Lakeview Roping Club To Have Event Sunday

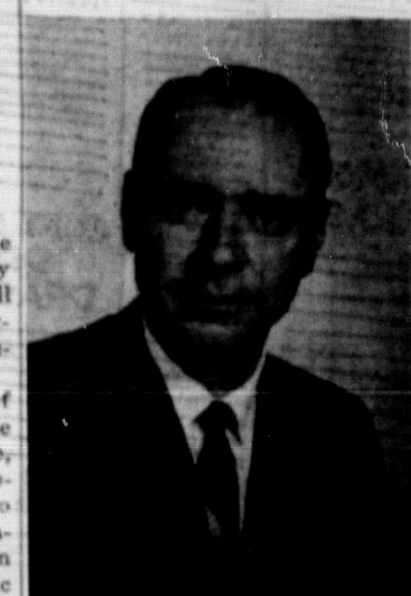
The Lakeview Roping Club will start its new season of activities with an event beginning at 2 p. m. Sunday.

The theme for the crusade is, "Christ the Only Hope". This is the same theme that was used in a similar crusade in Brazil which gave birth to the idea of a Crusade of the Americas. During the Brazilian crusade, 250,000 Baptists united one tremendous effort and led 100,000 to the Lord Jesus Christ.

Everyone is invited and encouraged to attend the crusade services in the local Baptist churches. Services will begin at 7:30 each evening.

EDITORIAL

The Changing Seasons!

Last weekend, Memphis and Hall County citizens witnessed the first thunder cloud of the year, which heralds the beginning of spring. As surprising as this may seem, the fruit trees also began blooming at about the same time, so Mother Nature has decided it is time to change seasons again.

The hearing of the thunder and seeing the flash of lightning, reminded us that the stormy (wet) season is here and it's time again for the tornado alert and watch to become a part of our everyday lives.

Glenn Shelton in The Wichita Falls Record News had this to say about spring rains which expresses many of our feelings about the season:

"The satisfying rain we had the other day reminds that the spring storm season is near at hand, and that soon the cycle of cumulonimbus clouds looming in the late afternoon far to the northwest will begin. It is a season of love; for though storms can be destructive, an aspect I deplore, there is something terribly exciting in drumming rain, booming clouds and flashing lightning. I can be hot and bored in the normal spring afternoon, interested in nothing and become an entirely new individual when nature throws one of her meteorological tantrums. When the clouds open up and the downpour begins accompanied by the cacophony of thunder and crackling lightning, I want to run out into the streets and glory in it all. Sleep is sweet when a nose is in an open window and a rainstorm is underway outside."

Thanks to the late winter snows and the first spring-like shower last Saturday evening, precipitation for 1969 has been above the mean figure as indicated in the Climatic Summary as published from 1932 to 1962. Memphis is expected to receive .77 of an inch in January, .77 of an inch in February and .85 of an inch in March, totaling 2.39 inches for the first three months. Through last Thursday, the year's total for 1969 was 2.55 inches and another half inch fell last Saturday making the total about three inches for this year.

April is a month during which Memphis is expected to receive 1.81 inches of moisture. Along with this, it is usually a month of windy weather and possible tornado alerts. Day-time temperatures range in the mid 70's and nighttime temperatures in the mid 40's during April.

The Climatic Summary also has another interesting bit of information concerning when we can expect the last freeze of the season. The figures show that 50 per cent of the time (or 5 years out of 10), the last occurrence of a 32 degree minimum in the spring occurred before Apr. 3, while 75 per cent occurred before Apr. 9 and 90 per cent occurred before Apr. 13 is better than 50 percent, which makes the growing of fruit a risky proposition since most fruit trees bloom before April 3.

With the coming tornado season, we should prepare our cellars and storm proof facilities for emergency occupation. Memphis citizens are reminded that the tornado alert signal is one long, even pitched blast on the sirens, accompanied by a voice announcement from City Police Department on Cablecom General TV cable system.

Also, a good barometer falling into the low 29's is another indication of a bad storm. Being alert, watchful and ready to take cover is the only sensible attitude to have during tornado season.

Last year's tornado in the Newlin area is an excellent reminder of the destructive power unleashed by a cyclonic wind. Let us all be prepared for the good and the bad of spring as Mother Nature prepares for the growing season after the deadness of winter.

