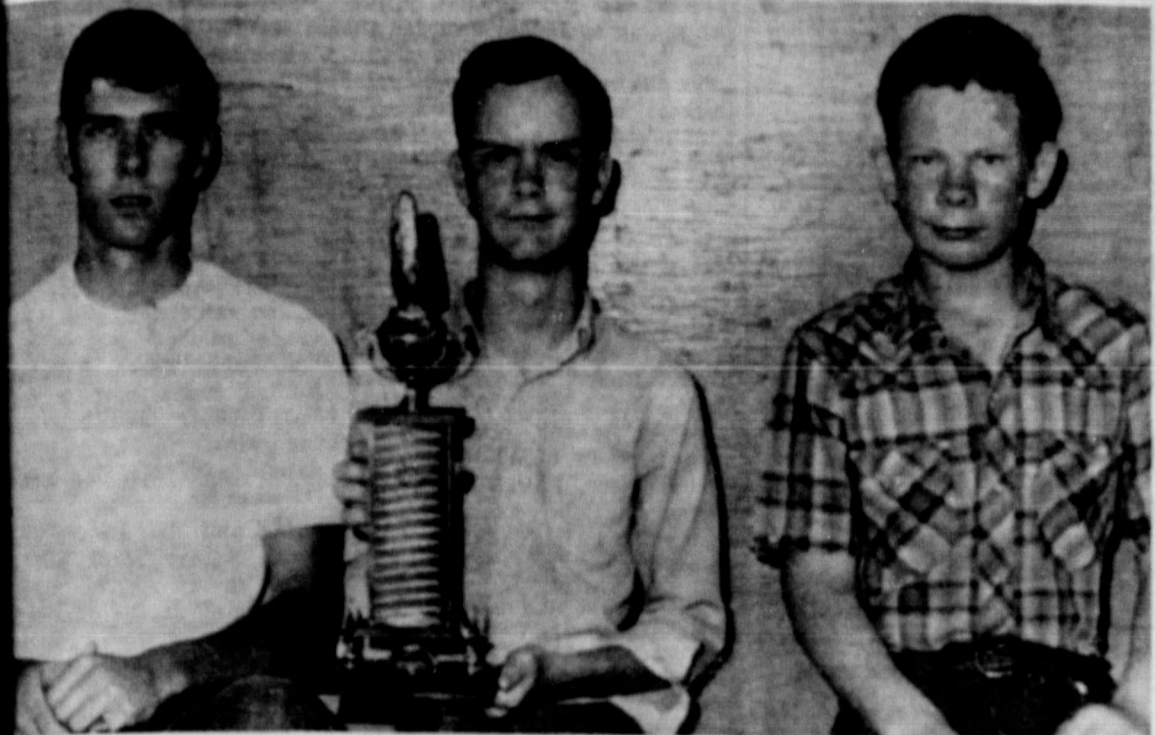

Hall County Netters Make Clean Sweep Of Regional

Hall County netters, and Roger Fowler, were the state champions in the Region Meet at WTSU last weekend. In the second straight year, Hall County provides tennis talent to represent this Region in Class State Finals. Brenda Durrett and Terry Wansley of Lakeview defeated the singles and Esmeralda Anne and Jan Rapp and Roger's Rod Adamson and Rod Fowler dominated the doubles. In girls, Brenda Durrett and Esmeralda Anne, had little trouble advancing to the state finals. Esmeralda defeated Helen Esparza, 6-1, 6-0 in the final. The Rapp sisters team defeated a team of Gardea - Guadalupe, 6-0 to advance to state. The boys had it a little more difficult. Terry Wansley defeated the team of Anton 4-6, 6-2, 6-1 in

the finals. However, the Turkey boys swept the Barstow team of Petty - Garcia 6-1, 6-1 to win the regional. In track, Memphis' Roger Fowler was the only lad to qualify for the State Meet by taking second place in the 880-yd. run. Coach Bert Glascock said that Roger "showed a lot of courage" in the race, running on a hurt

foot which kept him from working out for two weeks. Fowler turned in a good time of 2:02.1 in taking second after fighting off a challenging Brady lad, who fell on the cinders short of the finishing mark. Panhandle's McCollough won the race with a 2:09.8. Injuries hurt other track performances as Loral Rogers pulled a muscle in the 440-yd. lap of the mile relay on Friday and was only able to haulk a 10.4, placing third in the 100-yd. dash. He had the best qualifying time, 9.9, the day before.

