Sarpolis said he was speaking in the Boys Ranch Chapel when word was received of the death of Cal Farley, founder of Boys Ranch. "Cal Farley was just like anyone else, except he dared to dream an impossible dream, to help boys who need help," he said.

Sarpolis was 12 years old when he went to Boys Ranch, after three years of hospitalization, and he said, "my dream was to walk, go to school and go to church like other children."

Sue Melton scored 32 and Connie Moore scored 24 for the Cyclonettes while Lavender hit 31 for Iowa Park girls.

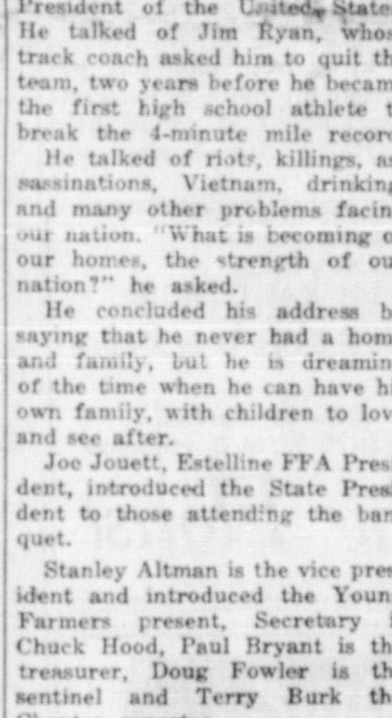
Wanda Walker had eight rebounds for Memphis. "We won the game on the strength of our guards offense (ball handling) and our forwards good defense.

## EDITORIAL

### Move To Aid Rural Areas!

One of the most important bills in the new Congress, from our point of view, is the proposed Rural Job Development Act introduced in the Senate jointly by Sen. Fred Harris of Oklahoma and Sen. Jim Pearson of Kansas.

By authorizing a series of tax incentives and credits, the Bill would encourage private industry to locate in rural areas, particularly those with a relatively high percentage of low-income families.

This bill attempts to stop the flow of people from rural areas into already crowded cities by providing jobs in these rural areas.

It would do this by making it attractive for private industry to invest in plants away from metropolitan areas. The two sponsors of the bill figure the best way to do this is through tax incentives because of most businesses of any size, a great deal of their efforts are devoted to trying to show a profit and still pay all the heavy taxes levied by Uncle Sam.

Nearly everybody, even the softest headed liberal, admits that giving more welfare to poor people is not a cure for poverty. The welfare check is a short term painkiller but doesn't destroy the root of poverty which is inability to hold a paying job.

The urban problem of welfare has been compounded by the influx of more and more people forced off the farm and who go to town to try to find a job. Without a job, they have to have welfare in order to live, and so the roll of welfare recipients mounts.

There are thousands of people in rural areas who would stay there if they had a job. If they can't hold down a job on the farm, they would welcome a job in a small town near home where they would work.

The movement of industry into rural areas has been retarded by several factors, including higher transportation costs, limited public services, distance from major markets and a shortage of skilled labor. Yet all of these factors can be overcome if industry is offered offsetting inducements.

Industry that has moved from the big cities, notably the Haggard slacks people in various Texas communities, have found that they get more efficient production and happier employees away from the city.

This type of legislation is a step away from mounting paternalism and would eliminate the need for more bureaucrats to administer a program. It is something that would help America as much as just about anything else—having jobs instead of welfare.

