Citizens of the area, especially those in the Estelline and Parnell areas, are invited to an open house showing of a Specific Pathogen Free hog farm as guests of Crump and Billy Ferrel from 1 to 5 p. m. Sunday, March 21.

To get to the newly constructed S.P.F. structures, the Ferrels advise turning south off of the Turkey - Estelline Hwy. at Parnell, then turn west for one mile at the old Parnell School house, turn back south at the next road intersection to the terrace road. The terrace road goes to the newly constructed buildings.

The Ferrels' new S.P.F. operation is sitting out in the middle of a field. The reason, according to Billy Ferrel, is to allow for privacy and to separate the swine herd from contact with other animals, human as well as domestic.

The operation is a farrow to finish one in which the young pigs never touch the ground until they are shipped to the market place.

After Sunday's open house, the buildings will be given a thorough cleaning and disinfected before the first group of sows move in to give birth to their first litters.

The Ferrels have litters on the way and Billy expressed concern that some of the sows may not wait until after open house. Those that do will have brand new, temperature controlled facilities in which to raise their young.

The purpose of the S.P.F. buildings is to combat the danger of disease which could wipe out the entire operation. The farrow pens will be home for the piglets until they are about 60 pounds. Then they will be moved to another building to be fed out, making another move at about 110 pounds into bigger pens. At 200 to 225 lbs. the pigs will go to market.

The Ferrels are not new to the hog business. They operated a 2,000 head feeding operation, which they closed to construct the S.P.F. operation. Billy Ferrel said they are planning to have a 2,000 a year pig production in the continuous farrowing operation they have constructed.

To keep a disease free environment, herdsmen will wear special clothing at all times. Visitors will have to wear special covering in order to see the animals after the operation begins.

## EDITORIAL

### Are Views Changing on the Crime Problem?

The Federal Bureau of Investigation released the 1969 figures on serious crime problem in the United States this week and the figures reveal an increase of 11 per cent when compared with 1968's figures.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover said all crime index offenses registered increases in volume. Crimes of violence were up 11 per cent, led by forcible rape up 16 per cent, robbery 13 per cent, aggravated assault 9 per cent, and murder 7 per cent. The crimes against property rose 11 per cent as a group. Individually, larceny \$50 and over in value rose 21 per cent, auto theft 12 per cent, and burglary was up 5 per cent.

Large core cities 250,000 and above in population noted an overall increase of 9 per cent in volume. The suburban areas recorded an increase of 13 per cent, while the rural areas were up 11 per cent.

Police arrests for criminal acts in 1969 rose 7 per cent for serious crimes (excluding traffic offenses). Arrests of adults rose 6 per cent, while arrests of juveniles continued to climb in 1969 with an 11 per cent rise.

Many people are vitally concerned with the continuing increase in serious crimes in our nation. The need for more policemen to apprehend the law breakers is growing. Then the need develops for more courts to try the cases, and more jail cells to house the convicted criminals.

Apparently some views are changing in our country. A newspaper columnist, Sidney J. Harris, expresses an interesting idea that the easiest way to make our "war against crime" twice as effective and half as expensive is to narrow our definition of crime.

He would go along with those folks that say our definition of crime is too broad, that by talking certain offenses out of the criminal category, law enforcement officers would have more time to work on others.

This point of view would limit crime to those acts which violate somebody's person or property. These include murder, rape, burglary, robbery and the like.

But he would do away with "Crimes" of gambling, prostitution, drug addiction, abortion and sexually deviant behavior. This columnist says that 90 per cent of the corruption of public officials comes from the error of trying to legislate morality.

He says gambling is a human problem, and so is prostitution. Drug addiction is a personal and medical problem. Abortion is a matter of private decision. Sex acts between persons is private business. These are the opinions of Columnist Harris and are held by many in our nation today.

Most of our criminal laws were written into the books many years ago, by a generation of God fearing, law abiding men. They have been adjudged constitutional under the precepts of our constitution. Modern man seems to want to select only those laws he likes and reject other laws which he dislikes.

The United States of America may someday not be considered the Christian Nation it once was. Making immorality legal just doesn't seem to us to be the answer in combating crime. One who gambles excessively and refuses to pay his debts many times turns to burglary to get out of the mess. One who is on drug addiction will kill and steal to acquire the drugs for his habit. A prostitution ring often turns to the profitable blackmail scheme.

Maybe you can't legislate morality, but you can't cure crime by making criminal acts legal, either.

### Let's vote at 18 in 1971

The U. S. Senate's decision by a vote of 64 to 17 to lower the voting age to 18 next year indicates the nation finally may be ready to do something about the fact that millions of Americans have been unfairly excluded from the political process.