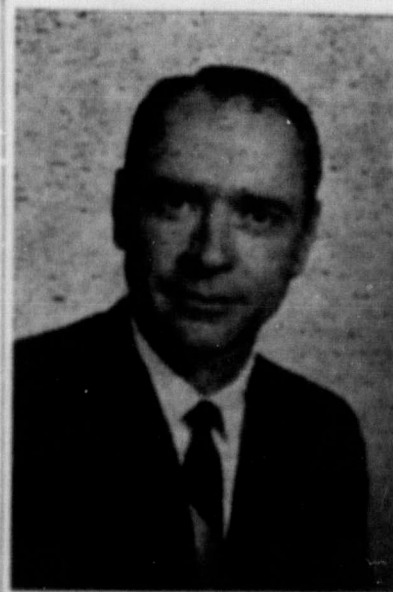

New Weapons Are Being Used To Fight Boll Weevils Along Caprock

New techniques will be used this spring in an attempt to reduce the boll weevil in the Texas High Plains. The trapping system will be an extensive one and the use of an insecticide, Temik, reports Almand, area entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. This project is an addition to the High Plains Reproductive Diapause Boll Weevil Control Program. The traps covered in these tests will be in Dickens, Motley, Hall, Briscoe and Floyd Counties.

Each year, four male weevils will be placed in each cage in the center of the trap. Traps will be made of metal about one square foot in size and painted a bright yellow. They will be inspected weekly and a fresh supply of weevils placed in each cage. Preliminary tests indicate that weevils need to feed on cotton before emitting the attractant, so a food supply will be kept in the weevil cages.

The traps will set up starting April 1 and will continue in service until about the first of July, says the entomologist. Tests indicate that the traps are much more efficient in capturing weevils as they emerge from overwintering quarters. By the first of July, a great majority of the overwintering weevils will have emerged.

Some 26,000 of these traps will be placed close to the most favorable overwintering quarters for the weevil. The traps will be concentrated below the Caprock in Dickens County from US 82 north through Motley County, the Turkey vicinity in Hall County and below the Caprock in Floyd County and Briscoe County in the vicinity of Quitaque.

As weevils begin emerging during early spring, officials of the Boll Weevil Control Program hope that the majority of them will be attracted by the traps and killed. This would drastically reduce weevil numbers in the area. The traps will be inspected closely and a careful count will be made of the captured weevils. As weevil catches increase, additional traps up to a total of 40,000 will be set up within the designated area.

Temik Discussed

Temik, a new systemic insecticide, will be used in conjunction with the weevil trapping system, explains Almand. Weevils will be killed as they feed on cotton

treated with the insecticide.

Again, efforts will be aimed at the weevils emerging from overwintering quarters. Small plots of cotton from 100 to 200 feet in length will be planted close to known overwintering areas. This cotton will be grown to the seedling stage in greenhouses or in other areas of the state. It will then be transplanted in the plots and treated with Temik. With this method, the cotton will be the first in the area.

Program officials anticipate that any weevil not attracted to the traps will be lured to the cotton, feed on it and die from the insecticide. These plots of cotton will be located in many of the same areas as the traps.

Large Scale Efforts Involved

This will be the largest experiment of its type to test these new techniques of boll weevil control, points out Program officials. They emphasize, however, that it is only a test and, therefore, the result can not be predicted at this time. However, in the near future, this may become a new effective and efficient way to totally eliminate a low level weevil population.

If necessary this fall, areas included in the test project as well as other areas in the High Plains Reproductive Diapause Boll Weevil Control Program will be treated with insecticide as has been the case since 1964 when the program was first initiated. The purpose of this spraying is to reduce the number of weevils entering hibernation quarters. The spraying program has been successful in reducing weevil populations to low numbers and these new techniques may prove to be effective and efficient in eliminating the remaining weevils.

The new test project is being carried out by the Plant Pest Control Division and Entomology Research Division of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Texas Department of Agriculture, Cotton Producers Institute and Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

County Extension agents in the counties involved in the project will be working closely with officials in the overall effort. More detailed information on the project in each county can be obtained from these agents.

About 60 seasonal employees will be working on the new project so many strange faces and government vehicles will be seen throughout the test area. Officials urge everyone, particularly those interested in cotton production, to cooperate fully in order to effectively test these new techniques of boll weevil control.

The last time that Jesus entered the city of Jerusalem a warm reception awaited. Palms were spread along the way.

