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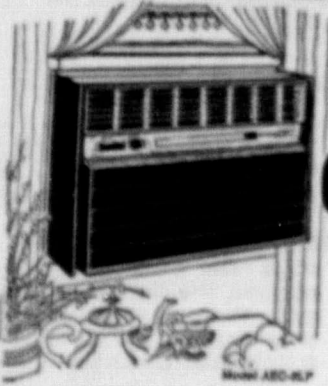

Helicopter Makes Unscheduled Visit To Memphis Sat.

An unexpected visitor, in the form of a 13-place helicopter, landed at Memphis Airport Saturday afternoon. The big craft was piloted by Larry Vineyard, who was en route to Albuquerque, N. M., from Fort Worth.

Vineyard reported that a warning light came on among the instruments. As a precautionary measure he landed here in order to get the instrument checked out. After locating the trouble, a call went out, and a new part arrived here Sunday morning.

After correcting the failure, the helicopter lifted off to continue its journey to Albuquerque.

Known as a Bell 205A, the craft is powered by a gas turbine engine, flies over 100 miles per hour, and can carry a payload of 5,000 pounds. It is the civilian prototype of the Huey D model used extensively in the Vietnam war.

Organic Matter Is Vital As Plant Nutrient

Organic matter is the storehouse of plant nutrients in the soil. It is often referred to as the "Fat of the land". It results from the decomposition of plant and animal materials by soil organisms. On the average it contains about 56 per cent carbon and 5 per cent nitrogen, reports Mike Bogard, of the Soil Conservation Service.

Organic matter improves soil structure and its ability to take in water and hold it in storage for later use by plants. It also improves soil aeration, loosens dense, compact soils and granulates loose, open sandy soils to give them a friable crumb structure.

During the decomposition process, a continuous supply of plant nutrients such as carbon dioxide, nitrogen, and phosphorus is created. It also makes the soil more favorable for vigorous, rapidly developing root systems on young plants.

Continuous cultivation without giving attention to regular additions of residues gradually lowers the organic matter in soil. Most soils in this area need a high residue crop such as sorghums or small grain grown on them at least one year out of two just to maintain a desirable amount of organic matter. The same results can be obtained with the addition of cotton burs. Many members of the Hall County Soil and Water Conservation District have found that a good conservation cropping system is most profitable in the long run.

I did find out in the interview with the Reynolds girls that Grace only weighed 2 1/2 pounds when a baby. So we heard "from little acorns mighty oaks grow."

Fifty-five years ago this month, I graduated from M. H. S. Our good Supt., Mr. Hamilton, suggested our class motto: "We Finish to Begin". I did not quite understand this graduating from

high school, but I understand it better now. I heard Winifred Moore, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Amarillo, preaching to 117 graduates in the church Sunday. He gave statistics that showed 10 per cent of high school graduates threw themselves away in one way or another. Hope we do not have any of that 10 per cent in Memphis High School. In 1907, we moved to Memphis and found that Uncle Sam Alexander was the county clerk, later district clerk and next county judge. This family lived at the west end of Main Street. There were 15 children, seven boys—Sam, John, Dave, Henry, Gordon, Marvin and Joe; eight girls, Nora, Kate, Emma, Allie, Bess, Frances and Tess. Surviving of this family now are two boys, Marvin of California and Gordon of Silverton; five girls, Kate of California, Allie of Eastland, Bess of Wichita Falls and Tess of Eastland. Most of them left Hall County and furnished a lot of Alexanders to other parts of the U. S. A.

We had the pleasure of attending the 50th wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Bland Burson at Amarillo Club May 18 when their sons and wives were hosts for the occasion. Met their many friends from 15 or 20 towns. Mr. and Mrs.