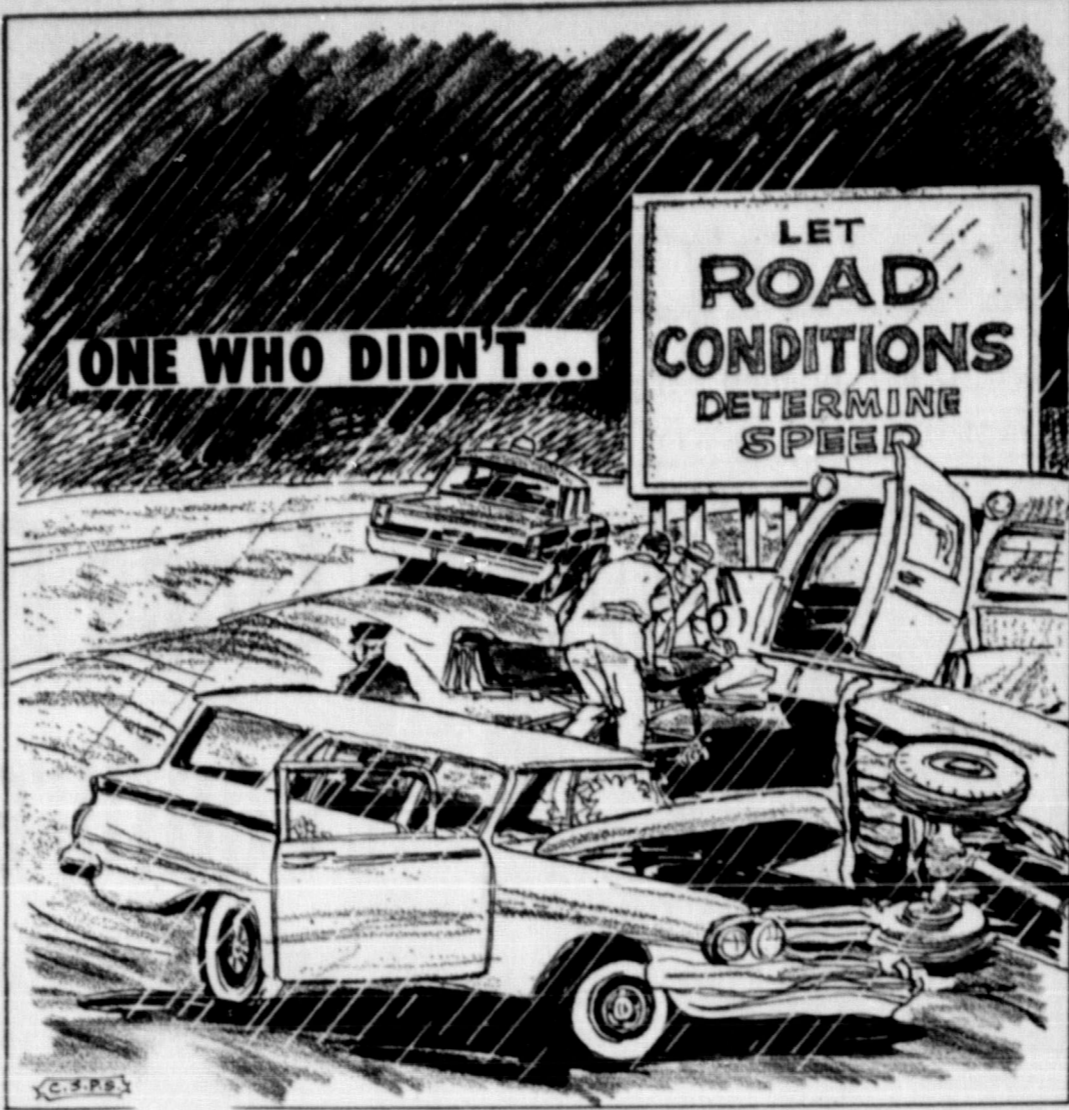

### What Other Editors Say

**Kamikaze is un-American**  
American servicemen are certainly among the best in the world, militarily, and have demonstrated this when it has been necessary in all parts of the world. But they are not supermen... they are quite ordinary human beings.

They are, on the whole, brave when it is required of them to be... sometimes foolhardy... sometimes heroic... often afraid but rarely cowardly... possessed of a sense of humor, a sense of mechanics and ingenious in improvising... and usually resourceful.

One thing that they are not, however, is suicidal.  
The men, and the officers, of the USS Pueblo, we feel sure, were also average Americans and quite ordinary human beings... and they were not suicidal.

If the Navy admirals who are conducting the Court of Inquiry into the loss of the Pueblo to the North Korean "mosquito fleet," as it has been sneeringly referred to, think that Commander Lloyd Bucher was wrong in not sacrificing the lives of his crew in a suicidal defense of his defenseless vessel, then we think the Admirals ought to go over and enlist in the Japanese Navy where kamikaze is practiced.

The North Korean torpedo boats which captured the Pueblo

may have constituted a "mosquito fleet," but it was a fleet more than adequate for the job on hand... the Pueblo, armed with two 50-calibre machine guns and a slow old tub at that, didn't have a chance and its commander obviously knew it.

