

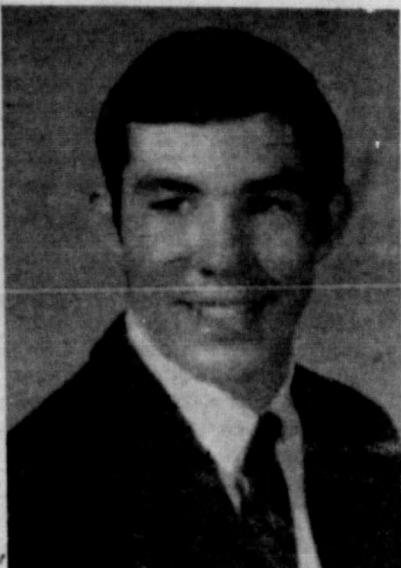

Hall County's Preliminary Population 5,879

According to Preliminary Population counts from 1970 Census Hall County has lost a total of 1,443 persons since 1960 and has been enumerated at 5,879 persons. This is not as great as the decline from 1950 to 1960, but is a greater decline for the county than was expected.

District Manager Robert L. Butler announced the preliminary figures last weekend. Figures for the municipal cities of the county were not released in the preliminary report.

All counties in the southwestern Texas Panhandle lost population according to the preliminary report. Childress county shows a decline in population of 1,940 and a 1970 population of 6,481.

Collingsworth county population is off 1,326 with a 1970 population of 4,950. Donley county's population is down 917 to 3,532 and Briscoe is down 907 to 2,670, as Motley, down 778 to 2,092.

Adult Farm Arc Welding Course To Be Taught

An adult farm arc welding course will be taught at the Vocational Department of Memphis High School June 8 through 11 in the evening hours.

We Salute Our Graduates!

This week, this newspaper is publishing its annual salute to the graduating classes of Memphis, Estelline and Lakeview, and we wish to join with our advertisers in extending best wishes to the 1970 graduates.

It has been the policy of this newspaper to offer some rather mild advice to our graduates as they prepare to enter the adult world, on the eve of their high school graduation night. We would urge them to devote the energies of youth to preparing themselves for useful and productive lives.

For our graduates who go to colleges and universities, we would advise them to take the opportunity presented to them by their parents, study your lessons and strengthen your character.

Our graduates will face tougher decisions on our college campuses now than ever before. Young men and women have always faced these personal decisions of choosing a career, choosing a form of life, committing themselves to the ideas they believe in.

We read with interest recently an article published concerning the Oxford Oath, which became popular and fashionable on the campus of Oxford University in England in 1933. This oath, sworn to by undergraduates, said that these young men would not defend or fight for Country or King against Adolph Hitler.

History tells us that when World War II broke out, these same students fought with the fury of their heritage and many gave their lives. History also teaches us that when people no longer have a will to defend themselves, they are conquered.

Mankind has never had it easy, has never had a period of luxury where it was necessary that work need not be done. Fortunes made by hard work, special advantages, or natural resources, are often lost by heirs of poor intelligence, unable to manage that which was entrusted to them.

America is still the land of opportunity, for those who are willing. It is still the home of the free. Each graduate has already experienced this freedom as they receive their public free high school education.

As our graduates become adult citizens they become heirs of the responsibility of citizenship. If our nation is to remain strong and proud, the envy of the world, it will be because our young men and women dedicate themselves to this effort. It may not be fun, or easy, to shoulder responsibility. But it must be.

WHAT IS 'SATMday'?

As of May 9, citizens of the United States should have observed "SATMday," or "Stop Accumulating Tax Money Day."

The Chamber of Commerce of the United States put its tax experts to calculating how many days out of each year American taxpayers worked to earn money to pay their federal, state and local taxes. The figure as determined by National Chamber tax experts is four months and eight days for 1970.

Figured another way, the average taxpayer works two hours and 49 minutes of an eight-hour day to pay his tax bills.

Here are some other tax facts dug out by the Chamber's taxation specialists:

—Half of the federal individual income tax in the United States is paid by persons who earn between \$5,000 and \$15,000 a year.

