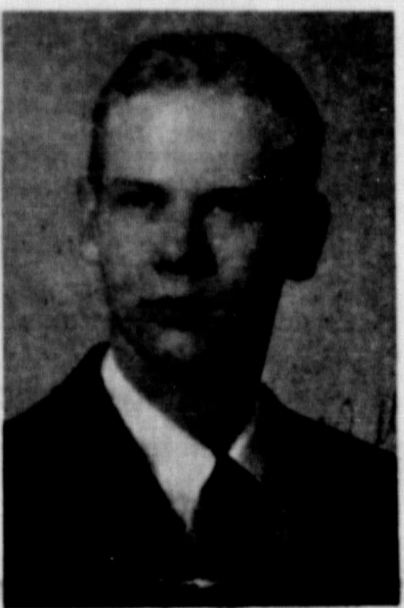

A three-quarter of a million dollar land transaction will turn a big chunk of the old Mill Iron Ranch in Hall and Motley Counties over to 25 Hall County agriculturalists who have formed the Panhandle's first grazing association.

Official ownership of 15,521 acres of land will change from the Leonard Brothers of Fort Worth to the Bridge Bit Grazing Association of which the 25 men are equal stockholders shortly after 9 a. m. tomorrow in the Hall County FHA office here.

Attorney for the Bridge Bit Grazing Assn. John Chamberlain said that all documents have been prepared and are ready for signing and representatives of Leonard Brothers will have the deed with them when they arrive in Memphis.

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The 25 Hall County farmers, all of whom are small farmers, put up \$500 to form the Bridge Bit Grazing Assn. The FHA is handling the financing of the land purchase at the rate of 5 per cent interest on a 40-year loan. The stockholders now must get financing from other lending agencies to stock the grassland with livestock.

Grazing associations were initiated several years ago by the FHA in an effort to give small farmers an opportunity to run larger numbers of livestock by pooling their resources. As a stockholder, each member is eligible to lease grass on a per-head basis from his own organization. The grazing fees go into a single cooperative structure which is wholly-owned by the stockholders.

Stockholders plan to hire a general manager in the near future. (Continued on Page 10)

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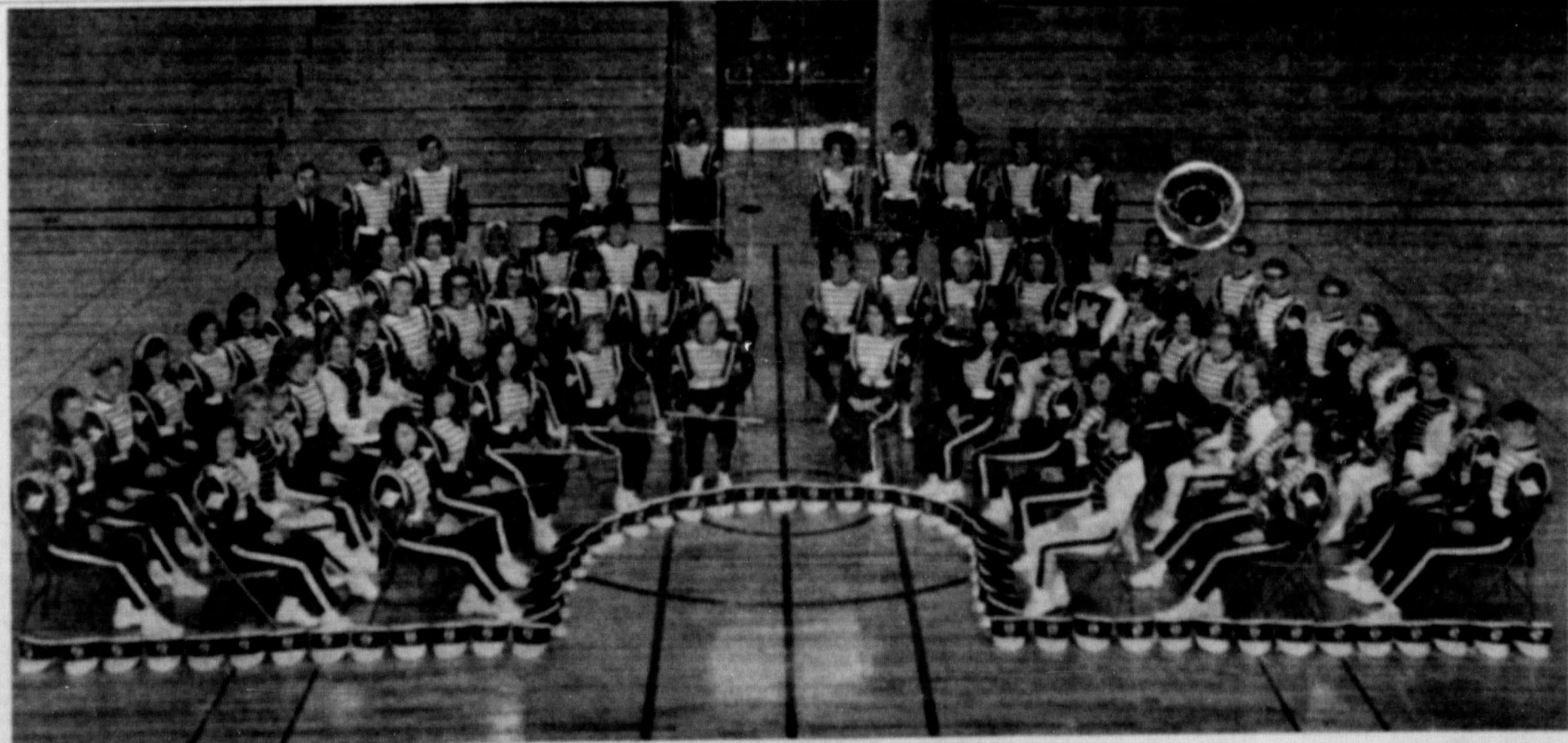

