## City Council Lets Sewer Plant Contract; Housing Approved

### Salvation Army To Kick-off Drive

The Memphis City Council accepted the low bid of A. W. Boren, contractor, of Fort Worth, of \$82,438.00 for the construction of a sewage disposal plant for the city, subject to the approval of state and federal agencies, last week.

The resolution, passed by the City Council, accepted the low bid submitted by Mr. Boren provided that the state and federal agencies who administer Public Law 660 approve the awarding of the contract. Also, the resolution authorized Mayor H. J. Howell and City Secretary A. L. Gailey to execute a contract with the low bidder.

Early this week the City officials received notification that 60 units of low rent housing have been approved by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development to be constructed in Memphis. The units will probably be built on several different sites.

#### Contract Bidding

Seven bidders submitted sealed bids on the city's sewage disposal plant. Bidders from Fort Worth, Wichita Falls, Amarillo, Lubbock, Borger and Plainview participated in the action. There was a differential of \$16,587 between the low bid and the high bid, it was reported.

Residents will remember that on June 1, 1965, the City of Memphis called a \$70,000 sewer system improvement bond election, (Continued on Page 7)

These men and women serve voluntarily as sole administrators of the welfare assistance during the past year, such as food, medicines, clothing, transportation, etc., all the State Welfare Services are available to Hall County as needed.

These State Services include Homes and Hospitals for Unwed Mothers, Missing Persons Bureau, Emergency Disaster Relief, Summer Camp for Boys, Hall County sends 8 boys every June.

W. D. Young, county chairman, points out that 90 cents of each dollar contributed stays in the

state for some welfare service.

Shannon Doss will handle the School Solicitation in Memphis; JoEd Cupell will be in charge of the School Campaign in Estelline, Loran Denton at Turkey.

There will be a mail appeal in conjunction with the personal solicitation.

## Symes Found Guilty Of Lesser Offense

After two and a half hours of deliberation, an all-man Hall County petit jury in the 100th Judicial Court returned with a verdict of guilty of negligent homicide in the first degree against Jess Clyde Symes, Tuesday evening at 8:30 p. m.

After the jury returned to the jury box, District Judge Charles Reynolds asked the defendant, Symes if he wanted the jury to set the sentence or did he want the court to set the sentence.

After consultation with his lawyer, Memphis Attorney Jack B. Boone, Symes asked that the court set the sentence, and District Judge Reynolds announced that the sentence would be pronounced Wednesday morning. The jury was then dismissed.

Wednesday morning, Judge Reynolds handed down a maximum fine set by Texas Law for this offense of \$1,000 and announced the official sentencing

would be made on Monday, March 28.

Symes was being tried in the 100th District Judicial Court on a murder charge resulting from the December 23, 1965, shooting of Bob Jenks in the Symes' trailer house located on 1st Street in Memphis. Jenks died shortly thereafter in Hall County Hospital of a bullet wound in the left temple.

There were 15 witnesses called to testify in the trial which began Tuesday morning with the selection of the jury.

The hearing of the state's witnesses began at 1 p. m. Tuesday with the defense presenting its case about 3 p. m. The jury left the jury box at 6 p. m. to deliberate the verdict.

The jury's verdict of negligence and carelessness in handling the gun that shot and killed Bob Jenks. By this verdict the jury did not find any malice or intent to kill.

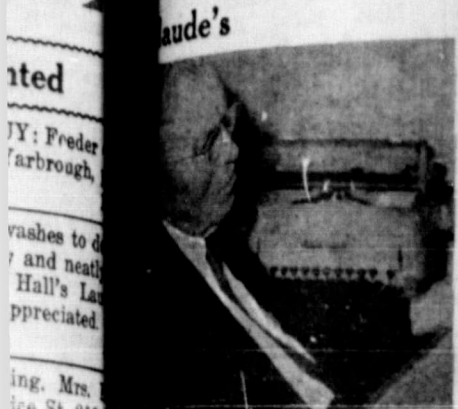

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## EDITORIAL Teachers Changing, Too

Last week, in observance of the Texas Public School Week, numerous parents and grandparents of students took time out to visit the classrooms of the students and many noticed that there have been some changes made at all levels, from kindergarten through the 12th grade.

A visitor to the schools nowadays doesn't have to be an expert to see that the little red schoolhouse is not what it used to be. Changes in all areas of education for the beginning reader to the senior year physics and higher mathematics courses have taken place.

