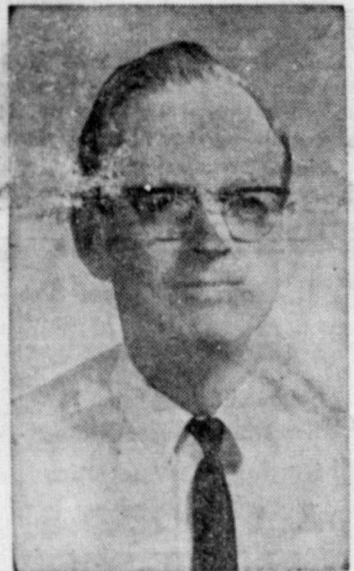

Farm Welding Short Course To Be Held June 8-11 At Vo. Ag. Dept.

"A farm welding course for adult farmers will be held June 8-11 under the sponsorship of the Memphis High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. C. L. Chambless, Superintendent and Mr. Ronnie Morris, teacher of Vo.-Ag.

Mr. Joel R. Barton, welding specialist with the Vo.-Ag. Division of the Texas Education Agency and the department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M College, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M College.

Mr. Barton is a native of Glasscock County, Texas, and was reared on a West Texas ranch. He attended grade school in San Angelo and graduated from high school at Big Lake, Texas. He holds a B.S. degree in animal husbandry from Texas A&M. After five years as a pilot in the U. S. Air Force, Mr. Barton served as an agricultural specialist in Texas

State hospitals and special schools. In addition to regular classes, he set up farm shops and gave instruction in farm welding and general farm repair.

Memorial Day, 1970!

Saturday, May 30, is Memorial Day, and citizens of Memphis and Hall County will be involved in observing the special day of remembrance with an 8 a. m. Memorial Service on the Courthouse Lawn sponsored by the American Legion Post of Memphis.

Flags will be flown, wreaths will be placed at statues on the Courthouse square and at the cemetery, and the memories of those from this area who have given their lives for this nation while serving in uniformed services will be recalled.

The American Legion Auxiliary will be selling poppies to be worn as is the custom of the special day or memorial.

For some in this nation, Memorial Day has a very special meaning. For the Veterans, the day is vivid with such memories of fellow Americans sharing hardships, fighting in a united effort against a common enemy, of accomplishments and heart-breaks, of events which changed peoples lives and changed the destiny of nations.

Citizens of this nation have many things to remember on this occasion. Americans have accomplished many things since this nation was founded, and men and women serving in uniforms have played vital roles in all perilous times. The uniforms have changed, the names of wars have changed, but the principles behind the conflicts remain.

Memorial Day is a time to remember. Nathan Hale said, "I regret that I have but one life to give for my country." We remember those we have known who have given their lives for their country. We remember them with honor, with dignity, and with pride that they were fellow Americans. We also remember those who served, and served well, but of whom the supreme sacrifice was not required.

Patriotism is carried in the heart. It is felt on special occasions. It can bring a tear to the eye when the Pledge to the Flag is spoken by a group of youth, at the playing of the National Anthem at a sporting event, or at seeing the Flag flying on a spring day.

Patriotism is a sign of strong character, for it is almost impossible for one who is selfish and greedy to be patriotic for patriotism requires sacrifice.

Memorial Day is also a time to be thankful. Thankful that because of the sacrifices of others, we can still enjoy the blessings of living in a free democracy, where we can worship God unmolested, participate in the running of our government, enjoy the protection of our legal system, labor in whatever endeavor we choose, and have almost unlimited access to what ever knowledge we may seek or desire.

What Other Editors Say

In the life on an editor

They are preparing a special rail for Editor Ben Ezzell over at Canadian. They plan a little ride for him, say, out of town. Seems Ben has been a little dovish here of late and very few Texans can stand that.

Ben took strong exceptions to the Cambodian situation week before last and I just as strongly disagreed with him all the way.

