My greatest inspiration in religion was my wife until her untimely death last December. We have dwelled upon this earth a long time, and I hope our efforts in promoting Christianity have been worthwhile.

During those long hours I have been recovering from my serious illness, at times my thoughts have turned back to my early years . . . to the time I was a student at Southwest University before becoming a school teacher for a few years. Memories are sweet as they come back to me, and I have sympathized with students who come out after high school for more education. My experience bygone days gave me a good understanding of the problems of our teachers. My contacts with school trustees well over a century ago have helped balance my judgment in the problems all schools face. This knowledge helped me as I served the Memphis Independent School District as a trustee many years ago.

After attending the annual picnic, which also is in memory of the 76th birthday of Hall County, my thoughts turn back, after visiting with so many people who have resided a long time in my county or who lived there a long time ago, and moved away, but who came "home" for the reunion. I don't remember whether I ever written in my column about the desire of my parents, and a few friends, that I become a Methodist preacher. This was in my early years, and certain things were taken to bring this about. But time marched on. I became a school teacher; then a newspaperman . . . and never been . . .

Memphis-Childress Gridders To Tangle Here Friday Night

Area Citizens Protest Cancellation Of Two Passenger Trains Thru Here

The proposed removal of two passenger trains running on the Fort Worth and Denver Railway line through Memphis was the topic of a hearing ordered by the Interstate Commerce Commission at 9:30 a. m. Monday in the Community Center in Memphis.

The hearing was presided over by hearing examiner John S. Messer.

The hearing was ordered by ICC on Aug. 16, after protests of discontinuance of Trains Nos. 1 and 8 between Dallas and Denver, Colo., were requested to be discontinued by Colo. & Southern Ry. Co. and Fort Worth and Denver Ry. Co. in application filed July 14, 1966. ICC in Docket No. 24244, stated, "that effective Aug. 15, 1966, said carriers will discontinue service on passenger trains Nos. 1 and 8 between Dallas and Denver."

Citizens from Memphis, Hedley and Clarendon testified here Monday in protest to the proposed removal of the two passenger trains.

The hearing here Monday was the sixth in a series of eight hearings scheduled. Others have been held in Denver, Pueblo, Trinidad, Clayton, and Amarillo. Following the Memphis hearing, others scheduled were in Wichita Falls Wednesday and Ft. Worth this Friday.

Dr. George Smith of Clarendon, in testimony at the hearing, said, "Our citizens in Clarendon are disturbed at losing two of our trains daily. Through the years, we had highways blocked occasionally. We are dependent upon railroads for mail service,

The Memphis Cyclone, playing host Friday night to the Class AAA Childress Bobcats, will be facing possibly their toughest opponent of their season in the local lads' last outing before District 3-AA play begins. Game time is 8 p. m.

The Bobcats, even though they are supporting a 0-2 season so far, have been impressive and are capable of playing a tough brand of football.

Headed by Quarterback Gary Smotherman (No. 10), 160-lbs., the Bobcats like to throw a lot of passes and probably have better team speed than the Cyclone.

Although the starting offensive line-up of the Bobcats is much lighter than the defensive unit they field, it is quick and explosive. "Childress runs out of the same offensive formation that Shamrock and Clarendon use this season," Coach Bert Glascock said.

The Bobcats running backs include No. 20 Jeffrey Cordell, 145-lbs., No. 21 Ronnie Sims, 140-lbs., and No. 30 Larry Moore, 160, in the fullback slot.

The Bobcats are expected to bring a large crowd of followers to Memphis. It was reported Powell Field was filled to capacity last weekend at the Skyrocket-Bobcat game.

The Cyclone will have two starters out of the lineup when they go against Childress Friday night. Guard Chuck Jennings, a starter on the quick side of the line, has a painful rib separation, and FB Kay Miller is out with a back injury. Both boys are expected to see action against Lockney.

Sophomore Garvin Speed, a 210-pound tackle, has been shifted into the guard slot vacated by Jennings, and FB-IB Kenneth Cornish, the most experienced back on the Cyclone squad, has moved into the fullback position.

Miller worked out with the team in pads Wednesday, after missing two days of workouts. Coach Glascock said that neither one of these injuries occurred . . .