Outside the school there is a new awareness that education today is the first work of our times.

Inside the schools there is much new equipment—teaching machines, highly sophisticated language laboratories, and in the near future such things as closed circuit television and advanced library aids.

In the midst of all this, in the eye of the hurricane of change, stands the Texas Teacher. And the teacher has changed too, quietly and without fanfare. The change has been for the good.

Long before the big changes in education began to be made about 10 years ago, teachers were working to better their profession abilities. That new equipment, revised curriculums—they are all pretty useless without a steady, professionally-prepared human hand to guide them.

So the Texas teacher has been changing, smoothly and almost unnoticed. How this has come about is certainly important.

In the first place the Texas teacher is no longer a nine-month employee. In the summer a great majority of them, paying their own way, go back to college, study for graduate degrees and learn how to teach the new curriculums.

Teachers new to the profession are better prepared today because older teachers, acting through profession associations, have continually urged higher teacher education standards.

One of the latest programs to be introduced in most of the school system in our area is the special reading courses which utilize optical projection machines and eye movement cameras determine reading habits of students. The courses are designed to develop better reading and comprehension skills. These special reading teachers will have to return to college again this summer to take special courses to become even more efficient as specialists.

We use this example because it brings up a major fact in the education of our children—reading is vitally important. School educators and administrators have known for many years that certain students are unskilled readers when compared to other students in the same age and classification, but until recently, there was little opportunity to do anything about the problem.

Today, students in the lower grades who are either having reading problems or vocabulary problems are being introduced to an exciting new field of presentation and class participation in visual reading. These classes, small in number, allow students to concentrate on reading, and actually participate in skill building activities.

One of the local teachers engaged in teaching special reading said that she has never seen children so interested in participating in reading classes as her students are. "They love to read out loud and take every opportunity to do so," she said.

In past years, many took the teacher for granted, but now we should realize that our teachers are as important to the wholesome atmosphere of our communities as the other professional people.

Our children and their education is of vital importance to our communities, because these children will grow to be our leading citizens and parents in a few short years.

### An Honor And A Privilege

It seems to us that some of our American citizens need a refresher course about service in the United States military service. Far too often we hear citizens protest against demonstrators, pop offs and scurvy characters by saying, "they ought to be thrown into the military service!"

We've heard this faulty statement several times here lately in reference to Cassius Clay, world's heavyweight boxing champion. This has followed Clay's recent unpatriotic spouting of when he learned he was to be drafted into military service.

We don't think Clay should be drafted. In fact, his venomous remarks about his native land should disqualify him from ever serving in any capacity for his country. We don't allow those who had prison records the privilege of serving in the armed services, yet in spite of their crime and time in prison, they're still loyal Americans. Clay isn't and shouldn't have any of the privileges our country offers.

Wearing an American uniform is an honor and a privilege. It is the same symbol of our nation that George Washington and all of our other illustrious predecessors wore. That uniform embodies the heritage and the tradition of our great nation. Men from the very birth of this nation have worn it gallantly, courageously and with pride.

Why, then, for goodness sakes, do some of our citizens look upon it as a sort of prison uniform... something to be worn as penance? Where do we get such screwball ideas? We're rapidly becoming the most mixed up and confused people in all the world.

We adults need to get our thinking straight about military service and stop this unneeded for practice of looking on it as a prison sentence. With some of our present day stupid attitudes about military service, we marvel at how our troops in Viet Nam maintain the spirit they do.

Mr. Cassius Clay has forfeited his rights to wear an American uniform. He shouldn't under any circumstances be permitted to wear one. Neither should the draft card burning beatniks and other demonstrators who have defiled our country. To permit them to do so desecrates all the valiant men of the past who have fought and died in that uniform.

Service in the uniform of one's country is an honor and privilege. Mr. Clay and others of his ilk have forfeited all rights to such

### Is Inflation Here?

The U. S. News and World Report had an article last week about inflation, entitled "How Real Is Inflation in the U. S.?"

The article has a full page chart which tells the story about inflation, and it isn't good reading.