This week The Record carried a near page ad from Royce K. Jones, an advertiser and subscriber of Ben's, who took the bark of all the way for his dovishness agreed with Jones all the way until I ran into "This will be my last advertisement in your paper." Economic boycott against American newspapers because of their editorial stand is one of the greatest threats to freedom we have. Especially so, when that boycott is directed at a weekly paper, the most independent of the news media in the country and the one most vulnerable because of their limited income in a small town.

Another thing Mr. Jones doesn't realize is the fact he is using coercion through threat of financial ruin to the paper, and in his ad-editorial this is one of the things he is fighting the hardest against.

The dissenters today are using coercion against the government to cause us to surrender in the Far East. Such coercion is vicious and has no part in American life. Persuasion is the valient means

used by free men to express their differences. — The Claude News

Concern, but not panic

Chief Justice Warren E. Burger recently gave the American Law Institute a sound lesson in perspective.

"It would be foolhardy not to be concerned about the turmoil and strife and violence we witness, much of it mindless and devoid of constructive ends," he said.

"But concern must not give away to panic."

He recommended a "studied and restrained response" to the "uneasy temper of the times which stir and shake the mind and the spirit."

While the nation must cope with the events which disturb it, he said, and preserve "that order without which no progress or development is possible," he argued against repressive crackdowns on dissent, against suspending any of our fundamental guarantees of expression and protest.

"We urgently need to find ways to convince the young," he said, "that progress is not made in great leaps."

In short, you don't fight ex-

tremism with more extremism.

The chief justice's words offer reasonable guidelines both to those who lash out blindly at our institutions and system, and to those who would blindly respond with coercive, generalized suppression.

Progress in a democratic society, as he said, always comes "without haste or hysteria."

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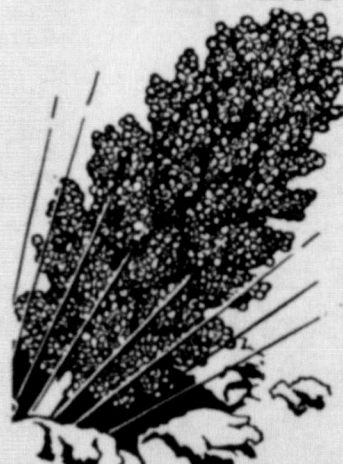

801 Men To Be Inducted From Texas In June

AUSTIN — The June draft call for Texas is 801, and no man will be selected and ordered for induction with a random sequence number higher than 170, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said last week. Texas Local Board No. 29 has called for 5 men for induction and 24 men for armed forces physical on June 10, 1970, it was announced. The June quota is down from 1,000 in May, which is being filled by men having random sequence numbers no higher than 145. The state quota for preinduction physical and mental examinations in June is 2,320, down from 2,500 in May. Men sent for these

examinations will be limited to those with random sequence numbers 1 through 215.

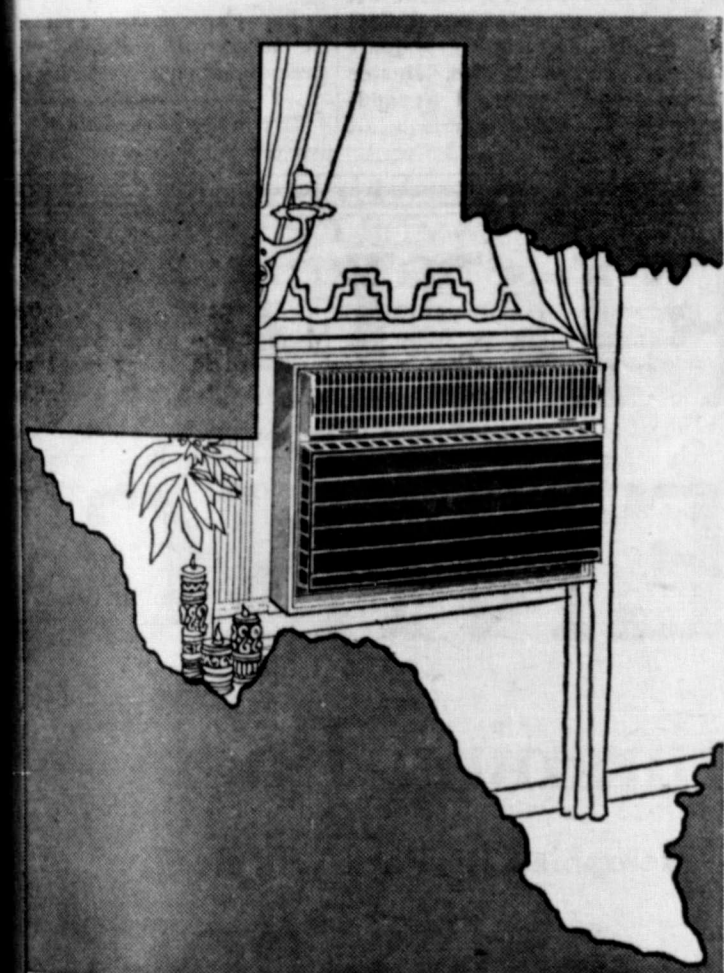
Deferred or exempt men, such as teachers, college students, and vocational or trade school students, with random sequence numbers 1 through 215, may be forwarded for these examinations if they are likely to lose their deferred or exempt status during the next six months, Colonel Schwartz said.

