Election Returns Will Be Called To Democrat Office

Returns from Hall County voters in the Democratic Party First Primary Election will be handled in the office of the Memphis Democrat Saturday night, following the closing of the polls in the five voting precincts at 7 p. m. This announcement was made early this week by Joyce Webster, chairman of the county Democratic executive committee. Presiding judges of the voting places in Hall County have been requested to call in totals as soon as polls close after 7 o'clock, or bring them to the office of the newspaper. Even if counting is not completed, the totals at the time should be called in. The complete returns may be delivered at a later time, it was explained.

Chairman Webster and other members of the executive committee of the county will be at the office to accept the results, and will post them immediately.

Presiding judges are requested to call the telephone number of The Democrat, collect, 259-2441.

Bill Combs, editor of The Memphis Democrat, is correspondent of the Texas Election Bureau. The first results, even though incomplete will be reported by telephone to the Dallas headquarters of the Election Bureau, and to other news media immediately.

Also, total votes cast in the Republican Primary Election will be turned in at the newspaper office, according to Larry Combest, chairman of the Hall County Republican executive committee. These results will be posted, and will be reported to the Texas Election Bureau and area newspaper, television and radio stations.

EDITORIAL

Go And Vote Saturday

Saturday, May 2, is the date of the Primary Elections for the Democratic and Republican Parties in Texas. The polls will be open, and you as a citizen of this state have an obligation to go vote!

Texas has had more registered to vote this year than ever, over 4,100,000, but will these eligible voters take time out to go and vote? That's what the trouble is. If every voter studied his lesson, and went to the polls and voted as if his vote would determine the outcome of the election and the future of his nation, then everything would be all right. But, many voters make a game out of their ballots.

First, some never get to the polls to vote in the first place, choosing more entertaining activities. Others express a very luke-warm attitude about the voting, do make it to the polls but do not know the candidates or their platforms and play an canic-menio-minie-moe in selecting candidates; or, as some do, vote for both candidates or just leave contested offices unmarked. Some voters play a game of trying not to lose their vote and say, "I haven't voted for a loser in (?) years."

Then there are those concerned voters, who study the issues and the candidates, select their favorites and go vote for them. Or there are those negative concerned voters, who study the issues and the candidates, and go vote against those they dislike.

What this all boils down to is a minority of voters, voting identical ballots, can and often do select the winners in elections. Every time a voter changes his mind, and votes for the other person, it subtracts a vote from Candidate A's tally and adds a vote to Candidate B's tally (narrowing or increasing the gap by two votes). This is why every vote is necessary and essential.

If Hall County is to have a voice in government, the best way to express this voice is having the largest turnout at the polls our citizens can muster. Go vote, exercise your right as a free citizen of this state and nation. Let your voice be heard at the ballot box.

Attend the precinct convention of your party, which will be held Saturday, in a designated place in your voting precinct. Here you will have an opportunity to elect delegates to the county convention, where delegates and resolutions will be voted upon for the party convention of the state. Ask your precinct chairman for the time and place of the convention.