Robert L. Fitzsimmons was born in England in 1863. He made his first ring appearance as an amateur in New Zealand. Fitz won this championship, knocking out four men in one night. In 1881, he knocked out five men in one night!

In 1891, he came to the United States and won the world middleweight title. He won the heavyweight title in 1897, knocking out Jim Corbett. Fitzsimmons later lost his heavyweight title to Jim Jeffries.

After 35 years of ring warfare, he had his last fight in 1914. He was then 52 years of

age! The fight went six rounds, no decision.

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### Citizens Donate \$843.00 To Cancer Society In Annual Drive Held Here

Memphis has shown it is concerned with the disease of cancer and is willing to do something about it, John Deaver, II, chairman of the 1968 Hall County American Cancer Crusade, said this week.

Wednesday, April 15, was designated by proclamation of Mayor Kenneth Dale as Cancer Day in Memphis. Generous publicity had been given the Hall County Unit of the American Cancer Society's Crusade by spots on the local radio, articles and information in the local newspaper, and by placing posters in numerous windows of businesses located in Memphis, Deaver stated.

The city has been divided into 74 two-block neighborhoods with these neighborhood areas being divided among nine area captains whose task it was to recruit and train a volunteer block captain for each of the 74 two-block neighborhood areas. These block captains were to visit each home in their two-block area distributing information about the work of the American Cancer Society, educational material on cancer's seven warning signals and a questionnaire for citizens to fill out and mail in to aid the ACS in evaluating the effectiveness of their publicity program, in addition to taking donations for furthering ACS's programs of education, research and furnishing of patient comfort items.

"The only thing more exciting and gratifying to the board of directors of the Hall County A. C. S. Crusade than the selfless and untiring efforts of the volunteer area captains and block captains who came forth to give of their time was the generous and complete acceptance of the citizens of Memphis when contacted by these workers," Deaver stated.

The results of the neighborhood crusade conducted Tuesday evening are now in and the treasurer of the Hall County Crusade, Ben Parks, reports that \$843.00 has been received thus far. This places Hall County among four counties in the entire State of Texas that have already exceeded their total collections for the year of 1968.

"Only a total effort by all the volunteers involved and the citizens supporting this effort could have produced this result and Memphis is to be congratulated for this," Deaver said.

Treasurer Parks reported that to date \$90.00 had been received in addition to the above amount for the Memorial Fund. This fund is operated so that donations are accepted in memory of persons and the ACS sends a card to the designated members of the family of the person in whose memory the gift is made stating that a gift has been made to such person's memory, and a permanent record of such gifts is kept.

The chairman said the business gifts drive is almost complete at this point, and a report will be made on its results at a later date.

Crusade Chairman Deaver outlined at the first board meeting of the Crusade various methods

by which gifts other than cash can be given to the society, with favorable tax benefits accruing to the donor, in many instances. Some of these were: real estate costing \$35.00 per acre with a fair market value of \$60.00 per acre; stock costing \$10.00 per share with a fair deduction at market value on date of gift of \$50.00 per share can be donated with a deduction of \$50.00 per share. Or stock may be held in trust whereby the donor may give stocks now and use the income during his lifetime, with ownership being transferred to the American Cancer Society after his death.

