

Register Your Vehicles Now!

The deadline is past to order 1970 Texas motor vehicle registration plates by mail, but there still is time for motorists to register without a lot of bother if they will follow simple instructions.

The three-part computerized form which all Texas vehicle owners received after Jan. 1, 1970, will still save you time if you will take it to your county tax collector's office. There's still no guarantee there won't be long lines facing those who wait until the last few days before midnight, April I, deadline. Every year, thousands of motorists put off registering their vehicles until the last minute.

Each year, the final days of the registration season find tax' collectors' offices jammed with procrastinating drivers.

Don't throw away your registration application; don't write on it or mar it. If the address is incorrect, you should show your correct residence address in accordance with instructions on the form. Don't separate the three parts of the form; just take it to the county tax office.

If you are unfortunate enough to have lost the registration form or didn't get one in the first place, take your last year's motor vehicle registration receipt and your car title as you

have in past years. Speaking of cars, this editor was reading the March 1970 message sent out by John Edgar Hoover, Director of F. B. I., concerning the sizable increase in auto theft in 1969 over 1968.

If all the 777,800 vehicles stolen in 1968 were not recovered, that would be an insurance loss of \$777,800,000. Add to this the cost of auto accessories, stereo equipment, radios, wheel discs, rear view mirrors, wheels, batteries and other equipment, and the loss could run well over a billion dollars.

Many stolen cars are disassembled, shipped out of the country as junk parts, reassembled in other countries and sold at handsome profits. Others are transported out of state and disguised, never to be returned to their rightful owners. Many will buy almost anything, and a taken by youngsters are wrecked or heavily damaged.