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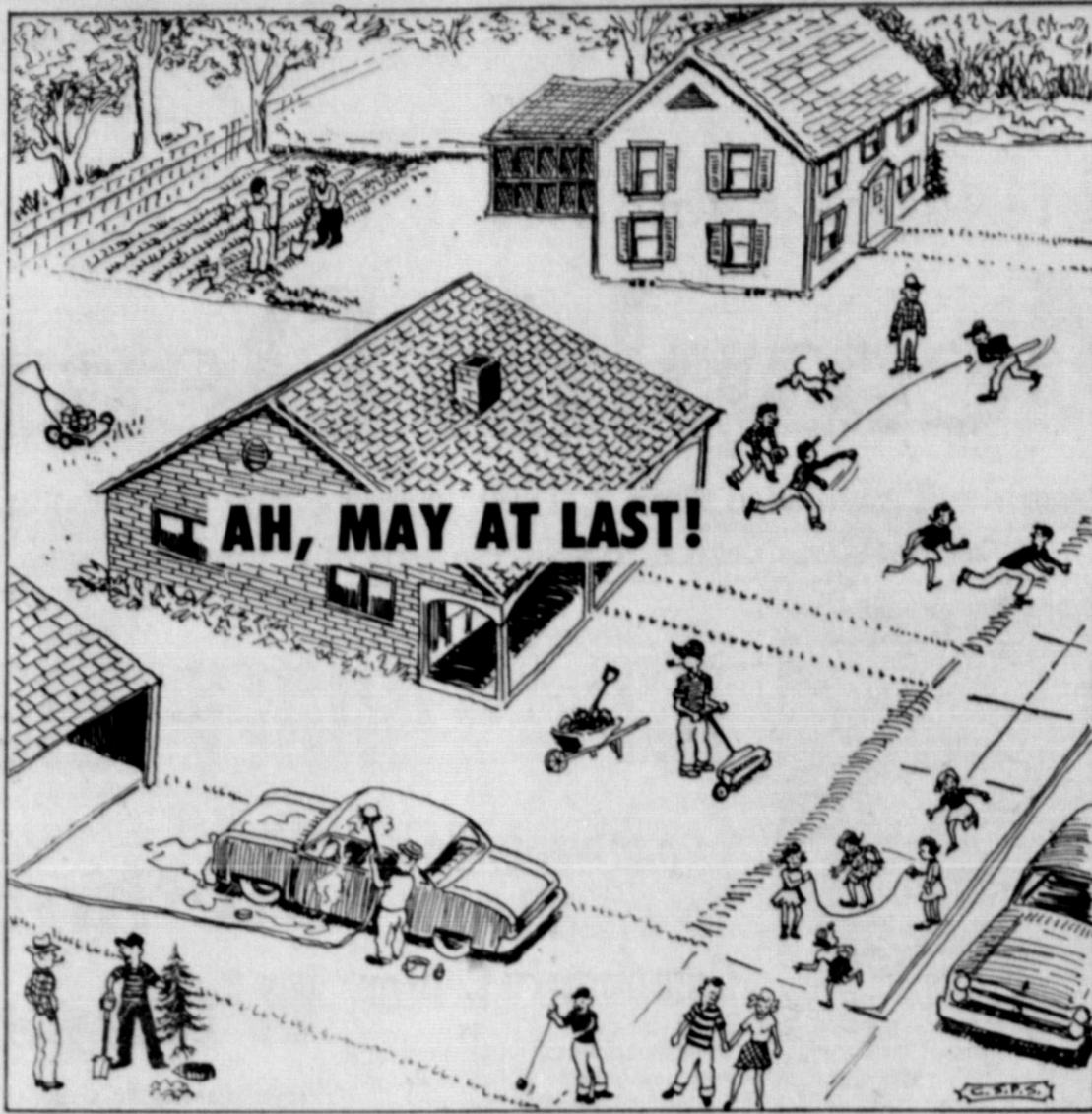

Open meetings and the public

The matter of secret or private meetings of boards and other agencies transacting the public's business has caused much attention and considerable action in Texas recently.

The practice should be stopped once and for all.

Sessions in which the public's business is being transacted should be open to allow the attendance by the public and the press which informs the public.

The Texas Open Meetings Act, passed by the Legislature, was designed to help insure this. It should be vigorously enforced.

And it should be protected against changes designed to weaken it.

The Texas Daily Newspaper Association has termed the act "virtually essential to the press in carrying out its basic function in informing the public."

The idea of secret or private meetings — including "work sessions" or other similar get-togethers prior to public meetings — goes against the concept of a free society.

This battle is not new. It dates back several hundred years and preservation of the citizen's right to know about governmental activities will require continued vigilance.

The press, which informs the public, needs the support of all citizens in protecting their mutual freedom.

The census is important

Everybody seems to be taking the current census that is under way with reasonable seriousness and is cooperating in good spirit, which is the way it should be.

As a national census is taken only every ten years there is always the danger of citizens not attaching the importance to it that is deserved.

But this year, more so than ever before, the census is most important. It not only reflects the population of the entire nation and of individual states, but of a county and the governmental components within the county.

