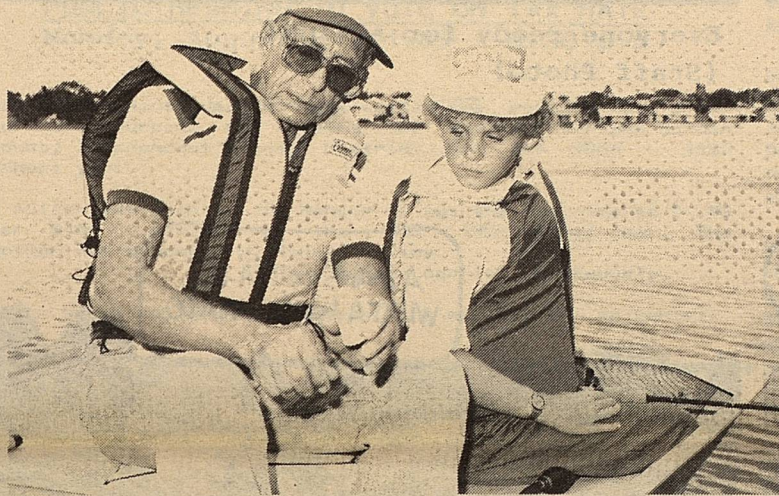

## Department on Aging Offers Certificates Honoring Grandparents

Grandparents are more important today than ever before. Recent social trends have obliged many grandparents to raise their grandchildren as well as their children often delaying their retirement as a result. And, as always, their wisdom, experience and work ethic make them the unacknowledged backbone of our state.

The Texas Department on Aging, in honor of the vital role grandparents play in society will sponsor Texas' observance of National Grandparents Day September 10, 1989. As in the past three years, TDcA will offer free certificates for presenting to outstanding grandparents.

These certificates are suitable for framing. They are printed in color on

parchment paper and signed by Gover William P. Clements and Department on Aging Executive Director O.P. Bobbitt. A space is provided for inscribing the name of the recipient.

Last year, TDcA distributed more than 100,000 Outstanding Grandparent certificates to individuals, schools, nursing homes, churches and civic groups. Many schools and other organizations sponsored local Grandparents Day celebrations which included presentation of certificates.

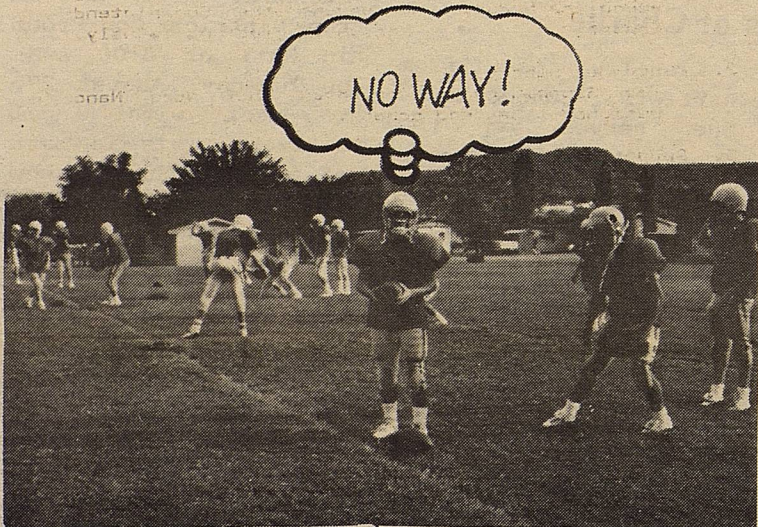

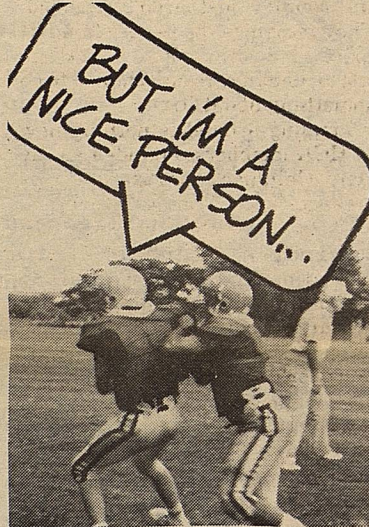

### Fall-Planted Bulbs Bring Spring Flowers

Fall-planted bulbs are an easy way to colorful spring flowers

These easy-to-grow flowers are inexpensive and require very little care.

