EDITORIAL

Squeezing Mr. Freeman

The plight of Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman demonstrates how politics sometimes gets blinded to realities. Every politician, including Freeman's boss, knows that political power has shifted rapidly from rural areas to the cities, where the votes are.

That's why Freeman does a great deal of talking to consumers, pointing out how relatively little they pay for food and other farm products.

It also explains why "farm programs" are no longer the center of fiery congressional debates and anguished administration pleas such as once claimed large newspaper headlines.

Congressmen are more apt to have an ear cocked toward the city folks than the farm area. Even in Texas, once the bulwark of the farm legislative program, the congressional delegation is now city orientated. Our own Congressman, Bob Price, works for the farm and ranch interests, and Rep. George Mahon of Lubbock is one of the powers in the House for farm interests, but that's about it.

However, the shift of power from farm to city is not yet complete, when you add in the indirect forces that depend upon agriculture even though not making a direct living from the soil.

Farming and related businesses still constitute a vast industry involving many millions of people.

The farm industry is one of the major users of steel in this country and one of the major consumers of petroleum products.

While the bulk of the nation's population is now in the major cities and in urban areas, there are still millions of voters in small towns and in small cities where the income from agriculture is the principal source of income.

And all of these people are getting mighty unhappy, getting that way because it is obvious that the consumer is getting a good deal at the market place only because the farmer is getting squeezed dry when he goes to sell his products.

The government gets quite excited when the consumer cost of living index rises, but the government remains quiet when the farmer sees his prices plummet.

U. S. News and World Report this week has an article on the plight of the farmers and farm areas, pointing out that since last fall prices have dropped straight down while prices farmers pay for their supplies and tools have climbed straight up.

This doesn't make sense, and it cannot be long tolerated. The U. S. News talks about a "farm revolt" and while this may not be an accurate term, it is sure that some revolting is going to take place at the ballot box.

Secretary Freeman a month or so ago woke up to the fact that lower consumer prices does not always mean political hay, especially in the farm areas. This was dramatized when the recent milk strike was called and farmers dumped milk out rather than sell it below cost.

Freeman announced a government measure to subsidize which would amount to about 2 cents a gallon, hardly enough to be worth the effort. At that, Freeman's office announced that retail outlets had better not go up on their prices or risk government investigation, indicating that even while purporting to help the farmer, the administration is still more worried about the consumer and the political implications there.

We don't know what it takes to bring about a "farm revolt." But we do know that something will have to be done to reverse the trend. Too much depends upon it and it is time the administration wised up.

What Other Editors Say

Time For Decision Is Now

A report from a special committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, titled "The Small Community in West Texas," has been issued and should be required reading for civic leaders in small towns everywhere.

The author of the report is John Ben Shepherd, former Texas Attorney General, current president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and instigator of the WTCC's Small Town Task Force that has made this exhaustive study. Here is what he has to say in the forward of the study: "More than one third of the people in West Texas live in communities under 12,000. Over 50 per cent of the 400 towns of this size have lost population in the past six years. Experts say that 104 of them will disappear entirely by the year 2,000."

Shepherd continues, "Personally, I think the experts are wrong—I believe that by the year 2,000 we will have more and stronger small towns and that they will be occupying their historic positions as the backbone of West Texas."

Shepherd later says in the forward, "Small towns are our last citadel of graciousness, neighborly concern and true hospitality... they have been and can continue to be an important element in West Texas economy and are representative of the democratic way of life in which a man is free to make choices and achieve security through his own efforts."

"The Small Town in West Texas is a symbol of freedom of self government, and loss of that independence, identity and image so characteristic of the initiative and self-reliance that has made West Texas great... would be irreparable."

"But these reasons are probably too visionary for the detached planner, misguided prophet of progress, politician more concerned with votes than principle, apathetic small town leader

and the individual who refuses to learn the lessons of the past."

Then the chairman of the Small Town Task Force section of the WTCC, C. L. Cooke, adds in the preface to the study:

"Small towns in West Texas have arrived at their hour of decision. They must decide if they are to move forward, stand still or die. Their efforts now will be the determining factor. The best talents of business, civic, government and political leaders have been utilized in the preparation of this report. It will be a great help in moving the small town forward, if the town's leaders will use it."

She read letters from two young Methodist Conference missionaries who are teachers. One was from Juaneta Rose, formerly of Plainview, who is directing the Tung-hai University Choir in Taiwan and is teaching an English Bible class for college students. The other letter was from Joyce Hill in Santiago, Chile telling of the many doors being opened through the Alfalit program on literacy in Latin America. In Chile the percentage of illiterates is 20 per cent. One of her Chilean friends remarked that she never ceased to be amazed that God can use her. Joyce Hill added, "But that's true of all of us, isn't it?"