This magazine and its charts and its statistical evidence point out what most of us have known for some time now—prices are going up in just about everything. If the 1955 dollar was worth 100 cents, the present food dollar is worth just 85 cents. The rent dollar has lost 13 cents; the home dollar 20 cents; the college-cost dollar 24 cents; the auto repair dollar 20 cents, and on down

the list of things we buy. Maybe prices have gone up 15 to 20 per cent during the past 10 years. Has your income gone up 20 per cent since then? If so, you are holding your own. If it hasn't, you have taken a cut in salary.

A lot of this inflation, the decrease in buying power of the dollar, has been creeping along at a slow rate. It wasn't until 1965, when our federal government started shoveling out the money on a variety of spending programs, coupled with a sharp increase in defense spending that inflation really caught hold.

Now that inflation is here, it is real, and it is worrying people, the administration is thinking about ways to halt it. Raising your income taxes is the quickest way, and that will likely be done soon. Other taxes are to be boosted, the interest rate raised, and other actions taken.

However, there has been no consideration given to cutting domestic spending. This is a sort of sacred cow that can't be touched. And without this sort of reduction, we will continue to have inflation. Better buy real estate or common stocks that rise with inflation. The dollar is certain to be worth less 10 years from now. — Ochiltree County Herald.





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## Texas Water Development Board Lists Loans Of \$40 Million To Texas Cities

AUSTIN — The Texas Water Development Board has loaned \$39,859,000 to Texas cities and towns to increase their water supplies and has committed an additional \$6,939,000 for construction of water supply projects, Howard Boswell, manager of the Board's Water Development Fund, reported to the Water Development Board at its February meeting.

Boswell, reviewing the water development fund since the first loan was made to the Lower Nueces River Water Supply District in October 1959, said 39 Texas cities and towns have met or will be able to meet their needs for additional municipal and industrial water supplies with the help of the fund.

In addition, he said, the Texas Water Development Board has provided financial assistance for the construction of Toledo Bend Dam on the Sabine River—a project of the Sabine River Authority, the State of Texas and the State of Louisiana—and has committed funds to the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Association project on the Salt Fork of the Red River near Clarendon and to the enlargement project of Lake Palestine on the Neches River.

Boswell pointed out that the Toledo Bend project is the largest in the Southwest that is being

constructed without federal participation or interest. Total cost of the project will be about \$60,000,000.

The Texas Water Development Board has invested \$12,168,575 in the Toledo Bend project. An additional commitment of \$2,831,425 will bring the total participation by the State to \$15,000,000. The State of Texas will own about 25 per cent of the water to be impounded, or approximately 1,100,000 acre-feet. The Board has committed itself to buy 227,240 acre-feet of conservation storage in the Greenbelt and Lake Palestine projects, bringing the State's investment in the Toledo Bend, Greenbelt and Lake Palestine projects to \$21,240,000.

During 1965, Boswell reported, the Water Development Fund closed loans amounting to \$10,811,000 to the San Jacinto River Authority (\$2,000,000); town of Rowlett (\$146,000); city of Alvarado (\$115,000); city of Corsicana (\$2,750,000); Wise County Water Supply District, \$1,000,000; an the Upper Neches River Municipal Water Association (Tyler) (\$4,800,000).

Loans made by the Texas Water Development Board have been used or will be used to construct dams and reservoirs having a total water conservation storage capacity of 1,231,000 acre-feet, 294 miles of pipelines, and 13 filtration or water treatment plants.

Funds used by the Board to provide financial assistance to municipalities, water districts and river authorities do not come from State appropriations, Boswell said, but are obtained from the sale of Texas Water Development bonds. Loans are made at 1/2 of 1 percent above the average interest cost of all bonds sold by the Board.

The Texas Water Development Board has the authority to sell up to \$200,000,000 in bonds. So far, \$70,000,000 has been sold.

Boswell said the Water Development Bonds have an AAA rating—the highest that can be given.

He said the loan program is self-supporting, with State appropriations required only for operating expenses of the Board and its staff. It is expected, he said, that in the future the storage purchase program will require some State appropriations for payment of principal and interest on water development fund bonds until the State sells its conservation storage facilities.

The Legislature last year, recognizing the water problems facing the State, overwhelmingly approved a constitutional amendment which will provide an additional \$200,000,000 in Water Development Bonds. The amendment will be voted upon in the general election in November.

## Geldon's Social Security Advice

Q—Do you have to be married to claim the child care deduction?

A—No. Women who are single, married, widowed, divorced, or deserted; as well as men who are widowed, divorced, legally separated, or those who wives are incapacitated or institutionalized may use this provision of the tax law.

