Coach Glascock made a public announcement of his intentions to move to Ranger at the conclusion of a Spring Sports program before the Memphis Lions Club Wednesday.

"I see in the audience several of the boys I coached since I've been in Memphis," Coach Glascock

said, "Which reminds me of how long I have been here. I feel we have a better all round athletic program today than we had when Coach Chambliss and I came here in 1962. I am proud of what part I have had in the development of this program."

"I wish all the success to your next coach and hope you give him the same excellent support you have given me the past four years, and the same amount of criticism you gave me the first two years," Coach Glascock said.

## Post Offices To Begin Distributing Census Questionnaires Next Saturday

Questionnaires for the 1970 Census of population and Housing will be distributed by post offices beginning Saturday, March 28 to all households in this area, District Manager R. L. Butler of Amarillo announced early this week.

Distribution of this form before the start of the house-to-house canvass gives the family a chance to assemble information about each member and about the house in advance of the census taker's visit. The district manager urged all residents to fill out the forms and have them ready for the census takers when they start their rounds on April 1.

The form contains seven questions about every person in the household and 13 questions about

the dwelling. The personal information asked for is: name, address, sex, color or race, month and year of birth, whether married or single, and relationship to head of the household. The information required about the dwelling is: number of rooms, cooking facilities, plumbing, if rented or owned.

Most of the questions are answered by filling in the proper tiny circle with a common pencil, making a tiny black dot which can be "read" by Census Bureau machines. Residents should read the instruction sheet which will come with the questionnaire before filling it out, Butler stated.

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## EDITORIAL

### Representative Government For All!

We are all soon to face election ballots and select those who will represent us on all levels of government, local, state and national. We think the time has come to seriously examine the principles we use in selecting those we will vote for, or those we will vote against.

Across our desk this week has come "A Study In Marxist Revolutionary Violence: Students For a Democratic Society, 1962-69," as published in the "Fordham Law Review," Vol. XXXVIII, Dec. 1969. The document is worthy of wide circulation in this nation. The subject matter is deadly serious. Consider the statement of Mark Rudd, SDS National Secretary, on Television Station WJW, Cleveland, Ohio in Aug. 30, 1969: "We're not communist inspired. We're communists. Corrupt, evil and it (our system of government) should be destroyed, in fact smashed."

A disease afflicts America today—the disease of extremism. We see extremism of several varieties: left wing (Old Left and New Left): right wing (Minutemen): black extremism (Black Panther Party): white extremism (Ku Klux Klan and anti-Negro hate groups). All too frequently verbal assaults by these groups are reinforced with violent acts: murder, assault, arson, bombings.

The integrity of democratic institutions are dangerously threatened by extremism. Every American should be concerned.

We all know our democratic society is held together by the law—that body of precedents, interpretations, statutes and pragmatic applications which theoretically provides balance, fair play and, to the best of human judgment, justice and dignity to the individual. The democratic process provides for change—but change within the framework of law.