—The federal budget did not hit the \$100 billion total until the country was 186 years old, but it took only nine years to reach \$200 billion.

—Interest on the federal debt is \$20 billion. That's more than the entire cost of operating the government only 29 years ago in 1941.

—State and local government's revenues are increasing at the rate of approximately 12 per cent a year and will double in less than seven years.

—State income tax revenues have increased four-fold during the past 10 years.

—The \$210 billion federal budget for 1971 will cost every individual in the U. S., from the newborn babe to the oldest centenarian, almost \$1,000—or to be exact, \$980.

As we see it, since January 1, you have been working for Uncle Sam, your state and your city. Now you can start making money to buy your food, clothes, car, TV set, house and all the other material items of your dreams. Hurry, you only have less than two-thirds of the year left.

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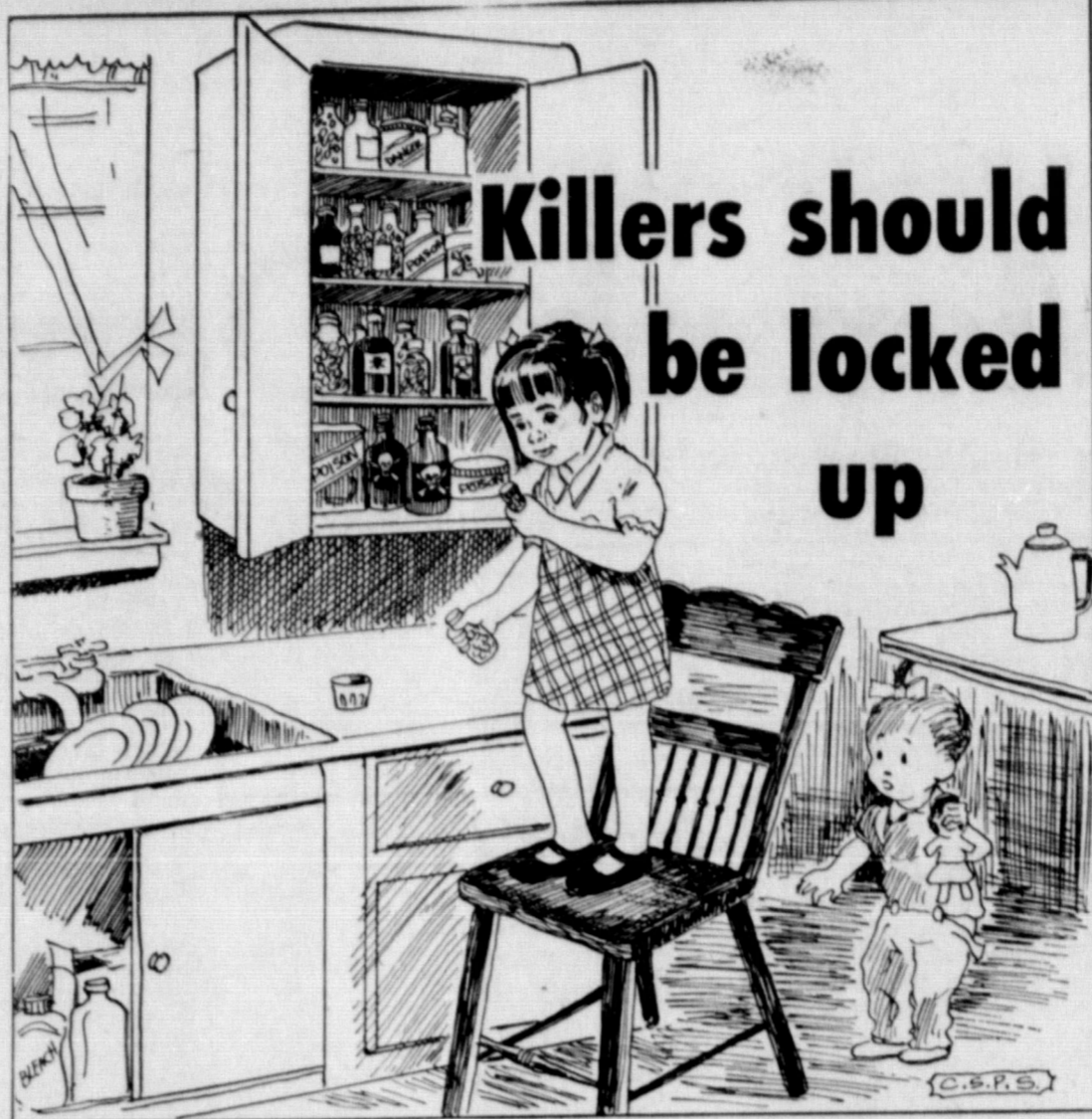