If you claim this deduction, use Form 2441 to compute the amount of your deduction.

Q—Is there any deduction at all for the college tuition I pay for my son?

A—Present tax law does not allow a deduction for this purpose. However, if you borrow money to pay the tuition you may deduct the interest charges.

Q—Are legal fees in an adoption case deductible? My husband and I had a little girl placed with us last year.

A—These legal fees are con-

Besides the penalty you have to pay for not having a number on your tax return, refund check can be issued out this identification.

Q—I'm 65 but my wife is 60. Does that mean all my medical expenses are deductible while she is subject to a 3 percent limitation?

A—When one member couple is 65 then all of their qualifying medical expenses are fully deductible. This means your wife's medical expenses fully deductible just as yours.

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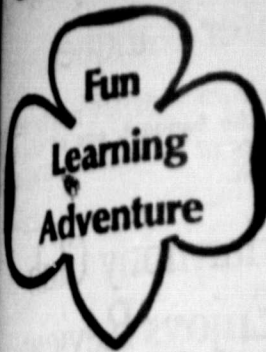

**Medicare Blanks Now Available At Local Post Office**

Postmaster C. E. (Gene) Lindsey announced this week that application blanks for supplemental Medicare benefits are available at the window of the Memphis Post Office.

The application blanks are being made available as the Social Security Administration seeks to contact 3.1 million senior citizens before a March 31 deadline imposed by the Medicare law.

President Johnson has proclaimed March as "National Medicare Enrollment Month." He urged all federal agencies and all citizens to cooperate in enrolling senior citizens in the program.

Initially, some two and one-half million application blanks were distributed to nearly 34,000 main post offices throughout the 50 states. Additional forms are available as needed.

Through direct mailings and other means, the Social Security Administration has had contact with 16 of the 19.1 million citizens who will be 65 or over on July 1. Of the 16 million who replied, less than one million said they did not want to sign up for the supplemental program.

The supplemental program costs \$3 a month and provides doctor bills and other benefits. Everyone 65 and over is eligible for the basic hospital benefits under Medicare.

A copy of the application blank is displayed on the lobby bulletin board of the Memphis Post Office, Postmaster Lindsey said.

Senior citizens who reached 65 before 1966 face a two year delay if they do not sign up by March 31. The application forms are pre-addressed to the Social Security Administration in Baltimore, Md.

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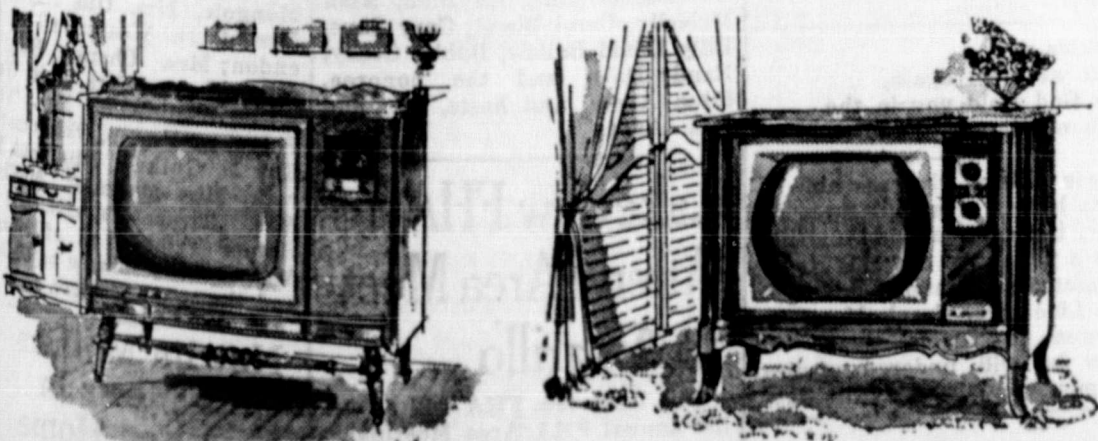

which carried by a large majority. The \$70,000 is 70 per cent of the cost of the proposed plant while the federal government, acting through the State Health Department, will provide the remaining 30 per cent of the cost.

The city has purchased from the Broome Estate slightly over 10 acres of land, adjoining the city's five acres where the present sewer plant is located on which to construct the new sewage plant facilities. This land cost the city \$2,796.00.