Mrs. E. Hutcherson gave an inspiring meditation on Pentecost based on Bishop Ralph Ward's article, "The Adequate Resource." She stated that from the manward side of Pentecost we should note that this new release of creative influence came to a prepared company; they were also committed company; and they were open to the Holy Spirit which would become their resource and power for a life of witness as Christians. 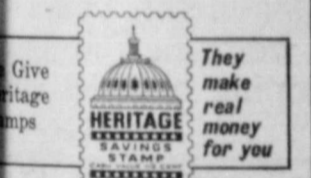

The First National Bank was named the depository bank for the district for the next two years.

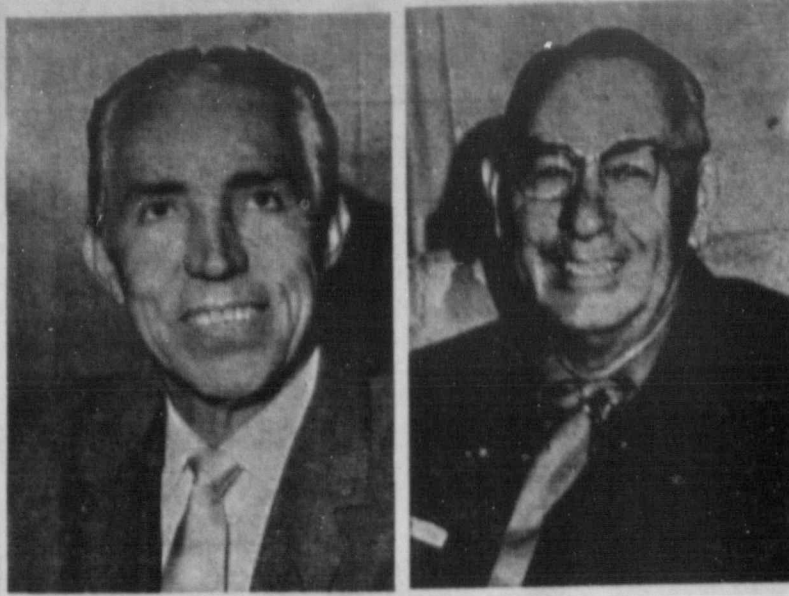
The board authorized the expenditure of \$7,100 for the purchase of teachers' supplies from N.D.E.A.

