# EDITORIAL

#### Move To Aid Rural Areas!

One of the most important bills in the new Congress, from our point of view, is the proposed Rural Job Development Act introduced in the Senate jointly by Sen. Fred Harris of Oklahoma and Sen. Jim Pearson of Kansas.

By authorizing a series of tax incentives and credits, the Bill would encourage private industry to locate in rural areas, paticularly those with a relatively high percentage of low-income families.

This bill attempts to stop the flow of people from rural areas into already crowded cities by providing jobs in these rural areas.

It would do this by making it attractive for private industry to invest in plants away from metropolitan areas. The two sponsors of the bill figure the best way to do this is through tax incentives because of most businesses of any size, a great deal of their efforts are devoted to trying to show a profit and still pay all the heavy taxes levied by Uncle Sam.

Nearly everybody, even the softest headed liberal, admits that giving more welfare to poor people is not a cure for poverty. The welfare check is a short term painkiller but doesn't destroy the root of poverty which is inability to hold a paying job.


The urban problem of welfare has been compounded by the influx of more and more people forced off the farm and who go to town to try to find a job. Without a job, they have to have welfare in order to live, and so the roll of welfare recipients mounts.

There are thousands of people in rural areas who would stay there if they had a job. If they can't hold down a job on the farm, they would welcome a job in a small town near home where they would work.

The movement of industry into rural areas has been retarded by several factors, including higher transportation costs, limited public services, distance from major markets and a shortage of skilled labor. Yet all of these factors can be overcome if industry is offered offsetting inducements.

Industry that has moved from the big cities, notably the Haggar slacks people in various Texas communities, have found that they get more efficient production and happier employees away from the city.

This type of legislation is a step away from mounting paternalism and would eliminate the need for more bureaucrats to administer a program. It is something that would help America as much as just about anything else -having jobs instead of welfare.

AUSTIN - Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes predicted defeat of the proposed compulsory consolidation of school districts in Texas.

"The Governor's Committee on Public School Education has made many constructive recommendations. I feel that the Texas Senate will pass many of them,' Barnes said in a statement released this week.

"However, I feel that the Tex-Senate will not pass compulsory consolidation," the new lieutenant governor said.

Barnes added that the recommendation to consolidate school districts with less than 2,600 students will probably fall on deaf

"The Texas Senate and this Legislature will probably write an attractive financial incentive program to encourage voluntary consolidation but will not adopt laws making consolidation compulsory Texas this year," Barnes said. recently.
