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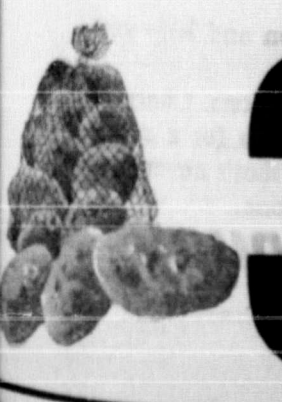
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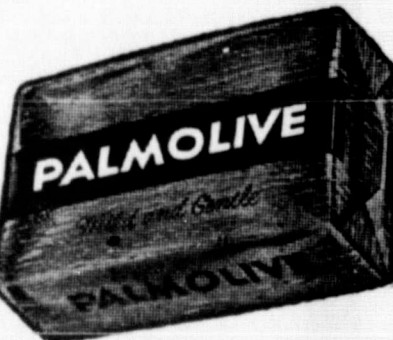
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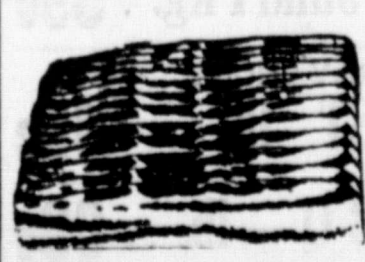
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# Report From Washington

### Let's Promote "Buy American"

A Washington supermarket has gone "exotic"—that is, its shelves are devoted almost exclusively to international delicacies, to foods from fifty countries "at supermarket prices." On hand for last years opening, in addition to diplomats, was what the supermarket management is calling a "gourmetician," and employee whose duty is to advise housewives on the selection available. Among the items carried in the store, according to news reports, are Syrian bread, baby abalone from Japan, stuffed grape leaves from Greece, Hungarian fruit pockets, chukkar patridge, and steaks of venison, wild boar and buffalo.

The American diet, as we all know, demands variety and the level of affluence in our country is generally such that a wide market exists for so-called "luxury foods." But I continue to think that the problems of our farmers and ranchers are not being helped by efforts to glamorize food-stuffs imported from abroad—to create in the American people a sense that fashion decrees tables laden with foreign-produced edibles.

The pages of our women's magazines are filled with recipes showing the best ways to prepare dishes and dinners representative of foreign lands. At the same time, it is difficult to find in these magazines simple instructions on how to prepare an attractive and tasty roast of home-grown American beef.

The challenge of foreign goods in the American marketplace is not one that can be met entirely by Government controls, through higher import duties and restrictions on the level of imports. The complex competitive forces of our free enterprise system are much more decisive influences in our supply-and-demand economy, and those who wish to retain their

markets at home as well as develop new ones abroad must look to their own efforts as well as the Government's in seeking broader opportunities. American automobile manufacturers, by producing so-called "compact" cars, checked the inroads made in their markets by foreign imports. They have continued to prosper. By producing more attractive products, by stressing the features of their own models, by skillful salesmanship, our automakers held imports to a small percentage of the U. S. market. The same challenge faced and met successfully by the auto industry faces other segments of our economy—and our farmers and ranchers, through their national organizations and trade associations, are stepping up their efforts to promote increased consumption of American food and fiber.

They are now being faced with the additional challenge of countering the "fashion" appeal of foreign products, by driving home the point that there is really nothing more stylish on American tables than good, hearty American food.

There must always be a place, but a proper one, for imports in the U. S. economy. After all, it is necessary for us to import in order to export. The United States is exporting a record quantity of agricultural commodities and the future looks bright. As we push for high export levels, let us also seek to develop outlets for American products here in the United States.

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## Quivira Girl Scout Camp To Hold Two Sessions

learn new skills or become more proficient in those already acquired. They may become more adept through practice in the arts of campcraft, knotcraft, and lashing; firebuilding and cooking; campfires and ceremonies; safety, on land and in water; conservation; singdowns, folkgames and new songs; archery and riflery (progressing to .22's); compass and wide games; and hiking and trail blazing. Many of these activities help fulfill requirements for badges.

In Girl Scouting, camping is the Girl Scout program in the out-of-doors and is designed to promote the physical, mental, and spiritual well-being of every girl and leader. Camping helps develop resourcefulness, initiative, self-reliance, and the recognition of individual worth. Girls receive actual practice in democratic living through participation in camp government. They develop a sense of responsibility, qualities of leadership, and a deepened awareness of others and of the world of nature.

Established-Troop Camp is in a permanent campsite with staff and facilities provided by the Council. It is supervised by qualified, experienced, employed personnel. All leaders and staff must meet high personal qualifications and have an understanding of the needs and interests of girls.

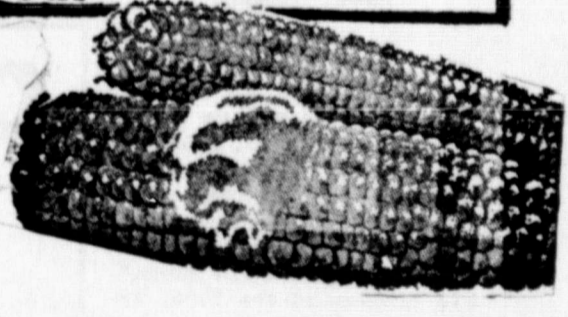
