Rites For Former Turkey Resident Held At Lubbock

Luther Calvin Edwards, 74, died Dec. 21 in Lubbock, Texas, after a prolonged illness. Funeral services were held in St. Mark's Presbyterian Church in Lubbock Dec. 22 with Rev. Bob Ferguson officiating. Masonic graveside rites were conducted. Burial was in Rest Haven Memorial Park.

He had been a resident of Lubbock since 1933 when he moved there from Turkey. He was an ex-school superintendent and banker and was owner of the West Texas Service Co. in Lubbock. He served two years on the State Board of Examiners and was ex-president of the Texas Association of Collectors. He will be remembered in Hall County as an organizer of the Farmers & Merchants Bank in Turkey in the late '20's.

He spent his early years in East Texas and was a graduate of North Texas Teachers College in Denton, and was married to Vesta Hasty in 1908.

He was a member of St. Mark's Presbyterian Church, The Golden Age Club and held an Honorary Life Membership in the Alford Masonic Lodge and Lubbock Lions Club.

Survivors are two sons, Luther H. of Dallas, Thomas J. of Lubbock; three daughters, Mrs. Elmer Lacy, Turkey, Mrs. Winston Watkins, Petersburg, and Mrs. Walter Tindall, Lubbock; one sister, Mrs. Vergil Barnett, Houston; 13 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren. One son, Noel J. Edwards, died in 1959.

Pall bearers were his grandsons, Noel, Billy, John and Tommy Edwards of Lubbock, Gordon and Joe Edwards of Dallas, Tubal Cain of Mangum, Okla., and Tony Watkins of Albuquerque, N. M.

Jesse C. Symes Is Released On \$10,000 Bond

Jesse Clyde Symes, 24, was released Wednesday on a \$10,000 bond from Hall County Jail, the Hall County Sheriff's office announced.

Symes was being held under bond on a charge of murder which was filed against him after a hearing Friday concerning the shooting death of Robert Ralph Jinks, 35, last Thursday afternoon.

Jinks died in Hall County Hospital where he was rushed by a Spicer Funeral Home ambulance which was summoned to the Symes' trailer house on North 1st Street.

Symes and another man were taken into custody by Law Enforcement Officers of the Hall County Sheriff's Office and Memphis City Police Dept. at the scene of the shooting.

Following an investigation headed by Sheriff Elmer Neel and Chief of Police Tomie Tucker, charges of murder were filed against Symes. Bond of \$10,000 was set by County Judge E. (Gip) McMurry Friday.

Sheriff Neel said this week the investigation is still in progress. Robert Ralph Jinks was taken to Hutchinson, Kans. where burial was under the direction of Elliott Mortuary.

He was an employee of Cooper & Woodruff Construction Co. which has the state highway contract on Highway 287 south of Memphis.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Pauline Jinks, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Jinks of Hutchinson, Kan. and two sisters.

Harvest Figure Hits 42,000 Bales With Slow Movement

High Rate Of Absenteeism Is Growing Concern Of Memphis School Officials

The high rate of absenteeism in the Memphis Schools is a matter of growing concern for all who are interested in the education of our children, according to Superintendent of Schools Shannon Doss.

In explaining the seriousness of the situation, he said that during the last six-week period that a total of 1,633 days of school were

lost by students. This is an average of 1.65 days for every student enrolled in the Memphis Public Schools.

"At this rate the local schools will lose a total of \$9,789 in state aid. This is enough money to buy two new buses; pay two additional teachers salaries, or do a lot of other needed things in the schools. This money can never be regained once it is lost," Supt. Doss said.

"Of course you cannot put a rice tag on what the child misses when he or she is absent, and contrary to popular opinion, a child can never really make up what he misses no matter how much additional work he might do," stated Mr. Doss.

"I wish to take this opportunity to urge all parents to make sure that their children are in their proper places in school unless they are physically unable to attend. The only legitimate excuse for missing school is for illness or death in the family. It is true that there are other important reasons, but they are not excusable according to recognized standards used throughout the state," Supt. Doss said.

Memphis Drops Two Games To Quail Tuesday

The two Memphis teams dropped games to Quail cager squads Tuesday night in two games played at Quail.

The Memphis girls battled to an 8-8 tie the first quarter only to trail at halftime 17 to 11. Quail went on to win the game 28 to 15.

Judy Campbell scored 13 points for Quail and Janie Watson scored 10 points for Memphis.

In the boys game, the Quail lads jumped to an 18 to 5 first quarter lead and battled the hard charging Cyclone to a 72 to 69 final score.

The Cyclone trailed 13 points after the first and 7 at halftime.

Bruce Ward had 26 points to lead the scoring for Quail, Memphis' Clyde Wilson, Jerry Moss and Junior Graves each scored 12 points for the Cyclone.