Burson are ranch people and are now living in Channing. Mrs. Burson is the former Frances Alexander. She had a music class in Silverton right after finishing high school here. I don't know whether Bland ever learned to play the piano or sing, but he did talk her into being Mrs. Bland Burson the past 50 years. I accompanied Gladys Denny Power and Willie Mae Thompson Baldwin to the celebration, who were former schoolmates of Frances and all three of them were members of the 1915 basketball team of M. H. S. Styles have changed in basketball uniforms since then, but I think the game is about the same the Bursons have had their ups and downs in life but both look as though they have weathered the storms in good shape. We are disappointed that we did not get to see Allie and Tess there. Allie was planning to come, but fell on the post office steps and suffered a concussion and Tess remained with her in Eastland.

Short visit with Billie Faye Nabors Molloy. Said she had visited with her brother, Slim Nabors, in St. Louis, Mo. Said Slim had

not cancelled his subscription to the Democrat yet. They are both a part of the late Mr. and Mrs. Luther Nabors family, long time residents of Hall County. Billie Faye said Forest Park and Jefferson memorial were still in St. Louis. I remember my first trip to St. Louis in 1905. The trip was made by rail. I picked up the tip money my dad left in the dinner. I thought he had forgotten his change. This was the year after the 1904 World's Fair and they still had all concessions in Forest Park.

I had a brand new hat, the wholesale hat dad gave me, and that night went out to see the sights. Rode the chute and rode on my new hat trying to keep it on my head. In later years going to St. Louis, I remember A. M. Arnold who sold men's clothing, he weighed nearly 300 lbs. He ordered a big steak at the Jefferson Hotel for dinner and when he was almost through with it he called the waiter and ordered another just like he had eaten. He ate all of the second one. I think he must have been on company expense account. It took a lot of

food to carry that man around. Then there was the "galey" theatre around the corner. The show I remember most vividly was "Chicken A La King" at the close of the show a crane came out over the audience with a large roaster on the end of this crane, and out stepped a beautiful young lady with the spot light on her served on a platter. I also re-

member dropping my new watch my dad gave me for graduation on the 10th floor of the hotel in the commode. I thought it was gone, but not so, I still have it and it still runs. Billie Faye is the cause of all the St. Louis stuff. I think there used to be a song, "St. Louis Blues" or "Take me Back to St. Louis".

State Law Is Changed On Public School Dist. Student Transfers

AUSTIN — Texas parents who wish to transfer their children from one public school district to another — without changing their own place of residence — have been given a new route by the State Legislature.

This new plan is outlined in detail by the Texas Education Agency in a letter mailed to school superintendents throughout the state Monday, May 26.

The act, passed by the 61st Legislature and signed by Governor Preston Smith on May 9, repeals transfer methods which have been in effect since 1925 and 1935.

Parents will no longer apply for transfer to the county superintendent. Instead, they will now go directly to the superintendent of the school district they wish their children to enter. The parent or guardian of the child must apply in writing at the receiving school superintendent's office. If the district agrees to receive the non - resident student, the parents or guardian will be notified in writing.

The old June 1 deadline for filing transfer applications will be extended, probably by several weeks, when the State Board of Education meets in Austin June 7, Agency officials explain. The board is also expected to adopt policies for implementing the

new law. Parents who have already applied for transfer to the county superintendents will be notified in writing to contact the receiving school district. If their applications have already been sent to the county office, they will be forwarded to the receiving school district.

Parents who transfer their children into another district may be required to pay tuition if the grades are taught in the home district. If, however, the grades are not taught, the home district pays the tuition.

The fee paid by parents may

not exceed the difference between what it costs the school district to support a student and the state funds received. This amount will be based on the per student costs during the 1968-69 school year. The state per capita funds for each child transferred out of his home district will travel with him. Average daily attendance, if any, recorded in the home district during the previous year will also be transferred.

The new law, which goes into effect immediately, applies to all Texas school children over six and under 21 years of age who are not high school graduates.