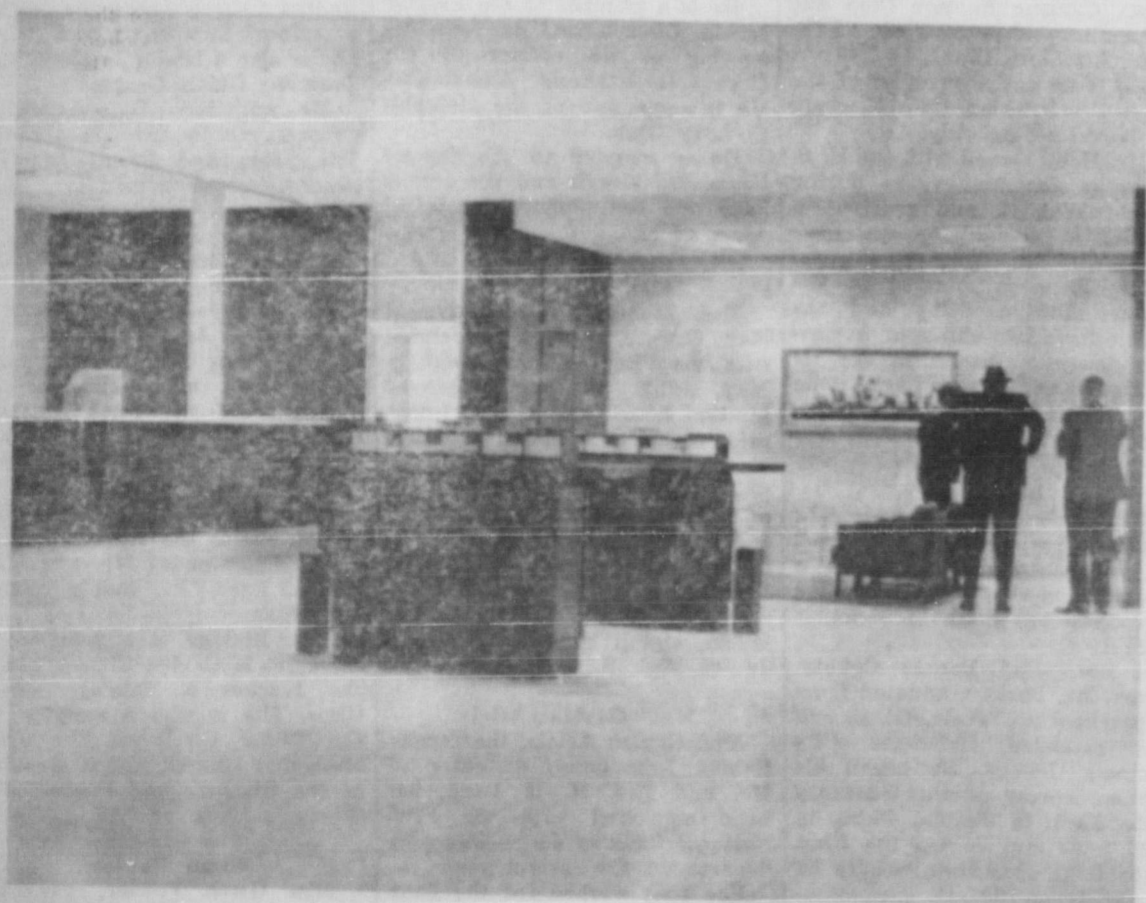

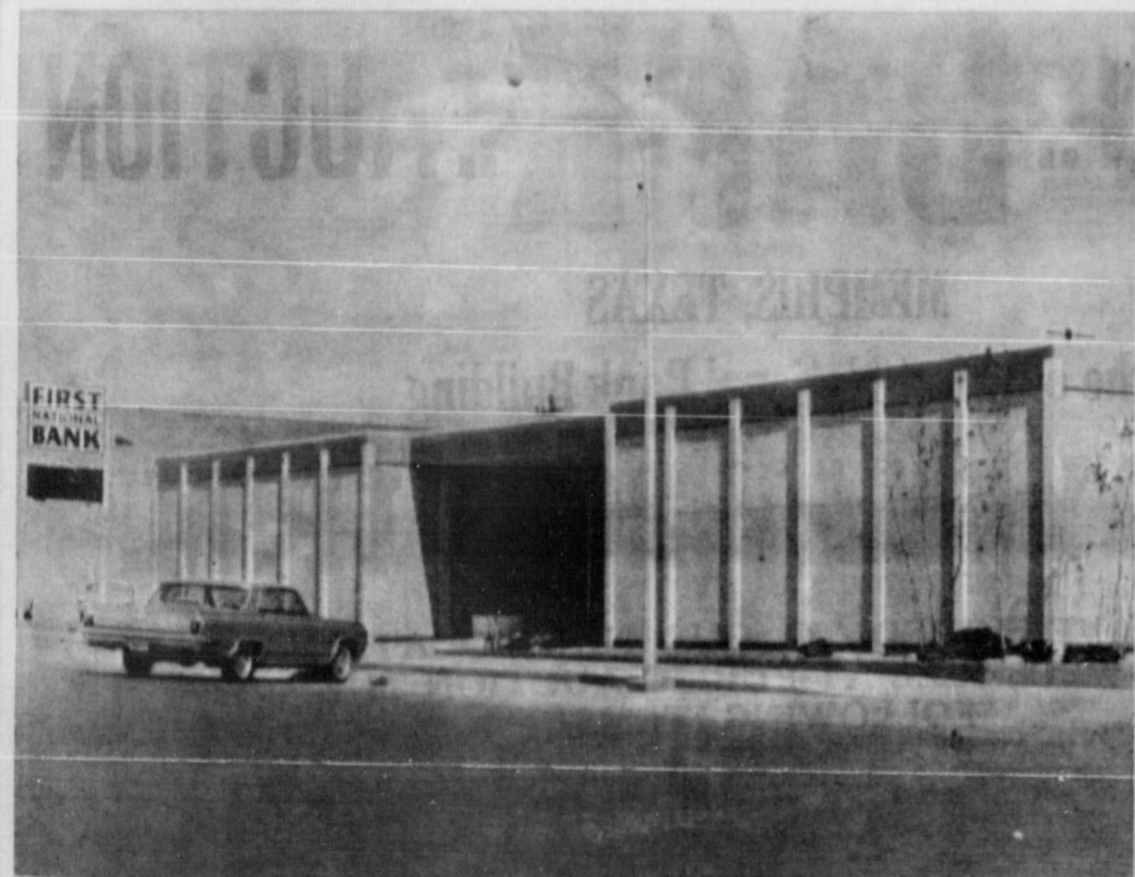

The First National began with a capital stock of \$25,000 on Dec. 1901. It was increased to \$50,000 in Jan. 1903 and to \$55,000 in Oct. 1906. On April, 1902 the capital stock was increased to \$100,000, where it remained until last year.