Coach Milton Miller figured out individual season statistics for the boys squad at the conclusion of 15 games this season.

The leading scorer for the squad is Bobby Carroll with 146 points hitting 52 per cent of his shots. In a close second is Mike Pounds with 140 points and Clyde Wilson with 138 points.

The leading rebounder is Clyde Wilson with 183 rebounds. Jerry Moss has 148 rebounds and 107 points, while Bobby Carroll has 129 rebounds.

Tony Pounds is the teams leading free throw shooter with 25 out of 37 for a percentage score of 68 per cent. He has scored 107 (Continued on Page 12)

Holidays or no holidays, adverse weather conditions or not, Hall County farmers still were able to do some harvesting of the 1965 crop this week, and brought the season total to 42,082 bales.

This year's harvest figure was almost caught by last year's record of ginning the 1964 crop, which was 41,000 bales.

Given favorable harvest weather, Hall County farmers will do all they can to wind up this year's harvest as most of the cotton is ready for the machines.

There is still much cotton left in the fields to be harvested, especially in the Lakeview area, and many late estimates of the season's yield are going into the neighborhood of 55,000 to 60,000 bales. This will exceed the 1964 figure by about 5,000 bales.

Over the 12-county area served by the USDA Cotton Classing Office here, heavy rains in the southern portion has stopped all harvesting, it was reported by K. E. Voelkel, officer in charge.

"We will work tomorrow even though it is a legal holiday," he said, "and if the weather is pretty, we will work Saturday, too."

Voelkel explained that the office has classed about 124,000 samples including today's total, which is about 65 per cent of the season's expectations.

"I feel, with pretty weather tomorrow and Saturday, we will be getting real busy. It will be necessary to work Saturday to try and keep up."

The office will carry over about 6,000 samples tonight, he said.

He is also the father of Mrs. Richard Highfield. The Highfield family lived in Memphis for several years. Mr. Highfield was director of the Memphis High School Band while the family resided here.

Peace And Prosperity' Is Roger Babson's Forecast For 1966

"Peace and Prosperity" should be the dominant theme of 1966. President Johnson is ahead in attempts to end the inroads he made with his Great Program. However, since a Congressional election may find the going slow it was this past week for re-election which twice before because of the taxpay-

4. The struggle for power within Russia may come to a head in 1966. If the strongman is anti-west, he could try to put on a good show by heating up the "cold war"; but this should constitute no more than threatening gestures and bold talk.

10. The Vietnam situation and the Dominican Republic incident have convinced the Administration that the military might of our nation must be maintained at a "ready" basis. This means stepped-up defense spending, which should add another prong to the economy.

14. Business inventory accumulation, likewise a big factor in the boom, should also become a less vigorous expansionary force. Perhaps fears of inflationary price increases will encourage businessmen to maintain a healthy volume of inventories; but unless war threats intensify, I see no need to pile up much more in inventories.

18. The all-important employment situation should remain generally good. We may have seen the greatest portion of the rise in manufacturing employment. However, employment in government payroll at all levels, and in serv-

ices, should continue to score sizable gains.

22. The automobile business will not be left out in the spending spree. It will enjoy another prosperous year; but I foresee no significant upsurge beyond the high levels of the past two years.

25. I predict that the greater danger will lie in credit inflation, rather than in price inflation.

29. I look for an increase in domestic competition in 1966. This should become more evident as the business upthrust tapers off. Also, we must not forget foreign competition. With many nations feel-

32. Of greater concern to me is the steady climb in nonfarm real estate foreclosures; I expect a further rise in 1966.

35. Farm equipment manufacturers should enjoy good business in 1966. This goes also for fertilizer and pesticide producers.

38. Looking at the farm sector, I see no radical change from the excellent 1965 year. Barring a crop failure or severe drought, farm prices, at worst, should shade only slightly lower.

41. I foresee no crisis over Cuba in 1966. The agreement Castro has made to allow more Cuban refugees to enter the U. S. A. un-

On The Passing Of 1965!

The 75th Anniversary of Hall County is on the edge of passing into the history books as 1965 comes to a close at midnight tomorrow night. The year, for the most part, has met or even exceeded expectations for our citizens.

This year will be remembered as the year of the 75th anniversary celebration when, despite adverse weather conditions at times, our citizens put out the welcome mat and all had a fine time. The parade, the picnic, and all the events went off in fine style except the Fly-In Breakfast which had to be scrubbed because of poor weather conditions.

This year also brought some changes and plans for other changes, the largest being the remodeling of the entire Memphis Independent School District's buildings and the construction of a new high school building. In the business district of Memphis many changes took place this year, are taking place right now, with other improvements being planned in the future.

These changes, coupled with the almost certain promise of, and near completion of, a good cotton crop and improved cattle market, along with added payrolls in this area has boosted the county's financial outlook beyond earlier expectations. When the year-end financial report of the four county banks is published it is expected to be one of the highest in the history.