Chairman Deaver also outlined the possibility of a donative sale of stocks whereby stock purchased three months ago, for instance, for \$10.00 per share has gone up to \$20.00 per share short term. The stock can be sold to the American Cancer Society at your cost of \$10.00 and ACS sells the stock at the same time on the open market for \$20.00 per share. The result is that the ACS gets the \$10.00 per share profit in the form of a gift from you and you deduct that amount without that profit entering into your income stream. In addition you get the principal back.

Also, irrevocable insurance policies given to the American Cancer Society can provide a yearly deduction for the donor and a legacy later to the ACS. The cash value of the policy goes to the ASC if payment should cease.

Chairman Deaver reported to those attending the meeting that many homes were visited by volunteers on April 15 whose occupants were not at home.

Any such person wishing to send their contributions may do so or give them in person to Roy Coleman, Tom Posey or Ben Parks.

"While Hall County is still far below its goal of \$2,000 for this year, real progress is being made toward that goal," the chairman concluded.

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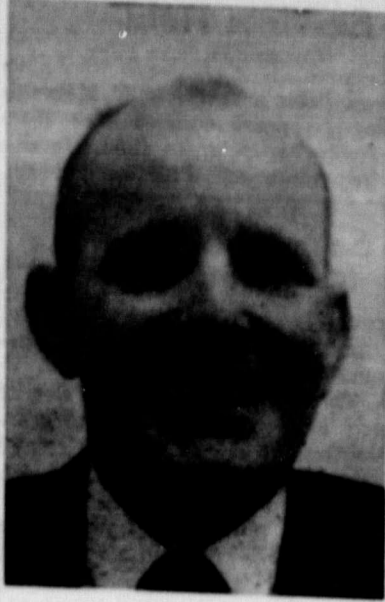

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR6)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in, operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places of (c) religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to

such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such

bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void. Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation;" and "AGAINST the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation." Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows: "Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of the elected members of both houses of the Legislature. (b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund. (c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by such Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature. (d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d and in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the

State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982. (e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by the general credit of the state, and if so secured shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas

Water Development Board to execute contracts or issue revenue bonds when such contracts or bonds are not secured by the general credit of the state. (f) Texas Water Development Bonds and such contracts secured by the general credit of the state shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas. (g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday, August 5, 1969, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment broadening the powers of the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund; eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$3,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board."

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR7)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 64 to read as follows: "Section 64. All other provisions of the Constitution notwithstanding, bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority shall bear such rates of interest as shall be prescribed by the issuing agency, subject to limitations as may be imposed by the legislature."

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to remove the constitutional interest rate limitations, subject to limits imposed by the Legislature, for bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority."

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 50b-1 to read as follows: "Section 50b-1. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, shall have authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in addition to those heretofore authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 50b of the Constitution. The bonds authorized herein shall be executed in such form, upon such terms and be in such denomination as may be prescribed by law and shall bear interest, and be issued in such installments as shall be prescribed by the Board provided that the maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by such bonds may be fixed by law. (b) The moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited to the credit of the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund created by Section 50b of the Constitution and shall otherwise be handled as provided in Section 50b of the

Constitution and the laws enacted pursuant thereto. (c) The said bonds shall be general obligations of the state and shall be payable in the same manner and from the same sources as bonds heretofore authorized pursuant to Section 50b. (d) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution. (e) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment such acts shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The Constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan."

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR4)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-d, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units with authority to make an arrest, or of any city, county, district, or other political subdivision who, because of the hazardous nature of their duties, suffer death in the course of the performance of those official duties. Should the Legislature

enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties."

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJRS)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 5, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended to read as follows: "Section 5. The Legislature shall meet in regular session each year at such time as may be provided by law and at other times as convened by the Governor. When convened in odd-numbered years in regular session, the Legislature shall devote the first thirty days to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of such session the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters then pending; and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as

may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business during this session by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership. "Regular sessions in even-numbered years, commencing in 1972, shall not exceed sixty days and shall be limited to legislation on the subjects of providing funds for the support of functions and activities of the state government and emergency matters submitted by the Governor in messages to the Legislature. At each regular session, commencing in 1971, appropriations shall be made for the support of functions and activities of the state government for the next fiscal year." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual legislative sessions."
