Wansley, who has not lost a tournament this year, will be a strong contender for the title if hemaintains poise and determination, according to Bevers.



### Important Amendments!

Hall County citizens will join with qualified voters throughout the state in a special election on August 5 to determine the fate of nine proposed constitutional amendments. These amendments are being published once each week for four consecutive weeks in May in newspapers throughout this

Citizens should take the time to read these amendments and decide on their merits and demerits for all of them are of importance, some of them are vital, and voters had better start getting informed about them, because they involve public business too important for casual decision-making.

Heading the list is a recommended boost in the welfare ceiling, from \$60 billion to \$80 billion . . . an amendment that is absolutely necessary if the state's aid to needy families, needy blind and needy children is to begin to keep pace with rising costs of living. A similar proposal two years ago was turned down by the voters of Texas, and the squeeze on the welfare program in this state has begun to hurt.

Another one which nobody should oppose would delete some 60,000 words worth of obsolete provisions from the state's constitution . . . a document that is too bulky now and is becoming bulkier with each annual wave of amendments.

Another which may be of vital importance to West Texas is an amendment which would authorize a \$3.5 billion water revenue bond issue for financing the state's share of a \$9 billion statewide water plan. Another proposal which is almost certain to raise a storm among the voters . . . and which probably ought to win approval and is likely not to . . . is an amendment which would raise the salaries of state legislators to the level of district the smaller school districts, and get ready.
