Cody, 39, was a former resident of Muleshoe. He was found Saturday, April 26, dead of stab wounds in his Lubbock apartment.



Sesquicentennial U.S.S. Saratoga Deployment Wagon Train Arrives May 12

It's getting closer and closer, and next week, the Texas Sesquicentennial Wagon Train will be at Springlake, which will be as near Muleshoe as it will be traveling.

The Wagon Train will pull into Springlake on Monday, May 12, and for all the next day will be on the Springlake Co-op Gin yard. On Monday night, May 12, members of the Wagon Train will be fed by area towns, including Muleshoe, and the public is invited to attend the Chili w/Beans supper. Serving begins at 5 p.m.

Heading up the cooking will be Tuffy Dent of Muleshoe, and tickets for the general public to attend the supper will be \$3.50 for adults and \$2 for children.

Preparing and serving the meal will be representatives from Earth, Springlake, Muleshoe, Olton and Plainview, who comprise the Highway 70 Texas Sesquicentennial Committee.

On Tuesday, May 13, there will be an all day arts and crafts fair at the Springlake Community Center and the Wagon Train will be trekking north on Highway 385 the following morning, May 14.

On Sunday, May 11, on an overnight stop in Littlefield, special activities are planned in the football stadium. Special music and entertainment is planned, headed up by The Anchor Brothers Band of Sudan. Almost all churches in the entire county will be dismissed for the night, with members encouraged to attend the activities in the Littlefield High School football stadium.

A Lamb County minister will be riding into the stadium on a mule, and will speak for approximately five minutes before an evening of music and entertainment gets underway, to be headlined by The Anchor Brothers.

Jimmy Johnson Contest Winner

Jimmy Johnson, a student at Watson Junior High School, will be representing Bailey County in the "Hands Around Texas Sesquicentennial Showcase" with his art. His entry in the competition was chosen by a panel of judges from among all other entries in his county.

Also, Jimmy will be among the other student artists from across Texas, who will be recognized Sunday during a reception in Bastrop, commemorating his selection to be represented in the display. The art display officially opened on Saturday, May 3, at the Hands Around the World Children's Museum in Bastrop, at the international headquarters for Hands Around The World.

In commemoration of a special year, subjects documenting the county history of Texas are being exhibited in a special sesquicentennial student art exhibition.

"Hands Around Texas" includes one picture from each Texas county - 254 works selected after more than two years of solicitation and competition by Hands Around the World International.

Jimmy Johnson chose as his entry, a painting of the Janes Ranch House, which was recently moved from its former rural location into Muleshoe to the Muleshoe Heritage Center. Constructed in 1909, the three story house is one of the oldest structures in the county.

Elmer DePalma, 2nd Class Petty Officer in the U.S. Navy, stationed aboard the U.S.S. Saratoga, which was involved in the 'Line of Death' incident with Libya recently, spoke to the Civics and Economics classes of Mrs. Jean Allison, at Muleshoe High School, on Tuesday.

These senior students, at MHS, exhibited much interest in hearing what DePalma had to say about the bombing, as they said they have been keeping up with this very closely.

Petty Officer DePalma showed videos of the U.S.S. Saratoga, where he is a member of the HS-3 Trident Helicopter Squadron, a search and rescue group which flies continuously when planes are flying, in order to pick up any members from downed aircraft.

F-14 Tomcat airplanes were launched off the Saratoga during the Libyan incident, and Petty Officer DePalma showed the students pictures of these planes being launched from the carrier. He said during the attack he was both scared and excited.

He also showed pictures of Soviet planes, which at times, flew very close to the Saratoga. However, no Soviet ships appeared when the Libyan attack started, although several had

Spring Round-Up Scheduled Friday

On Friday, May 9, Dillman Elementary will pre-register students who are eligible for kindergarten or pre-kindergarten for the 1986-87 school year, according to Principal Barbara Finney. Registration will be held in the Dillman gym.

Mrs. Finney said that to be eligible for pre-kindergarten, children must be five years old by September 1, 1986 and must also meet one of the following requirements: (1) have limited knowledge of and comprehension of the English language, or (2) are from a family who is eligible to receive free or reduced price lunches.

Pre-kindergarten classes will operate on a half-day basis only, with classes being from 8-11 a.m. or from 12:15-3:15 p.m. Kindergarten will operate on a full day basis, she added.

Parents are asked to bring the child's birth certificate and immunization records when enrolling. All children who enroll for kindergarten or pre-kindergarten on May 9 will also be screened for speech and language that day, so parents are urged to bring your child with you.

