Amarillo District Attorney Dee Miller Top Choice of Panhandle Democrats

County Democratic Executive Committee chairman, in a convention held in Amarillo last night, voted to name Dee Miller, district attorney of the 47th District, to represent the district in the 1966 congressional election.

and has two children. He is a native of Borger and the youngest, by about a minute, of seven children. He has a twin brother, Oth Orick Miller, who practices law in Amarillo.

Dee Miller received his law degree at Southern Methodist University, and first became a member of the district attorney's staff in Amarillo as an assistant to Wayne Bagley in February, 1960. He remained on the staff when Bagley was elected, later to be appointed the DA's job by Governor John Connally in July, 1963, when Bagley resigned the position. Miller is serving his first elected term.

It was reported that Miller began planning immediately after the meeting for a campaign of less than 90 days.

C. C. Directors Hear Important Reports

The directors of the Memphis Chamber of Commerce heard several interesting reports Monday at their regular monthly meeting. President Byron Baldwin announced that Thursday, Feb. 16, 1967, will be the date for the annual banquet and the speaker will be Speaker of the Texas House, Ben Barnes.

Chamber Manager Clifford Farmer reported to the directors on a meeting with the Texas Highway Commission in Austin on the Palo Duro Road at a hearing set up for this purpose.

Attending the hearing from this

area last Thursday were County Judge E. (Gip) McMurry, Mayor H. J. Howell, County Judge J. G. Johnson of Claude and Chamber Manager Farmer. The group carried a letter written by County Judge Moreland of Silverton endorsing the project.

Mayor Howell received a letter this week from D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, in which it was stated: "Careful consideration has been given by the Highway Commission to the presentation of your delegation on Aug. 4, requesting a Scenic Road from State Highway 256 northwesterly to a connection with Park Road 5 in Palo Duro State Park."

"The Highway Commission directed that just as soon as the Federal Scenic Highway Report is available to us a copy of same be transmitted to you for your information. In the meantime it will be our purpose to continue our studies on this matter in order that we may be prepared to complete our report in line with that which might be recommended in the Federal Scenic Highway document."

School Nurse Urges Students To Have Check-up

"We would like to recommend that each student have a complete physical examination before school starts," Helen Neel, school nurse, announced this week. This not only means the students should go to their medical doctor, but also to the Riding Hall where optometrists to have their eyes checked, she explained.

The Tuberculin test is required of all first and seventh graders and will be given to the classes after school starts. The parents will be contacted before the tests, Mrs. Neel stated.

Each first grade student must have a smallpox vaccination before entering school. The local physician should be contacted for this.

"If the vaccination can't be given by the doctor for any reason, contact the local health office any Tuesday between 10 a. m. and 12 noon or at 7:30 p. m., she concluded.

Officials of the First National Bank in Memphis let the contract to Beverly and Associates of Amarillo, Wednesday afternoon, for the construction of a new home for the bank.

There were eight general contractors and numerous sub-contractor bids opened Wednesday. The Amarillo firm submitted the low bid and was awarded the contract.

President Jack I. Davis announced that construction is expected to begin on the 8,700-square-foot building on the north side of the square within the next three weeks. The contract calls for completion of the building within 180 days.

"The bank is planning to set the date and time for ground breaking ceremonies within the next few days or as soon as the exact date for construction to begin is known," President Davis said.

The new bank building will have an exterior constructed of pre-cast exposed aggregate panels, pre-cast stone columns, and porcelain fascia with silk screening. The interior will be of terrazzo and carpet on floors, and wood paneling and vinyl fabric walls.

Architectural work on the new building is being done by Gary and Homertz, Architects of Big Spring.

The contract letting was held at 2 p. m. yesterday in the Community Center of the Municipal Building in Memphis, after sealed bids had been opened and considered.

Mrs. H. A. (Major) McCanne, 84, a resident of Memphis 64 years, passed away Monday afternoon, August 8, in a Wichita Falls Hospital.

The State Of The Union—Of Major Concern!

