## Jack Norman, Manager WTU Co., Dies Unexpectedly

Jack M. Norman, 49, well- Light Rains, More known Memphis resident and manager of West Texas Utilities Company, died unexpectedly in Abilene about 10:45 Friday shortly after being stricken with a heart attack.

Mr. Norman had gone to Abilene on Thursday to attend a West Texas Utilities Golf tournament. He had played only a short time when the attack occured.

Born August 7, 1916 in Paducah, Norman moved to Memphis with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. James H. Norman in 1923.

He attended the Memphis Public schools and was graduated from Memphis High School in 1935. He worked in his father's store and operated the store with his brother until 1939 when he was employed in Memphis as a salesman for WTU Co. The following year, he was transferred to Cisco and woked there until he entered the Armed Forces for service during World War II.

The Flag should be displayed daily, weather permitting, on or near the main administration building of every public institu-

The Flag should be display in or near every polling place on election days.

The Flag should be displayed during school days in or near every schoolhouse.

The Flag, when carried in a procession with another flag or flags, should be either on the marching right; that is the Flag's own right, or, if there is a line of other flags, in front of the center of that line.

The flag should not be draped over the hood, top, sides, or back of a vehicle or of a railroad train or a boat. When the Flag is displayed on a motorcar, the staff should be fixed firmly to the chas-

sis or clamped to the radiator cap. No other flag or pennant should be placed above or, if on the same level, to the right of the Flag of the United States of America, except during church services conducted by naval chaplains at sea, when the church pennant may be flown above the Flag during church services for the personnel of the Navy.

The Flag of the United States of America, when it is displayed with another flag against a wall from crossed staffs, should be on the right, the Flag's own right, and its staff should be in front of the staff of the other

The Flag of the United States of America should be at the center and at the highest point of the group when a number of flags of States or localities or pennants of societies are grouped and displayed from staffs.

When flags of states, cities, or localities, or pennants of societties are flown on the same halyard with the Flag of the United States, the latter should always

should occupy the position of honor and be placed at the clergyman's or speakers right as he faces the congregation or audience. Any other flag so displayed in the chancel or on the platform should be placed at the clergyman's or speaker's left as he faces the congreation or audience. But when the Flag is displayed from a staff in a church or public auditorium elsewhere than in the chancel or on the platform, it shall be placed in the position of honor at the right of the congregation or advience as they face the chancel or platform.