A Workless Society

Among the exciting predictions being made so freely these days is the one insisting that man's laboring days are over.

The workless society, if not actually about to dawn, is already pink in the eastern sky, giving promise of a new future for the laboring man, an existence where he can enjoy the good things of life without having to break a sweat to earn them.

Another prophet squints into the future and foresees that human beings, free from the compulsion to work, will devote themselves increasingly to "dancing, playing and interacting with each other."

This sounds like fun, and all of us like to have fun. Things like dancing and card playing and the like might make life just one big long vacation in which one devotes his efforts to having a good time.

But we have the feeling that this transition from work to play for the average man is not bearing down upon us with express train speed. If ever we have learned anything in this old world it is that you just don't get something for nothing.

True, in these days of inflation and unrest, when the old paycheck gets stretched so thin it sometimes fails to cover the expenses, there is a tendency to look longingly at this workless society and look forward to a time when we can get by without working and have enough money to do the things we want to do.

However, it may be a long time off. The Bureau of Labor Statistics in Washington, whose crystal ball provided accurate during the 1960's on such matters as gross national product and employment trends, says the average work week will not shrink very rapidly.

It forecasts a reduction of only one-tenth of one per cent, from 38.1 hours in 1968 to 37.8 hours in 1980 for non-farm workers. In fact, the work week may even show an increase because of part time workers who take a second job to finance the things they feel they have to have. And a lot of people who work 44 or 48 hours a week would like to work 38 hours for the same money, but it isn't working out that way.

All of which seems to be pointing the way toward continued work. Man goeth forth unto his labor until the evening, the Psalmist said. And it's probably just as well. After a few months of intensive dancing, playing and interacting, a lot of us might begin to think nostalgically of the good old days at desk and bench when all we had to do was work.

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Nothing in this world sounds better to the eager ears of an outdoorsman than the instant purr of an outboard motor . . . when it starts from the first push of the starter button, the first turn of the starter key, or the first pull of the starter cord.

Man, it's a great feeling especially if you have company along. They think you're the greatest host, just to step in the boat, turn on the ignition, and "away we go."

Many a motorist has talked to his motor in rather unclear language, simply because the outfit didn't fire when he said "go."

But he should have talked to himself — not to the motor. More than likely the trouble dated back to when he last had the rig out.

No experienced boatman will merely drive in from an outing, tie down, and go home. If he does, he's asking for trouble.

First thing the seasoned boatman does when he comes to shore at the day's end is to drain the gas from the carburetor. This is done simply and easily. Merely disconnect the gas tank from the motor, then start up the motor again and keep it running until all the gas in the carburetor is used.

Experts in this field just disconnect the gas tank hose as they approach the dock and come on under the power that is left in the carburetor. This way, besides saving a handful of gas, they also save time.

Experience will show you how far you can go with various size motors and various size boats before the carburetor runs dry. Naturally, the smaller the motor, the longer your gas supply lasts.

Thanks to inventive genius, there is another and simpler way to solve this "get-moving-quick" problem. On the market now is a liquid product called Sta-Bil — short for "stabilizer."

This a liquid additive for your gasoline tank. It keeps your gasoline volatile simply by preventing the "conglomeration" that takes place in the gas tank when the fluid (and worse yet, a gas and oil mix) sits for long periods of time.