"How Goes The Union?" asks one man of another in a conversation. "All Goes Well!", was the answer. This was a conversation out of the pages of a history book, carried on by our forefathers in a time of vital crisis in which the very roots of the union of states known as the United States was being threatened. Do you hear conversations like this today? Not very often at the coffee house, or the drug store. Today we seem to be far more interested in less important things than the "State of the Union."

As citizens of this nation, we have an obligation, a duty, a trust and a responsibility that few human beings in this world are privileged to have. This duty is adequately expressed in the simple question, "How Goes The Union?"

When considering the crime rate in this nation, we sometimes feel that our nation has big problems. More than 278,000 serious crimes were reported during 1965; a six per cent increase over 1964. This figured out to 14 victims of serious crimes per 1,000 inhabitants. These included 5,600 murders, 34,700 aggravated assaults with a gun and over 68,400 armed robberies. Auto thefts alone resulted in total property stolen in excess of \$1 billion.

Then, consider the problem of absentees at the polling places in this nation. As the General Elections in November approach, we are reminded of the valued right of every American to express his choice for leadership by the use of the ballot on election day.

This coming November vital issues will be settled at the polls across the Texas Panhandle and in our state.

There are some of our citizens who are concerned with the state of the union. These are our men in uniform serving in the many "Hot" spots over the world. Perhaps we would vote in greater numbers if we could realize the sacrifice that many Americans have made on the battlefields of the world so that we might truly have a government of the people.

Within the coming months and years, let us pledge ourselves to the American tradition, ask "How Goes The Union?" The Union has its problems which can only be resolved by interested, dedicated citizens concerned with its preservation.

What Other Editors Say

Not Replaceable Overnight

Walter Rogers' announcement Sunday of his plans to withdraw his name from nomination as the Democratic candidate for Congress . . . and to retire from public office at the end of his present term in January . . . caught many of his close friends by surprise.

And perhaps it shouldn't have. Mr. Rogers has represented the 18th Congressional District most ably for nearly 16 years . . . but his task has been an increasingly difficult one. Probably no member of the House of Representatives has been under more pressures from diametrically-opposed factions at home than was Walter Rogers of Pampa.

The Panhandle congressional district is larger than many states in area, and packed with enough diverse problems to match most of them. It has oil and gas interests, major ranching interests, and large and small-scale cotton growers . . . to name just a few. It has ardent conservatives and ardent liberals . . . both in substantial numbers . . . and at times it must seem as if it has precious-few middle-roads of any stripe at all. It has one major metropolitan area (Potter-Randall county and environs) with enough voting strength to almost wag the day but not quite enough of control . . . and the major wealth of the district has been concentrated in the hands of an ultra-conservative group which has often ex-

erted extreme pressure on middle-roader Walter Rogers while, at the same time, offering aid and substantial financial comfort to a succession of unsuccessful right-wing opponents.

Congressman Rogers, we believe, made a sincere effort to fairly represent all of the diverse elements in his district . . . and a sincere effort also to serve the best interests of his country. We shall be sorry to see him leave the hall of Congress, and we wish him well in his return to private law practice.

We think the loss of the 18th United States Savings Bonds, exchanged for Series H Bonds, need not be reported for Federal income tax purposes until the H come tax purposes until the H maturity. Semi-annual interest checks are computed on the face value of the H Bonds which includes the accrued E Bond interest.

But we don't blame Walter Rogers at all for chucking it . . . even though we think his prospects for winning re-election were excellent. He has been facing an exceptionally well-heeled Republican opponent, partially financed by some members of the same power-bloc which has paid lip-service and given nominal support to the Democratic candidate in an effort to keep control in both camps . . . and facing a repeat performance of the unbridled personal attacks made on him by the same clan two years ago. It just isn't worth it.

We hope, for the sake of the big majority of us in the 18th District who want and need sound and able representation in Washington, that the County Democratic Chairman of the thirty counties in the 18th District will come up with a nominee who can fill Walter Rogers' shoes. Surely the Panhandle has many men who are able and willing to serve and on whom moderate Democrats can agree.—The Canadian Record.