The Supreme Court edict of one-man, one-vote makes the population count vital in setting up political districts. The population figure will determine, for instance, the number of U. S. representatives that Texas will be permitted in the next 10 years. This same population will have a final bearing on state senatorial and state representative districts. Under Supreme court findings, such districts have to be almost equal population-wise and population is the only criteria.

Another factor is that nose



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of valuable information that will have a bearing on future plans for our nation. It will give projections of what can be expected in the next decade and even past that.

The importance of the census behooves us all to lend a helping hand and cooperate in every way with the census enumerators.

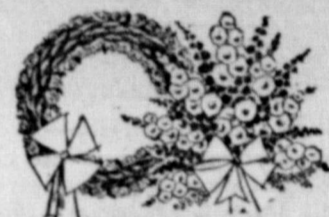

Mayor Kenneth Dale, Lone Star manager Coy L. Mills said today that "with more than 42 percent of all accidents occurring in the home, we're all involved with home safety. This safety campaign in Memphis is part of a system-wide effort by Lone Star to promote basic safety habits to help reduce that figure."

A key feature of the campaign includes distribution of a recently published Lone Star booklet, "Home Safety — So Much Depends on You!" The booklet offers home owners a handy source of safety tips ranging from poisons to a special section on child safety.

As a part of the campaign, demonstrations by Lone Star home economists will include discussions on home safety tips. The home safety booklet and other materials will be available for civic organizations. Also, a home safety exhibit will be featured at the Gas Exhibits Building during the Oct. 1970 State Fair of Texas in Dallas.

Rushing and hurry habits can, and often do cause accidents. "When the rush-bug gets into the kitchen, for example, he can cause burns, cuts and falls. We know he's a menace on the highways, but he's just as dangerous

at home where most accidents in the U. S. occur," Miller pointed out.

Most citizens don't realize that 12,000 fatal falls occur in the U. S. in homes annually. Falls are the leading cause of all home accidents and rank second only to motor vehicle accidents as an accidental killer.

More than four-fifths of all fatal poisonings occur in the home, claiming more than 1,500 Americans each year. The best way to prevent poisonings in a home is to remove all harmful fluids from reach of little ones. Locking up paint supplies, lawn and garden sprays, insecticides, medicines, and fuels is suggested.

Household equipment and appliances should be inspected at least once each year. Appliances which normally provide safe reliable service, become dangerous only when necessary maintenance instructions are ignored.

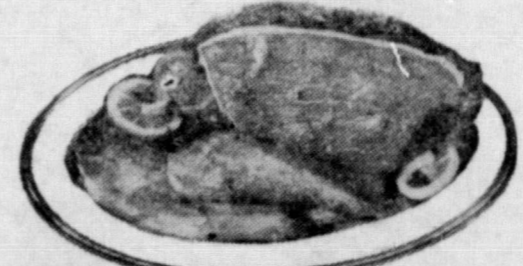

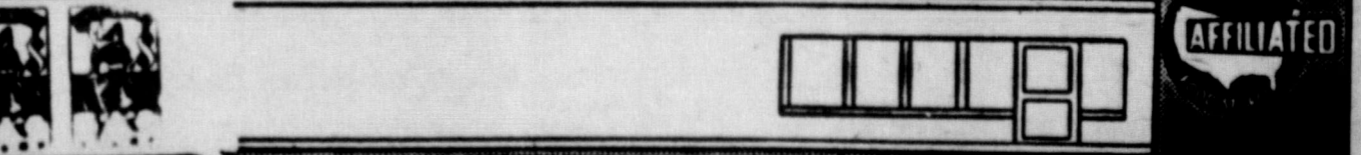

Ramsey Says Gas Is Important To Pollution Control

AUSTIN — Railroad Commissioner Ben Ramsey said here today propane, butane and mixture of liquefied petroleum gases appear destined for an important role in the continuing fight to control air pollution.

Ramsey is seeking a second full term as a member of the three-member Commission in the primaries May 2.