The chief argument in the Senate against lowering the voting age to 18 by an act of Congress was that it might be unconstitutional.

But the Constitution does not explicitly speak to the matter one way or another. This would seem to mean that Congress is free to act.

If there is any question about lowering the voting age by act of Congress rather than by constitutional amendment, the lower voting age proposed by the Senate would not take effect until Jan. 1, 1971, allowing plenty of time for a Supreme Court ruling.

Highly significant was the fact that Senate debate ignored almost entirely the cutworn argument that persons 18-to-21 are too young to be trusted with the responsibilities of citizenship.

As the situation stands, more than 10 million Americans between the ages of 18 and 21 — some of our brightest and most concerned citizens — are denied the right to vote in local, state and national elections.

Waiting for the states to lower the voting age (only four have done so) would be an admission that the nation simply doesn't care enough to correct an obvious injustice.

Unfortunately, the Senate bill has a long way to go before it becomes law.

The vote-at-18 proposal was attached as a rider to the bill extending the protection of Negro voting rights in the South.

This means the youth issue could become entwined with the race issue when the differences between the Senate bill and a bill passed by the House of Representatives last year are worked out.

Another obstacle is the opposition of the Nixon administration to a lowering of the voting age without constitutional amendment.

But if the Senate action is any measure of the new mood in Congress, there is good reason to believe that voting at 18 is an idea whose time has finally come.

### A Steak May Not Be A Steak At All

Lafayette, Ind. — An official of a major packing company said today that through future fabrication techniques "all muscles of an animal's body can be put into the form having optimum tenderness, flavor and lean, muscle-high protein content."

John Murphy, vice president of Swift & Co., Chicago, told Indiana cattlemen meeting at Purdue University's Farm Science Days, that "essentially, we will be producing . . . from one animal all steaks."

"Depending on the trade demand, from this animal's counterpart we will process all roasts," Murphy added. "There may be some grade of animal that will then produce all of our chopped and ground meats."

"... if we get extremely sophisticated," he continued, "other protein sources, such as those from the soybean, can be formulated into the ground meat or, more particularly, the frankfurter and processed meat products of the future."

Murphy said that in the future meats will "have months of refrigerated shelf life instead of weeks," adding:

"Perhaps we may solve the ultimate so that fresh meats in the future may be held at room temperature for indefinite periods of time."

Many food packages in the future, he continued, will be of the plug-in type to act as freezers, refrigerators or cookers "are just around the corner," Murphy declared.

"Proteins that will dissolve under cooking temperatures and become part of the gravy are being worked on now," he said. "...we may even offer a choice of flavored boxes, wrappers or bottles to complement or spice up the rest of the meal."

### On advertising

Every advertiser in the local community serves the whole community as well as himself.

Any advertising which draws a shopper to a center of trade is likely to help many businesses other than the advertiser.

It has been noted by a Chamber of Commerce report that a limited number of advertisers in most small cities carry more than their share of the load in maintaining local business activity.

Some types of firms, on the other hand, which could help most to keep business in the local community do only a limited amount of advertising. Among those cited were restaurants, recreational service, hardware stores, variety stores and repair services.

The local restaurant, for instance, is in real competition with well publicized eating places within a radius of 100 miles. The public which travels to a distant community to eat out usually carries extra money which may be spent on anything from gifts to expensive clothing.

The same is true when traveling is for recreation, or the purchase of hard goods and special services.

In short, the best way to keep a trade center active is for all types of retailers to help in keeping the public informed on the variety of goods and services available through everyone's shopping guide — the local newspaper. — Sikeston (Mo.) Standard.

### 30 YEARS AGO March 22, 1940

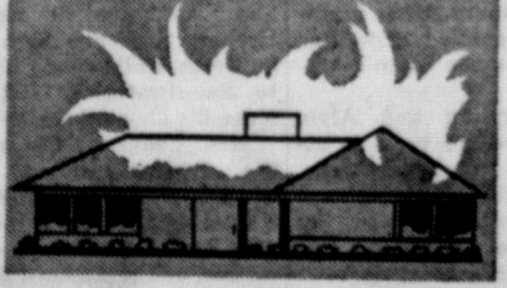

### Governor Urges 'Drive Friendly' For Traffic Safety

Governor Preston Smith is continuing an all out effort on traffic safety with use of "Drive Friendly" to make an impact on Texas drivers. "Drive Friendly" was officially introduced by the Governor last week in Austin.

This program has but one objective — to keep Texans from killing and maiming themselves and each other at a rate which staggers the imagination," he continued.

