See D. Herring, Vice President Grand Prairie State Bank, told 300 persons at the 49th Annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet here Tuesday evening, laughter brings sunshine to your face.

## Program On Guar Given At Lions, Rotary Meeting

Barnie Rivers, field representative of Stein, Hall & Co. Inc., of Vernon, presented the noon program at a joint meeting of the Memphis Lions and Rotary Clubs yesterday.

Gordon D. Maddox was the Lions Club program chairman who introduced Mr. Rivers. Rivers presented an interesting program on the growth, harvesting and marketing of guar, a warm weather crop requiring much the same growing conditions as cotton.

Rivers began the program by stating that Guar is a multi-million dollar cash crop with a ready market. The use of Guar products is expanding rapidly in the following industries: Oil, Dairy, Food, Paper, Textile, and Pharmaceutical. Also, in addition to Guar gum, processing of guar seeds produces a high protein meal as a secondary product. When mixed with other feed components, it makes an ideal stock feed.

The Stein, Hall plant located at Vernon, is being expanded rapidly, Mr. Rivers said, to meet the growing demand for Guar products.

Rivers passed out Guar Bean Purchase contracts to those at the meeting in which a producer was offered a minimum of \$4.60 per cwt. for Grade No. 1 clean, Guar Beans. He said this is not a ceiling price. It is a floor price and sets the minimum price per cwt. to the producer. The market price of the day, if above \$4.60 per cwt. will be paid the producer (Continued on Page 10)

## University Of Texas Awards Ph. D. Degree To James Regnald Curry

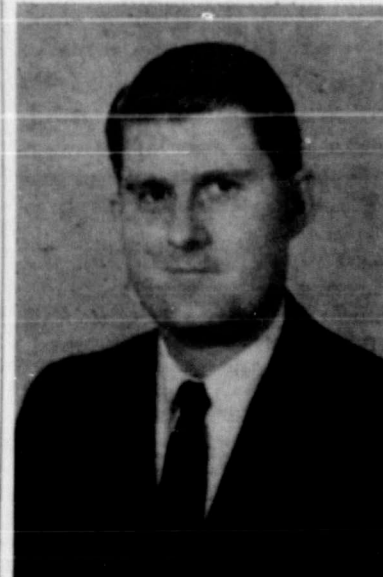
James Regnald Curry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Curry of Memphis, was one of 118 graduate students awarded doctoral degrees from the University of Texas, Austin, at the close of the fall semester.

The list of recipients, made public by Dean W. Gordon Whaley of the Graduate School, included Texans and students from 22 other states and 11 foreign countries.

Curry received his Doctor of Philosophy degree in physics.

A member of the 1961 graduating class of Memphis High School, Dr. Curry graduated with honors from high school and entered the University of Texas that same year.

He received his Bachelor of

## Dates For Four Area Volleyball Tours. Announced

Dates for four area volleyball tournaments were clarified this week.

Beginning with the Memphis "M" Club tournament, Feb. 27, 28, and March 1, teams are invited to participate in tournaments in Memphis, Hedley, Lakeview and Estelline.

The Hedley tournament sponsored by the Hedley FFA and FFA will be held March 6, 7, and 8. This is a change as Hedley and Lakeview have swapped dates.

The Lakeview Senior Class volleyball tournament will be held the following weekend, March 13, 14 and 15.

Then, the Estelline Young Farmers will sponsor a volleyball tournament on March 20, 21 and 22.

The four towns have made a special effort again this year to avoid conflicts so teams from each of the towns can participate in tournaments in the other towns.

Volleyball is a sport which attracts youngsters, teenagers and adults, male and female, and involves all in an active, strenuous, and healthy activity. Many business firms sponsor teams and competition for trophies at the tournaments is keen.

The volleyball season comes at the conclusion of basketball season and usually lasts about one month.

Next Wednesday, Feb. 26, all parents of Hall County children ages one through 12 years, are asked to take advantage of free measles vaccination at the Memphis Junior High beginning at 1 p. m.

The Memphis School Board, in conjunction with local health authorities and the Texas State Department of Health, will conduct a measles vaccination program for the children of this area at that time.

Children who should have measles vaccine are those 12 months old through 12 years who have not had regular (10 day) measles or previous measles vaccination. Children who have had either of these are already immune and need no additional protection, it was announced.

Health authorities also reported that there may be some children who should not have measles vaccine at this time. These would include those who are sick with high fever on the day of the vaccine program, those who are highly allergic, and those who are being treated for cancer, leukemia or tuberculosis.

School officials asked that parents who have children under a Doctor's care at the time of the clinic, should consult the doctor before hand.

Sponsors of the free measles vaccination program also request that all children be accompanied by a parent or other responsible adult over 21 years.

