Another of the retired teacher's projects also benefits children, especially in the winter months. Miss Hammond makes quilts for boys at Boys Ranch near Amarillo, and has "adopted" a dormitory of 36 youngsters. Next week she will visit the ranch and take her ninth quilt to them. She laughed, "If I live long enough, each of the 36 boys will have one of my quilts."

Miss Hammond explained that when she first began making the quilts, they were given to any boy who might need one. She had a talk with Cal Farley, founder of the ranch, and requested that the quilts be given to a certain age group, boys from 11 to 14. Miss Hammond recalled, "I told Mr. Farley that I was an eccentric old maid, cranky as could be. I had always taught boys of those ages, and feel that they need special understanding. It's a difficult age group—they aren't babies and they aren't adults, and people often don't understand them. I want that age boy to have one of my quilts."

Farley wrote her a letter shortly and told Miss Hammond that her wish had been granted, and

she would have a whole dormitory for whom she could quilt.

"Two of the boys have written me letters of thanks. One of them said that he had never had a quilt of his own before. I cried when I read that," Miss Hammond said.

This remarkable woman, who derives so much pleasure for herself while helping others, retired in 1962 after spending 49 years in the teaching profession. Her first teaching job was at Salisbury, after which she taught at Newlin and Lakeview. In 1924 she came to Memphis, where she stayed for 38 years until her retirement.

Miss Hammond laughed when asked if her first schools were one-room buildings. "Oh, no. They had two or three rooms." Her beginning salary at Salisbury was 35 dollars a month, and for the next ten years or so, it was 50 a month. She happily recalled a big salary increase in 1936, when she began earning 60 dollars, and the next year an even larger one of 75 dollars per month.

The former teachers said she does not understand people who "sit around during their retirement or even their earlier life, moaning that they are not enjoying life, that there is nothing to do. There just are not enough hours in the days for me to do all the things I want to do."

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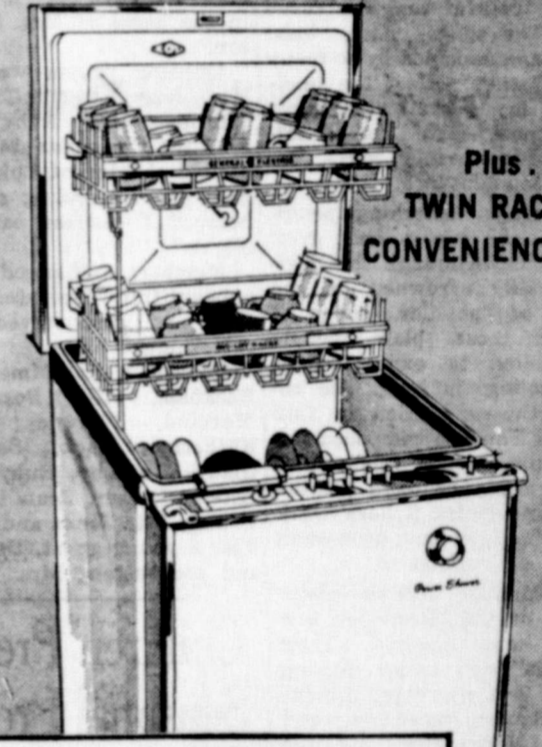

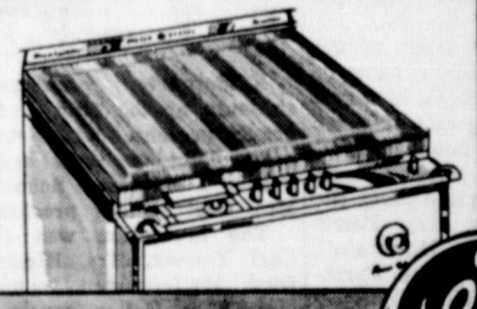

### 1913 Study Club Enjoys Program On Folk Music

Twenty-one members and one guest, Mrs. Bob Fowler, met in the home of Mrs. L. G. DeBerry the afternoon of December 1 for a delightful program concerning American folk music. The program, ably presented by Mrs. Mills Roberts as narrator and Mrs. George Ferris at the piano, told the history of folk music with selections of songs from various parts of America.

Andrew Fletcher of Saltoun (1703) has said, "Give me the making of the songs of a nation and I care not who makes its laws." Under the title, "America Sings," Mrs. Roberts gave an interesting background for the folk music played by Mrs. Ferris.

Folk songs are "the stuff that dreams are made on," and mummur of wishes and conflicts often too disturbing to be more openly stated. They are part dream and part reality, part past and part present. Each phrase has risen from the depths of the heart or been carved out of the rock of experience. Each line has been sung smooth by many singers who tested it until the language became apt, truthful, tough as cured hickory. The songs have been cared for and reshaped by so many hands that they reflect the tenderest and most creative impulses of the human heart. Like all serious art forms, folk songs improve on acquaintance.

Work songs, marching songs, sad songs, and joyous ones grew with America. Although the Puritans officially frowned on the frivolities of popular songs, it seems even those plain people were impelled to express their deepest feelings in song. The colonial Northwest is rich in folk music. The Yankees composed numerous topical songs which were circulated orally or were printed on cheap broadsides. Sailors' work songs or 'chanteys have been sung by men of all nations.

All are familiar with the plaintive songs of the Tennessee and Kentucky mountaineers. Their "harp songs" and aither playing are a part and parcel of Americana. The Square Dance tunes and songs, the Negro spirituals, the marching songs of the foot soldiers and the work songs of the prisoners are woven into the warp and woof of the nation's history.