Our leaders and citizens are not to think that this trend will continue unaided during 1966, or even next month, without renewed efforts on everyone's part in working together toward a better tomorrow for our entire area.

Now is the time for our citizens to make New Year's resolutions for themselves which we feel are very appropriate to the season and if the resolutions are kept, will improve those making the resolutions. We would like to pass on to our readers a suggestion for a New Year's resolution which came from the Superintendent of our School District.

This week, Superintendent of Schools Shannon Doss made known a problem facing the local school district and suggested that the same problem faces districts all over this area and the entire state. The problem is unexcusable absenteeism brought about by parent neglect or selfishness.

Parents of school children should make this resolution and stick by it except on rare occasions: "I will have my children in their proper places in school unless they are physically unable to attend, for the only legitimate excuse for missing school is for illness, or death in the family."

In a statement this week Mr. Doss stated there was growing concern of the high rate of absenteeism in the Memphis Schools because during the past 6-weeks period 1,633 days of school were lost by students here, averaging 1.65 days each student.

If you haven't made New Year's resolutions it is time to do so and we would seriously urge our readers to stand by their good resolutions.

The Championship Season

This is the season of the year when football champions in all conferences are being recognized. All-District teams are being selected. Marching band contests are being held. It is an exciting time for the communities and schools in every section of the state. Teams are being honored and individual efforts are acknowledged.

American boys and girls today have more leisure time than ever before and much of it is devoted to extracurricular activities. If the administrators and sponsors were not providing these school activities, directed by strong and competent leaders and surrounded by reasonable and effective controls, the high school students would be looking in other directions for challenging experiences.

If these school events were eliminated at the stroke of the pen, then tomorrow or the next day outside organizations and various private groups would move into the area and take over the "public school captive audience." Before high school leagues throughout the nation were organized, that is exactly what happened in both high school and college ath-

letics. The same situation developed in music contests.

High school leagues of the nation are strong and well organized today. These are voluntary associations, organized and controlled by public school administrators. Courts have upheld the right of the leagues to make rules and to assess penalties against those members who fail to abide by the rules and regulations set up.

The Rule Of Law

"Can a disorderly society survive?" That question is asked in an article by former U. S. Supreme Court Justice Charles E. Whittaker which originally appeared in the Kansas City Star and has been reprinted by The Reader's Digest in condensed form. His answer: "In all recorded history, none ever has. On the contrary, history shows that the first evidence of each society's decay appeared in the toleration of disobedience of its laws."

Justice Whittaker relates this historical fact to the attitude of certain groups within this country which hold that they have the right to violate laws they consider bad. Of this, he says: "The great

pity here is that these minority groups are actually eroding and destroying the legal processes which alone can ever assure to them, or permanently maintain for them, due process and equal protection of the laws, and that can, thus, protect them from discrimination and abuses by majorities."

There can be no true freedom without the rule of law. Anyone has the right to protect any law and urge its repeal or change. But no one has the right to disobey laws which he simply doesn't like.