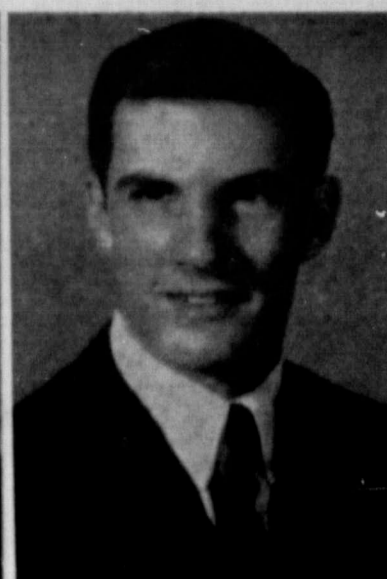

YOUR COUNTY AGENT SAYS

THE PRACTICE OF PESTICIDE SAFETY MAY SAVE A LIFE
Pesticides, improperly used, can be injurious to man, animals and plants. County Agricultural Agent W. B. Hooser offers these suggestions for their safe use.

Purchase a pesticide that is effective for the pest to be controlled. Proper identification of the pest and assessment of the infestation is essential. Follow the label directions and heed all precautions on the label.

Apply pesticides so that they do not endanger humans, livestock, crops, beneficial insects, fish and wildlife. Do not apply pesticides when there is danger of drift, when honey bees or other pollinating insects are visiting plants or in ways that may contaminate water or result in illegal residues.

Avoid prolonged inhalation of pesticide sprays, dusts or vapors; wear protective clothing and equipment if specified on the label.

If your hands become contaminated with a pesticide, do not eat or drink until you have washed. Wash immediately if pesticide is spilled on or otherwise comes in contact with the skin. Remove contaminated clothing and wash thoroughly following each pesticide use. In case a pesticide is swallowed or gets in the eyes, follow the first aid treatment recommended on the label and get prompt medical attention.

Do not clean spray equipment or dump excess spray material near ponds, streams or wells. Because it is difficult to remove all

traces of herbicides from equipment, do not use the same equipment for applying insecticides or fungicides.

Dispose of empty pesticide containers. Have them buried at a sanitary land-filled dump, or crush and bury them in a level, isolated area. Store pesticides in original containers under lock and key — out of the reach of children and animals — and away from food and feed.

YOUTH AND THE LABOR LAWS
Summer is almost here and many farmers and ranchers will be hiring boys and girls to fill in for the critical labor shortage during the summer months. But before employing such youth, certain requirements must be met under the Fair Labor Standard Act as amended in 1966, says County Agent W. B. Hooser.

Employers must abide by the Agriculture and Child Labor Requirements when hiring youth under 16 years of age, other than the owner's or operator's own children.

This law states briefly that youngsters under 16 cannot be hired to operate or ride on tractors (over 20 belt horsepower) or self-unloading wagons or hoist wagons; operate or unclog combines, field balers, hay conditioners, forage harvesters, corn pickers, roughage blowers or crop dryers; operate post-hole diggers or power driven saws; or work inside a gas-tight forage or grain enclosure or in a yard, pen or stall occupied by a dairy bull, boar or stud horse.

These standards do not apply when a youngster under 16 is employed by his parent on a farm owned or operated by such parent, explains Hooser. Also, those youth under 16 who have completed a bonafide cooperative voca-

tional training program are exempt from the provisions of the act.

County agricultural agents can conduct such training programs at the present in order to prepare youngsters between the ages of 14 and 16 for summer employment.

This training mainly involves the safe operation of tractors and farm machinery. Identification cards are issued after successful completion of the training program, and employers should make sure that youngsters have these cards before hiring them. An employer can be fined up to \$10,000 for willful violation of the Labor Act.