Not alone the legends of those songs but the music itself so beautifully played by Mrs. Ferris charmed the listeners. Among the melodies chosen by Mrs. Ferris were: "Springfield Mountain", "The E-r-i-e Canal", "The Farmer's Crust Wife", "When You Go A-Courtin'", "The Girl I Left Behind Me", "John Henry", "Arkansas Traveler", "When The Stars Begin To Fall", "Frankie and Johnnie", and "Bury Me Not On The Lone Prairie".

### Sen. Rogers Gives Skip-Row Request Of Area Farmers To Secy. Freeman

State Senator Andy Rogers of Childress reported in a telephone conversation from Austin Monday afternoon that the wishes of cotton farmers about skip-row planting was passed on to the Secretary of Agriculture last Wednesday.

He stated that it was his privilege to be in the official party along with Congressman Graham Purcell, and every attempt was made by both to convince Mr. Freeman of the importance of continuing the skip-row regulation as it had been in effect in the past, pointing to the overall economy of this part of Texas in the program.

Sen. Rogers said that he tried to get a short meeting with the secretary with representatives from, Childress and Cottle counties, but that other groups were making the request; so the au-

dience could not be scheduled. The call from President Lyndon Johnson, requesting that Freeman go to the LBJ Ranch, cut short the amount of time he had in the district.

Rogers had been meeting with the Committee of Faculty Compensation in State Supported Universities and Colleges, which was held Monday in the Capitol Building, of which he is a member. The special study committee will report back to the next session of the Legislature.

"We know that the competition for the better brains and scientists has become about as stiff as it is for professional quarterbacks," Rogers stated.

Various members of the committee are holding meetings with officials of different colleges and universities, and will continue next fall.

"For the first time in our history, salaries of faculty members are above the national average," he added. "We need to recruit the top brains in our colleges and universities to face the future."

"Also, our retirement program for college professors is much below the national average, as surveys show. The attempt to solve this problem involves a constitutional question. This legal difficulty was briefed and reported to us by the attorney for the Texas Legislative Council and a representative from the Attorney General's Office.

"About our skip-row planting of cotton—I was impressed by Secretary Freeman. He is a sincere and dedicated public servant. It is my belief that this visit in Texas was his first opportunity to see and hear at first-hand the conditions and problems of agriculture in our area."

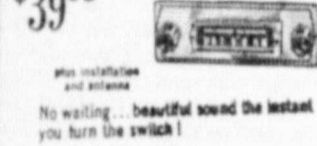

## Gen. Telephone Company Reminds Of Bill Decrease

All telephone bills will be reduced effective January 1, 1966. E. H. Danner, president of General Telephone of the Southwest and Southwestern States Telephone Companies, reminded telephone customers this week.

The Federal excise tax on local telephone service and long distance calls will be lowered from the present 10 per cent to 3 per cent as a result of legislation approved by Congress and signed into law last summer.

On each succeeding January 1 an additional 1 per cent cut will occur so that 1969 the entire 10 per cent Federal excise tax on telephone service will be ended.

"We are pleased that the resulting savings will be received by our customers," the president commented.

Danner reminded customers that no excise tax revenues have ever gone to the telephone company. "The telephone company has merely collected the money for the United States government since the tax was put into effect as 'temporary' measure during World War II," Danner stated.

"We are pleased to have contributed to the efforts to end this discriminatory tax and believe that the legislators who assisted are to be commended," Danner commented.

"LRS" for preparation of background reports on public and legislative issues; for pro and con analysis of bills; for surveys of court decisions; for spot factual information for histories of legislation indicating the original intent of Congress; for tabulation of statistics; for assistance in answering inquiries from constituents; and for a variety of other services.

It is possible that expansion of professional services to Congress—a goal of some Congressional critics—will come through expansion of the Legislative Reference Service. As an example of the type of broadened responsibility undertaken by the LRS (with prior Congressional approval) a "Science Policy Research Division" was established in 1964 to bolster the scientific staffing of House and Senate committees. Among reasons for forming the unit was growing concern in Congress over the \$15 billion being spent annually by government departments for research and development activities, which continue to spiral upward, and the need for improved information to permit Congress to monitor the activities of no less than 42 agencies engaged in technical activities. Another problem with which the new unit is dealing concerns overlapping by government agencies in such fields as water resources development. The new service, it is hoped, will give Congress greater strength in dealing with scientific and technical experts from the Executive Branch who testify before Congress in behalf of appropriations for expanding Gov-

ernment programs. It is difficult to believe, because it has come to pass in a relatively short time, but two out of three professional employees of the Executive Branch are scientists, engineers, or physicians.

As was pointed out in a recent television broadcast, Congress too often must rely upon the testimony of witnesses who speak in behalf of Executive Branch programs and activities in which they are employed. It is too much to expect that these people be completely objective. To maintain parity of scientific competence with the Executive Branch, the Legislative Branch—Congress—needs to have its own experts to provide assistance in formulating legislation and preparing to receive testimony from witnesses from the departments and agencies. Traditionally, it has been the Library of Congress, through the Legislative Reference Service, that has provided the necessary backstopping to Congress. Its role may be more and more important in the years to come.

Staple lengths were predominantly 15-16 inch with 83 per cent. Other lengths were: 29-32 inch, 7 per cent; 31-32 inch, 9 per cent; 1 inch and longer, 1 per cent.

The micronaire readings (finesness and maturity) showed a considerable decline compared with last week. About one-half of the cotton classed was 3.6-4.8 compared with two-thirds of the classing a week ago.

Other readings were: 2.6 and below (Wasty), 2 per cent; 2.7-2.9, 9 per cent; 3.0-3.2, 18 per cent; and 3.3-3.5, 20 per cent.

Pressley tests (fiber strength) continued to reflect strong fiber with 86 per cent tested showing 80 square inch and a cent tested 75, only 3 per cent below.