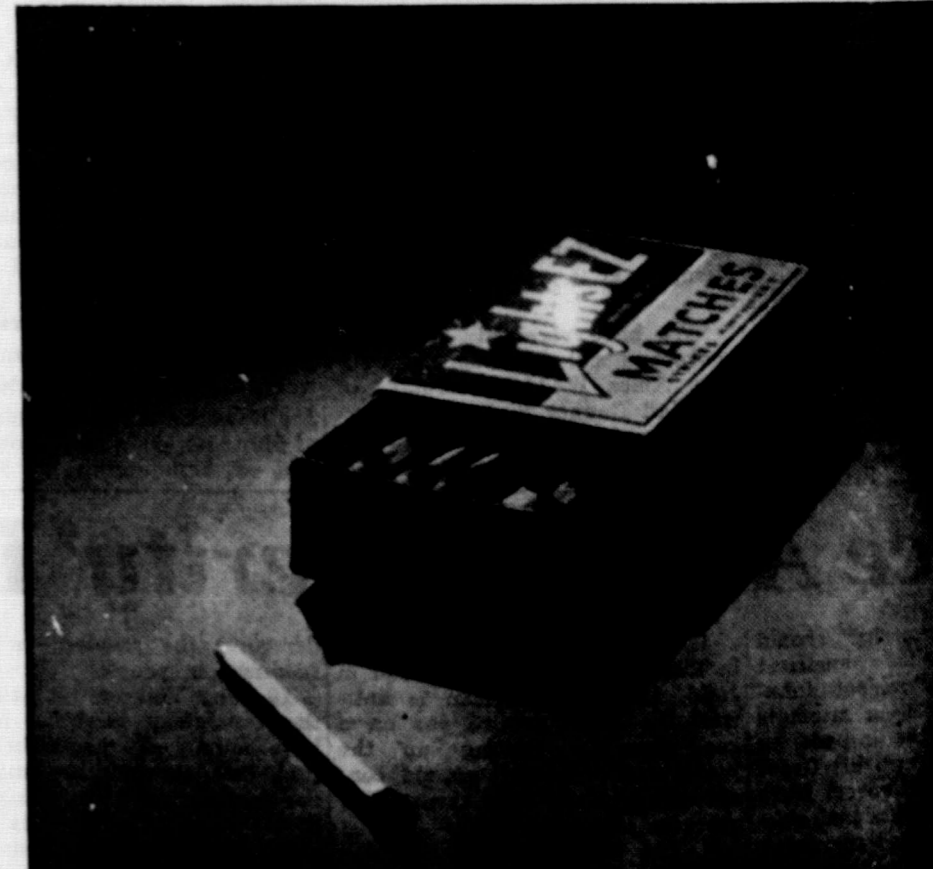

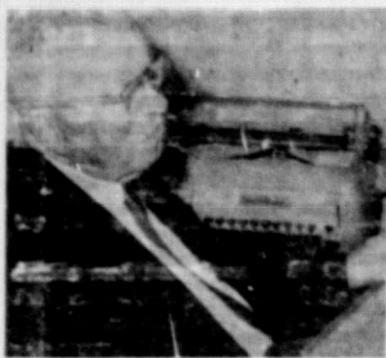

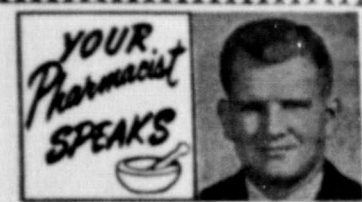
Claude's Comments

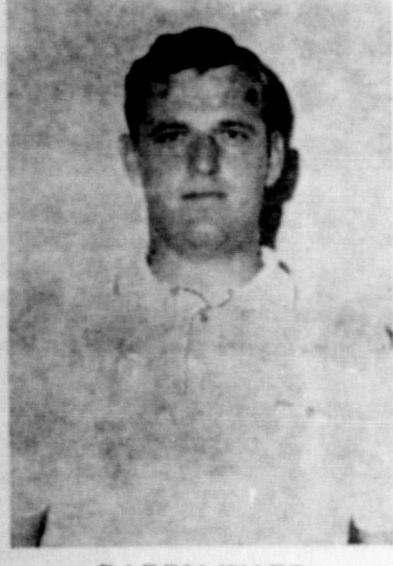

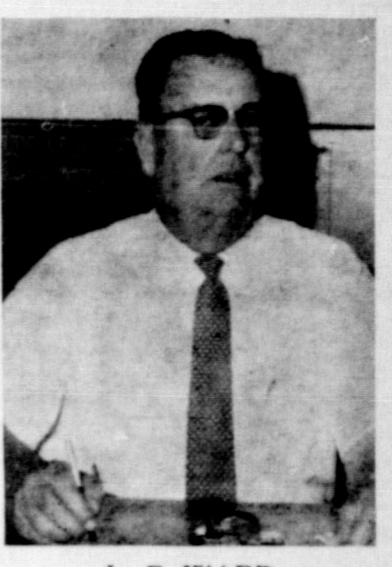

urban renewal and highways.

37. Private home and apartment building could show slight improvement, but the real boom in residential building will not register significantly in 1966.

38. Hence, I forecast that real estate conditions will remain selective. Well-located sites for homes and industrial and commercial complexes will do well, but study of local conditions is imperative.

39. I predict a further increase in farm land values in 1966. With costs still rising, the physical size of farms must expand so operators can benefit from mechanization. This places a premium on well-located land in the im-

47. If businessmen, consumers, and investors do not act voluntarily to keep inflationary pressures and speculation from getting out of hand, the monetary authorities may be forced to raise margin requirements on stock purchases, and perhaps tighten credit further.

48. Look for somewhat lower bond prices in 1966. Although we are not in immediate danger of credit exhaustion, the banking system is under some strain from the rapid expansion of credit in recent years. My advice is to buy bonds which mature in five years or less. The time to buy good longer-term bonds will come when the yields on short-term bonds exceed those on long-term issues.

49. The dollar will not be devalued in 1966. Possibility of devaluation of the British pound will undoubtedly come to the fore again, but additional effort will probably be made to keep the pound from "going under". I fear, however, that all this is only "buying time" that devaluation of the pound may be inevitable.

50. I foresee no cure for the outflow of gold from America's shores in 1966. However, in view of the importance of the U. S. in international trade and world military considerations, foreign bankers will be reluctant to withdraw their gold en masse. Bear in mind also that there is no country that can match our industrial and military might... and that, among the leading nations, the United States has suffered least in terms of the ravages of inflation and political instability.