Study Being Made To Improve Cablecom TV

Cablecom General, Inc. has announced that a feasibility study is being made and engineering plans are being drafted for adding additional services to the Cable TV system in Memphis. It is hoped that an Educational TV station, one or more independent stations and a news channel can be added to the system. The planned additions will require rebuilding the entire system with the most up-to-date types of aluminum cables and electronic equipment available to the Cable TV industry and will make the Cablecom General operation in Memphis one of the most modern and sophisticated systems in the United States. Non-Grazing Dates Announced For Diverted Acres

The Hall County ASC Committee has recommended that the non-grazing period for diverted acres remain May 1 thru September 30 for Hall County. After talking with various producers it was decided to leave the non-grazing dates as is, because it seems that most producers would rather start grazing earlier in the fall and take off earlier in the spring. The present law requires a 5 month non-grazing period.

The Hall County Industrial Foundation started today making a labor survey for a new industry in Memphis. It is for an established manufacturer of mobile homes who wishes to start a Texas branch plant in the Old Oil Mill here.

Dr. R. E. Clark Is Director Of First State Bank

President Don Cockrell in announcing the election of Dr. Clark as a director of the bank said, "We want to certainly welcome Dr. Clark to the official family of our bank." A life-time resident of Memphis, Dr. Clark is the son of Mrs. R. E. Clark, and the late Dr. R. E. Clark, Sr., and a 1946 graduate of Memphis High School. He was covaldicatorian of his class. About Daylight Saving Time!

It seems that pressures for continuing change in about everything is the rule and our citizens can prepare for the bi-annual change in time, scheduled for 2 a. m. Sunday, April 27.

At that time, we can roll our clocks forward one hour so we can rise at our usual time to see the glorious sunrise, for our government feels that the early riser gets the worm and if its anything all our citizens need to gather it's worms.

This hour time change makes some difference in our lives. For the parents who want to get their children to bed at 8 p. m., the battle will begin anew, for children do not like to go to bed before the sun goes down.

For those who like to spend their summer afternoons working in the yard, fishing, playing golf, swimming, bicycling, and other outdoor recreations, eating their evening meal when the sun goes down, it will be a late, late supper. You can always watch the late evening news on television while eating; that is if you have a strong stomach.

The Daylight Savings Time does allow for more time in the evening to complete lawn chores, but creates shopping problems for those in the rural areas, for stores close one hour earlier (sun time).

Church leaders have noted that attendance at worship services on the first Sunday after the time change is smaller due to those who forget to change their clocks. This year, let us strive to remember the time change and arrive at church when we should.

Citizens of this nation are the most time conscious people in the world. Never has there been a nation where its citizens exist solely on a time-table as do Americans. So, whenever legislation is passed to change or alter time in this nation, you can bet it will have a great effect on us, and point out that nothing is sacred, or not subject to being changed.

Support Your Local Library!