For example, one ounce of Sta-Bil (three squeezes from the little 8 oz. can) will stabilize one gallon of gas for 12 months, two gallons for five months, four gallons for two months.

It is suggested that, before storing, you run the motor for ten minutes to be sure that all

gas in the carburetor and fuel lines is treated.

Unfortunately, many of us do not "get out to set" every day or even every week. Some of us are lucky if we get away once a month. This means that the motor sits idly in the boat stall, or on the trailer, until you are able to "put in" again. Meanwhile, the gasoline does what comes naturally . . . particularly that to which oil has been added . . . conglomerates. This means that the tank as well as the carburetor becomes gummed up if the fluid is not used often. That's why most outdoorsmen, before they start up their outboard motor, will shake the little gas tank vigorously to distribute the oil evenly throughout the solution or at least get it off the bottom. Not to do so means that the gas being used will be lightly mixed with oil and, as the supply diminishes, the remaining fluid in the tank will be largely oil and, therefore, tend to gum up the motor rapidly.

Sta-Bil prevents congealing. It keeps the fluid clean by preventing gum and resin forming in the fuel system. In other words, it prevents formation of the sticky, troublemaking mess.

Needless to say, a faulty, sputtering motor is going to suffer from wear more than a smoothly operating, easily starting, sweet running outfit. So if you are going to leave your outboard motor sitting idle for a while — add some Sta-Bil. Same goes for your inboard. In fact, it is equally applicable for the lawnmower, tractor, etc. — especially where oil is mixed with gas.

A red fox can attain a speed of 30 miles an hour. But a rabbit can run as fast as 50 miles an hour. This gives it the edge when it comes to being chased by a fox.

No antlered animal, like the Texas white-tailed deer, is native to Africa.

Porcupines occasionally appear beside the road, or in the dwarf timber, of West Texas. These little animals have more than 20,000 quills to protect their body.

Rabbit reproduction is joked about, but a healthy pair of rabbits, where plenty of food is available, can produce as many as 20 offspring per year.

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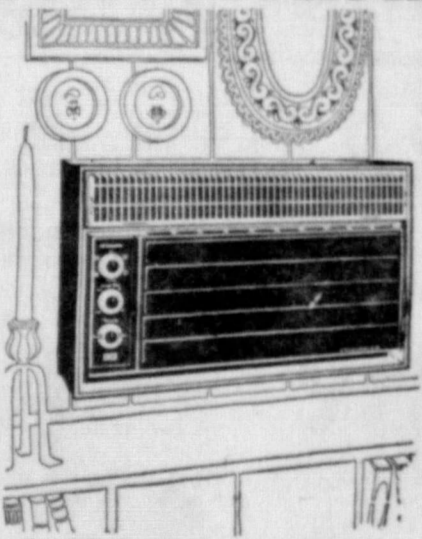
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Ground and About

Paralytic polio is still a disease to be reckoned with, but history has shown that the disease can be eradicated by a comprehensive immunization program, says the Texas State Dept. of Health.

Before the vaccines were available, polio was a disease to be lived with. But with the coming of vaccines, and their acceptance by the people and the medical profession, the decline in paralytic polio has been dramatic. Research in this field had been underway for years before the development, first, of inactivated poliomyelitis vaccine, licensed in 1953, and then of live oral polio-virus vaccine, licensed in 1961.

Because of the availability and general use of effective polio vaccines, the epidemiologic pattern of poliomyelitis in the United States has changed markedly.

In 1955, for example, there were 14,850 cases of paralytic polio and 1,053 deaths in the United States. Eleven years later there were only 108 paralytic cases and seven deaths. This decline is directly related to mass immunization programs throughout the country.

But what of the incidence of the disease in Texas?

During the last 10 years the number of paralytic cases has fluctuated from a high in 1962 of 186 cases to a low in 1969 of only six cases. Total number of cases in this period was 485. In 1966, when Texas had 73 reported cases

of polio, the Lone Star State had two-thirds of all cases (106) in the United States.