No men with random sequence numbers above 215 will be forwarded for examination until further notice. Men born in 1951, who have no random sequence numbers, will not be called for this purpose. A drawing will be held later this year to establish the numbers for the 1951 group.

All volunteers at the draft boards must be inducted ahead of the non-volunteers selected and ordered to report for induction by random sequence number. The Texas induction quota of

801 for June is the state's share of a national call for 15,000 men, all for the army.

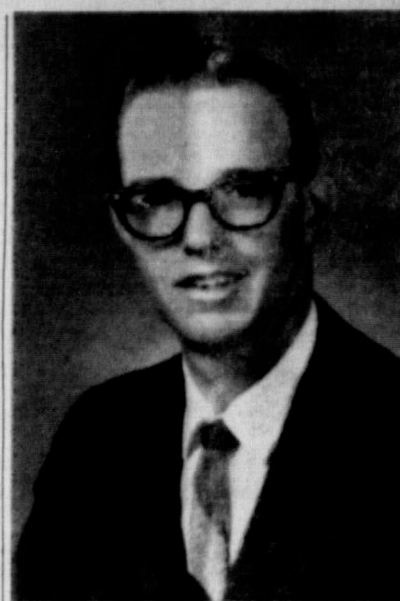
Larry Parks To Receive Business Degree At U-T