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Kids Of Working Mothers Can Eat Nutritiously

The notion that children of women who work outside the home subsist on convenience foods and snacks is probably a myth.

According to a survey study published recently in the *Journal of the American Dietetic Association*, working mothers feed their families seven percent salads and 8 percent more eggs than mothers who do not work outside the home.

The study showed that working parents' children under age 12 eat more vegetable dishes, more bacon, more unsweetened cereals, and less candy, pizza and salty snacks.

"This study does not measure whose diet is actually healthier," says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist Dr. Alice Hunt.

She points out that it also does not include meals eaten away from home, and families with working mothers eat 10 percent more of their meals in restaurants and fast food outlets than families with full-time homemakers.

"The children in any family can get balanced meals if parents will make sure they are getting meat, poultry or other protein foods, dairy products, grains and cereals, fruits and

vegetables each day," says Hunt. "In addition, parents should limit the amount of extra fat and sugar their children consume."

The key difference in the nutritional value of children's diets may depend more on what parents know about nutrition than whether the mother works outside the home or not, she adds.







Stress in a child may be hard to recognize because it often takes the form of misbehavior. But you should be aware that a family's financial problems, like other stresses, will affect children, too. However, child development experts tell us there are several ways to support a child who is stressed.

Listening is the first suggestion. Children's concerns are real to them. It may not seem to you that what they are describing is important or worth worrying about, but it is to them. Children may have exaggerated fears that the loss of your job, a drop in farm income, or some other family financial problem will mean they won't have anything to eat or they'll have to move right away.

Reassuring the child and sharing what positive steps the family is taking to deal with the problem can help reduce such fears. Letting the children help by making from-scratch cookies, clip coupons, save aluminum cans, or other money saving jobs, will let them feel both helpful and important.

Allowing children to express their feelings is also an important way to help them deal with stress and to let them know it's "ok" to worry. Adults can comfort children by telling them in words or with a hug, that you appreciate their concern and that they don't have to bear their burdens all alone.

Sometimes it helps to read a story or tell a story about a child in similar circumstances. This can also convey the sense that the child is not the only one who feels bad.

It's also important to provide many opportunities for children to exercise vigorously, to play creatively, to work constructively, to feel needed, and to rest soundly.

A final suggestion is to maintain basic limit setting. This sends a message to the child that you are interested enough to care what he or she does and that is crucial to the child's sense of security.

CRP Acres Sought With New Bidding

The bidding process for the Conservation Reserve Program that was initiated at the first of the year will be reopened for the period of May 5-23. At the same time, the initial bidding process for the 1987 program will start.

This will allow producers whose bids were not previously accepted to revise them or to submit new bids this year and also to submit bids for 1987, points out Spencer Tanksley, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Producers interested in submitting bids for either of the program years should contact their county ASCS and SCS offices to initiate the sign-up procedure, says Tanksley.

The 1986 sign-up held in March fell far short of the acreage expected to be accepted into the program, notes Tanksley. Nationally, about 838,000 acres of highly erodible cropland on 10,307 farms were entered into the CRP, with accepted bids ranging from \$5

to \$90 per acre. Texas did not fare as well as the rest of the country, with only 29,052 acres on 151 farms accepted into the CRP.

USDA had hoped to put some five million acres into the program in 1986, with about 825,000 of those in Texas. Over five years, the USDA has targeted some 45 million acres for the program, with 11.5 million of those in Texas.

Landowners considering the upcoming sign-up period will need to remember that the CRP calls for a 10-year contract and establishment of permanent cover (grass or trees) to protect land from wind and water erosion, explains Tanksley. Costs involved in establishing this cover will be shared 50-50 with the government.

Bids on the cropland to be taken out of production should be based on what that land would produce if it remained under cultivation, says Tanksley. A special worksheet is available at the county Extension office to help a producer determine a bid price.

Tanksley reminds producers that annual rental payments on the land will be limited to \$50,000 per farmer and will be in addition to annual commodity program payments.

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

Chief Petty Officer DePalma said he fully agrees with the U.S. Action taken against Libya, and expressing regrets that a child (Khadafy's adopted child) was killed, commented, "It's better his child than mine." He is the father of a four and a half month old daughter born during his eight months at sea.

DePalma explained that two Libyan missiles had been launched after Khadafy ordered the U.S. to stay out of waters, recognized as 'international waters', and drew what became known as the 'Line of Death'.