The ever increasing demand for liquefied petroleum gases as fuel for internal combustion engines, space heaters, and central heating units, Ramsey said, constitutes one of the most dynamic elements of the growing market for petroleum products. These light, pure hydrocarbons burn cleanly and efficiently, he explained, and do not contain the lead particles nor the lethal gases that state and federal authorities are found to be harmful and dangerous to humans, plants and other animal life.

Ramsey said the Commission, responsible for protecting the public health and safety in the transportation, storage and use of these gases, has recently adopted revised requirements tailored to help maintain liquefied gas as one of the safest fuels available to the consumer.

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Crop, Livestock Questionnaires To Be Sent To Texas Farmers In May

During the last half of May, some 40,000 Texas farmers will receive at their mailboxes a most important questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin.

County Agent W. B. Hooser says it will be the annual acreage survey and that many farmers in Hall County will be included in the 40,000. The information derived from the replies will be the basis for the official estimates of crop acreage for the State of Texas and for each county.

Cary D. Palmer, State Statistician for the Texas Reporting Service emphasizes the importance of getting back just as many of the 40,000 questionnaires as possible so that each county will well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture, Palmer adds.

The Texas Legislature, explains the county agent, has provided a program of estimates for each county. Because Texas covers such a wide area, State totals alone do not provide adequate information on our most basic industry; hence, the need for county information. The program is a cooperative effort of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture. The county agent urges all farmers in the county who receive the questionnaire to fill it out accurately and completely and return it as soon as possible to the Reporting Service.

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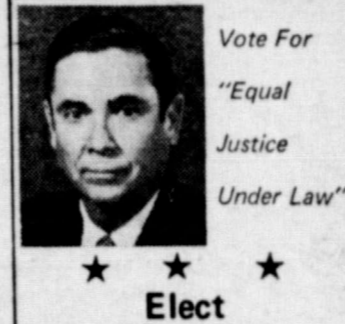

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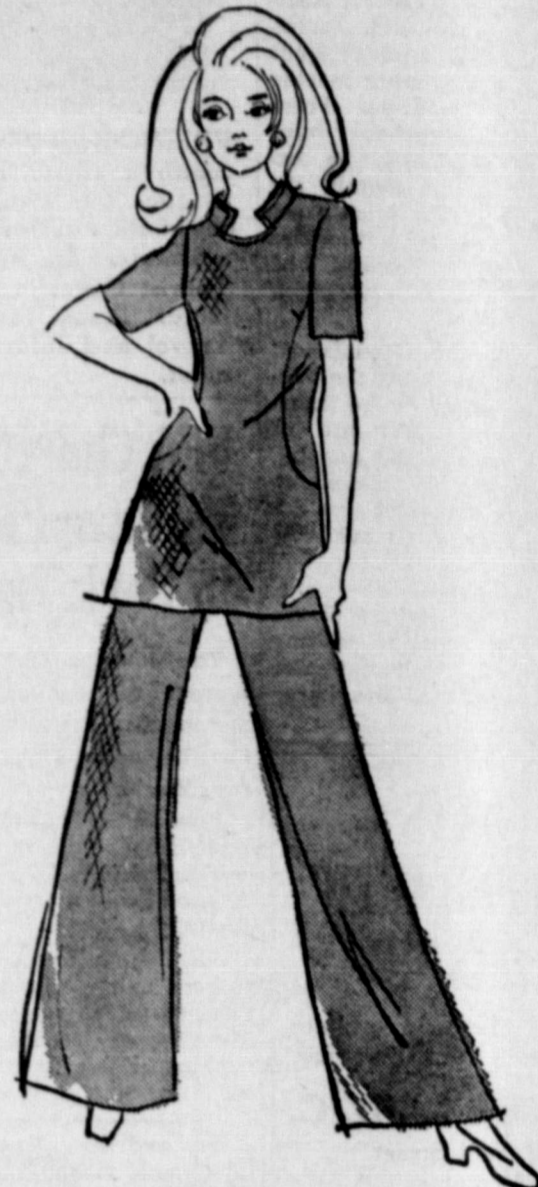
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B. Shots