We think Commander Bucher was right. If the Navy wants its intelligence ships defended, it had better provide them the means of defense. Give the men of the Pueblo, or any other fighting unit, the tools to do the job and they will exhibit the will for it and as much courage as is necessary, as countless comrades have done before them.

But Kamikaze is for the Japanese... and remember what happened to them.

### Names Are Important!

Parents have to be careful what they name their sons. His first name may become the whole key to his conduct, says a University of Chicago psychologist.

"When a child is given a name that is an object or ridicule, such as Precious," explains Dr. Robert C. Nicolay, "or denotes snobbery, such as Throckmorton or provokes embarrassment, such as Looney, or confusion as to sex, such as Marion, he is placed on the defective and may have to fight for it."

The doctor says boys like names that are commonly accepted: "Children are conformists. They like the names that have been popular the last 1,000 years — John, James, Robert, David, William, Thomas, Richard, Joseph, Frank Michael.

"There are probably 5,000 names a boy wouldn't have to fight to defend."

Well, there you are, parents. Either give the boy a name he can live with or, when you give him a strange one, see that he gets boxing lessons at an early age.

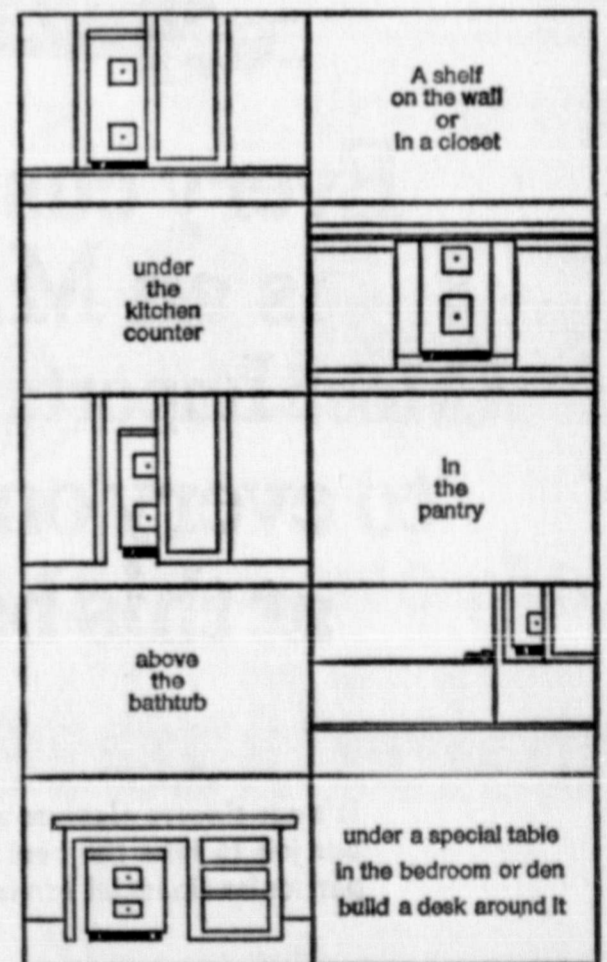

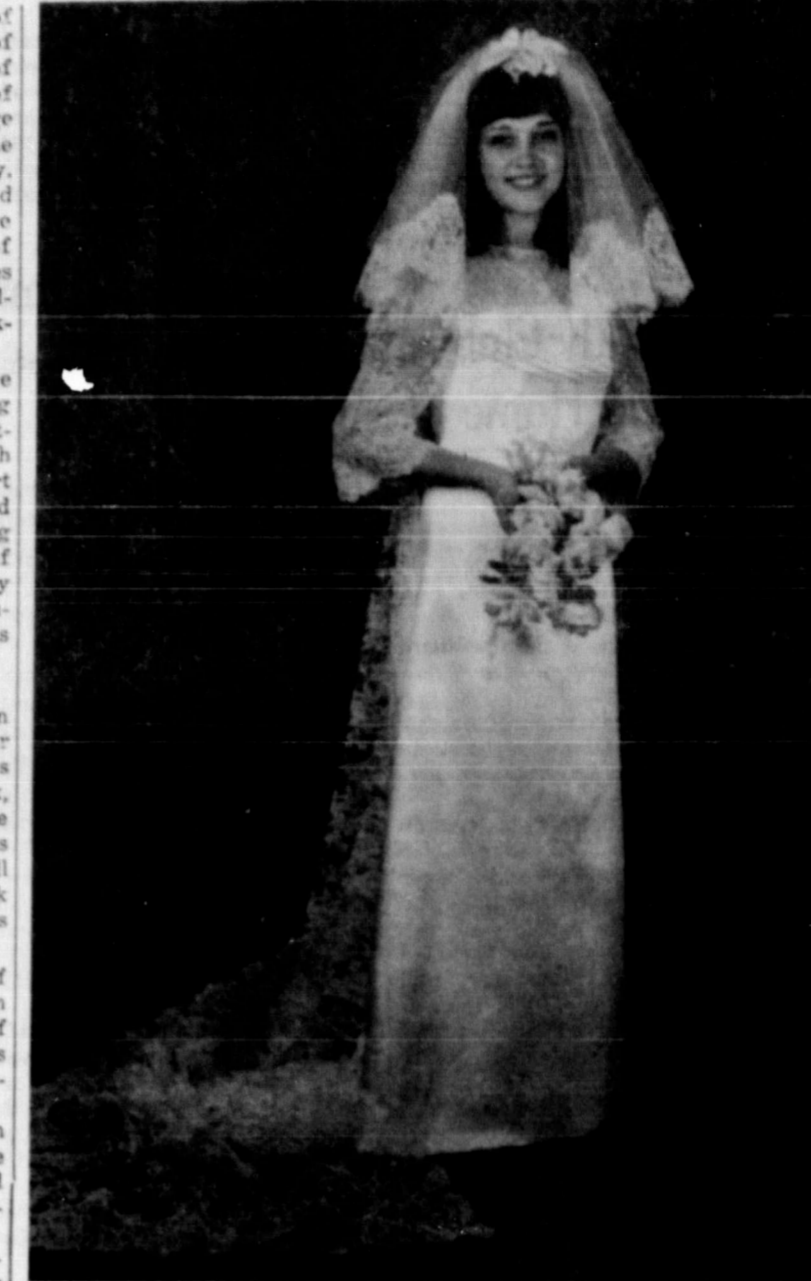

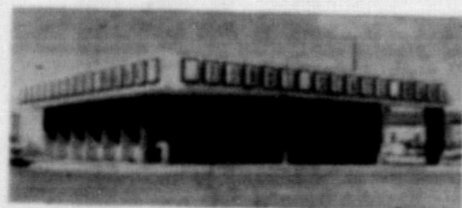

### Barnes Predicts Defeat Of School Consolidation Idea

AUSTIN — Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes predicted defeat of the proposed compulsory consolidation of school districts in Texas.