First Bale Of County Cotton Is Harvested

The first bale of Hall County cotton harvested from the 1966 crop was ginned at the Estelline Co-Op Gin Tuesday and brought to Memphis Compress Co. Tuesday afternoon.

The bale, harvested by E. G. Johnson from a farm in the Estelline area weighed in at 560 pounds. Johnson got the ginning done free of charge and was paid 40 cents per pound for the first bale by the Memphis Compress Co., M. C. Allen, Jr., manager.

The first bale was grown on the O. C. Payne farm located one mile southwest of the gin, it was reported.

The Memphis Chamber of Commerce and Hall County Board of Development will give to Johnson a \$50 check as premium for growing and harvesting the first bale of 1966 cotton, President Byron Baldwin announced.

Vergil McPherson Makes First Bale Of Hedley Cotton

Hedley's first bale of cotton was brought in last Thursday by Vergil McPherson, who farms and operates the Verwin Motel in Hedley.

The bale was ginned free of charge by the West Texas Gin. From 2,450 pounds of seed cotton, a bale weighing 600 pounds was ginned and 1,100 pounds of seed was obtained. Good grade and staple were reported.

The Hedley Lions Club purchased the bale for 40 cents per pound. It will be used to advertise the 15th Annual Cotton Festival at Hedley, slated Oct. 14-15.

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EDITORIAL

National 4-H Club Week, Sept. 24—Oct. 1

The week of September 24 through Oct. 1 has been set aside as National 4-H Club Week and it is fitting that tribute be paid to the young members and adult leaders in this program, throughout the nation.

In writing to 4-H Club members throughout the nation, President Lyndon B. Johnson stated: "As you learn for living through 4-H, I am happy to extend to each of you my warm good wishes for another year of accomplishments."

"I want to congratulate you and your volunteer leaders on your fine past record as well as on the promise which you bring to the life of rural America."

It is heartening to note your readiness to gain new knowledge, skills, and ideas through your head, heart, hands and health endeavors. And it is gratifying to see the success of your efforts to extend the opportunity you enjoy to more and more of our young people.

Your aims reflect this Administration's goals for a better and fuller life for all Americans.

"I know that you will sustain and strengthen your personal standards and high ideals in the coming year. And I know too that your 4-H program will remain a model and inspiration both at home and abroad," President Johnson stated.

The nation's 4-H youth will be in the headlines next week and "four"—spoken or written—will be repeated many times because it symbolizes the club's emblem; its head, heart, hands and health credo; and designates that 4-H is FOR boys and girls.

It occurred to us that there also are four choice words which bear repeating; Encourage, Recognize, Influence, Report. For it seems to us that the entire 4-H program is built around these four words.

Youngsters not affiliated with 4-H are encouraged to join. Current 4-Hers are encouraged to continue membership, thereby to steadily expand their skills. Recognition is given to the 2 1/4 million 4-Hers for jobs well done, projects completed and junior leadership, to name a few. The influence of 4-H is acknowledged by parents, volunteer leaders, Cooperative Extension men and women working with youth, by business and government officials and educators. During National 4-H Club Week, members make a report of individual achievement, progress, successes (and some failures). Also a team of 11 4-H reporters to the nation are winding up cross country tours and personal appearances as living examples of 4-H in action.

The 4-H Club program has a lot of worthwhile projects which youngsters can take advantage of if they choose to join the program. These include foods, livestock, health, leadership, safety, automotive, field crops, photography and clothing.

The 4-H program has over 24 million alumni who have been helped by the program. Many of these are still active in the capacity of adult leaders.

The 4-H Club Week theme this year is "learning for living." There is nothing more valuable to a youngster than the learning of a skill which will be useful in later life. Many youth organizations help prepare our youngsters to be better parents and citizens when they reach adulthood.

For this reason, we add our salute to the 4-H Clubs with that of President Johnson, who set aside the national observance.