Begin by ordering good quality, healthy bulbs. Order in September for the best selection of quality plants. These generally will produce flowers the first season and are free from disease.

A second point to remember is the bigger the bulb the bigger the bloom.

If you purchase bulbs early, before the October or November

planting time, store them in a cool, dry, well-ventilated area until planting.

Before ordering your bulbs, make sure the variety you choose will produce well in the South. Daffodils, narcissus, tulips, Dutch hyacinths, French-Roman hyacinths, grape hyacinths, triteleia and Dutch iris are among the choices open to Texas growers.

Some spring bulbs, such as tulips and Dutch hyacinths, require cold treatment prior to planting because of mild Texas winters.

### Soil Test For Fall Wheat Planting

Farmers should take time in the next few weeks to collect soil samples from fields they plan to plant to wheat or other fall-seeded small grains.

Soil test results done now will be returned early enough to allow plenty of time to apply recommended nutrients and incorporate them into the soil during final seedbed preparation.

Incorporating or knifing nutrients into a moist seedbed is important to reduce nitrogen volatilization losses associated with surface-applied urea-containing fertilizers. It also allows placement of non-mobile

nutrients such as phosphorus into the active root zone of plants.

Small grains that are to be grazed naturally require more fertilizer than ungrazed grain because of nutrients removed by grazing. About 30 to 40 pounds of nitrogen are removed in forages grazed by stocker cattle for each 100 pounds of beef produced per acre.

This nitrogen, less some recycling, must be replaced to provide adequate nutrition for grain production after livestock are removed.

A soil test remains the best way to deter-

mine fertilizer needs. It discloses how much of a given nutrient to apply, which depends on such factors as the level of that nutrient in the soil, residue levels, cropping history, available moisture, grazing practices and general management.

A general "rule of thumb" indicates that wheat requires about 2 pounds of nitrogen per bushel of grain produced. Therefore, a 30-bushel yield would remove about 60 pounds of available nitrogen per acre. Soil test will determine the amount of residual nitrate-nitrogen in the soil and reduce nitrogen recommendations by the amount, thus saving the producer dollars.

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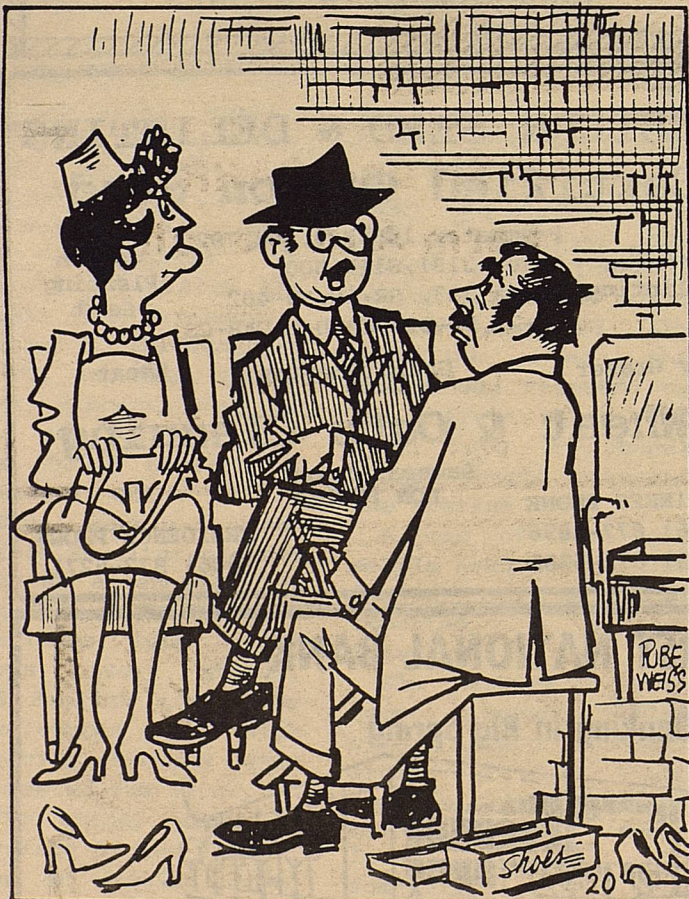
## EMT NEWS

### EMERGENCY FEED PROGRAM (EFP) FOR LIVESTOCK

We are still accepting applications for the emergency feed program. If you are required to feed above normal due to the drought you may be eligible for the program.