"The Governor's Committee on Public School Education has made many constructive recommendations. I feel that the Texas Senate will pass many of them," Barnes said in a statement released this week.

"However, I feel that the Texas Senate will not pass compulsory consolidation," the new lieutenant governor said.

Barnes added that the recommendation to consolidate school districts with less than 2,600 students will probably fall on deaf ears.

"The Texas Senate and this Legislature will probably write an attractive financial incentive program to encourage voluntary consolidation but will not adopt laws making consolidation compulsory in Texas this year," Barnes said.

Compulsory consolidation and other recommendations of the Governor's Committee on Public School Education are included in Senate Bill No. 2 which was introduced last week by Senator A. R. Schwartz of Galveston and Senator Oscar Mauzy of Dallas. The bill has been referred to the Senate Education Committee.

### New, High Yielding, Drouth Resistant Grass Seems Ideal For Texas Range

... high yielding grass variety has been approved for certification by the State Seed and Planting Board and released for public use, the Bogard of the local Conservation Services report.

Selection 75 Kleingrass, a palatable, drouth resistant pasture grass which is being released for certified seed production, Bogard said. SCS and Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations joined in the release after both agencies cooperated in making evaluation plantings across the state.

Bogard said the newly certified grass is one of the most promising developed in Texas in recent years. He pointed out, however, that it will never replace the top grasses already in use. "It just gives livestock men an alternative good grass to choose from when planting improved pastures," he said.

