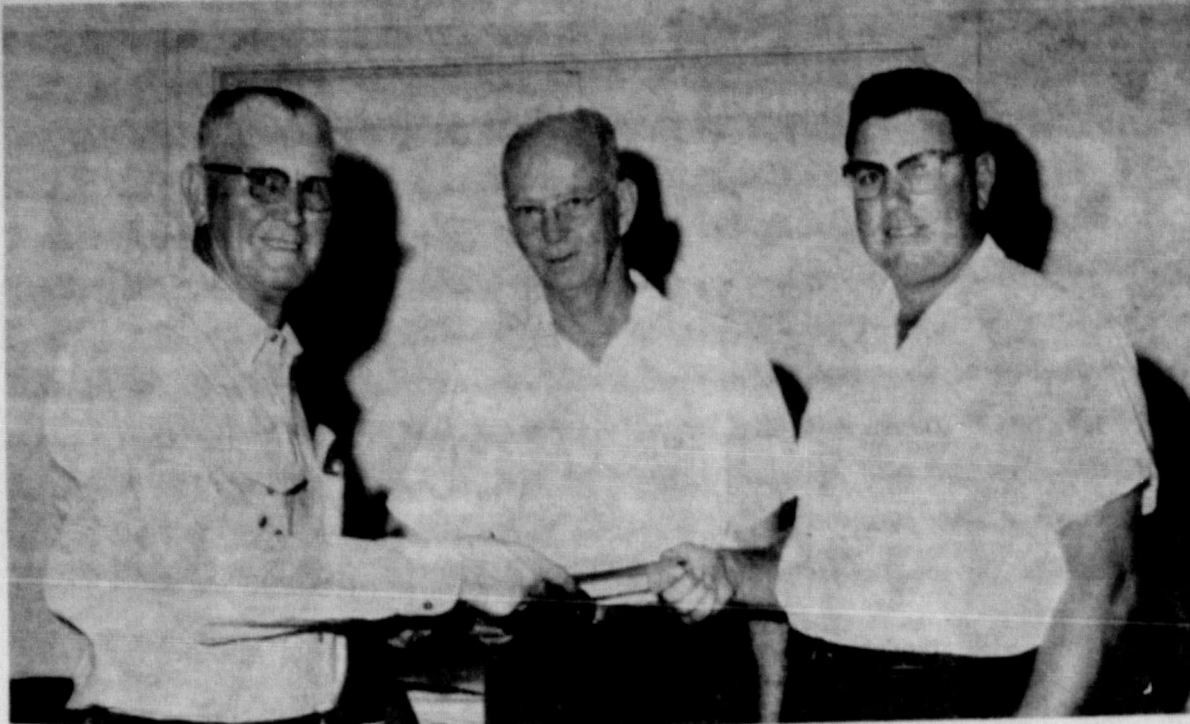
The next morning, the boys started on the first leg of the journey, setting up base camp that evening.

### ASCS Community Committeemen Nominee Petitions Should Be Made Now

Slates of nominees for membership on ASC community committees soon will be established at the ASCS County Office, Lynn C. Davis, chairman ASC county committee, has announced. The present ASC Committee is making a special effort to encourage the greatest possible participation of eligible voters in the election.

Any local resident who is eligible to take part in an ASCS farm program may vote and may hold office as a committeeman regardless of race, color, creed, or national origin.

Davis said today that farmers who are eligible to vote in the

committee elections also have the right to nominate as candidates for committee membership any farmer who is eligible and willing to serve. Such petitions, each one nominating one farmer and signed by six or more eligible voters, may be filed at the County Office any time before August 29. Eligible voters may sign as many petitions as they wish.

Additional nominations may be made by the incumbent ASC community and county committeemen.