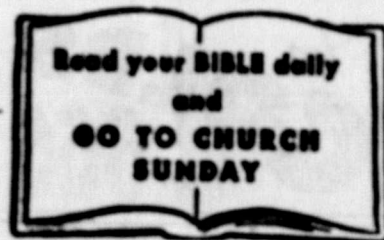
But Jesus came not in search of glory, but for the fulfillment of a promise, in the agony of death upon Calvary.

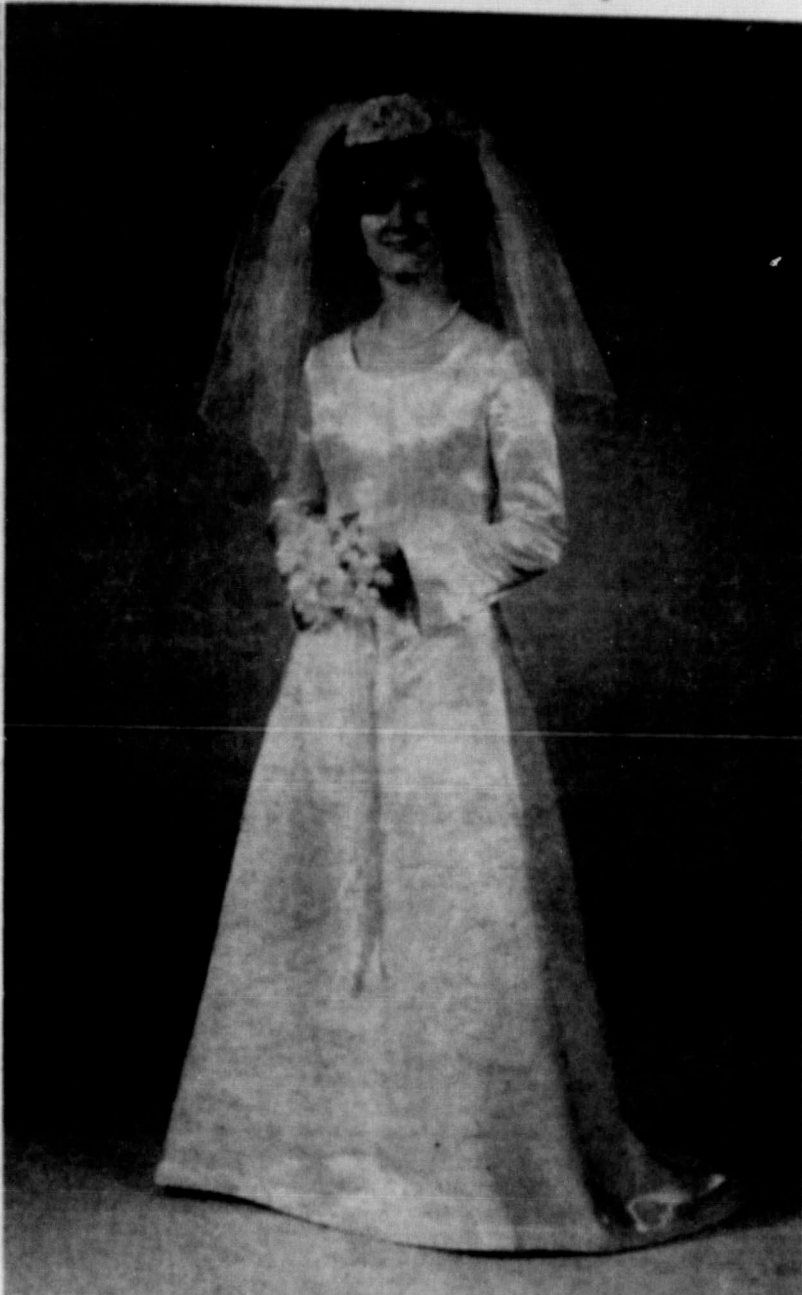

Leslie Sparks, Brother Of Local Minister, Dies

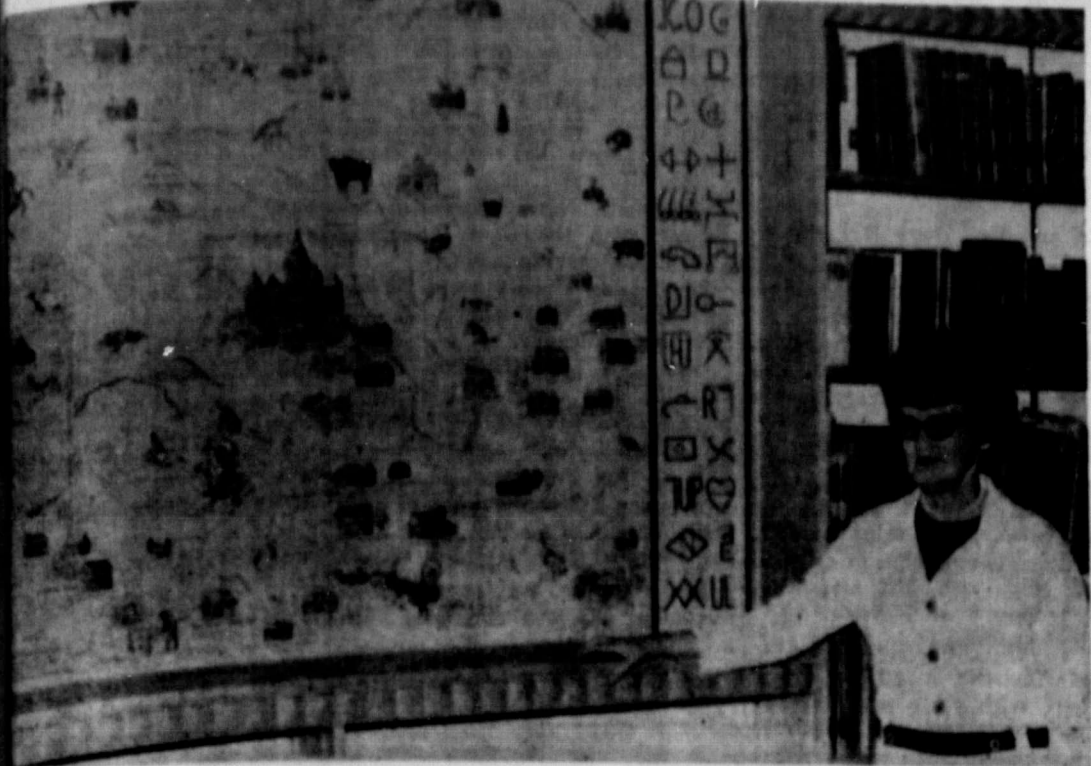

Tommye Noel Does Historical Mural for New Library Building In Denton

Miss Tommye Noel of Denton, artist and former Memphis resident, recently completed a historical mural and donated it to the new Smiley Fowler Public Library.

The mural, which depicts a map by Mrs. Sena Mounts Wright, a member of a prominent early day family of Denton.

The historical and geographical map of Denton County was reproduced by Miss Noel on a wall of the Smiley Fowler Library. The mural hangs between bookshelves containing only material and

books about Denton and books by Denton authors.

Art critics praise the composition and handling of color in Miss Noel's work, and historians value her accurateness of detail. The four by six foot painting includes the early cattle brands of Denton County Cattlemen.

Miss Noel donated her work of art as a remembrance for Otis Fowler, chamber of commerce manager for 30 years, and for the enjoyment of Denton citizens in preserving the local history.

About 80 percent of Brice area farmers attended the boll weevil meet Thursday, President Doug Burgess reports. A cotton planting date of May 7, 1969, was agreed upon. The dusting or spray date was set for June 16 to June 21. Farmers who were not at the meeting will be contacted, he said. A directors meeting at Memphis is planned for tonight with Emory Boring III, area entomologist, Vernon, to be present. The Hall County Insect Control Assn. is planning a boll weevil control program on a community basis, a program which has been successful in other counties in the state, Burgess explained. A community-wide planting agreement is more realistic than an area-wide program. This plan permits us to apply methods which will be beneficial to the most farmers at a particular time, Burgess said.

Cong. Bob Price Gives His Position Regarding Congressional Pay Raises

Congressman Bob Price of Pampa this week clarified his position upon the issue of pay raises for members of the House of Representatives, the Senate, and other federal officials, which became effective in February by majority vote in Congress. The complete text of his statement is as follows: The following is a statement of my position regarding the Congressional pay raises and my efforts to prevent enactment of what I consider unwarranted increases for Supreme Court Justices, Cabinet Members, Congressmen, and other high ranking Federal Officials. The authorization for the proposed increases were included in the Postal Revenue and Federal Pay Act of 1967 which included a three-stage salary increase for civilian Federal employees that was intended to close the so-called "comparability gap" between salaries of private employees and Government workers. Another provision of the Act was the establishment of a commission to recommend rates of pay for judges, Administration executives and Members of Congress. In a roll call vote, I opposed