The current feeding period runs through August 31, 1989. If you decide to apply for EFP please come prepared to furnish the following:

1. An accurate age and an accurate count of your livestock
2. locations, qualities, conditions and acreages of your pastures
3. acreages and conditions of your hay
4. locations, quantity and quality of feed on hand

For those who previously applied for EFP please remember feed tickets submitted for pay must be signed by the seller. Also remember if you wish to continue to the EFP you must reapply prior to September 1, 1989.

### FAILED ACRES

Failed acres must be reported as planted and an application for disaster credit (ASCS-574) filed for the crops before destroying or making any other use of the crop.

### CRP CERTIFICATION

All CRP farms must have their acreage certified by September 15, 1989.

### 1989 DISASTER PROGRAM

We currently have no official information concerning a 1989 disaster program. We will let you know as soon as we know.

## Televised Driving Test Puts The Viewer Behind The Wheel

Better known as "Superman," actor Christopher Reeve will host "The Valvoline National Driving Test," a one-hour entertainment special that will utilize state-of-the-art camera technology to place viewers in the driver's seat while testing their knowledge of car safety and defensive driving on Tuesday, August 29, at 9 p.m. on CBS. The broadcast airs just before the long Labor Day weekend, a holiday typically marred by high numbers of traffic fatalities.

President of Texas Safety Association, George Gustafson says, "I strongly urge all Texans to tune in to the broadcast to sharpen their driving skills before the Labor Day weekend begins, especially those who have not taken the National Safety Council's Defensive Driving Course recently." Much of the content of the test booklet is taken directly from that course which Texas Safety Association and its agencies teach throughout the state. Other organizations which provided technical input include Mothers Against Drunk Driving, The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, and The American Automobile Association.

Reeve and his co-hosts, who will include Betty White, Randy Travis, Susan Sullivan, Perry King, Meredith Baxter Birney, Dick Butkus, and Al Unser Jr., will ask viewers multiple choice and true/false questions about everyday traffic situations which confront motorists. A simulated traffic situation, shot by specially-mounted cameras, will visually illustrate the question and test the viewer's reaction and memory. At the end of each question, Reeve will ask viewers to choose an answer. Then, he

will offer an explanation and give the correct answer and score.

The program is sponsored by Valvoline Oil company and was developed with technical review from the National Safety Council. An official test booklet is available at no cost from retail outlets selling Valvoline products, plus test sheets will be printed in both TV Guide and USA Today before the broadcast airs.

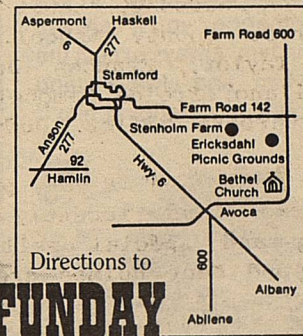

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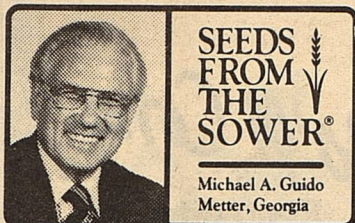

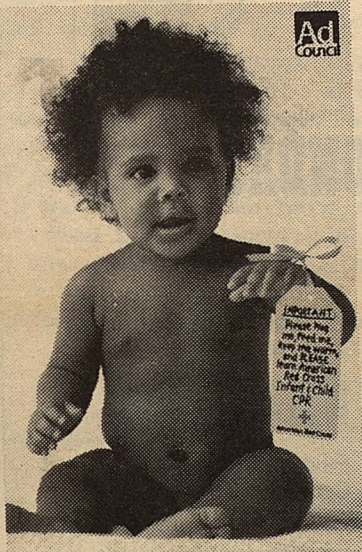