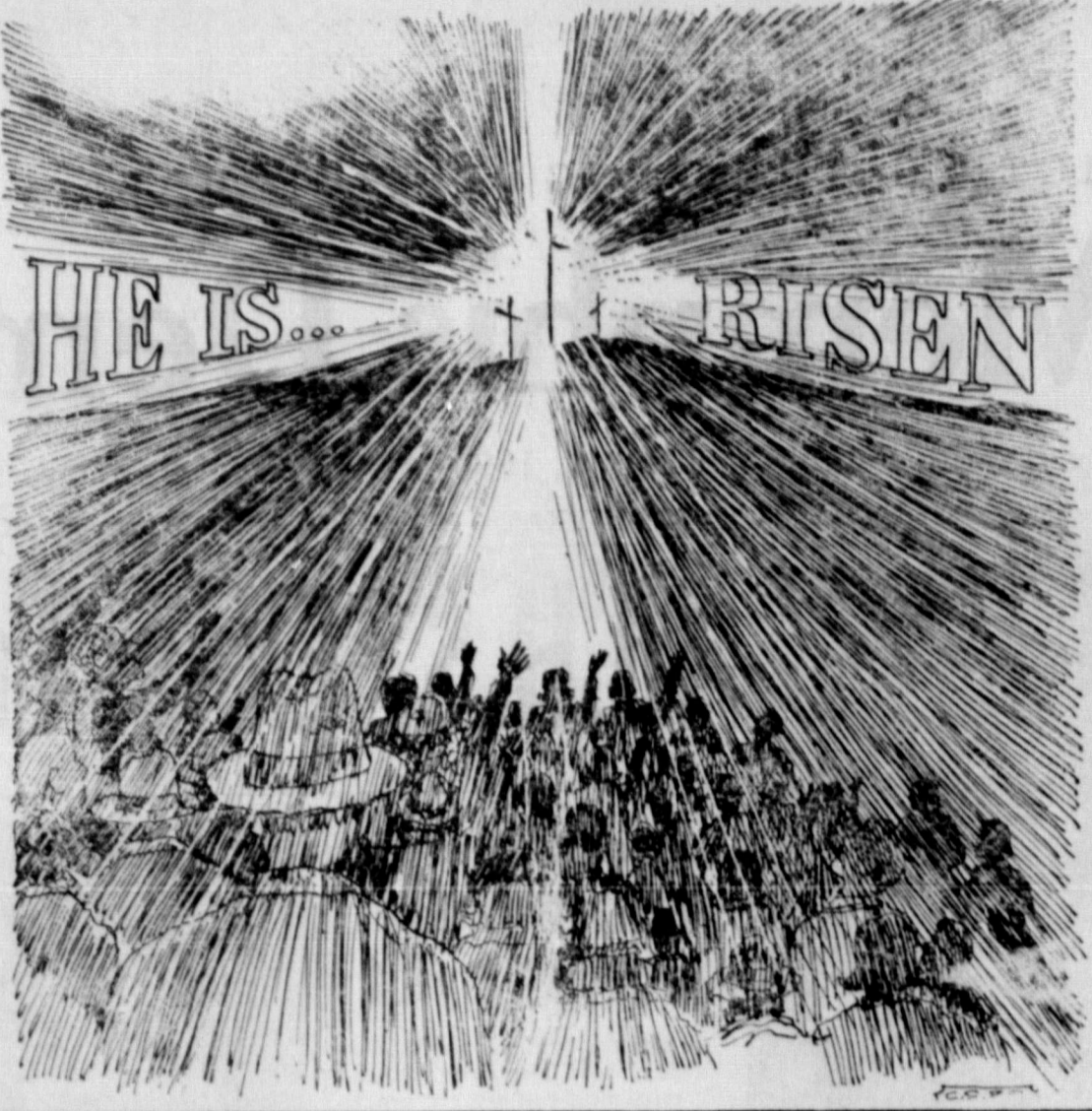
Our society allows and encourages protest and dissent, the opinions of the minority as well as the majority. These are such things as writing or visiting your congressman or other elected officials, letters to the editors of newspapers, petitions to legislative and executive bodies, and peaceful rallies and demonstrations. A great strength of our society is its ability to adjust to new problems, issues, and challenges through orderly and lawful change.

When any group openly proclaims that our government should be overthrown by violence, the time has come to be concerned—and we as a nation have reached that point!

The document goes into depth describing the reasons SDS members taunt and hurl bitter obscenities against established authority in this nation. Some SDS leaders talked about "the politics of guilt"—meaning that, in their opinion, Americans have troubled and guilty consciences about injustices and inequities in their society.

What do all these things have to do with the upcoming elections? Well, as we see it, it is this. When we vote for a man to represent us in government, who promises to take care of our own particular group (because we are a majority and can elect him) but he is against this minority group or that minority group, or will raise taxes on this segment before he will on us, or he promises any special favors that we probably don't deserve, then we are guilty of creating injustices and inequities in this nation.

A representative should have the moral fiber to represent all the people all the time and do what is best for the poor as well as the rich, the farmer as well as the industrialist—in other words seeking justice and fair play for all. Tullia Editor H. M. Baggerly last week hit the nail on the head when he said, "If he isn't willing to serve all, he isn't qualified to serve any."