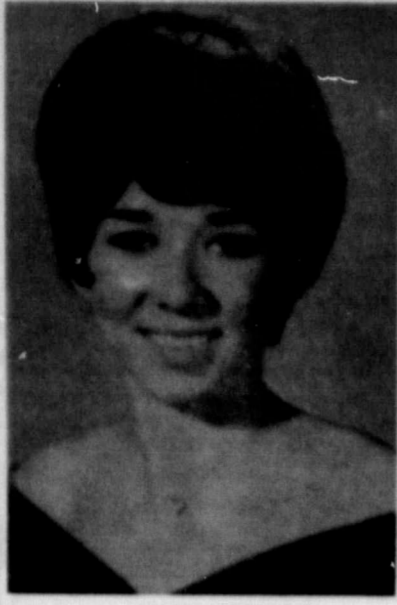

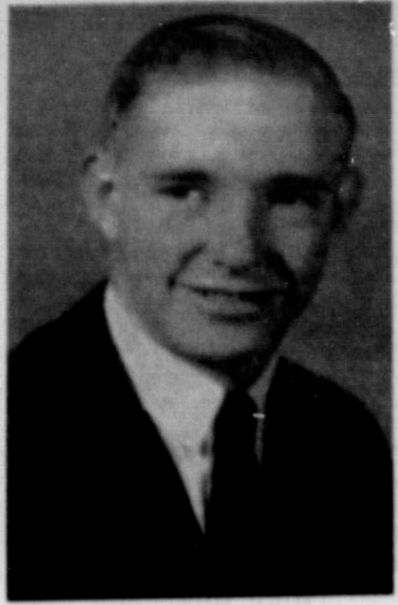

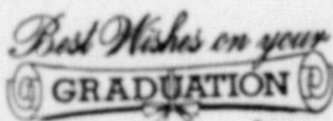

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

"Sometimes social security beneficiaries fail to notify us of events which should be reported so we can stop their checks," Travis C. Briggs, manager of the Amarillo social security office, said today. "These overpayments are always hard to repay once the check has been cashed."

When an applicant files his claim for social security, he is given instructions on events which should be reported. Briggs encouraged all who receive social security to be sure they have their reporting cards, and to send them in to the Amarillo office when they wish to report a change. If you do not have your reporting card, a letter or phone call to the office will get you a new card.

The office should be notified when a beneficiary expects to earn over \$1680 in a year, or stops work.

Other events which should be

reported are:

1. Death of a beneficiary
 2. Leaving the United States.
 3. Marriage or remarriage.
 4. Divorce or annulment.
 5. Adoption of a child beneficiary.
 6. Change of custody of a person who has someone receiving benefits on his behalf.
 7. Return to work of a person receiving disability payments.
- "A number of widows and surviving children of deceased workers in this area may be missing out on social security benefits due them," according to Travis C. Briggs, district manager of the Amarillo Social Security office. "Many changes have been made in recent years concerning benefits

for widows and children. Some are completely disabled and over age 50 can now receive reduced widow's benefits if she becomes disabled within seven years of her husband's death or the time she last had a child entitled to benefits in her care. Also, widows who remarry after age 30 retain a part of the widow's benefits. Neither of these things were true under the old law," Briggs explained.

Anyone knowing someone who might qualify for benefits under these provisions is urged to have them get in touch with their social security district office in Amarillo. The Amarillo office is located at 1066 South Adams, phone number 376-5151, and is open Monday thru Friday from 8:15 a. m. until 4:30 p. m., staying open until 6:30 p. m. on Thursday.

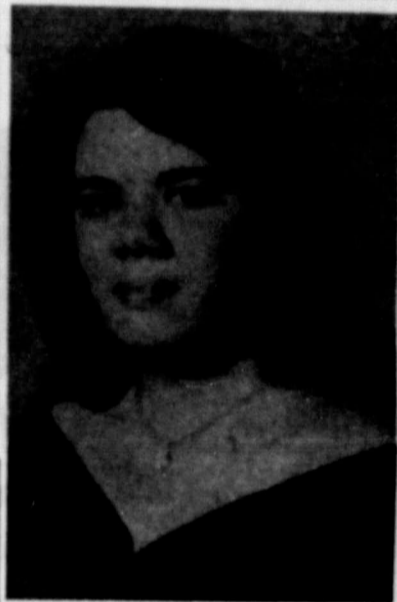

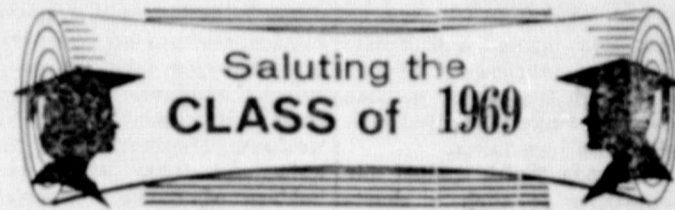

AUSTIN — Senate filibusters against new college bills may take up much of the remaining days of the legislative session due to close June 2.