Selections of Kleingrass were made in 1951 from a 15 to 202.5 inch rainfall belt in South Africa for planting at the SCS nursery in San Antonio. After extensive evaluation at the James "Bud" Smith Plants Materials Center at Knox City and in soil water conservation districts across the state, Selection 75 was chosen as the one strain best adapted to Texas conditions. The grass is adapted to a wide range of soils, but on dryland is best on sandy loam to clay.

it grows four feet high. It is related to blue panic and switchgrass. The seeds are small and shatter easily, which restricts seed yields.

Quail, deer and other wildlife also find Kleingrass attractive. Quail eat the seeds, and deer relish the forage, especially in the early spring when few other plants are green.

Breeder's seed are produced at the SCS plant center at Knox City. Foundation seeds were grown in 1968 and will be available in 1969 through the Foundation Seed Section, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, College Station. Limited amounts of certified Selection 75 seed will be available in early 1969 for spring plantings.

About one and a half to two pounds of pure live seed per acre are usually drilled for broadcast plantings, Bogard said. For row plantings about one pound is used. For further information, contact technicians of the local SCS office located at 600 Noel Street, Memphis.

At the McGregor Station, average daily gains were better on Johnsongrass than Kleingrass 75, but neither Coastal Bermuda grass nor Johnsongrass produced as much total gain per acre under low to medium fertilizer applications.

The grass has also done well at such widely scattered points as Spur, Knox City, Fort Worth, Mineola, Rusk, Ballinger, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Victoria, San Benita, and Angleton.

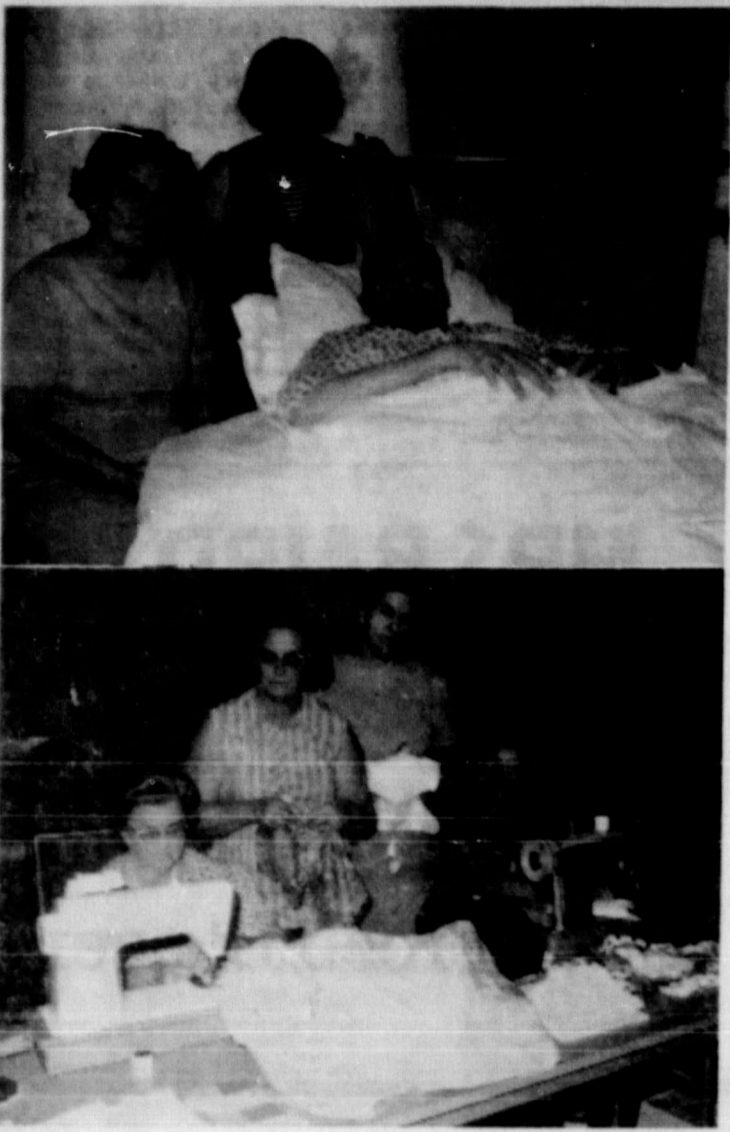

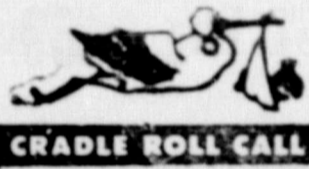