### What Other Editors Say

With the threat of a postal strike hanging fire. My Akin Back became intrigued with what is received by us thru the mails. Sunday we received 50 pieces of mail and Monday 24 for a total of 74 pieces until noon Monday.

These 74 pieces of mail are categorized as follows: newspapers — 6; state and federal government releases seeking publicity — 19; state and national business firms seeking publicity — 18; unions seeking publicity — 3; third class business mail — 5; 1st class business mail (this is the essential mail to any business firm) — 18; personal letters to staff members — 4; and wrong box — 1.

An orchid to the postal employees — only one mistake in 74 pieces of mail — can you do 74 things without making a mistake? We tend to remember the mistakes and forget all the correct things people do.

There are several very interesting facts revealed above. The State and Federal governments establishment outrequested the entire state and national business community for free publicity. The score — government 19 requests, business 18 requests. Two-thirds of the mail which we received Sunday and until Monday noon was not wanted, not needed and not used.

**This is progress?**  
The earth has changed on its axis more than once in its long history and there are scientists who think it can happen again.

Here is an AP story from London which indicates the Russians have a plan which may bring such a change. It deals with the Soviet 15 year plan to dam the waters of three great Siberian rivers and divert it southward to the Caspian and Aral seas. This would irrigate 85 million acres of arid land and would drain 150 million acres of swamp.

British meteorologists say the scheme would deprive the Arctic of one half the fresh water flowing into it. It would reduce the amount of fresh water on top of the salt water of the ocean and this would reduce freezing which would tend to make the Arctic Ice Cap melt faster. All the time the ice at the South Pole is getting thicker and thicker.

The United States and Canada have a plan similar to the Russians although it is twenty years behind in planning. This would divert water from Alaska and Cana-

sons living in other countries. Feel better? — Ernest Joiner in Sebastopol (Calif.) Times.

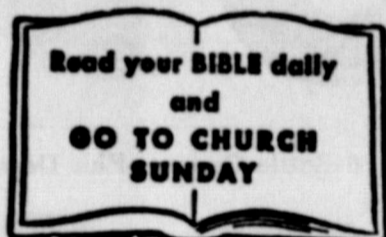

In pagan times an annual spring festival was held in her honor."

"In ancient times on Easter the courts of justice were closed and alms were dispensed to the poor, who were also feasted in the churches. Slaves sometimes were given their freedom at Easter as the rigorous restraints of Easter were over. On Easter Day some people salute one another with an Easter kiss with the exclamation 'He is risen' to which the reply would be 'He is risen indeed,' she concluded.

Mrs. Bill Lockhart continued with Easter Customs, "Most per-

sons are aware of the religious significance of Easter. It is a holy time for both Christians and Jews. Some of the customs include egg coloring, egg hunts, egg rolling on the White House lawn, Easter parades, hot cross buns, food - with pork playing the prominent roll, Easter lillies, and the Easter bunny."

"A Hymn is Born" was the subject for Mrs. Mildred Stephens. "Clint Bonner is the author of this very fascinating book with any number of hymn writers being quoted as to the origin of their thinking in writing hymns. One hymn writer, Isaac Watts, is credited with having written more than 650 hymns but more amazing, Charles Wesley, is credited with having written more than 6500."

"At age forty, Charles Wesley wrote love letters to his bride-to-be in the form of hymns and even wrote one on his wedding day. His brother, John, was anxious to preserve all of his hymns and overlooked one of his best, 'Jesus, Lover of My Soul'. John made the remark he did not want anyone to 'tinker' nor alter any of his brother's songs as they could neither mend the sense or the verse. In 1739 Charles wrote 'Christ the Lord is Risen Today' and it is still one of the favorite Easter hymns. He did not end each line with the Greek word, Alleluia! which gives the words much emphasis so a 'tinkering' editor added that for meaning," Mrs. Stephens concluded.

Cargill was born March 8, 1872, in Louisiana. He was ordained in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. He spent sixty years in ministry, serving churches in Louisiana, Arkansas and Texas. His last pastorate was in Italy. Cargill writes a weekly column in the newspaper in Italy and is in active touch with all of his other communities where he has served.