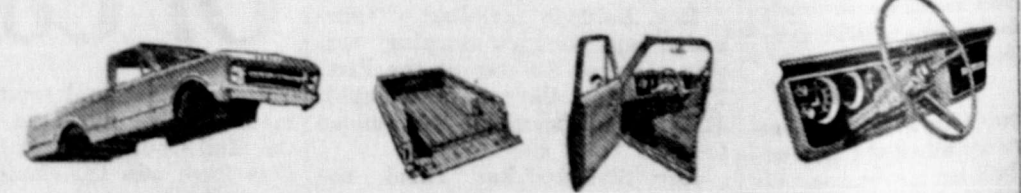

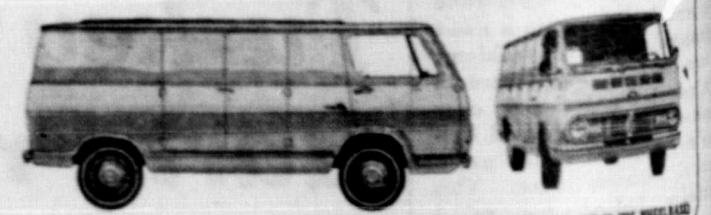

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Irishmen Outscore Cyclone 28-20 Friday

 Explosive Memphis Cyclone unit lost out in an offensive battle with the fighting Shamrock Friday night in a game that was disappointing to fans but a real fine game. Cyclone came from behind in the third quarter and over the local lads. According to local sports writers Shamrock victory. Shamrock's offense was keyed by blocking and hard running who were always able to get key yardage on third down efforts. The Cyclone was no handicap to

Dwayne Jones fielded a Shamrock punt and almost broke clear, returning the ball to the Shamrock 34 before he was downed by Shamrock's fastest man, Flowers. On the next play, HB Gary Rea carried on an end sweep around right end, broke into the clear and raced into the end zone to put the Cyclone ahead 8 to 6. Memphis' next drive was the longest of the night for either team covering 93 yards in three plays, with less than two minutes left on the clock before halftime. The drive started when HB Rea carried for three yards. Then WB Junior Graves cracked through for a 21-yard pickup. A piling on penalty against Shamrock moved the ball on down to the Memphis 44 yardline. On the next play, QB Pounds threw the long-bomb pass to End Clyde Wilson who had the Shamrock secondary beat, caught the ball, and raced for the TD. The play covered 56 yards.

A place-kick for point was good off the foot of Kay Miller but the local squad was penalized five yards for off sides. Then a pass play went incomplete on the next attempt for points. Shamrock came back after the half and drove 65 yards for their second TD. Scoring from the two-yard line was Robert Martin. A pass from QB Ike Shipman to End Mark Young was good for two points and the score was 14 to 14.

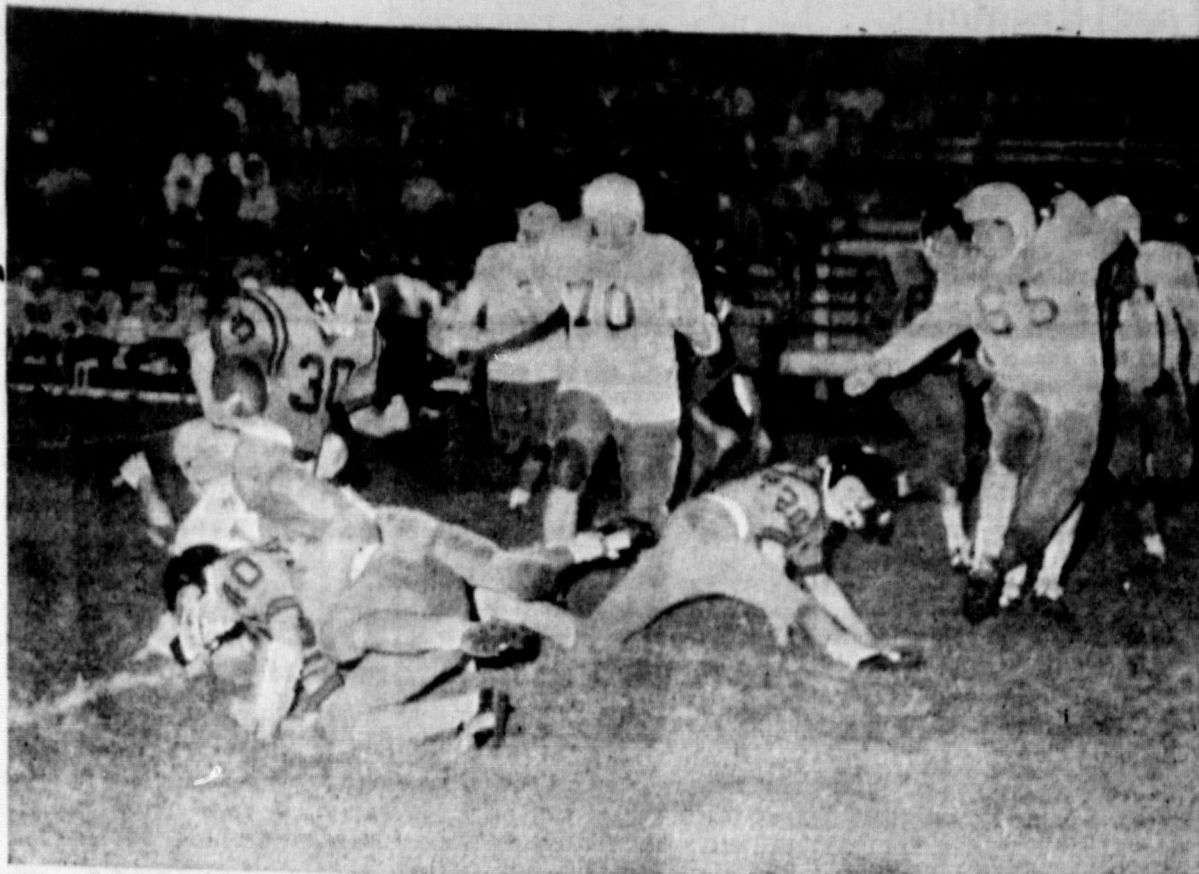
Memphis came back after the kickoff. A 10-yard carry by WB Graves gave Memphis a first down on the Shamrock 48. On the next play, QB Pounds faked a pitchout to WB Graves and tucked the ball and raced 48 yards to the goal line. A pass for points from QB Pounds to HB Rea was completed but short of the goal line so Memphis led 20 to 14.