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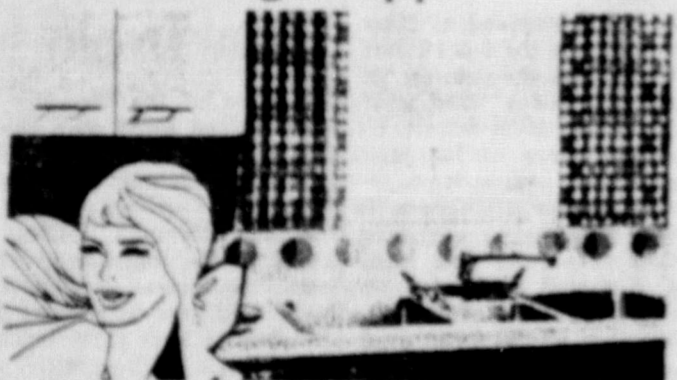
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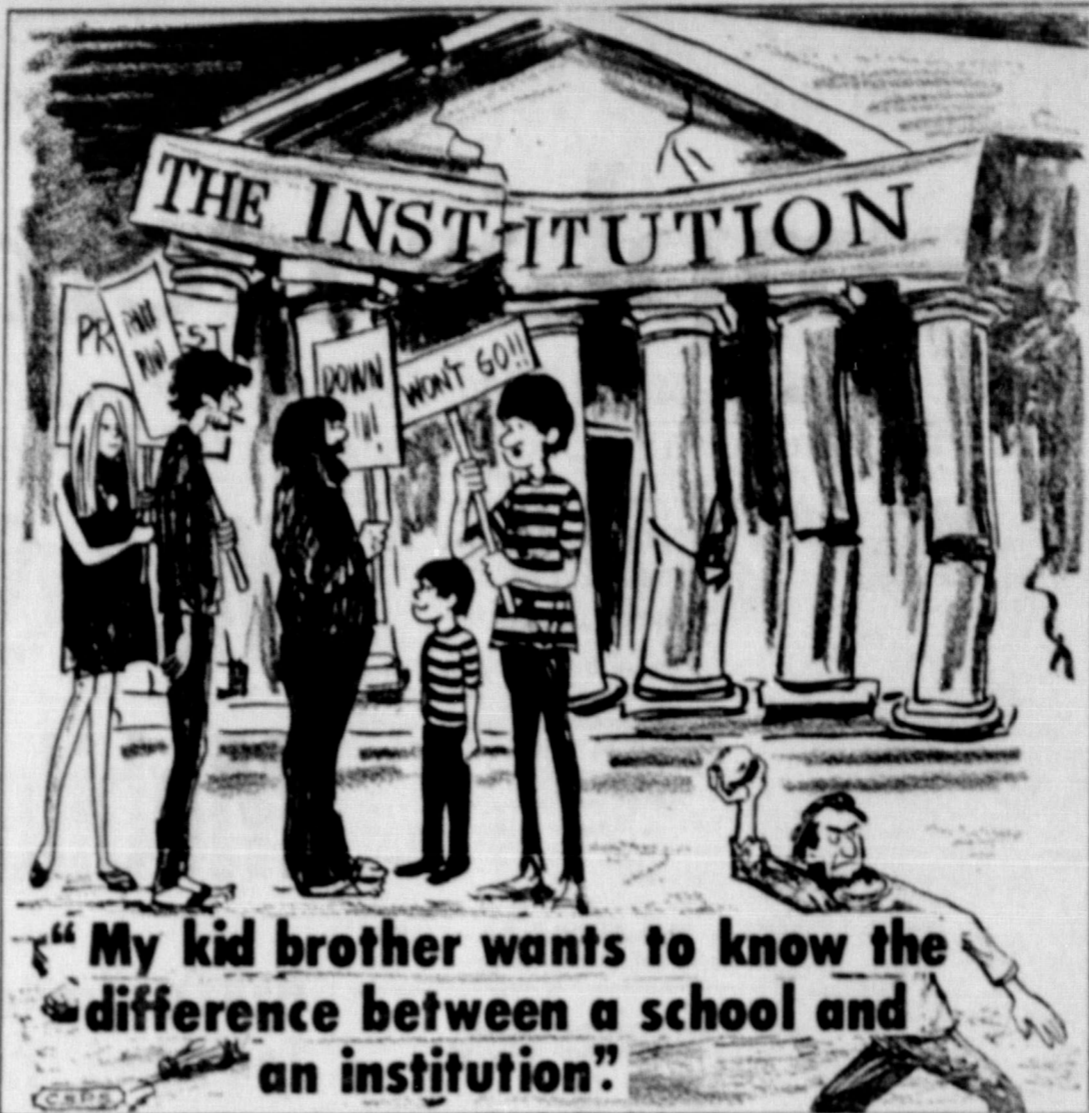

Great destiny is an eggshell that must be handled with care and with proper respect for momentum. It can roll too fast in any of many directions, to sudden destruction.