"We want the best men available to serve on our ASC committees," Chairman Davis declared, "because the committee system is the backbone of farm programs—those dealing with conservation of soil and water, as well as price support activities for various commodities. In the last few years, the farmer-elected committee system—unique in the history of agriculture—has been studied intensively by a committee of farm and public administration experts especially appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture for that purpose. The system not only has been retained, but has been greatly strengthened."

Here in Hall County, Davis points out, 858 farmers, 80 per cent of the total, took part last year in one or more programs administered by the ASC Committee. Funds disbursed under the Committees' supervision last year amounted to \$6,166,797. Of this amount, \$5,000,000 was for price-support loans aimed at increasing market returns above what farmers would receive on an unsupported market. Included in the price-support program in this county are such major commodity programs as cotton, wheat and feed grains, among others.

Last year also, 22,914 acres of farmland were improved under

the Agricultural Conservation Program cost-sharing arrangement. This cost \$88,405, with about half coming from the participating farmer, the balance from ACP.

"So you can see that ASC committeemen in Hall County are in effect board members of a big business," the chairman continued. "This points up the urgency in getting out the greatest possible cross-section of farmers in community elections."

The election of ASC community committees throughout Hall County will be held by mail with all ballots being returned by September 8, 1965.

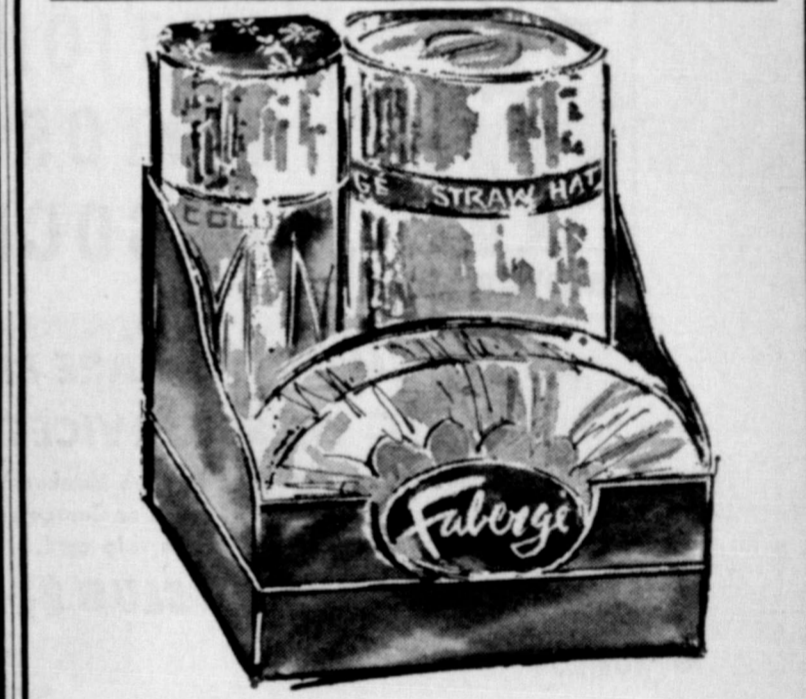

The story follows:

Using the same old furniture every day would make any wife hate her job. That's Mrs. E. W. Godfrey's philosophy. "I'm always changing things at home," said Mrs. E. W. Godfrey, Jr., showing off her latest projects.

Godfrey, who goes along with her wife's projects and even as a hand now and then as he recalled living in Memphis for a year while she worked on her current furnishings, told me I would have to do everything before we move to a new place because he wanted to see the new apartment before he moved in. Mrs. Godfrey stated, "I just got my apartment with plenty of space for my junk" for months. They finally settled

on a one-bedroom apartment off the Gulf Freeway.

**Scraped, Painted**

"I scraped and painted and created until I finished every piece of furniture and decoration for our new home. Of course, I really was finished with it all because I'm always changing something," she winked.

Currently the Godfrey apartment boasts gilded and antiqued furniture and various examples of the Godfrey creativity.

One corner of the living room features a round table with an ornate lamp made from parts of five lamps. Its base and stem are crowned by two electric candles. Artificial gladioli, roses and grapes in various shades of apricot, pink and gold twine around the candles.