Protection For Unlawful Protests
When the new Civil Rights Bill was before the House Judiciary Committee for consideration, Representative George Grider of Memphis had inserted in the proposal the word "lawfully" as an amendment to the section designed to punish those who commit violence against anyone demonstrating in favor of civil rights. As the amended bill reads, protection is afforded only to those who are exercising their protests in lawful manner.

The New York Times seized upon the amendment as a Southern "dodge," pointing its finger editorially at "Southern towns" where civil rights demonstrators had been arrested in the past on misdemeanor charges.

Representative Grider has answered the New York Times charges and shown, once again, that far too many critics in the

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 39 proposing an amendment to Section 18, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, to withdraw Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 18, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 18. For the purpose of constructing, equipping, or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements for the Texas A & M University System, including Texas A & M University, Prairie View Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas at Prairie View, Tarleton State College at Stephenville, Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Engineering Experiment Station at College Station, Texas Engineering Extension Service at College Station, and the Texas Forest Service, the Board of Directors is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of one-third (1/3) of twenty per cent (20%) of the value of the Permanent University Fund exclusive of real estate at the time of any issuance thereof; provided, however, no building or other permanent improvement shall be acquired or constructed hereunder for use by any institution of The University of Texas System, except at and for the use of the general academic institutions of said System, namely, The Main University and Texas Western College, without the prior approval of the Legislature or of such agency as may be authorized by the Legislature to grant such approval. Any bonds or notes issued hereunder shall be payable solely out of the income from the Permanent University Fund. Bonds or notes so issued shall mature serially or otherwise not more than thirty (30) years from their respective dates.

"The Texas A & M University System and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, and The University of Texas System, and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, shall not receive any General Revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case

ing The Main University of Texas at Austin, The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston, The University of Texas Southwestern Medical School at Dallas, The University of Texas Dental Branch at Houston, Texas Western College of The University of Texas at El Paso, The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute at Houston, The University of Texas Postgraduate School of Medicine, The University of Texas School of Public Health, McDonald Observatory at Mount Locke, and the Marine Science Institute at Port Aransas, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds and notes not to exceed a total amount of two-thirds (2/3) of twenty per cent (20%) of the value of the Permanent University Fund exclusive of real estate at the time of any issuance thereof; provided, however, no building or other permanent improvement shall be acquired or constructed hereunder for use by any institution of The University of Texas System, except at and for the use of the general academic institutions of said System, namely, The Main University and Texas Western College, without the prior approval of the Legislature or of such agency as may be authorized by the Legislature to grant such approval. Any bonds or notes issued hereunder shall be payable solely out of the income from the Permanent University Fund. Bonds or notes so issued shall mature serially or otherwise not more than thirty (30) years from their respective dates.

"All bonds or notes issued pursuant hereto shall be approved by the Attorney General of Texas and when approved shall be incontestable. This Amendment shall be self-enacting, provided, however, that nothing herein shall be construed as imposing any obligation heretofore created by the issuance of any outstanding notes or bonds under this Section by the respective Boards prior to the adoption of this Amendment but any such outstanding notes or bonds shall be paid in full, both principal and interest, in accordance with the terms of such contracts."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment withdrawing Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment withdrawing Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an Amendment to Sections 4 and 5 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members; prescribing their qualifications; elections, appointments, tenure of office and compensation; and prescribing the term of court of said court.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 4 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 4. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of five Judges, one of whom shall be Presiding Judge, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three Judges shall be necessary to a decision of said court. Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the state at a general election and shall hold their offices for a term of six years. In case of a vacancy in the office of a Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election."

"The Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election."