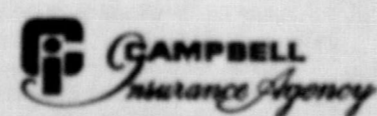

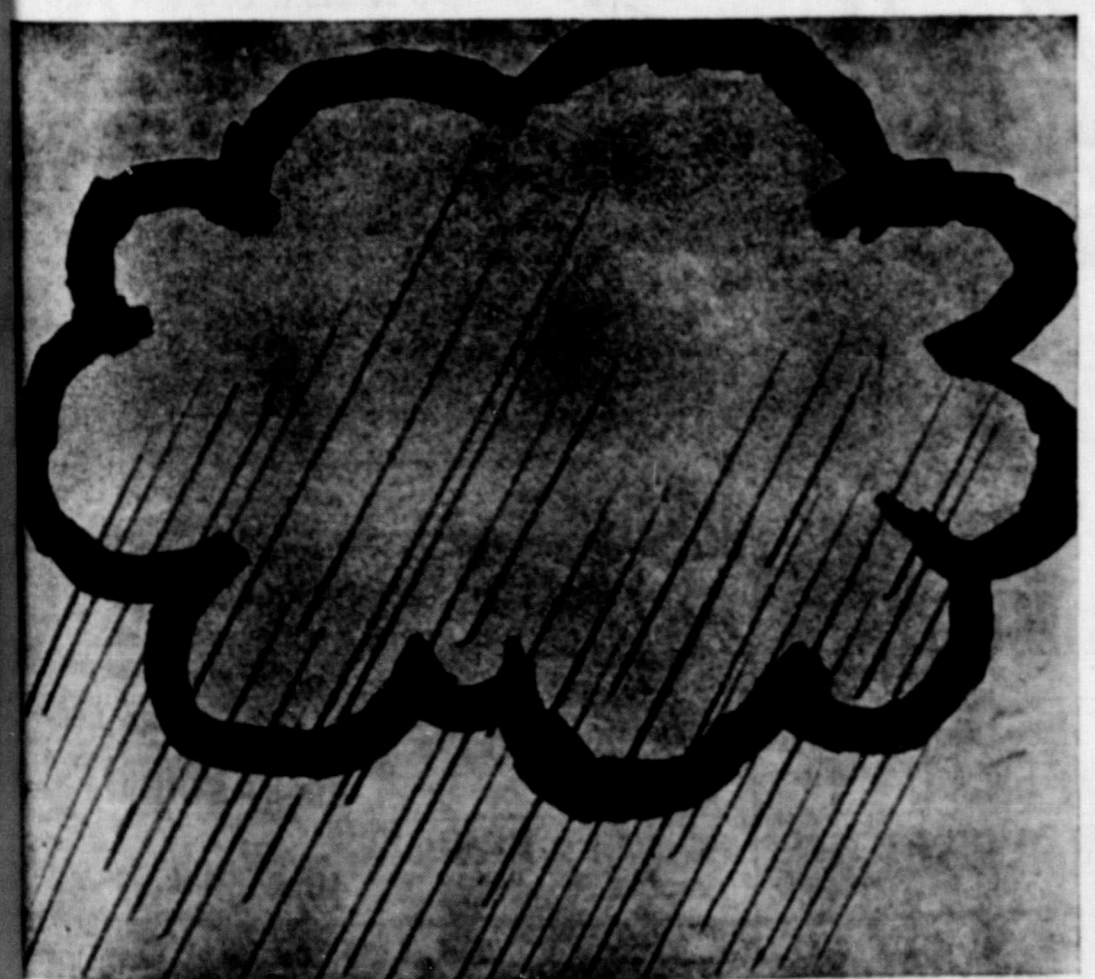

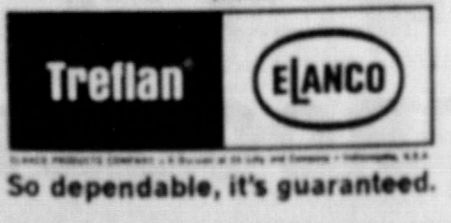

In Letters To Parents—

Lt. Mike Davidson Gives Impression of Vietnam

(Editor's Note: Lt. Mike Davidson, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Davidson of Establine, gives his first-hand impression of Vietnam in two recent letters to his parents. Lt. Davidson, an officer with the U. S. Navy, volunteered for service in Vietnam after serving for the past year and a half on Guam and recently arrived there. The letters follow.)

Hi:
Arrived here 12:30 yesterday and boy is it hot. After collecting my baggage at the airport and changing my money over, I piled aboard an old bus with about 40 other people and made our way through the crowded streets of Saigon to the hotel. The hotel is a place to stay for a couple of days until one gets checked in. I hope to get out of here today or tomorrow at the latest.

I am now listening to my radio and the songs are the same as one would hear in the states.

There are many things that I will be telling you as time goes along but right now am rushed for time.

Oh, I met Butch. He came out to the airport and we visited for about 30 minutes. Also I met Roger Ellis, the man I was to relieve. He left here this morning

early. It always helps to have a long breaking - in period like that, Ha!

Talking to him, it looks like I will have a good job, and it won't be too much to the job. I will let you know how all that works out.

Say hi to everyone and that I will get a letter off to different ones as soon as possible. Especially say hi to Donna Kay and David. I hope my shipment is there by now, including my car in one piece. Thanks ever much for taking it home.

Hi:
I got a couple of minutes off so here goes.

I got out of Saigon after spending a day and a half there which isn't too bad. I caught a small air plane down here to Binh Thuy which took about 35 minutes.