The Texas State Department of Health has led the fight against polio and pushed constantly for immunizations. During the 19 years from 1960 through 1969, the Health Dept. distributed almost six million doses of vaccine. Polio cases on a national scope now occur primarily in unimmunized children in the lower economic groups rather than affecting all ages and socio-economic groups. In fact, Texas has more than 200,000 newborns every year. Close your eyes to immunizations for just five years and you have more than a million children in the one-through-five age bracket who may be susceptible to polio.

If you are a parent, don't take a chance on your child becoming a statistic, advises the State Health Department.

Loose Stacking of Hay Has Advantages Over Baling

Hopefully, says County Agent W. B. Hooser, we'll have a lot of hay to either bale or loose-stack this spring and summer. It is time now to consider the storage method to be used.

He notes that loose-stacking of hay continues to gain interest among livestock producers and lists several advantages over baling.

The harvesting cost is lower; feeding and storage costs are less; less labor is involved and it can be self-fed to livestock.

Also a lower investment in machinery is required; storage is possible with a slightly higher moisture content for the hay; the quality is equal to baled hay or slightly better; cattle can be maintained in good condition during the winter and it is an inexpensive method for storing excess forage.

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LOOK COUNTY AGENT SAYS

Aphids Cause Many Kinds of Damage to Plants

New plant growth in the spring is attractive to many kinds of very small soft-bodied insects known as aphids or plant lice. These insects, says County Agent W. B. Hooser, suck juices from the leaves, buds, flowers and twigs of most garden plants.

Their feeding, he adds, causes many different kinds of damage, depending upon the plant under attack and the kind of aphid involved. Green peach aphids, for example, cause the leaves to curl around them. Spruce gall aphids cause the terminal growth they feed on to swell into a cone-shaped gall in which they live.

Other aphids not only cause injury to plants but create a nuisance by dropping their honeydew on sidewalks, driveways and automobiles. This substance also attracts flies, wasps, ants, bees

and other insects. The major honeydew producers are pecan aphids, willow aphids and aphids.

The gardener has several tools available for combatting aphids. One of the newest is the soil-applied systemic insecticide. Several brand name products are available which contain the systemic disulfoton (DiSyston R), mixed in fertilizer or formulated along in a low concentrate granular form.

There are also many foliar sprays that do a good job of controlling aphids or plant lice.

Information is available from his office, Hooser said, covering control measures as well as safety measures to follow when chemicals are being used.

Agent Offers Suggestions For Improving Hay Quality

Cut hay while it is young and tender. Young plants are palatable and highly digestible, but became tough and stemmy when they approach maturity, reminds County Agent W. B. Hooser.

The county agent offers these suggestions on the best time to harvest hay crops. For sudan,

sudan-sorghum hybrids, Johnson-grass, native grasses and similar plants, cut them in the boot stage or just before the seedheads emerge.

Midland bermudagrass should be cut after no more than four weeks of growth, he says.

Most spring hay crops contain high amounts of moisture when cut at the preferred stage. Too, the weather is often rainy, cloudy and cool and the ground moist; thus, creating curing problems.

There isn't much you can do about the weather but something can be done about maintaining the quality of the hay. The use of hay conditioners reduce curing time by as much as one-half; thus, crop can usually be cut and cured at the right time with little or no damage from rain.

The county agent says that fertilizer should be applied after each cutting, especially nitrogen. If production for the first cutting is fairly high, phosphorus and potassium may also be needed.

Soil samples taken prior to harvesting will provide the information or foods to use immediately after the harvest, says Hooser.

Control of Bagworms Effective When the Worms Young

Bagworms, damaging pests of evergreens and occasionally of broadleaf plants, can be found feeding on these plants. Evergreens should be examined closely and if small worms are found, control measures should be applied.

The worms will be difficult to see because of the bag which construct around themselves which foliage is attached. As bagworm feeds and grows, it so does the bag. A heavy infestation can completely strip the foliage. When this happens the plant can be lost.