School children whose parents have signed a request slip will be vaccinated Wednesday. No school children will be vaccinated without the written request from their parents or guardian, it was explained.

Authorities are prepared to vaccinate 300 children with about half this number already signed up to be vaccinated.

The free vaccination for measles in this county is a part of the Measles Eradication in Texas program. The Texas State Department of Health reports that statistics show the highest measles incidence usually occurs during the months of March, April and May.

Measles epidemics usually begin when measles virus is introduced into groups of susceptible children. These children are almost always found in the nursery, kindergarten and first three grades of elementary school. Older children generally have much higher levels of immunity to measles as a result of past exposures.

This is why the vaccine is being administered to children 12 months old to 12 years old in this area.

Health authorities hope the free measles vaccination program will eradicate this disease in Texas.

## Three Trustees To Be Named On Estelline Board

Supt. David Haynie announced Tuesday morning that three trustees of the Estelline Ind. School Dist. will be elected in the School Trustee Election April 5th.

The terms of J. D. Cox and Harlen Hood are expiring as board members. Two candidates' names will be on the ballot for three-year terms. Also, a vacancy will be filled in the election for a two-year term.

J. D. Cox and Harlen Hood have indicated they will seek reelection, and Ted Bruce will be a candidate for the two-year term. W. C. Morrison resigned from the board creating the two-year vacancy.

Supt. Haynie announced that candidates must file applications to have names placed on the ballot 30 days before the date of the election with the Hall County Judge.

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## EDITORIAL

### Help Stamp Out Measles!

Wednesday, Feb. 26, 1969, Hall County citizens will have an opportunity to do their part in a state-wide campaign to help stamp out measles. Free measles vaccination program will begin at 1 p. m. on that date in the old cafeteria area in Memphis Junior High School.

This newspaper is of the opinion that this program is one of the best public health programs to be instigated in the State of Texas and is being brought to Hall County in cooperation and sponsorship of the Memphis Public Schools, local health authorities and the Texas State Department of Health.

Children 12 months old through 12 years old who have not had regular (10 day) measles or previous vaccination are asked to participate in the free vaccination program. Children who have had either of these are already immune and need no additional protection, health authorities report.

There are some children who should not have measles vaccine administered to them. These include children sick with high fever on the day of the vaccination, children who are highly allergic, and children who are being treated for cancer, leukemia or tuberculosis.

Also, parents with children who are under a doctor's care or for some other reason feel their children should not take the vaccine are asked to contact their physician for his advice concerning the measles vaccination.

As we see it, it will be the parents who will be the real heroes if a sufficient number of measles vaccinations are given. Local officials hope that 300 children will be inoculated. It is requested that each child or children be accompanied by a parent or other responsible adult over 21 years of age.

Local school officials are receiving signed statements from parents authorizing the measles vaccine be administered to their children. School officials in Lakeview, Esteline and Turkey have been contacted and invited to participate in the program. Parents throughout Hall County who have children who need the measles vaccination are urged to bring their children, especially pre-school children over one year old, to Memphis Jr. High on Wednesday, Feb. 26.

Measles is a dangerous disease. It can cause mental retardation, blindness, deafness and death. In this day and age no child need have measles. In 1963 a sure-fire vaccine was discovered and one inoculation—yes, just one—can protect a child throughout his entire life.

The Public Health Service has provided enough vaccine to wipe out the disease in a single year. Children can get free shots. They will be given here, in Memphis, Texas, next Wednesday afternoon.

If you are a parent, chances are you remember the three to six days of fevered misery you experienced as a child from uncomplicated measles. You may have forgotten the childhood friends who died, or the bitter experience of families whose children suffered from complications such as pneumonia or encephalitis. Or those who were left with residual deafness or mental defects as the result of measles.

In Texas last year, measles claimed over 30 lives. With the vaccine available, this loss is unnecessary and senseless.

Once there was a boy with a red spot on his forehead. It spread over his face, shoulders, down his body. He coughed. And his temperature went up. His mother said, "just measles." Measles brought on pneumonia. He should have been immunized against measles.

Measles epidemics usually begin when measles virus is introduced into groups of susceptible children. These children are almost always found in the nursery, kindergarten and first three grades of elementary school. Older children generally have much higher levels of immunity to measles as a result of past exposures.

This is the last of February now. Statistics show that the highest measles incidence usually occurs during the months of March, April and May.

Don't you think it's time now to stamp out the threat of measles? Then take your children to be vaccinated and make the program of measles eradication effective.

**Land grants built the rails**  
A lot of western railroads were built, during the development of the West, by land grants from the states aimed at opening the country to settlers by way of the steel rails. In Texas alone, 32 million acres of land went to various railroad builders for this purpose . . . and the railroads served the developing west as themselves by using some of the land for rights-of-way and selling most of it to settlers and developers.