This is my second day here and so far I just love it. I must be the luckiest guy around. Food is really very good considering I'm in the war zone. My room, I am sharing with another GI who will be in today. The size is very small but once again it is excellent considering this being a war zone. My job, when I get broke in, I think I will like very well. My hours will be 8 hours on and

16 off 7 days a week. Right now I am scheduled to go on at 1900 to 0350. The best part of all is that we play volley ball for about 45 minutes during lunch every day.

A couple of things I could use are some blank 3" tapes. There are none here so if you want me to tape for you had better send me some tapes. A so some cookies would seem good. That is the only thing I can think of I need.

So far I haven't received any mail but should one day. Today is Saturday the 12th at 1400 which is Friday the 11 at 11:00.

Must close for now and get to doing things. Say hi to all.

line south to Red River will have a set planting date of from May 15 to May 28. According, their dusting or spray date for the control of fleahoppers and over wintered boll weevils will be from July 5 to July 12.

From data received for the Hall County ASCS office, it is noted that Hall County has a cotton allotment of 89,306 acres. It is thought that at least 80,000 acres of this total allotment will be planted.

The Hall County Insect Control Assn. stated that it is a known fact that the farmers of Hall County plant at least 40,000 plants or more per acre — this is three and a third plants per foot

or 10 plants per yard. These figures show us that there will be a minimum of 3,200,000,000 cotton plants in Hall County this year. By using the time tested factor of one boll per inch to produce a bale per acre we find that if one boll per plant can be saved, that is usually lost to insects, we would produce an extra 22,222 bales of cotton in Hall County, which when priced at a low of 16 cents per pound would increase the farmers income by -1,777,760. in Hall County.