A proposal to create a medical school at Texas Technological College in Lubbock brought prolonged oratory from Sen. Christie of El Paso who wanted the school in his home town.

Sen. Don Kennard of Ft. Worth warmed up on the Tech bill for an extended effort to delay approval of a University of Texas at Dallas on property of the Southwest Center for Advanced Studies.

Senate State Affairs Committee voted out other bills to set up upper level (junior - senior - graduate studies) colleges at Midland - Odessa, Corpus Christi and Texarkana and an additional University of Texas dental branch.

State Affairs Chairman Sen. William T. Moore of Bryan emphasized he is opposed to all of the bills and intends to make his views known on the floor. Moore postponed action on any of the group over the weekend by leaving town with the bills locked in a vault — and unreported to the senate floor.

Meanwhile, a House - Senate conference committee coached by Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and House Speaker Gus Mutscher plowed slowly through the job of writing a one - year budget bill that will necessitate no new taxes.

Gov. Preston Smith spelled out his opposition to such a short-term approach to state governmental budgeting as more costly in the long run as evidenced by

recent experiences with the one-year plan and emphasized he interprets the Texas constitution to require a biennial appropriations pattern.

By trimming proposed spending and switching some unused surplus in several state funds, a conference committee headed by Sen. A. M. Aikin, Jr., of Paris and Rep. W. S. Heatly of Paducah believes it can provide the teacher pay raise requested by the Texas State Association without new taxes.

Smith feels that the state's dollars simply cannot be stretched that far. Barnes thinks they can cover the basic needs of higher education, state hospitals and special schools and state agencies, and still leave \$61.9 million for the first year of the teacher pay raise.

Smith said there was a movement afoot to kill the \$15,000,000 - a - year general fund allocation to farm - to - market roads. Barnes said the Senate conference would not propose taking that program away.

Governor declined to say he will veto the one - year bill. "Several alternatives will be open to the governor," said Smith. "It would be proper or possible for me to choose one at this time, because I do not know what the circumstances will be."

Legislature Nears Windup
With adjournment deadline closing in, legislators are getting day and night workouts on literally hundreds of bills.

House finally completed action on a watered - down \$1.25 - an - hour minimum wage bill. Amendment sent it back to the Senate. House earlier approved creation of a dental school for San Antonio, new regulation of coin - operated amusement machines, law banning possession of LSD and other hallucinogenic drugs, higher service charges on large real estate loans, a new upper - level college at Laredo, strengthened rules for transporting migrant workers, elimination of the requirement that jurors be freeholders of house - holders and county civil service systems for major counties.

Senate, not so productive due

to filibusters, passed three bills to remove legal obstacles to heart and other organ transplants, agreed to creation of a new medical school in Houston and another in an unnamed city, approved a broadened tuition - aid plan for needy students, and proposed submission of a constitutional amendment to abolish the welfare spending ceiling in 1979 (in event the August 5 vote fails).

Both houses completed action on bills to expand the program of special education for exceptional children between the ages of 3 and 21, make universities out of Stephen F. Austin (Nacogdoches), Southwest Texas (San Marcos), Angelo State (San Angelo), and Sul Ross (Alpine) State Colleges, permit use of Spanish in teaching in the first six grades of public school by repealing the prohibition against use of a foreign language in public classrooms, create a board to license private detectives, set legislative salaries at \$6,500 a year (if the voters approve a constitutional amendment at the special election Aug. 5 to permit the increase from the present \$4,800 a year), allow courts to issue driver licenses to persons who drive for a living but have

lost their licenses for traffic law infractions (to be used on - the - job only and not for private driving), create the University of Texas Clinical Nursing School at San Antonio, make public agencies liable to persons injured by mistakes of public employees while driving motor vehicles or operating motor - driven equipment, and regulate practice of optometry.