The city's system, now being used, was built in the early 1900's and for several years, inspectors of the State Health Department have informed officials that the plant is obsolete and unsanitary.

The proposed new plant has been designed to meet criteria of a population of 5,000 people at a sewage flow of 70 GPCPD and DOD Load of 0.17 pounds per capita per day.

Major features of the proposed plant are an Imhoff Tank, a high rate filter, sludge beds and stabilization ponds.

#### Housing Project

The notification from the federal agency on housing and urban renewal stating that Memphis has been approved for 60 units of low rent housing came in the form of a letter addressed to Dick Fow-

ler, chairman of the City Council's Housing Committee.

Last January, the city received notification that the federal agency had approved the city's workable program for community improvements, making the city eligible for low rent housing.

A crew came to Memphis shortly after this approval was received and surveyed the town and determined that 60 units of low rent housing were needed here.

The city has employed the services of Pierce, Norris and Pace, and Associates of Midland, to do architect and engineering work on the planning of the low rent project.

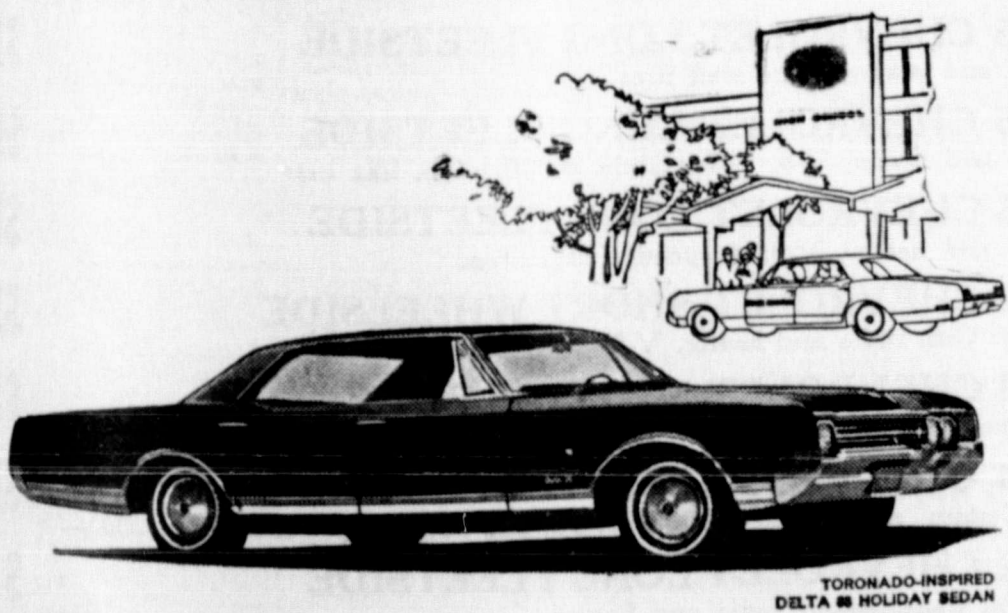

## GARDEN TIPS

By Mrs. G. D. Stephens

**Peony**  
They should be treated for fungus and fed. If you want to have nice blooms, keep all soil off the little red shoots, being careful with the tender sprouts. Betyrtis fungus disease which affects beraceous and tree peonies should be controlled by spraying plants and soil around the base in early spring with Bordeaux mixture or Termate. Spray once when the peony is leafing out and again in two or three weeks. Food for the medium plants is 1-2 cup of bone meal around the plant, mixing with soil.

**Chrysanthemums**  
Looking at Mr. Hudspeeth's calendar for growing mums, we note his recommendation that in March all beds be prepared. On this area is spread a two-inch layer of manure or peat moss plus commercial fertilizer (any available brand) at the rate specified on bag (not to exceed 3 or 4 pounds per 100 sq. ft. for 5-10-5 or 5-10-4 analysis, or half that amount for 10-4-6 or 10-5-5). Spade this deeply. Re-spade in April or May just before setting out plants. More to come each month.

All commercial fertilizers carry the analysis printed on the bag in 5-10-5, the first 5 indicates 5 parts of nitrogen, the 10 indicates 10 parts of phosphorus, and the last 5 indicates 5 parts of potash, as well as all other analysis.

desegregation plans, including those with geographical school attendance zones, must file by April 15 a form agreeing to observe the new guidelines. Office of Education will review spring reports and schools judged to have shown no reasonable progress will be ordered to take further steps before fall.