"The Court of Criminal Appeals and the Judges thereof shall have the power to issue the writ of habeas corpus, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, issue such writs as may be necessary to enforce its own jurisdiction. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have power upon affidavit or otherwise to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the exercise of its jurisdiction. The Court of Criminal Ap-

peals may sit for the transaction of business at any time from the first Monday in October to the last Saturday in September in each year, at the State Capitol. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall appoint a clerk of the court who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and who shall hold his office for a term of four years unless sooner removed by the court for good cause entered of record on the minutes of said court.

"The Clerk of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall continue in office for the term of his appointment." "Section 3. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1966, at which election each voter opposing said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot: "FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

"Each voter favoring said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment the same shall become a part of the Constitution of this state.

Sec. 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published and said election shall be held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this state.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIFTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 33 proposing an Amendment to Section 6, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, to authorize state participation in programs financed with funds from private or federal sources and conducted by local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations, in establishing and equipping facilities for assisting the blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, in rehabilitating and restoring the handicapped, and in providing other services determined by the state agency to be essential for the better care or treatment of the handicapped.

"The state agencies may deposit money accepted under this subsection either in the state treasury or in other secure depositories. The money may not be expended for any purpose other than the purpose for which it was given. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the state agencies may expend money accepted under this subsection without the necessity of an appropriation, unless the Legislature, by law, requires that the money be expended only on appropriation. The Legislature may prohibit state agencies from accepting money under this subsection or may regulate the amount of money accepted, and the expenditure of the money is administered, and the purposes for which the state agencies may expend the money. Money accepted under this subsection for a purpose prohibited by the Legislature shall be returned to the entity that gave the money.

"This subsection does not prohibit state agencies au-

thorized to render services to the handicapped from contracting with privately-owned or local facilities for necessary and essential services, subject to such conditions, standards, and procedures as may be prescribed by law." "Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing assistance to the blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped, in the form of grants of public funds obtained from private or federal sources only, to local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations for establishing and equipping facilities to assist the handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, for their rehabilitation or restoration, or for providing other services essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 79 proposing an Amendment to Article VIII, Section 1 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 1-d to read as follows:
"IT IS RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article VIII, Section 1 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding Section 1-d to read as follows:
Section 1-d. (a) All land owned by natural persons which is designated for agricultural use in accordance with the provisions of this section shall be assessed for tax purposes on the basis of its use as such agricultural use. 'Agricultural use' means the raising of livestock, growing of crops, fruit, nuts and other products of soil under natural conditions as a business venture for profit, which business is the primary occupation and source of income of the owner.
(b) For each assessment the owner wishes to classify his land under provisions of this Section, as designated for agricultural

use he shall file with the local tax assessor a sworn statement in writing describing the use to which the land is devoted.
(c) Upon receipt of the sworn statement in writing the local tax assessor shall determine whether or not such land qualifies for the designation as to agricultural use as defined herein and in the event it so qualifies he shall designate such land as being for agricultural use and assess the land accordingly.
(d) Such local tax assessor may inspect the land and require such evidence of use and source of income as may be necessary or useful in determining whether or not the agricultural use provision of this article applies.
(e) No land may qualify for the designation provided for in this Act unless for at least three (3) successive years immediately preceding the assessment date the land has been devoted exclusively for agricultural use, or unless the land has been continuously developed for agriculture during such time.
(f) Each year during which the land is designated for agricultural use, the local tax assessor shall note on his records the valuation which would have been made had the land not qualified for such designation under this Section. such period of time as would permit a former resident of this State to meet the residence requirements for voting in his new state of residence, and in no case for more than twenty-four (24) months."