"1968 witnessed an all time high of over 3,500 dead citizens, 250,000 injured at a cost approaching one billion dollars. The most distressing part of this is the tragedy and heartbreak which resulted, but an equally disturbing aspect of this record is the fact that nearly half of these cases

involved a drinking driver. "I am convinced Texas citizens can do something about this, because I have utmost faith in the people of this State. So, I am appealing to every motorist to follow what 'Drive Friendly' means." "Drive Friendly" means: Operating your vehicle as a responsible citizen. Obeying all traffic laws. Respecting state and local police officers who patrol streets and highways for our benefit. Being generous with your right of way. If in doubt, give it to the other driver. It's not worth dying over. Keeping your vehicle in good operating condition. Not driving when in an unfit condition — particularly while drinking.

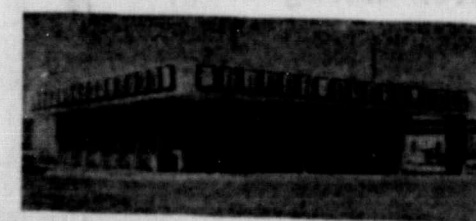

So he got on the horse and Mr. Howard led him for a while, then handed Gip the bridle reins, and the horse slipped in the mud a little forward and then started pitching; threw him off backward and broke his leg between the knee and ankle. Gip can show the evidence with a scar yet. The ambulance then they used to bring him to the doctor was a cot with men walking down the road carrying it by hand. He suffered a good while with this leg. If it had not been for the accident happen- ing at that time, we might have seen one of the world's greatest Rodeo performers dressed in costume to compare with Liberace.

I remember one of the boys of the 1924 graduating class all with white trousers and black coats. He left Memphis and located in Anton and it was not long after he arrived in Anton that the people found out he was a good Broom and they put him to work. He was elected mayor of Anton in April, 1948, and has held that office since that date, and as one of their local citizens stated, "That Broom (Broome) has done a good job of sweeping a long time." This year will make his 22nd year as mayor of this town. I call that a good record. I bet the people run him again this year. He was just a papa when he started on this job, but now he is married to a grand- ma! I have known George Broome since he wore diapers and rompers. I think if you give him a good cigar and an L. B. J. white hat, he could take care of Taming Hall. George is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Broome, long-time residents of Memphis. Congratulations to you George and

will be waiting to hear of election returns, as I am sure you will start on your 24th session as Mayor Broome. Some of George's classmates in MHS were R. C. Lemons, Rabb Harrison of Lubbock, Dr. Alvin Baldwin of Dallas, H. D. Stringer of Washington, D. C., and the late Chaney Thompson of Breckenridge.

## Estelline Talent Show Is Changed To May 8

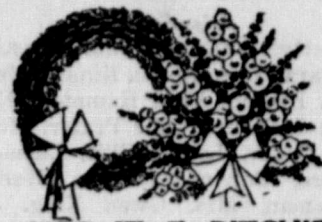

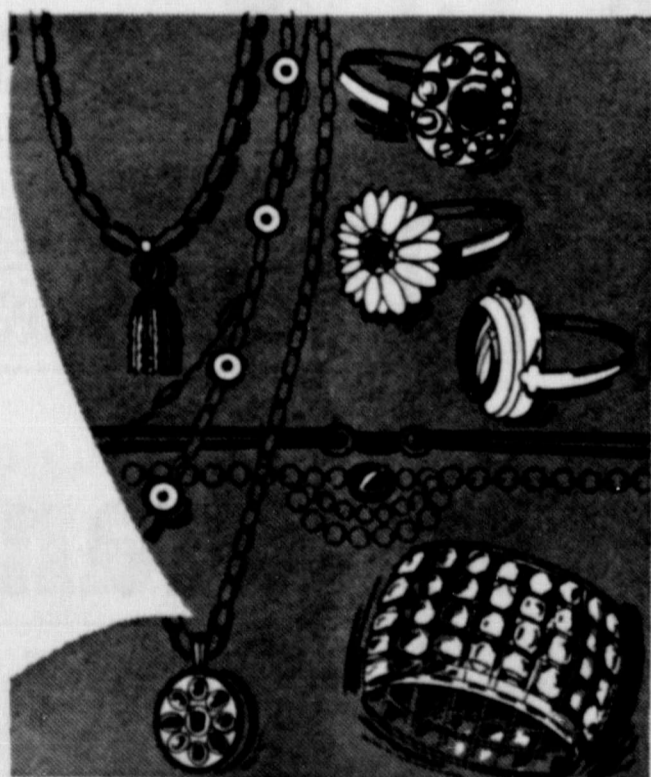