According to the Naval officer, no U.S. target was hit by the missiles, but it was determined to go in and blow up the missile sites. He said most of the Soviets, who had apparently provided the missile

MSB Display All Historical Texas Flags

History of the Republic of Texas will be on display at the Muleshoe State Bank during the week of May 5-10. The bank will commemorate the Texas Sesquicentennial with an exhibition of replicas of eleven historic flags representing Texas as it went from independent country to 28th state.

"These flags chronicle the battles of independence and the political establishment of the republic," said Jackie Scoggin.

The flags are limited edition museum replicas containing the historic emblems of Texas. Only one of the original flags from which the replicas are made has been preserved, explained Mrs. Scoggin, who said the rest were destroyed in battles or have been lost. The flags on display were replicated from eyewitness accounts written by men and women in Texas 150 years ago.

Each flag is entirely hand-made from silks and cottons that match the fabrics used 150 years ago and show the years of wear, burns, stains and frayed edges.

"These historic Texas flags represent the most important moments in our state's early days," Mrs. Scoggin added. "Some date from the fight for independence from Mexico in 1835 and 1836.

"Others are from the time of the Republic of Texas, a time unique in American history, since no other state was ever an independent and sovereign country."

"Skill-Bingo" by Mail Is Illegal in Texas

You may have recently been offered a chance to win a new Cadillac simply by playing a so-called "Skill-Bingo" game through the mail. It's easy and the official entry blank only requires that you send in one dollar in order to play. But if you read the fine print, you learn that there are several "playoffs" after the initial entry. What you don't learn is that you could spend at least \$75 getting to the final game—and that the final game is so difficult that the vast majority of entries are wrong.

The California company mailing out this promotion claims that it is not illegal. While that may be true under California law, it is not true under Texas law. Whenever you are asked to pay money to enter a contest, you should be suspicious.

WHAT THE LAW SAYS

Under our state's penal code, a bet is an agreement that a person will win or lose something of value, dependent on chance, *even though accompanied by some skill*. When you send in any amount of money along with your entry, you are betting that you will win the game. In addition, our state law defines a lottery as "any scheme or procedure whereby one or more prizes are distributed by chance among persons who have paid or promised consideration for a chance to win anything of value, whether such scheme or procedure is called a pool, lottery, raffle, gift, enterprise, sale, policy game, or some other name."

WHEN BINGO IS LEGAL

Any lottery is illegal, even if conducted for charitable purposes. On the other hand, regular bingo games may be legal if conducted for charitable purposes and in accordance with the Bingo Enabling Act, Article 179d, V.A.T.S. This lengthy and complex law allows bingo to be played for money on a limited basis by organizations registered to do so with the Comptroller of Public Accounts. It is not illegal to play bingo at home for amusement if entry fees and prizes are "nominal" and there are no more than 15 players. Nursing home and retirement home residents may also play bingo for fun if fees and prizes are nominal. If you wish to set up a charity bingo game, you should contact a lawyer in your area.

IT'S A BAD BET, ANYWAY

If you have spent money on a mail bingo game or other type of lottery, your chances of winning are extremely small. However, your chances of receiving more entry blanks in the mail are great. Next time you get one of these entry blanks, and the accompanying letter requests you send in money, the best place to file that entry blank is with the trash.

Dear editor:

The other day Congress, whose members make, who are paid, \$75,000 a year plus a lot of other things like free airplane trips, free telephones, free mail, free office rent, etc. voted to increase the amount they can get from making speeches and writing articles from \$22,000 to \$30,000 a year. Under the law, a Congressman can't be paid more than \$2,000 per speech or article.

I don't understand this. I've heard Congressman talking on television and I've never heard one of them deliver a speech I figured was worth \$2,000. Every voter in the country gets letters from Congressmen several times a year and I'd like to hear from just one citizen who figured what a Congressman wrote was worth \$2,000.

Of course when you turn the rock over you discover the people who pay \$2,000 for a speech are paying it to a Congressman whose vote they need on special legislation. If a bankers' association pays a member of the Congressional Banking Committee \$2,000 for a speech at its national convention, it doesn't expect to get any new ideas from him on banking. In fact, he could be overdrawn for all they care. They just want him to vote right, like a defense lawyer wants a jury to vote right.

The way Congress voted to increase its speech-making and article-writing allowance was masterful. With few members present, a bill was introduced raising the limit from \$22,000 to \$30,000. Under a special rule, the Speaker simply announced: "Unless there is opposition, the

bill is passed." No recorded vote needed.

This is like announcing to 6-year-olds at a birthday party: "Unless some of you object, everybody can have a second helping of ice cream."

Unfortunately, for columnists, when Congress' voting chicanery was brought to light, members quickly reversed themselves and agreed to get along on just one helping of ice cream.

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