The same plants are infested by bagworms year after year. Control measures are most effective when worms are small and serious damage is caused by plants.

Additional information on bagworm and other ornamental pests is available at the agricultural agent's office.

B. B. Shots

In the keepsakes of the late Maud Milam given us for Heritage Hall, we find the first "annual catalogue" of Memphis High School in 1899. There were only four teachers in the school, Chas. H. Hittson, principal, Geo. Forgy, summer grade, Nora Alexander, intermediate, Miss Maggie Ryles, primary. The school board called the "Board of Directors", composed of B. F. King, president; A. Roberts, treasurer, and S. G. Alexander, secretary. The rules and regulations were very interesting, as follows: "One requirement, Do your Duty. The school from first to finish is strict—no sectarian and co-educational, yet only Christian teaching and fraternal courtesy will be tolerated. Our Rule is to have no exceptions except as occasions demand. Ten rules are made, ten will be broken; if none are made, none will be broken. We avoid rules and rely upon the integrity of our pupils. Much can be done

by persuasion, little by force. American children are so much like their parents that it is difficult to "make" them do anything. It is better to rule by love." Copied from first annual.

Hope to have the cooperation of the local club women this summer in keeping Heritage Hall open for visitors.

Graduation of 1899 were six girls: Belle Hittson, Ella Hillfield, Blanche Temple, Annie Copeland, Willie Whittle and Eva Harper.

Senior Class of 1899-1900 were one girl and three boys: Myrtle Stephens, Raymond Cottingham, Sam Alexander and James King.

Special advantages: (quote from catalogue) Memphis is an ideal location for a high school. There is not a more beautiful train site on the Fort Worth and Denver road. No saloons and gambling halls curse our community; but three beautiful church spires point heavenward emblematic of pure, peaceful, progressive citizens, and why should they not come to Memphis high school when it offers more than any other high school in the Panhandle?

In the graduating class of 1912 there were only seven: Bessie

Bradley, Vera Craft, Holman Kennedy, Jessie Elizabeth Read, Lena Belle Sloan, James Hubert Thompson and Bernice Wrenn. The graduating program was in the Ann-Wood opera house on north 5th street. They had a play that night "Pygmalion and Galatea." They did not have enough in their class for the play, and they used two of the boys from the 1914 class, Roy (Joe) Thompson and myself were the slaves in this play and I think all the noise we ever made in this play was a "grunt." It was as I remember a very dramatic play. Anyway that is when I won my first and last "oscar." I believe that is what they call them now when they win in acting, but I still cannot find my OSCAR. The colors of the 1912 class were blue and white and their flower was White Rose and motto "Non Confuctus, sed inuitus."

In checking the old records we find the graduation program of the celebrated 1928 class that we have heard so much about from Hiram Crawford, Jimmy Anthony, Ed Foxhall, Edwin Hutcherson, Grover Roden and David Hudgins. I find there were 76 in the class. Their motto for the class was "We instigate while others imitate." Their colors were white and green and their flower was white carnations. Velma Bishop was valedictorian. Others taking part on their graduation program were a violin solo by Jack Thomas, cornet and trombone duet by Colby Delaney and Russell E. Baldwin; recessional by Mrs. Elmer Shelby, invocation by Rev. C. E. Jamison; address by J. W. Cantrell of Wichita Falls, awarding scholarships by H. A. Jackson, awarding diplomas by S. C. Miles and benediction by Rev. S. E. Templeton.

I guess a lot of our problems are solved over a cup of coffee and a lot of trades made sipping coffee. My observation in a local drug store a few days ago was that one booth was filled with Methodist ladies, discussing their recent meeting. Another booth was filled by four or five school teachers solving some of their problems and still another booth was full of four Baptist brothers living up their program, and still one more group of six young grandmothers with sympathetic problems. If they worked at the capitols of our state and nation, they would use up a lot of coffee solving state, national and international problems.

