
Request Should Be Made Now For Planting Crops Destroyed By Hail

Cotton or grain sorghum destroyed by natural causes after final planting date may be planted to other crops provided the producer files a written request and obtains county committee approval before planting to another crop.

This statement was issued today by Lynn L. McKown, Hall County ASCS office manager, following hail damage suffered Tuesday night in the northwestern part of the county.

The producer is required to pay a small fee to have the land inspected. The required replanting dates are June 10 for cotton and July 1 for grain sorghum.

All farmers with crops destroyed by hail should discuss their problems with the county office or their county ASC committeeman before devoting destroyed acreage to any other use as each farm may have a different problem in complying with the programs, McKown pointed out.

American Legion Supports ROTC!

We were recently handed a copy of the resolution passed by unanimous vote of the 4th Division, American Legion, in convention assembly in San Angelo, May 18 in support of Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC).

The resolution, we feel, has a truly patriotic message and one our readers should take heed to because of future significance should the Students for a Democratic Society aims to be successful in disrupting ROTC training on the campuses of our nation's colleges and universities.

The resolution states that The American Legion has supported and promoted R. O. T. C. in High School and College curriculum and that the American Legion requests the State Legislature and the Congress of the United States to withhold all State and Federal funds from any tax supported College or University that favors any request of the Students for a Democratic Society and their Associates.

The Resolution reads, "Whereas; the SDS (Students for a Democratic Society) are disrupting tax supported Colleges and Universities with demands to eliminate the R. O. T. C. program, and Whereas; The SDS has been cited by J. Edgar Hoover as Communistic controlled and subversive . . . Now, Therefore Be It Resolved; That The American Legion seek public support for the R. O. T. C. program.

This resolution will be presented to the Department Convention at San Antonio, July 18-19-20.

The reason the SDS is so interested in disrupting the ROTC program in our colleges and universities is because much of the strength of our Armed Forces comes from our colleges and universities in the form of ROTC officers.

Few military forces in the world are led by officers all of whom have college degrees or their equivalent. Also, the United States of America is never found wanting for high caliber junior or senior grade officers in the Army, Navy, or Air Force.

If outside forces are to "bury" the people of the United States, as has been predicted by the Communist Bloc, then our colleges and universities must be disrupted, our moral fiber must be destroyed, and our national pride and ideas must be changed into disgust and disillusionment.

With this in mind, it is obvious that the Students for a Democratic Society has as its primary goal the tearing down of the higher education system in this nation. The American Legion, one of the nation's leading patriotic organizations, is directly opposing actions taken by SDS as being subversive.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Foxhall and was sponsored to Girls State by the local American Legion Auxiliary Unit No. 175.

Girls State was organized as a national Americanism activity in 1937 by the American Legion Auxiliary. Non-partisan and nonpolitical, the purpose of the Girls State program is to provide citizenship training for girls of hifh school age, to afford them an opportunity to live together as a selfgoverning group and to inform them of the duties, privileges, rights, and responsibilities which they will assume when they become adults. They learn the problems of government by performing the same duties as office holders. Citizens are selected at local levels principally on a basis of character and leadership from students who have just completed their junior year in high school each year.

The 1969 session of the American Legion Auxiliary Bluebonnet Girls State has grown from an experimental conference of 94 girls, held at Baylor University in 1941, to become the largest single extracurricular educational program for high school girls in Texas. This year, 430 girls are in attendance, plus two from Mexico City, making a total of more than 8,400 girls in Texas who have participated in this toplevel citizenship program.

posed receiving district on or before June 1 immediately preceding the school year for which such transfer is requested. (The filing date for the 1969-70 school year only shall be July 15, 1969). The proposed receiving district agrees to accept the transfer.

State per capita payments and average daily attendance for the prior school year, if earned in other than the current receiving district, shall transfer with the child, the policy reads.

The policy also states the receiving district may charge a tuition fee not to exceed the difference between the district's actual expenditure per student in average daily attendance for the preceding school year, as determined by its board of trustees, and State aid received for that vear.

However, such tuition fee shall school year unless properly set out on the transfer application having lawful control of such child and the receiving district.

The adult making the transfer request is repsonsible for the tuition fee on a transferred scholastic whose grade is taught in the resident district, the policy states. time or 259-2466 at night.