School systems also must eliminate segregation in such programs as transportation, athletics and extra-curricular activities. Where faculty members are displaced as a result of desegregation, staff vacancies later occurring must be filled by these ousted teachers if they qualify.

In other action the State Board of Education directed local school districts to raise their contributions to the foundation school program by \$6,100,000 next year. Local fund assignment for 1966-67 is \$138,000,000 compared with \$132,500,000 for 1965-66. Total cost of minimum foundation education program for the state this year is estimated officially at \$649,326,890. Legislature set local school contributions for 1966-67 and thereafter at 20 per cent of the total cost of the preceding year's program. State puts up the other 80 per cent.

Board also approved investment of about \$700,000 from the State Permanent School Fund. Some \$3,000,000 will be placed in common stocks, another \$3,000,000 in corporate bonds and an estimated \$1,000,000 in short-term Treasury bills.

Investment money will come from maturing Treasury bills, bonds and the regular monthly deposit from school land, oil and gas leases, says Paul Mathews, chairman of the investment committee.

**APPOINTMENTS**—Gov. John Connally named John L. Hill as Secretary of State. He replaces Crawford C. Martin of Hillsboro who resigned last week to devote full time to his campaign for attorney general.

Hill is an outstanding Houston civil trial attorney. He has tried cases in district courts in most areas of Texas during the past 19 years. His term will run until next January.

Connally named L. D. (Red) Webster and reappointed Al Badger, both of Dallas, to the Texas Commission on Alcoholism. Also reappointed were Robert

B. Gilmore of Dallas and W. E. (Buck) Tinsley of Austin to the Water Development Board.

House Speaker Ben Barnes appointed Reps. Gene Fondren of Taylor, George Cowden of Waco, Ralph W. Scoggins of El Paso, Rayford Price of Frankston and Lee Duggan Jr. of Houston to serve on a key election law study committee.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith earlier had named Sens. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, Don Kennard of Fort Worth, Ralph M. Hall of Rockwall, Jack Hightower of Vernon and Abraham Kazen of Laredo to that panel.

**AG RULINGS** — Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has ruled that a domestic corporation can't pay dividends out of its earned surplus to anyone not a stockholder; and that a life insurance corporation may pay dividends to policyholders from surplus funds—from profits made by the company.

In other action, the attorney general ruled that: Under present state law, a Commissioner's Court or qualified voters of a county may not create a precinct or multi-precinct Airport District and transfer a county-owned airport to such a district.

Ward County school trustees should be elected April 2 from commissioners precincts as they now exist rather than as they will be formed under the boundary change effective next January 1.

Texas courts may enforce child support order of out of state courts but extradition should be carried out only after bonafide civil attempts have been made to collect payments.

Public school-sponsored clubs which perpetuate their membership for the basis of decisions of their own members, rather than free choice of any qualified pupil, are prohibited.

Jury fees must be paid before a jury is allowed in juvenile cases.

**BONDS SOLD**—Texas Water Development Board has sold \$15,000,000 worth of development bonds to the First National City Bank of New York City and associates, the low bidders.

Effective interest rate was 3.5 per cent of the 25-year issue. First National City Bank was one of five bidders for the bonds. This brings to \$55,000,000 the amount sold by the Board from an authorized total of \$200,000,000. Another \$200,000,000 authorization in water development bonds will be voted upon by Texans in November.

Bond money has been used to finance reservoir projects by the purchase of water storage space,

and in the purchase of outstanding development bonds of Texas cities and water districts.

**VERNON CENTER LAUDED** — A model demonstration center for aged, to be located at Vernon, "will be the finest of its kind in the nation," says Governor Connally.

According to the governor, the will provide cottage-type units for all phases of geriatric care. It will provide cottage-type units for ambulatory patients and a pre-admission unit to screen elderly persons considered for admission.

Center will place patients in community rest homes, nursing homes and convalescent centers in which they would receive proper care.

**SADLER SPEAKS** — Texas Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler, in testimony before a congressional committee in Washington, urged the creation of Guadalupe Mountain National Park in Culberson and Hudspeth Counties.

However, he stated that while he is interested in the creation of the 71,650-acre park, he also is interested in the 45,171 acres of oil and gas rights which the state school funds owns in the proposed park.