Do not have the report on the Grandma Bowling Team who made the trip to Tulsa, Okla. J. M. Ferrel decided not to open up the aquarium here, but had

a fish fry for his Sunday School dept. He and Minnie fried 186 fish and with corn bread and salad with it, made a real tasty meal. I happened to get invited and it was the same price as bank coffee with service. About 75 adults attended.

A note under the door of Heritage Hall last Monday afternoon from Mrs. James Dunn (Ruth Pendergrass) from Lubbock and Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Pendergrass of Long Beach, Calif. The note said everything looks good from the outside, but do not have time to wait for you to open. Next time give us a ring and we will get you in. Thanks for stopping by. The Pendergrass family were residents long ago.

New items have been added to Heritage Hall. Sue Holland brought in from Estelline Uncle Pete Rigsby's golf knickers, golf clubs and a trophy he won playing golf several years ago. Would like to have the date on this if anyone knows. Other items added to the Hall is the enlarged picture of the late W. M. (Bud) Milam and also a painting by the late Maud Milam. The scene is a Salisbury Hill, south of Memphis. The pony skin coat that was bought by Maud about 1906 when teaching one of her first schools. A bunch of records and newspapers brought in by Mrs. Felix Cochran, sister of Maud and daughter of the late W. M. Milam. Our latest donors to Heritage Hall — Maud Milam Estate and Mr. and Mrs. Felix Cochran.

We had a special showing in Heritage Hall last Friday morning for the first graders of Travis school. Gladys Williams, teacher of one class with 18 pupils and Jo Ann Bailey with the other class with 15 pupils, making a total of 35 looking Heritage Hall over. Teachers and pupils were very complimentary of the displays and they were attracted by the eagles, also animals, old post office, old bicycle, buffalo, ox yoke, and were interested in the pictures of the school room where they found

pictures of their parents and grandparents.

One of our strong supporters of Heritage Hall, Orville Finch of Dalhart, was given a 50-year award from Kiva Temple Shrine in Amarillo as shown on TV a few days ago. He had been a continuous member for over 50 years. Congratulations to a man that is still percolating like Orville who is now over 90 years old. I think his family came to Hall County in 1890 and they experienced a lot of hardships in the old days to help bring us up to date. The late J. A. Finch was the father of Orville Finch and Howard.

We had 60 people register in Heritage Hall last Saturday which was 20 per hour, as we only open three hours. Old-timers here were Lonnie Elmonson and wife Bess (Anthony) Edmonson, now of Amarillo. They both thought we had made a lot of progress in our displays. They brought word from Mrs. Roy (Ruby Baldwin) Leverett, who is now in Hillhaven Convalescent Home, says she is doing as well as she could being sick like she is. I think having a grand-

daughter in Austria, now as Rotary exchange student, has helped her morale a lot. Sharron is the daughter of Anna Beth Leverett Short and remember as Sharon Short.

Mrs. Carl (Ruth Finch) Harrison may have been a week late on Mother's Day, but she was making up as she had all of her kids in Heritage Hall Saturday, and think they all enjoyed the tour as there

were a good many items in Heritage Hall from the Finch family. Sharon from Hedley, Carlene of Midland, Allan of Minneapolis, and Jim of Dallas.

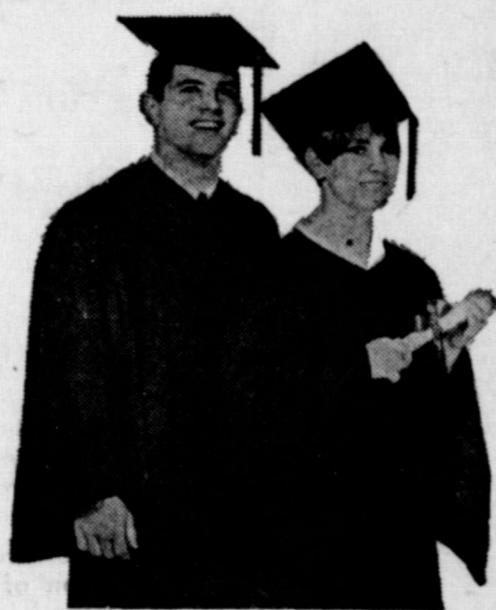

Food Stamp Has Affected Texas

COLLEGE STATION — Major expansion of the Food Stamp Program announced in January has affected Texas. Latest figures show that food stamps valuing more than \$2.5 million are spent by Texas limited-income households monthly.

