Farmers Approve Cotton Marketing Quotas!

The nation's cotton farmers voted 94.8 per cent in favor of federal marketing quotas, price supports and direct payments on their 1966 crops. Hall County followed the national trend by approving marketing quotas by over 95 per cent.

Probably the newest wrinkle in the agriculture picture as far as cotton production is concerned is new legislation on the sale or lease of cotton acreage allotments within the county or with-

For the first time since the allotment practice was introduced in agriculutre, farmers or land owners are allowed to sell, purchase or lease acreage allotments within the county boundaries. Texas counties voted in the referendum recently on the question of whether or not to permit cotton allotment transfers outside a county by sale or lease, and it was decided on an individual county basis. It required a two-thirds majority for passage.

Hall County, like most of the Panhandle counties, voted against this practice. Only 61 of over 250 counties voting agreed to permit cotton acreage to move outside the county. No allotments are allowed to be transferred across state lines.

Quite a bit of talk has been done about transferring acreage allotments from one farm to another. Primarily, however, the new law states that the period within which selling, leasing, or buying of acreage allotments must be done between June 1st and December 31st of each year. Farmers interested in this practice have until December 31st, 1965, to make whatever allotment adjustments they desire for the 1966 cotton crop, Lynn L. McKown, ASCS county office manager announced.

Under the new law, the USDA exercises no control over the price of the allotment. The cotton law penalizes buyers who obtain allotments from bale-to-the-acre land and move allotments to farms with better yield histories. One hundred acres is the largest allowable transfer.


McKown explained that a farmer who owns farms with cotton allotments in several counties in the state can transfer allotments from one of his farms to the other as long as he does so during the period of time specified, regardless of the vote of the counties in which his farms are located.

Considering that only 61 of Texas' counties approved out-ofcounty transfers there is little to encourage one to believe that the Texas Panhandle will end up with any great increase in cotton allotments because of the practice. It has been predicted that if all "unwanted" acres in these counties were moved into the Panhandle it would amount to less than a five per cent increase in the current allotment.

McKown said that allotments on soil bank land within the county boundaries can be sold or leased by the soil bank land Vietnam. owners under the new law so long as this is done by the Decem ber 31st deadline