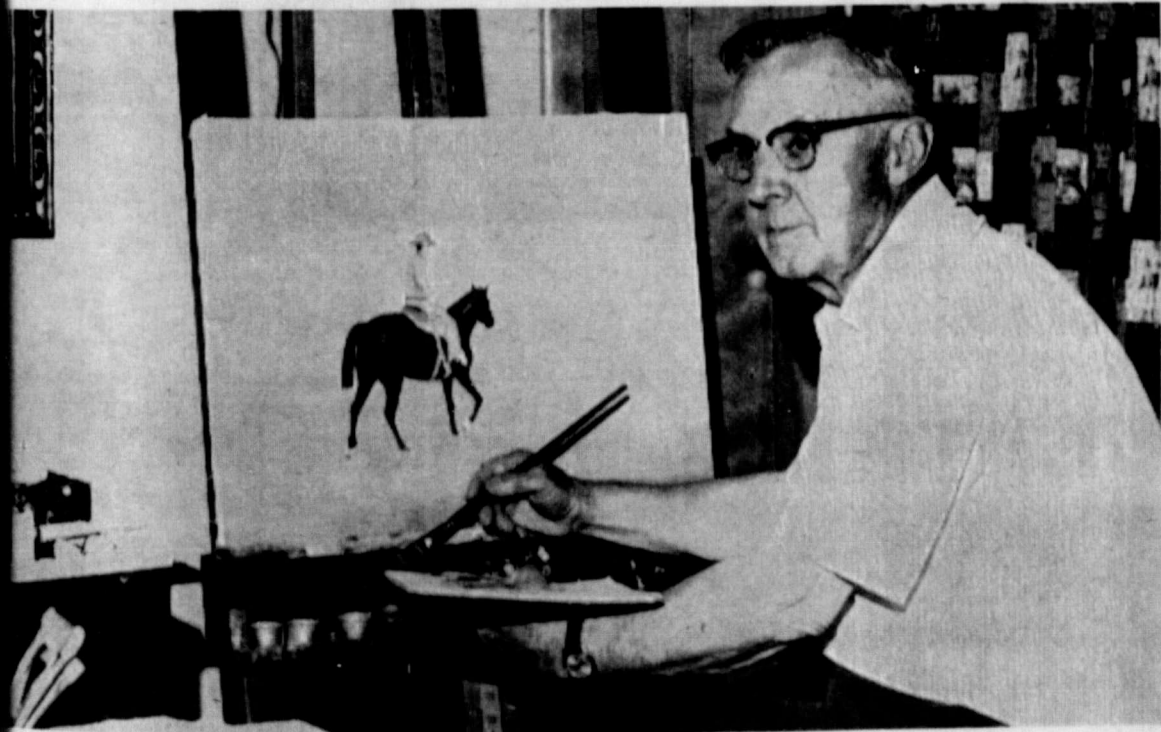

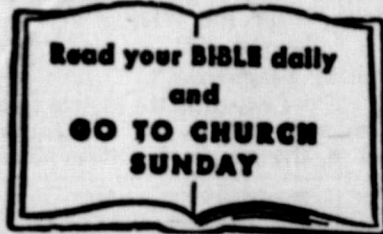

County FB Moves Against Act To Unionize Laborers

Directors of the Hall County Farm Bureau last week were alerting members of the local organization about the possibility of the U. S. Congress passing legislation making unionization of farm labor compulsory. According to W. M. Davis, Jr., president, a letter is being mailed to county farmers alerting them to the possibility, and urging each to write Congressman Bob Price, and Senators Ralph Yarborough and John Tower, and express opposition to the bills before the Senate and House of Representatives.

The heading at the top of the form letter, "What Is The Possibility of Unionized Farm Labor?" calls attention to the issue. Excerpts from the letter are as follows:

"A Bill is now being considered that would make Unionization of Farm Labor Compulsory. 'Some say 'It won't affect me, because I don't even have an employee.' It will affect everyone in one way or another. Remember how the dock strike affected us last year. No cotton could be shipped. Did that help your cotton sales?"

If farm labor should become unionized it would also be the gins, implement houses, seed dealers, grain storage, etc., so it will affect everyone regardless of what size farm you operate.

"If Senate Bill No. 8 should pass, here are some of the provisions:

"The Labor Management Relations Act, and the judicial interpretation thereof during the past 34 years would become applicable to the employment relationships between farmers and farm workers."

Other items pointed out included Union Representation, Exemption, Strikes, Strikes for Non-Wage Purpose, and Fines. Each of these are explained in the letter.

Davis said that this bill has the backing of some so-called farm organizations who are also encouraging passage of it.

"The Farm Bureau opposes this bill, and the directors of the Hall County Farm Bureau urge you to write our congressman and senators. Let's tell them what we think of this bill before it is too late," Davis said.

(Continued from Page 1) agriculture, Plainview, Texas. Arrangements for the adult education short course in welding and in other fields are made through Mr. Labay's office.

The short course at Memphis is scheduled to begin June 8th at 7 p. m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held June 9, 10 and 11. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Barton will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Ronnie Morris.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. C. L. Chambless, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Mr. Ronnie Morris. An entry fee of \$5.00 will be charged. Farm Welding Course Certificates will be presented to each enrollee who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Barton states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as safety in welding, factors controlled by the operation in running a bead and striking an arc, types of electrodes, preparation of joints, distortion, cutting, hardsurfacing, and pipe welding.