The program has been implemented in 11 counties and 20 more are in the process of establishing a food stamp program.

The families buy a certain amount of federal food coupons (food stamps) each month. The U. S. Department of Agriculture then provides additional coupons to increase the family's food buy-

ing power. About 75 percent of the coupons are free.

All Texas counties should have food stamp or donated food programs by June 30, according to State Department of Public Welfare officials who administer the distribution of both programs.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service coordinates county educational programs to help families use food stamps and commodity foods provide nutritionally adequate meals. These families are among those enrolled in Extension's Expanded Nutrition Program.

The Texas State Nutrition Council asked the Extension Service to act as county coordinator of the educational programs in use of donated foods and food stamps. Home demonstration agents were asked to work with other agencies

groups on these programs. Agents train leaders to work with the families, Mrs. Florence Low, assistant director for home economics, said. Leaders learn to give food demonstrations, conduct workshops and group meetings and make home visits. The leaders then work with families in the two programs.

Food stamps are used like cash in local stores authorized to accept them. They can be used only to purchase food.

Five Texas counties — Montgomery, Childress, Parker, Wharton and Brazoria — soon will establish the program. The Food Stamps Program now operates in areas of Houston, San Antonio, Bryan, Ft. Worth, El Paso and Big Bend of West Texas.

In the commodity food program, low income persons receive about \$14 a month worth of food such as flour, cornmeal, canned juice, cheese and canned meat.

According to existing plans, the Food Stamp Program will replace donated foods, said E. W. Keykendall, assistant director for Commodity Distribution Division, Austin.

YOUR COUNTY AGENT SAYS

Insecticide Use Will Increase With Warmer Weather—Use Caution!

With warmer weather insects pests will increase, and this means, says County Agent W. B. Hooser, insecticide use will also become more widespread.

Since insecticides come in many forms, it is important to know some of the terms used to describe them. There are dusts, wettable powders, soluble powders, emulsifiable concentrates, oil solution, granulated materials and aerosols and spray bombs, explains the county agent.

Dusts do not mix with water and should never be used as sprays. They come as dry powders ready for use.

Wettable powders are for spray use. They contain a wetting agent and may contain up to 85 percent of the actual ingredient.

Soluble powders are chemicals which readily dissolve in water. They can be applied with low-pressure, low-volume sprayers.

Emulsified concentrates are liquids carrying the insecticide in a suitable solvent and emulsifier. They can be applied with low-pressure, low-volume sprayers.

TDA Intensifies Efforts On Use Of Pesticides

AUSTIN — An intensified pesticide monitoring program to define any existing problems in the State of Texas caused by the use of chemicals in agricultural production is being developed by the Texas Department of Agriculture, Commissioner John C. White reports.

Brooke Tidswell III, a graduate of the College of Agriculture and Environmental Science at Rutgers University, is helping initiate the program.

In the program, TDA also began operating its new Pesticide Residue Laboratory in Brenham in October, 1969, with the primary purpose of testing crops for harmful residue. White's agency also

Oil solutions are ready for use and may contain from a half to 10 percent active ingredients.

Granulated materials are ready to use insecticides in or on particles of a carrier. They are useful for controlling soil insects.

Aerosols and spray bombs produce a fine mist or a coarse spray. Fine mists, aerosols, are used to control flying insects and the coarse spray bombs for leaving a residue of the insecticide.

In addition, baits, insecticide-fertilizer mixtures, insecticide-herbicide mixtures and moth-proofing agents are some of the special formulations available.

Regardless of the form of the insecticide used, Hooser emphasized the need for following label directions to the letter and using them only for the purpose stated on the label. All should be stored out of reach of children.