Shamrock came back and drove 70 yards for their next score, climaxed by a pass from QB Shipman to HB Flowers from the nine yardline. A place kick by Martin was good to make the score 21-20. Shamrock drove again in the fourth period for their final score. Scoring was QB Shipman. Martin place kicked the point to make the final score 28 to 20.

1967 Vehicle Inspection Begun September 1

Colonel Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced recently that the 1967 vehicle inspection period had begun.

Garrison said that the new inspection period began on September 1 and will end on April 15, 1967 as prescribed by the Public Safety Commission. The inspection period is the same as in previous year.

"This means that between now and April 15, 1967, each of the five and one half million registered vehicles will have to secure the new green and white 1967 inspection sticker from one of the 5500 official inspection stations," he said.

Garrison pointed out that Texas

inspection stations can be identified by the official station sign displayed at the station. Garrison suggested that motorists have their vehicles inspected during the routine garage for ordinary maintenance, the necessity of waiting in line at a later date for inspection will be eliminated. In announcing the new inspection period, the Public Safety Director pointed out that defects contributing to traffic accidents in Texas during the fewest yet years since the inspection program began in 1951.

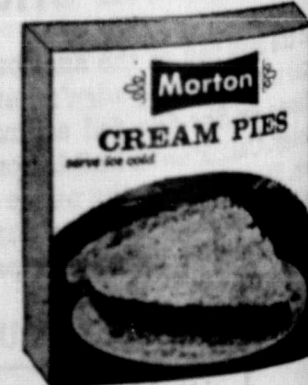

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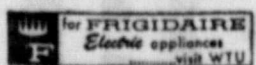

Memphis Lions Club Hears Speaker On Health, Education and Welfare

Don Newman, Director of Health and Welfare in Castro County and administrator of the Castro County Hospital in Dimmitt, was guest speaker for the Memphis Lions Club meeting held Wednesday at the Community Center.

President Dick Fowler presided, and the speaker was introduced by Billy Ray Jones, program chairman. Lion R. J. Neal, who is employed by the Texas State Department of Health's Migrant Project in Memphis, assisted in obtaining the speaker.

Other guests were Mrs. R. J. Neal, employed with the Migrant Project as a Public Health Nurse, and Mrs. Geneva Shropshire of Lubbock, also a Public Health Nurse for the state.