According to Sadler, the mineral rights should be retained by the state for the benefit of the 3,000,000 school children aided by the Public Free School Fund,

One bull, two cows, and 32 calves went to market the 10th of September and the heifers and steers topped the market. The bull brought 16.60 which topped

the market price for bulls sold that day.

## Penney's To Get Special Cards At Headquarters

During March 2-19, about five million "anniversary cards" will be sent to J. C. Penney Company headquarters in New York—and every one will arrive punched with holes, Wray Studstill, manager of the Penney store in Memphis, announced this week.

While not greetings in the usual sense, the 2 by 1 inch perforated cards are important, Studstill said. Each will represent a sale and, hopefully, a satisfied, well-served customer during Penney's 64th anniversary observance.

The tiny cards will be sent to Company headquarters from Penney stores around the nation, including the one here. They form the basis of the firm's semi-automatic stock control system for selected lines of staple, year-round merchandise such as underwear, hosiery, men's shirts, lingerie and work clothing.

Customers see the cards on the stores attached to articles of merchandise. Each card contains such information as lot number, color, size and store number. When an item is sold, the card is removed by the store manager or sales associate and mailed to Penney's data processing center at its New York headquarters, Studstill said.

At this point, computers take over, "reading" the pin hole code in the cards and reordering stock for the stores. At the same time, the computers will compile sales statistics and other data.

Manager Studstill said, "Sixty-four years ago, at our first store in Kemmerer, Wyo., Mr. Penney was able to keep a whole year's figures and stock inventory in one small ledger. He used a code, too, but it was written in ink.

"Sales for the first year were nearly \$29,000. Now the company does that much volume in a matter of minutes. If we kept records the old way, each year we'd use thousands of ledgers like Mr. Penney's."

More than 40 per cent of the company's 2.2 billion dollar sales are processed by the modern computer system.

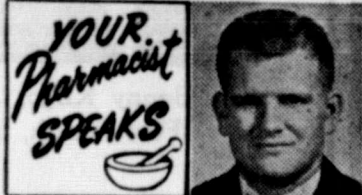

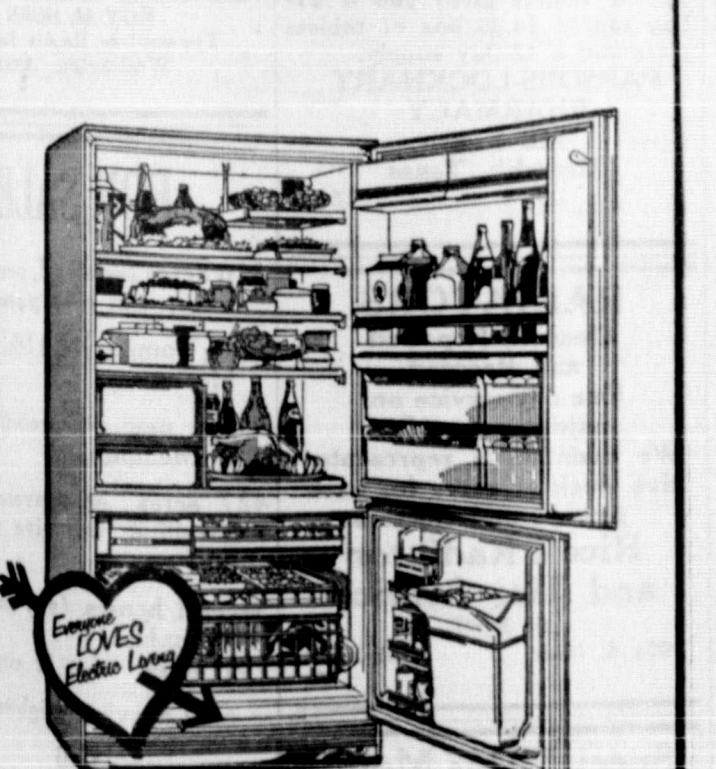

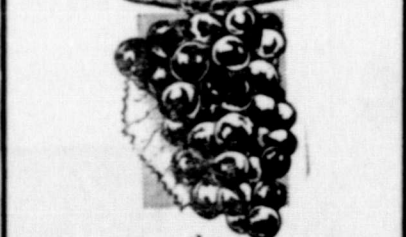