All this is history. But people who once rode the rails by the tens of thousands have long since transferred their allegiance to the automobile and the airplane . . . and the western railroads which once vied for the passenger traffic are nowadays more interested in hauling freight than people, and many of them are trying to abandon their passenger traffic altogether.

In Oregon, some people are beginning to fight back. The Powder River Sportsman, an Oregon newspaper, reports that President Frank Banong of the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce is threatening legal action to require Oregon railroads to return 2.9 million acres of land to the state because the railroads are attempting to end passenger service there.


Banong says the lands were granted originally to the railroads in consideration of passenger service . . . and takes the logical position that since passenger service is being discontinued, the land grants should be given back. We suspect that Mr. Banong is merely venting his frustration and doesn't really expect that the Southern Pacific will restore either its passenger service or its land grants . . . but his action might prick the conscience of some other western railroad which got their start from grants of public lands in return for promises of public service.

DALLAS — If you have a refund due on your 1968 Federal income tax return, a sure way to slow it up is to mail your return to an incorrect address.

Mr. Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for Northern Texas, said today that Northern Texas taxpayers should mail returns showing refunds directly to the Southwest Service Center, 3551 S. Interregional Highway, Austin, Texas 78740.

A preaddressed envelope for this purpose is included with your tax-forms package. If it was mislaid or lost, a mailing label may be obtained from your nearest IRS office.

Checks or money orders in payment of the tax should be made payable to: "Internal Revenue Service."

## SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

One of the most important jobs Social Security has is to pay monthly benefits in the form of checks which are delivered to the beneficiary's address on the third of each month.

On about the fifth of the month, the social security people get several calls or visits from beneficiaries asking why their checks were not delivered. Usually, it is found that the beneficiary has changed his address, and social security was not notified in time to change the address on the check.

To make sure that checks are delivered on time, and to the correct address, Travis C. Briggs, manager of the Amarillo office, suggests that all beneficiaries notify social security of a change in address as soon as possible to permit them to correct their records.

All beneficiaries should ask the office for a card "Notice of New Mailing Address" if they do not already have one. The card is addressed to the local office and does not require postage. When social security receives the card, they will take the action necessary to make sure the checks come on time to the new address. If you do not use the card to change address, but write a letter, be sure your notice shows the name

of the person entitled to checks, the old and new address and the claim number on which benefits are being paid.

The Amarillo office is located at 1006 South Adams, phone number 376-5151, and is open Monday thru Friday from 8:15 a. m. until 4:30 p. m., staying open until 6:30 p. m. on Thursdays.