Newman discussed the use of federal funds in health, education and welfare. It was noted that Dimmitt is now one of the fastest growing cities on the Plains because its Community Action Committee has taken advantage of the various federal programs available, and that Memphis or any other city could also benefit by securing these funds.

He quoted Franklin D. Roosevelt, "If our brothers are oppressed, we are oppressed; if he hungers, we hunger; and Newman said, "We can add to this, 'If he suffers, we suffer'."

The speaker said that local taxing authority is too narrow to adequately solve local problems, such as inadequate migrant housing,

lack of public health facilities, and no day care center for working mothers. "All these programs, such as the Head Start projects, provide education and better health for the public, and decrease the number on welfare roles."

He stated that the federal projects allow local groups to develop their own programs, and can be administered locally.

The Migrant Health Program, Newman said, allows a local group to decide what they need and supplies federal financing of 90 percent of the cost for such services as clinics for babies, immunization, pre-natal care, out-patients, and employment of a public health nurse and sanitarian.

"Our taxes pay for these programs. We should not let the large, urban areas gain all the benefits, when cities such as Memphis need these facilities, too. We improve the whole community when these problems are solved," the speaker said.

He listed five means of developing a program for the community. "First, someone has to have a lot of interest and be willing to put in lots of time. Second, there must be a need. Third, someone must sponsor it. Fourth, get medical approval. Fifth, make a local contribution."

"I would hope that you, if your community has a need, would begin to provide other health services. If you lessen the suffering of your brother, you will also lessen your own," Newman concluded.

Variety, Change Make Character Of 4-H Program

"The 4-H program has been marked by change since its inception more than 60 years ago," says County Extension Agent W. R. Hooser. Greater variety of educational projects, more emphasis on the improvement of the boy and girl and a program with appeal for young people everywhere, are some of the changes the agent pointed out.

A more recent but no less important change, Hooser says, is the demand for 4-H in towns and cities across the country. Still an important educational force in rural America, more than 77 per cent of its members reside in rural areas, nearly a half million 4-H members now live in towns and cities of 2,500 or more. A decade ago, 86.5 per cent lived on farms and rural areas and 13.5 per cent in urban areas.

To meet the changing needs of youth, 4-H has increased its educational projects and opportunities. Among the new offerings are: Automotive care and safety home management, personality development, conservation, horse, dog care and obedience and community beautification. These are being supplemented with intensified activities of career explorations, science, health, nutrition, recreation, public speaking and

safety. For the young person with suitable facilities, the proven and established clubs being commended.

Agent Hooser invites all young people 9-19 years of age living in Hall County to learn of the opportunities offered by 4-H. They are invited to call his office at 259-3015 in the county courthouse in Memphis. Now is a particularly good time to inquire about 4-H with new groups forming and established clubs being reorganized, he points out.

Adult volunteer leaders interested in working with youth are needed, the agent advises. Men and women willing to assist boys and girls develop to the fullest their citizenship and leadership abilities, are encouraged to contact County Extension Agent W. R. Hooser.

Fort Belknap was the scene of their famous ancestor's activities over 100 years ago. Col. Young led the Texans in the Indian wars, earning perpetual acclaim by having Young County bear his name.

Mrs. Maggie Wright, through the Crain family, is the great-granddaughter of Col. Young. Her other children are Mrs. Wenona Brown of Kilgore, Mrs. Ola George of Borger, Ralph Wright, serving with the U. S. Navy in Hongkong, and Ed Wright, stationed with the U. S. Air Force in Massachusetts.

The other Crain cousins, descendants of Mary Anne Young, Col. Young's daughter and wife of Joel Arthur Crain, assembled at the fort. They are from Dallas, Fort Worth, Greenville, Sherman, Graham, Paris, Trent, Celeste, Lubbock, Sterling City, San Angelo, Stanton and Shreveport, La.

James Wright and his son, Timothy, were fascinated at the information about their ancestor. They learned that Col. Young always wore a top hat and a fancy, pleated shirt, dignifying his office as delegate to the annexation convention in 1845, as a state legislator, as an attorney-at-law and as U. S. Marshal in Grayson County.

Fought Battle Chustenalah. Murdered in Red River cane 'brakes' by renegades for testimony in Gainesville hanging. A Memorial to a Texan who served the Confederacy. Erected by the State of Texas 1963."