Omnibus Courts Bill
Rep. Renal Rosson, chairman of the House Judicial Districts Committee, says Sen. Murray Watson's bill which combines all requests for new courts and court reorganization will get to the floor of the House before adjournment. Says Rosson, "a subcommittee needs to work on the bill, but it will probably be out of committee next week."

Senator Watson's bill will reorganize the 71st, 124th, 33rd, 35th, 38th, Second 38th, 63rd, 119th, 49th and the 79th Judicial Districts and create the 229th, 232nd, 159th, 158th, 240th, 244th, 243rd, 242nd, 241st, 239th, 237th, 238th, 149th, 168th, 230th, 228th, 227th, 226th, 225th, 194th, 181st and the 192nd Judicial Districts. It also creates or reorganizes the

168th District Court, the 237th District Court and the Court of Domestic Relations for Midland County.

Horses Run Slowly
Rep. Glenn Kothmann of San Antonio did not even come close in his effort to submit to the voters a proposal - option horse race betting.

And the funeral oration of the Kothmann resolution was preached by Rep. David Allred of Wichita Falls. Thirty - three years ago his father, Gov. James V. Allred, kept calling the Legislature into special session until horse race betting was repealed. So this week's fight by Representative Allred was a rerun of his-

Courts Speak
Finding no reversible error in the Court of Civil Appeals, State Supreme Court upheld the annexation by Pasadena of 576 acres on the Houston ship channel. Annexed farm land of Houston Endowment Inc. is surrounded by unannexed oil company holdings and the foundation contended unequal taxation would result.
High court stuck with its decision unholding forfeiture of 5,000 acres of sulphur leases by Cobra Oil and Gas Corporation in Culberson, Pecos and Reeves counties.
A Lubbock prosecutor argued for Supreme Court reversal of

the decision that juveniles charged with offenses have the right as adults to be proven guilty "beyond a reasonable doubt."
Leases Bring \$3.5 Million
Land Commissioner Jerry Miller reports bids of more than \$3 million were received from several leases on far West Texas lands of University of Texas. Total brought the University to \$528, 049,139.
Following University lease sale, an additional tract of 30,972 acres in Cotton Etsate in Hudspeth and Culberson counties was offered at auction. No bids were received on it.

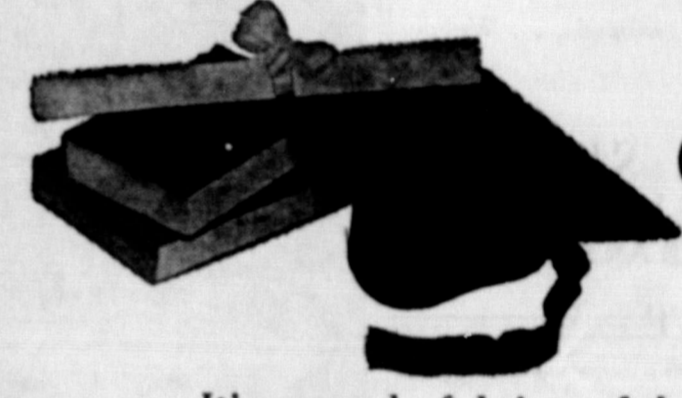

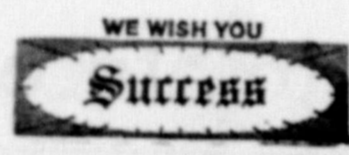

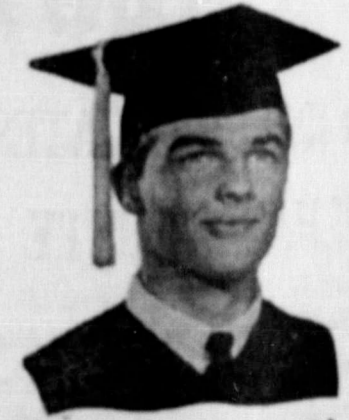