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-d, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, declaring state policy regarding optimum development of water reservoirs; providing for the use of the Texas Water Development Fund under such conditions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law in the acquisition and development of storage facilities and any system of works properly appurtenant thereto providing for the sale, lease or transfer of such facilities under General Law; providing for long-term contracts for water storage facilities; authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board upon a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected members of each house; providing that anticipatory legislation shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory character; providing for the necessary election form of ballot; and proclamation and publication.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 49-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:
"Section 49-d. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the State of Texas to encourage the optimum development of the limited number of feasible sites available for the construction or enlargement of dams and reservoirs for conservation of the public waters of the state, which waters are held in trust for the use and benefit of the public; and the proceeds from the sale of the additional bonds authorized hereunder deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund and the proceeds of bonds previously authorized by Article III, Section 49-c of this Constitution, may be used by the Texas Water Development Board, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General

Law, including the requirement of a permit for storage or beneficial use, for the additional purposes of acquiring and developing storage facilities, and any system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment and transportation of water from storage to points of treatment, filtration and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods; provided, however, the Texas Water Development Fund or any other state fund provided for water development, transmission, transfer or filtration shall not be used to finance any project which contemplates or results in the removal from the basin of origin of any surface water necessary to supply the reasonably foreseeable future water requirements for the next ensuing fifty-year period within the river basin of origin, except on a temporary, interim basis.
"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law the Texas Water Development Fund may be used for the conservation and development of water for useful purposes by construction or reconstruction or enlargement of reservoirs constructed or to be constructed or enlarged within the State of Texas or on any stream constituting a boundary of the State of Texas, together with any system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment and/or transportation of water, by any one or more of the following governmental agencies: by the United States of America or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by the State of Texas or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the state; by interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party; and by municipal corporations. The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions under which the Texas Water Development Board may sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any reservoir and associated system or works

which the Texas Water Development Board has financed in whole or in part.
"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law, the Texas Water Development Board may also execute long-term contracts with the United States or any of its agencies for the acquisition and development of storage facilities in reservoirs constructed or to be constructed by the Federal Government. Such contracts when executed shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as state bonds issued under the authority of the preceding Section 49-c of this Constitution, and the provisions in said Section 49-c with respect to payment of principal and interest on state bonds issued shall likewise apply with respect to payment of principal and interest required to be paid by such contracts. If storage facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment.
"The aggregate of the bonds authorized hereunder shall not exceed \$200,000,000 and shall be in addition to the aggregate of the bonds previously authorized by said Section 49-c of Article III of this Constitution. The Legislature upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue all or any portion of such \$200,000,000 in additional bonds herein authorized.
"The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions for the Texas Water Development Board to sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any acquired storage facilities or the right to use such storage facilities together with any associated system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment or transportation of water at a price not less than the direct cost of the Board in acquiring same; and the Legislature may provide terms and conditions for the Board to sell any unappropriated public waters of the state that might be stored in such facilities. As a prerequisite to the purchase of such storage or water, the applicant therefor shall have secured a valid permit from the Texas Water Commission or its successor authorizing the

acquisition of such storage facilities or the water impounded therein. The money received from any sale, transfer or lease of storage facilities or associated system or works shall be used to pay principal and interest on state bonds issued or contractual obligations incurred by the Texas Water Development Board, provided that when moneys are sufficient to pay the full amount of indebtedness then outstanding and the full amount of interest to accrue thereon, any further sums received from the sale, transfer or lease of such storage facilities or associated system or works may be used for the acquisition of additional storage facilities or associated system or works or for providing financial assistance as authorized by said Section 49-c. Money received from the sale of water, which shall include standby service, may be used for the operation and maintenance of acquired facilities, and for the payment of principal and interest on debt incurred.
"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

If a student does not file a tax return and claim his refund, the Government doesn't know he has a refund coming. In the case of many students, filing a tax return can be a profitable task.

Boll Weevils Have Increased In Hall Cotton

Populations of adult boll weevils have increased greatly due to the emergence of the first true generation from squares. Bollworms continue to increase in Hall County.

No aphid infestations were reported in Hall County this week.

Fleahopper infestations were static in cotton in advanced stages of growth. In Hall County this insect may damage younger cotton and cotton that has not been able to set a good fruit load. As cotton reaches the advanced stages of growth, larger populations of fleahoppers may be tolerated without serious damage. Control measures should be based on fleahopper numbers and on damage as indicated by excessive loss of small squares.

Light bollworm populations were observed in Hall County this week.