In Jan. 1966, the capital stock of the bank was increased to \$200,000.

The history of the First National Bank, taken from the official records, is one of continued growth and progress of an institution which began in the early founding of this area and has grown to a total assets of over \$8 million.

In its history, two men, the late S. S. Montgomery and the late F. N. Foxhall have done much to shape its destiny. Mr. Montgomery was one of the first directors and served throughout his lifetime.

Mr. Foxhall became a director of the bank in Jan. 1927 and served until March, 1954, until he passed away. These 27 years were during trying times for all banks and the leadership and guidance of Mr. Foxhall is evident in the bank's records.

Damaging Wind Storms Cause Erosion In Hall County SCD Area

Damaging wind storms have hit this year in the Hall County Soil Conservation District, according to Mickey Black of the district's work unit of the Soil Conservation Service.

Black reported that the majority of the land that was damaged was the more sandy soils that had no protective cover on them. The conditions in most of the areas were below normal.

"These conditions continue," Black said, "next year will be even worse."

Now is the time for farmers to think about how to lessen the damage that will be caused by

windstorms next year," Black said. "The diverted Acreage program presents a good opportunity for the farmer to plant crops that will leave high residues on the soil and help prevent the damage caused by windstorms and also water erosion."

Residues such as sorghum stalks will give the bed protection from soil blowing when left standing. The height of the stalks helps reduce the speed of the wind on the ground. Any early tillage on sorghum land should be done with equipment that will leave the stalks standing until about April 1, or through the blow season, Black advised. Fields that have summer harvested high residue crops, such as small grains, should not be disturbed until about Aug. 1, or until as late as possible.

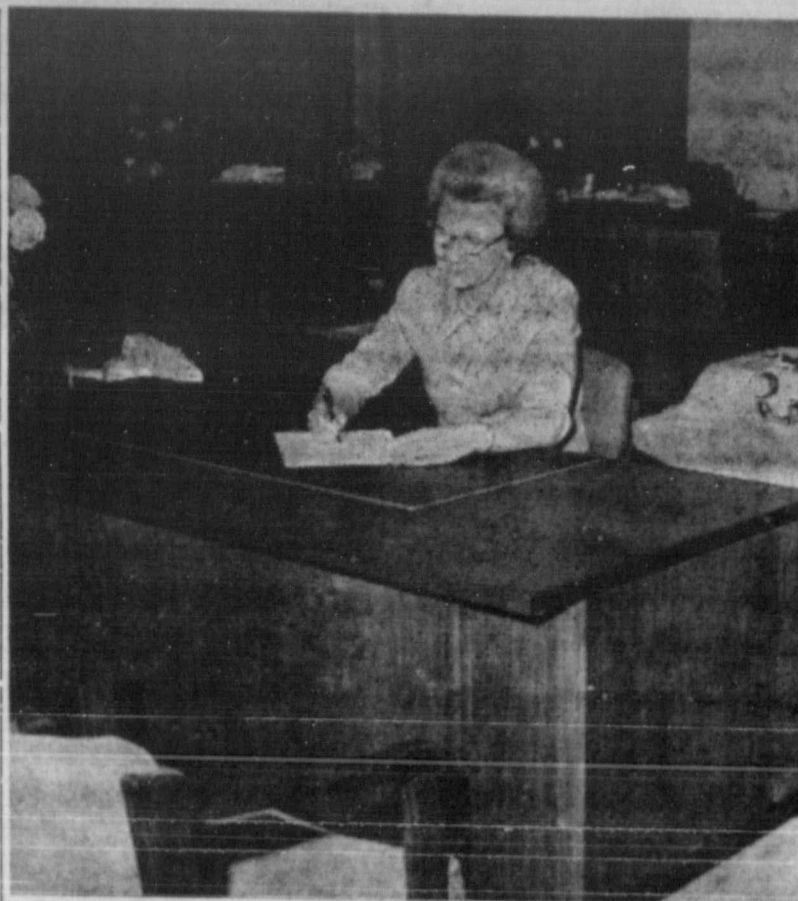
High residue producing crops such as sorghum and small grains give the farmer the best known protection against wind erosion, according to the Soil Conservation Service.

Farmers have been advised to contact their Soil Conservation Service district supervisor or the local Soil Conservation Service technician on the best methods of maintaining soil protection from wind erosion.