**Weigh Bill Spike**

On the same table Mrs. Godfrey displays an old weigh bill spike she stuck through a large gold candle. The base, painted gold and white, also holds artificial roses and leaves.

Lamps abound throughout the room. A five-foot candle lamp dominates one corner. When Mrs. Godfrey sanded it down she discovered it was from France and was made of pressed paper.

Her favorite lamp is one with a round table built around it. Artificial ivy twines up the lamp pole.

In the bedroom the Godfreys display a world globe holder that now holds a fish bowl and is covered by a glass table top. A typically unique Godfrey lamp with an apricot-colored shade and a base made from an old chair leg stands above the fish bowl.

**Velvet Frame**

To show off a picture of the Godfrey son and daughter-in-law cutting their wedding cake, Mrs. Godfrey created a heart-shaped frame decorated in red velvet and pearls.

The back of the frame is en-

crusted in pearls in a criss-cross design. Mrs. Godfrey kept her pattern straight by pasting a hair net on the frame and gluing the pearls along the lines of the net.

The apartment is a testimony to Mrs. Godfrey's claim that she keeps antique paint companies in business.

"The directions say to just put the paint on but I always strip furniture down to the bare wood so I'll have a good, clean piece of furniture," she said.

**Reupholstered Secretary**

The secretary in her dining room was once a beat up old piece with layers of paint. Now it looks like a priceless museum piece. New gold drawer pulls and antique paint did the job."

Proving you can "use almost anything to make something pretty," Mrs. Godfrey utilized her left-overs from a chair repair job to make wall plaques for her dining room.

To complete the decor in the living room, the Godfreys added a black love seat, upholstered by Mr. Godfrey.

"I saw the love seat on the front porch of an old couple's home. I knew it meant nothing to them. I pestered them for three years until I finally got it. It was my husband's first upholstery job and he handled the tufting and pleating beautifully," she beamed.

Mr. Godfrey's second project was to upholster an over-stuffed chair in turquoise brocade for the living room. Mrs. Godfrey used a similar fabric to make a chair that converts into a bed when their three grandchildren visit.

The Godfreys needed extra seating for the children.

Mr. Godfrey opened the low kitchen cabinets and placed small table tops on hinges on the inside of the cabinet doors so the children could eat there.

The Godfreys, especially proud of their children and grandchildren, decided to show them off where everyone would see them. In braid-trimmed panels, the Godfrey offspring appear in candid birthday suit pictures on the bathroom wall.

"Eighty-five per cent (85%) of such funds shall be allocated by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas on June 1, 1966, and fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds shall be allocated by said Comptroller on June 1, 1972, based on the following determinations:

"(1) Ninety per cent (90%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966, shall be allocated to state institutions based on projected enrollment increases published by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System for fall 1966 to fall 1978.

"(2) Ten per cent (10%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966 shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on the number of additional square feet needed in educational and general facilities by such eligible state institutions to meet the average square feet per full time equivalent student of all state senior institutions (currently numbering twenty-two).

"(3) All of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on determinations used in the June 1, 1966, allocations except that the allocations of fifty per cent (50%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on projected enrollment increases for fall 1972 to fall 1978, and fifty per cent (50%) of such funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on the need for additional square feet of educational and general facilities.

"Not later than June first of the beginning year of each succeeding ten-year period the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas shall reallocate eighty-five per cent (85%) of the funds to be derived from said Ten Cent (10%) ad valorem tax for said ten-year period and not later than June first of the sixth year of each succeeding ten-year period said Comptroller shall reallocate fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds to the eligible state institutions then in existence based on determinations that are similar to the determinations used in allocating funds during the twelve-year period beginning January 1, 1966, except that enrollment projections for succeeding ten-year periods will be from the fall semester of the first year to the fall

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT**

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24** proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Article VII, Section 17, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping of buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning; providing for allocation of funds therefor; authorizing the issuance of bonds or notes and the pledging of allotted funds for the payment of same; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 17 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 17. In lieu of the state ad valorem tax on property of Seven Cents (7¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 51 of Article III, as amended, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Two Cents (2¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the continuing payment of Confederate pensions as provided under Section 51, Article III, and for the establishment and continued maintenance of the State Building Fund as provided in Section 51b, Article III, of the Constitution.