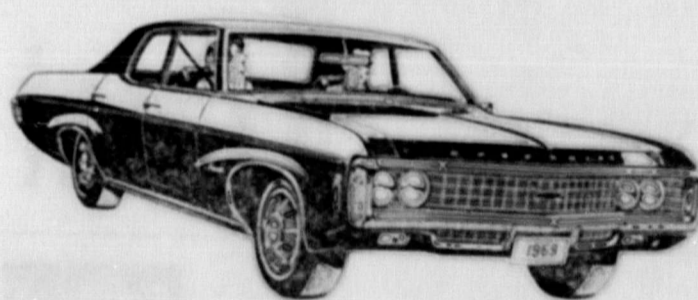

From then on they were pretty good home boys, but they never did forget this reception. All of these boys made good citizens. We had teenagers in 1914 as we do in 1969, but they did not get around as fast. I would give their names but want to keep them in high esteem by their grandchildren. 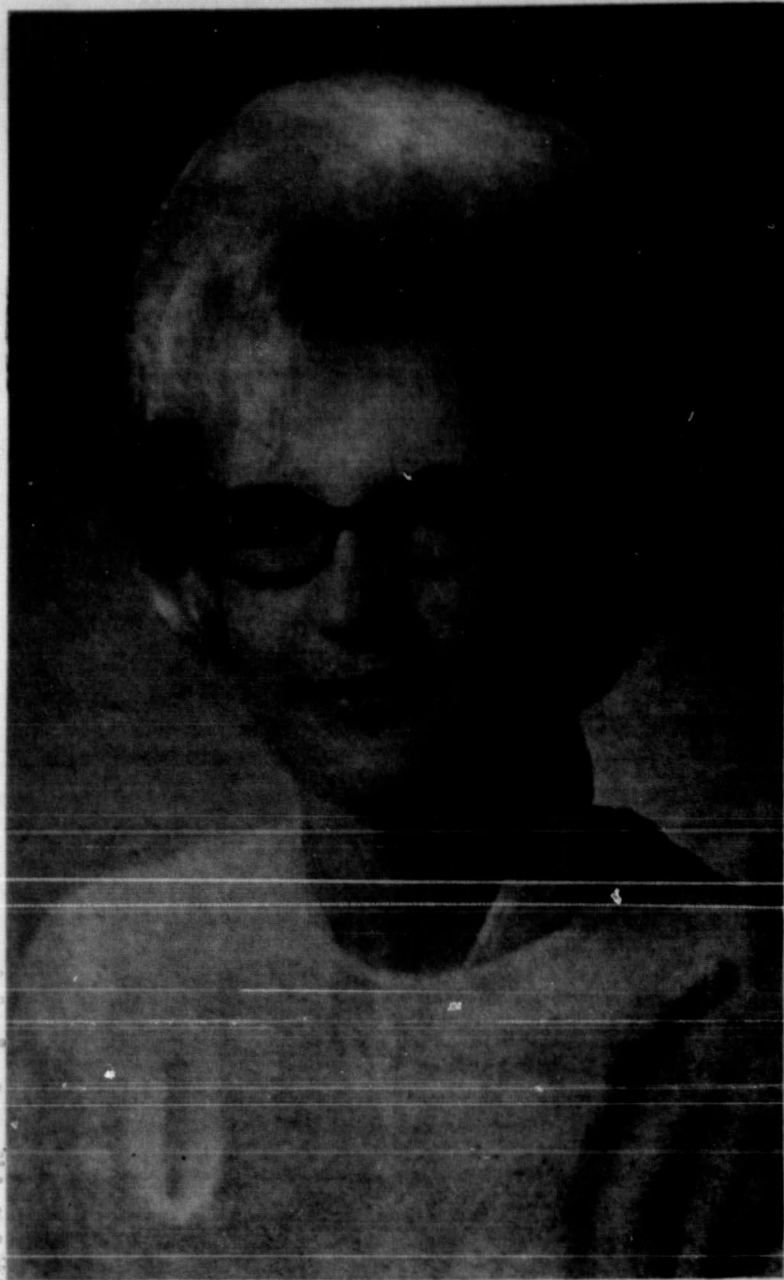

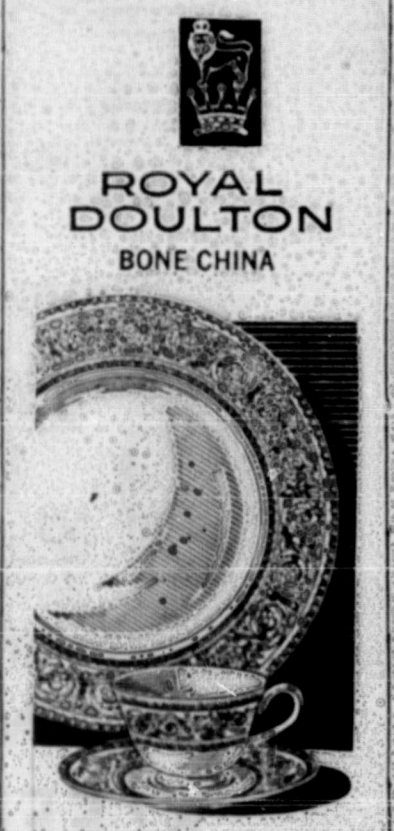

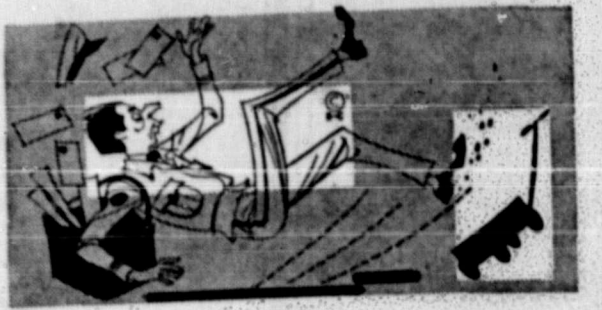

when Guar is delivered, he said. Farmers in Collingsworth and Childress Counties are now planting a certain amount of guar as a cash crop and we are hoping Hall County farmers will try a Guar Program for the 1969 season.

Rivers showed several colored slides of different types of hybrid guar, and explained recommended seeding rates, etc. He explained that guar is especially beneficial as a dry land crop and is not bothered by insects. It

should be planted in rotation mainly for the benefit of succeeding crops. It rotates with cotton, sorghum, corn and vegetables. A common practice some areas is to alternate crops of cotton and guar in a 1-2 rotation.

He said a fact to remember considering economic returns from guar is that it has no value as a soil - improving summer gume. Influence on succeeding crops is truly amazing. He also slides which documented this.

He concluded his talk by saying that around Vernon, Guar has come the number one cash crop. With the expanding demand for plant expansion, the State people are seeking new and increased sources for Guar beans said.
