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

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
### EDITORIAL Local Governments Being Studied!

The Committee for Economic Development (CED) recently released the recommendations of its committee of research and policy which has been studying local governments in this nation. The report calls for the need of revolutionary readjustment of the nation's 80,000 units of local government, designed to serve local interests more effectively and to balance central power in the federal system.

The statement entitled "Modernizing Local Government" advocates a nine-point reform program aimed at strengthening local units of government in this democracy of ours.

The nine points made by the committee are: (1) Reduce the 80,000 local governments to no more than 16,000; (2) Curtail the overlapping layers of local government now found in most states; (3) Confine popular election to members of the policy making bodies of government, severely reducing the 500,000 locally elected paid or unpaid officials; (4) Put a single chief executive (either elective or appointive) in charge of all administrative agencies and halt the election of department heads; (5) Replace the "partisan spoils' system" found in most counties and many other local units with personnel practices based on merit and profession competence; (6) Increase reliance on modernized county governments (except New England) to solve the problems of rural, urban, and most metropolitan communities; (7) Give local governments, when modernized, broad legal powers to plan, finance, and execute programs suited to the needs, interests, and desires of their citizens; (8) Revamp the 50 State constitutions to provide for boundary revisions, extensions of legal authority, and elimination of needless government units; (9) Revise the terms and conditions of federal and state grants-in-aid to encourage modernization of local governments.

The question arises, do we need to revamp our local governments? To answer this, one would only have to answer a similiar question, covering a more specific area: do our local governments have the power to solve their own problems, or are local governments always turning to state or national governments to solve these problems? The CED statement says, "The nation's court houses and city halls have often seemed to lack the vision and dedication-as well as the financial resources-to diagnose conditions, devise solutions, and make ple see the situation as it is?" vigorous response. 

The costs of local governments also are rising steeply. Direct expenditures for all municipalities, counties, New England towns, townships, and special district rose from \$20.1 billion in 1952 to \$45.1 billion in 1962, or 124 per cent. According to the CED statement, they are likely to double again by 1972.

Federal leadership in dealing with national problems at local levels has been beneficial in many fields, the statement says. But it is time for the citizens of the 50 states "to take made sense to sound off one's If business is good, it is no stock of their systems of local government in relation to urgent present and prospective needs. This involves more than an assessment of current performance. It also demands a judgment of future capabilities in planning and executing activities essential to healthy community development. As we approach the twenty-first century, weaknesses in eighteenth and nineteenth century forms must be corrected-or new systems createdif local government is to survive as a vital force.

America where 30 per cent of the population occupy 90 per cent of the land, and support four-fifths of all local governments. The statement stresses that the 2,700 counties outside metropolitan areas should be consolidated into no more than 500 strong and effective units. The criteria used should be minimum population, accessibility to the county seat, trading and communication patterns, revenue base, and geography.

Rural townships with small population should be abolished and their function assumed by newly consolidated county governments. Most, if not all, of the 11,000 non-metropolitan villages, with fewer than 2,500 population, should disincorporate and permit a strong county government to carry on their functions. Self-governing special districts in rural areas should also be abolished and their functions should be assumed by counties.

independent rural school districts are too small to meet the needs of the citizens, the statement says. They should be consolidated until every unified school district in the country has at least 1,500 students. The boundaries of the new consolidated districts should be coterminous with the boundaries of the restructured counties which the state calls for. These counties should then be empowered to manage the local school systems on the basis of local option.

The statement is critical of the methods generally used to finance local governments, which derive from 70 to 75 per cent of their revenues from local sources, chiefly from the property tax. Major complaints are lodged against unequal assessment and unre-assessment of personal and real property taxes, whether urban or rural.

The CED report stated that outmoded forms of local government should be abolished, realignment of boundary lines should be mandated, the state legislatures should have constitutional authority to grant home rule powers to reconstitued units.

Whether or not the CED report will have effect upon local government units or bring about changes is yet to be seen. However, if local government is to remain a vital force in our nation, changes will have to come about in one way or another.

PICTURES - Show the type construction of the building as well as many other items of information that industry would be interested in.

VIP (Very Important Part) — Have firm commitments in writing on all industrial sites and buildings as to sale price and/or lease price, cost of extending utilities or roads and basic construction

Crop residue management leaves part of the crop residue on the surface of the soil to keep the temperature down and aid in the control of erosion. Under average conditions it takes about 2000 pounds of crop residue per acre to maintain soil condition. It takes upward of 2500 pounds per acre to improve soil condition.

When the temperatures are approaching the century mark as they are now, it is a good time to consider what heat can do to the soil and make plans to improve the soil through crop residue management, Keith concluded.

# **Cotton Insect Report In Hall County Released**

Early season insect populations are decreasing throughout Hall County, even though boll weevils and bollworms are building up Early cotton in Hall County is blooming and many beneficial insects are reported.

No infestation of thrips were reported. Thrips do little damage to cotton after it reaches the six leaf stage.

Fleahopper infestations continue to be light in Hall County. Cotton producers should continue to check their fields for fleahoppers. In young cotton, 15 to 20 fleahoppers per 100 terminals is considered to be an economically important infestation. As plants increase in size and fruit load. larger populations may be tolerated without serious damage. A few fleahoppers were reported on H A. Hodges farm two miles west of Plaska.