"Also, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Ten Cents (10¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping buildings and other permanent improvements at the designated institutions of higher learning provided that none of the proceeds of this tax shall be used for auxiliary enterprises; and the governing board of each such institution of higher learning is fully authorized to pledge all or any part of said funds allotted to such institution as

hereinafter provided, to secure bonds or notes issued for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping such buildings or other permanent improvements at said respective institutions. Such bonds or notes shall be issued in such amounts as may be determined by the governing boards of said respective institutions, shall bear interest not to exceed four per cent (4%) per annum and shall mature serially or otherwise in not more than ten (10) years; provided further, that the state tax on property as heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 9 of Article VIII, as amended, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty Cents (30¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation. All bonds shall be examined and approved by the Attorney General of the State of Texas, and when so approved shall be incontestable; and all approved bonds shall be registered in the office of the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas. Said bonds shall be sold only through competitive bids and shall never be sold for less than their par value and accrued interest.

"The following state institutions then in existence shall be eligible to receive funds raised from said Ten Cent (10¢) tax levy for the twelve-year period beginning January 1, 1966, and for the succeeding ten-year period:

Arlington State College at Arlington

Texas Technological College at Lubbock

North Texas State University at Denton

Lamar State College of Technology at Beaumont

Texas College of Arts and Industries at Kingsville

Texas Woman's University at Denton

Texas Southern University at Houston

Midwestern University at Wichita Falls

University of Houston at Houston

Pen American College at Edinburg

East Texas State College at Commerce

Sam Houston State Teachers College at Huntsville

Southwest Texas State College at San Marcos

West Texas State University at Canyon

semester of the tenth year. All such designated institutions of higher learning shall not thereafter receive any general revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements for which said Ten Cent (10¢) ad valorem tax is herein provided, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of any General Revenue Funds. The State Comptroller of Public Accounts shall draw all necessary and proper warrants upon the State Treasury in order to carry out the purpose of this Amendment, and the State Treasurer shall pay warrants so issued out of the special fund hereby created for said purpose. This Amendment shall be self-enacting. It shall become operative or effective upon its adoption so as to supersede and repeal the former provisions of this Section; provided further, that nothing herein shall be construed as impairing the obligation incurred by any outstanding notes or bonds heretofore issued by any state institution of higher learning under this Section prior to the adoption of this Amendment but such notes or bonds shall be paid, both as to principal and interest, from the fund as allocated by any such institution.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 17 thereof, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 17 thereof, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping of buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.



### Turkey Firm Is Low Bidder On Okla. Dams

Lyles Construction Co. of Turkey was low bidder Wednesday for the construction of four dams on the Tri-County Turkey Creek flood control project.

The low bid, one of 10 submitted, was \$162,394.

The four dams are part of a \$4.9 million project covering 96,400 acres in Harmon, Greer and Jackson Counties of Oklahoma. Seven of the 41 dam sites are in Harmon County. Original cost was estimated at \$650,000 with an additional \$222,000 for land treatment.

The dams will rise from 30 to 40 feet above the natural water level, and will require at least five more years for completion because of the difficulty of flat surface. Construction of the dams in Greer County has been underway for several months.

Included in the Harmon County project, expected to begin soon, will be clearing, excavation, earth-fill, concrete pipe, conduits, reinforced concrete, filter materials and fences. The project originates in Harmon County near Russell and follows Turkey Creek southwesterly to the Red River.
